## COVID-19 resurgence affects Norton County

After a period of time with no active cases in our county, a resurgence of positive COVID-19 cases has occurred according to reports issued by the Norton County Health Department last week. In their final report of the week, which was issued at 10 a.m. last Friday, October 16, the Health Department indicated there were 57 active cases in Norton County. Those individuals are currently in isolation and have continuous communication with the local Health Department. The Health Department is continuing its efforts of contacting any close contacts of the positive cases; the definition of a close contact is being within six feet for 10 minutes or longer. At the time of the Health Department's Friday report, the total number of lab-confirmed COVID cases was 252, which included

131 Norton Correctional Facility offenders who have been transferred out of the county, 63 cases now considered to be recovered and, sadly, one Norton County resident who has died as a result of the Coronavirus. Recovered cases are those in which confirmed-positive COVID-19 cases have completed isolation, have had significant improvement in symptoms, and have gone 72 hours fever-free with no fever reducing medication. According to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment's (KDHE) website, there had been 1,147 people tested for COVID-19 in Norton County at the time of Friday's Health Department report.

As of 9 a.m. on October 16, there had been 1,700 new cases statewide and 21 new deaths in the state reported since Wednesday, October 14. According to the KDHE website's Friday morning update, there were 70,855 active cases

in Kansas, with 3,370 hospitalizations, 859 statewide deaths, and 518,334 negative tests.

### Andbe Home Outbreak

In their Friday morning report, the Health Department also indicated it had identified a cluster of COVID-19 cases at the Andbe Home in Norton. With results still trickling in on Friday, 39 residents had been determined to be COVID-positive.

At 10:43 a.m. that morning, Andbe Home Administrator, Megan Mapes, announced via social media the Andbe Home was experiencing a full COVID outbreak despite the precautions taken since March. According to Mapes, 22 residents' tests were still pending at that time. Residents had been in quarantine, Mapes stated, since the Andbe Home's first positive resident case on October 7. Mapes also indicated 12 staff had tested positive, with more

staff still being tested or out on quarantine at that time.

"Please know that we are taking care of your loved ones the best we can and will make sure their needs are being met," Mapes said. "Thank you for your continuous support, trust, and understanding."

### Norton Correctional Facility Cases

As of Friday afternoon, there were 167 total positive cases at the Norton Correctional Facility's Central Unit, all of which had been transported to the Lansing Correctional Facility. By Sunday evening, the number of COVID-positive offenders transferred out of the county had risen to over 232. When asked to explain why the symptomatic offenders are required to be transferred out of the county instead of continuing to be housed at the Norton facility, Kansas Department of Corrections Ex-

The Norton City/County Economic Development board met on October 13 at the Economic Development office. The meeting was called to order by Curtis Eveleigh, Chairman. Members present included: Tom Brannan, Curtis Eveleigh, John Griffiths, Aaron Hale, and Brad Hopkins. Deborah Anderson and Wally Burton attended via ZOOM. Absent were Jerry Jones, Amber Nuttycomb and Dick Thompson.

Also present were Mike Posson, Executive Director and Verla Grysch, Administrative Coordinator.

Donna Liddle, President and CEO

of the Norton Area Chamber of Commerce was present as a guest. Ms. Liddle reminded those present of the City Wide Clean Up which will be held October 19-21 and that the Goodwill truck would be in the City parking lot beginning October 15 through October 29.

### Old Business:

The Director updated the board on the proposed Norton County Housing Rehab Incentive Program for which two grants have now been submitted for funding to Dane Hansen Foundation and Norton County Community

Foundation.

Director Posson also provided the board a progress update on the County SPARK Direct Aid spending plan and Norton County SPARK grant programs which have been created to support Housing, Childcare, Healthcare, Business Support and Non-Profit Support. The Director also requested board members Deborah Anderson, Aaron Hale and Jerry Jones assist with the SPARK Executive committee review of SPARK grant applications. The Director also reviewed status of the Norton County CDBG-CV grant funds

for business support due to Covid-19 expenses. The grant application processes for both grant programs opened up to the community on October 1 with first deadlines for applications on October 15.

