Donald Bass Sentenced to **Twenty Years**

CHARLOTTE COURT HOUSE –On July 22, 2020 Judge Kimberly S. White sentenced Donald C. Bass on three charges of dis– tributing cocaine in Charlotte County. Bass was sentenced to 20 years, with all but two years suspended on each charge for an active six-year sentence. All suspended time is con-ditional to his good behav-ior for a period of 20 years and completion of two years supervised proba-tion. He is also ordered to pay \$600 in restitution to the VSP BCI Criminal Fund. The charges were the result of an investigation by the Tri-County Drug and Gang Task Force. The Tri-County Drug and Gang Task Force is comprised of Narcotics Investigators and Special Agents of the Charlotte County Sheriff's Office, Lunenburg County Sher-iff's Office, and the Virginia State Police Division III Bureau of Criminal Investigation Appomattox Field Office. MEHERRIN – A shoot-ing incident in Meherrin resulted in the arrest of a Meherrin woman. The shooting incident took place around 9:30 p.m. on July 25 along Schul-tz Mill Road in Meherrin. When they arrived, dep-uties from Prince Edward County Sheriff's office found a man with a gunshot wound.

The wounded man was taken to Centra Southside Community Hospital, according to reports.

The investigation resulted in the arrest of a 24-year-old Meherrin resident, Brittany Eas ter Ortíz, 24. She was charged with malicious wounding and taken to Piedmont Regional Jail. In this case we all survived and know exactly what went wrong and how.

When I make a stupid mistake I try to share it as much as I can. I hope I can prevent someone else from doing the same thing.

The event was humiliating, frightening and humbling.

For my entire life I have loved swimming. I have swum in creeks, rivers, lakes, oceans, quarries and farm ponds. I have swum by day and night. I have swum in storms. I swim in swimming trunks and without.

I have taken numerous children swimming and not danger. Not once have I felt not in control.

There have been many times when teaching a child to swim that I have reached over and plucked a child from the water before he or she was in real danger. I thought I was in control.

Last week changed that.

Both boys were playing in about 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ feet of water. Both are beginning swimmers and can dogpaddle and both can float on their backs.

LOCAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Virginia regulations for both special and gifted education require the establishment of an advisory committee. In Charlotte County, these committees have been consolidated into one committee. The committee is composed of parents, community leaders and school personnel who volunteer their time and effort to assist the school division in developing and implementing programs for special education and gifted students. The school board approves the committee members. An attempt is made to balance the committee



for geographic and ethnic representation. The committee meets, at a minimum, three times each year. All meetings are open to the public. Information as to the meeting dates, times and places may be obtained by calling Ms. Jamie Brown at 434-542-9503.

The committee has many functions which include:

- Advise the school division of unmet needs in the education of special education and gifted students.
- Assist the school system in the formulation and development of long-range plans designed to provide needed educational services for special and gifted students.
- Participate in the development of priorities and strategies for meeting identified needs.
- Provide periodic reports and recommendations regarding the education of special and gifted students to the division superintendent: and.
- Assist the school system in interpreting plans to the community.

Effective July 1, 2019, a booster dose of Tdap vaccine is required for all children entering the 7th grade. Central Middle School **MUST HAVE PROOF** of this requirement being met **BEFORE** the first day of school of the next school year.

Students will not be allowed to start classes unless Central Middle School has appropriate documentation that the shot has been given or official notice that the student is exempt.

The only exceptions to the law are listed below:

- 1. a religious exemption which <u>requires</u> that a Religious Exemption Form be completed, notarized and provided to the school, **or**
- 2. Documentation <u>from a physician</u> indicating the child cannot receive the vaccine due to medical reasons.

Please make arrangements for the shot <u>BEFORE</u> the first day of school which is AUGUST 10TH.



Human Papillomavirus (HPV) for rising 6th Grade Girls.

Parents MAY CHOOSE to give or not to give the HPV vaccine to their daughters. There is NO REQUIREMENT to provide the school with proof of HPV vaccination. If the HPV shot record is provided, we will add this to the student's shot records.

Both Tdap and HPV are available through doctor's offices and the Charlotte County Health Department in Charlotte Courthouse.

Please take a copy of your immunization record with you when you make an appointment. You may obtain a copy of immunization records from your child's school.