### New Business:

Director Posson told the board that NetWork Kansas had made several great improvements to the online portal which supports the Youth Entrepreneurship Challenge events. So far USD 211 has 57 students registered with 42 businesses which will be participating

## USD 211 Board of Education holds regular meeting for updates

The regular meeting of the Board of Education, U.S.D. 211, was called to order at 7:30 p.m. on October 12 by Deena Wentz, President. Six members were present so a quorum was declared.

Members present included: President Deena Wentz, Vice President Jennifer Miller, Jamie Amlong, Sean Kats, Abby Rice, and Michael Terry. Others present were: Superintendent Phil Wilson, Clerk Gina Riley, Principal Corey Roy, Principal Dustin McEwen, Principal Julie Schrum, Curriculum Director Jeremy Hawks, Math Curriculum Director Steve Vance, NTA Rep Kris-

ten Fahrenbruch, NTA Rep Jana Hammond, District Nurse Angie Alexander, and Teacher/Coach Bill Johnson. Board member Craig Renner was absent.

Superintendent Wilson informed the board that the track project is complete and is open for use. He reviewed the student head counts and FTE used for budgeting purposes, noting that there has been a downward trend in enrollment in general over the last several years, which continues to have a negative effect on the state funding available. He stated that administra-

tors have been working on classroom walkthroughs, which is a feedback type of method of learning and training for teaching staff, not so much as evaluation. He discussed the need for an English Language Learning paraprofessional to assist some Spanish speaking students and would be asking for the approval of hiring an individual for this position later in the meeting. He informed the board that he has been advertising for a new Transportation Director to replace Jim Jackson, who is retiring at the end of December, and hopes to have an individual to approve

at the next meeting so they may begin training with Jim.

Math Curriculum Director, Steve Vance, gave a presentation of how he is using computer technology in his classes, both for those in the classroom and working remote.

Curriculum Director, Jeremy Hawks gave an update of the district KESA plan, stating that the district's spring OVT visit was postponed and then completed virtually this fall due to COVID. He stated that the presentation went well and that working with

# OBITUARIES

## Paulino "Paul" Amedeo Montoia

September 5, 1925 - October 13, 2020

Paulino "Paul" Amedeo Montoia, age 95, passed away peacefully on October 13, 2020, in Norton, Kan. Paul, one of nine children, was born on September 5, 1925, to Alfredo and Lucila (Camus) Montoia in Cuba, New Mexico.

He served in the Armed Forces from 1943-1949, stationed in Denver, Colo., Korea and Germany. On his return from Germany to Denver, he came by way of Norton, to see an army buddy, Augie Unrein, and his wife, Anna. It just so happened Anna's sister, Clemmie, was introduced to Paul on that visit and from then on Paul made visits to Norton until his discharge from the service. Paul and T. Clementine Robben were united in marriage May 1, 1950, in Norton, where they made their home. In the early years, he worked for his father-in-law, Clemens Robben, at the Norton Manufacturing Company where they drilled water wells and he also learned welding and metal works. In 1951, Clemmie and Paul bought a three room house along Highway 36 as their first home. Eventually they needed more space, so Paul purchased an old farmhouse and he was able to use the lumbar making the addition of 2 bedrooms and later a living room and carport. The addition made room for their growing family totaling four children.

Paul bought the Phillips 66 gas station, which stood on the corner of Highway 36 and Second St., which also included a small grocery store and a door-to-door Fairmont milk route. Later, he would build a new service station in its place and eventually sold the business to Leroy (Pete) Peterson.