MEDIA RELEASE 2020-2021 POLICY FOR PROVIDING FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS

Today announced its policy for providing free or reduced price meals for children served under the National School Lunch, and/or School Breakfast Programs. Each school and/or central school nutrition office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

Household size and income will be used to determine eligibility for free or reduced price meal benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines, shown in the chart below, may be eligible for either free or reduced price meals. Children who are members of households receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits (formerly the Food Stamp Program) or who receive Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) may be automatically eligible for free meals. Children who are homeless, migrant, or runaway may also be automatically eligible for free meals. Foster children, who are the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court, are eligible for free meals regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Children who are members of households participating in WIC may also be eligible for free or reduced-price meals based on the household's income

Family Member - ADD \$5,824 \$8,288 Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free or reduced price meals for their children. Applications are also available at the principal's office in each school and at the central office. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households must only fill out one application per household and return it to the school division. Applications may be submitted at any time during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used for determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials. For school officials to determine eligibility for free or reduced price benefits, households receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) only have to list their child(ren)'s name and SNAP or TANF case number and an adult household member must sign the application. Households who do not list a SNAP or TANF case number, including WIC households, must list the names of all household members, the amount and frequency of the income received by each household member, and the last four digits of the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If the household member does not have a social security number, the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available. The application must be signed by an adult household member in order to be approved.

Households may apply for free or reduced price meals at any time during the school year. If a household is not eligible now but has a change, such as a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, becomes unemployed or qualifies for SNAP or TANF, the household should contact the school for an application. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines.

Households that receive Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits (formerly the Food Stamp Program) or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) may not have to complete an application for free or reduced price student meals. School officials will determine eligibility for free meals based on documentation, obtained directly from the Virginia Department of Social Services, that a child is a member of a household currently receiving SNAP or TANF. School officials will notify these households in writing of their eligibility. Households who are notified of their eligibility, but who do not want their children to receive free meals, must contact the school. SNAP and TANF households must complete an application if they are not notified in writing of their automatic eligibility within the first 10 days of the new school year.

In accordance with Federal civil rights law and U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) civil rights regulations and policies, the USDA, its Agencies, offices, and employees, and institutions participating in or administering USDA programs are prohibited from discriminating base race, color, national origin, sex, disability, age, or reprisal or retaliation for prior civil rights activity in any program or activity conducted or funded by USDA.

This increase in COVID cases is a cause for concern as we prepare for our students to begin school in roughly two weeks. A Tradition of Our Rights Of greater anguish to me is our loss of rights this year. After swearing with his hand on a Bible to uphold the state and federal constitution, Governor Northam decided that his power superseded the constitution. Our Second Amendment rights were compromised partially during the session last winter. One should fully expect greater losses in coming months. Likewise, Governor Northam has successfully stepped all over the First Amendment when he not only closed our churches but actually charged leaders of at least one church with a crime when they tried to hold an outdoor service. He has dictated school policy, which is the responsibility of local schoolboards, deeming education as non-essential. He and his majorities in the General Assembly have trampled on the rights of businesses that employ Virginians. STATEWIDE - After extensive deliberations, the Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC) Presidents Council voted to postpone conference (ODAC) Presidents coun-pionships for fall and winter sports through the end of the 2020 calendar year (December 31). The ODAC remains focused on providing meaningful competition for all stu-dent-athletes in 2020-21, which includes an intention to sponsor conference competition for fall and winter sports in the spring semester.

"The ODAC is one of the nation's premiere Division III athletic conferences precisely because of our long-stand-ing commitment to the student-athlete experience at all of our institutions," expressed Dr. David Bushman, President at Bridgewater College and chair of the ODAC Presidents Council. "In light of the broader public health concerns surrounding athletic competitions, the well-being of our campuses and everyone involved in athletic competition made this decision the right one. We have great athlet-ic department leadership across the conference and a su-perb conference staff and we are all committed to hosting meaningful competition as soon as it is safe to do so."

To help the ODAC and its member schools provide their student-athletes with the most complete athletic experi-ence possible, NCAA Division III is considering a blanket waiver that would provide unprecedented scheduling flex-

waiver that would provide unprecedented scheduling flex-ibility. The scheduling change would supply all conference sports with more time for individual and team skill in-struction, strength and conditioning, leadership develop-ment, and other athletically related activities during the academic year as health and safety conditions allow. "The conference's leadership worked extremely hard to explore ways we might have conducted conference championships and competition in the fall," explained ODAC Commissioner Brad Bankston. "Those conversations involved a number of options, but none of them could change the current impact of the virus and its prevalence in our society. A safe return for students and the sustain-ability of campus life is a priority for all our members. ability of campus life is a priority for all our members. The combination of fall, winter, and spring sports in the second semester is challenging, but the ODAC is commit-ted to providing all student-athletes with a meaningful conference regular season and championship experience in a safe manner " in a safe manner.²

The conference will continue to explore all options for a safe return to intercollegiate athletics. The ODAC leadership will communicate further developments regarding competition in 2020-21 as solutions are finalized and implemented.