In 1958, he built the A & W Drive-In Restaurant on the lot next to their home on Highway 36 which butted up next to their carport. This was operated during the summer months and closed in the winter. It became the first job for a lot of local high school kids and a popular



hangout as well. He also was a wholesale distributor for DOB Corporation selling pizza-making supplies to Kansas and Nebraska bars and restaurants. As years passed he built a new home 4 miles west of Norton, removed his original home, and built a new A & W replacing the old one. He ran the A & W for a total of 20 years where they started selling mugs of root beer for 5 cents and hamburgers for 29 cents which carhops would deliver. During this time, he purchased the Halbert Propane Service and later renamed it Norton Propane Service. Paul would later sell that business to Don Ryan.

Paul partnered with Larry Hull leasing Silvaire Skating Rink building and re-opened it as a "membership only" nightclub and renaming it The Club Silvaire. At that time, it was dress attire only and as Kansas was a dry state at that time, the members had to bring their own bottle of liquor and were issued a punch card with the number of drinks they could have during the evening. The club had a dining room serving meals of steak dinners, etc., and a dance floor for evening entertainment. They eventually sold the club to Darlene Strickland who happened to have been a previous customer on his pizza route.

Later in the 70's, he would team up with Marvin Pfannenstiel to co-manage the Prairie Dog Golf Course bar and dining.

Among his many endeavors, he owned a backhoe and trenching service in which he dug house basements, septic tanks, sewer lines, gas lines, etc., which he would operate until his failing health wouldn't allow him to work anymore.

He was a man of many trades and hard work was something he relished.

In his spare time, he enjoyed going to the casino with his wife and in-laws Augie and Anna Unrein, on the bus and attending polka dances with a regular group of area friends.

Paul was a proud member of the St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church, Knights of Columbus, 4th Degree KOC, American Legion, Eagles charter member and VFW.

Paul is survived by his wife of 70 years, Clemmie, of their home; sons, Paul, (Leila) Farmington, NM; Thomas, Palco, Kan.; Ted, (Barbara) St. Louis, MO.; and one daughter, Jeanette, (Gary) Lacy, Norton, Kan., nine grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren, brother, Robert (Delores) Montoia, and sisters, Minnie Olivas, Juanita Underwood, Dolores, (Bob) Romero, and Dorothy, (Emilio) Romero. He was predeceased by his parents, two brothers, Louis and Fred Montoia and one sister, Ruth Montoia.

A memorial has been established (Paul A. Montoia Memorial) and the donations with be shared among St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church, Norton Amusement Association, and the Norton Senior Center.

A graveside service and interment took place Saturday, October 17, 2020 at the Norton Cemetery.

## Larry Lee Kleweno

July 4, 1938 - October 14, 2020

Larry Lee Kleweno, age 82, died October 14, 2020 at Cedar Village, Ness City. He was born on July 4, 1938, to Herman H and Pauline (Filbert) Kleweno in Ness City, Kansas, at a maternity home.

Larry's first home was southwest of Bazine, which he always called the "Home Place". When Grandmother Filbert died in 1947, Herman and Pauline took their family into Bazine to live and care for Grandpa Filbert. Living at the South end of town there was room for a milk cow, chickens, rabbits, and ducks. His sister, Darlene, and Melford Schaben wanted to take Larry to the county fair, but he said, "No." He wanted to stay home and take care of the chickens, rabbits, and ducks.

Larry attended the Bazine Grade School and completed his freshman year at Bazine High School. In 1952 the Kleweno

family moved to Lenora, Kansas, where he started his sophomore year. After filling the farm generator there was an explosion from the gasoline fumes, and he was badly burned. For the next four weeks he was hospitalized in Norton, but when gangrene set-in he was sent to a Denver hospital by train. They had to remove the windows to get him unloaded on the stretcher. Larry spent another 13 weeks in the hospital.

After graduating from high school, he was drafted and ruled ineligible because of the burns on his legs and hand. Larry went to Wichita for a short while to help a contractor from Norton erect steel frame buildings. Following the March 1957 blizzard, he worked with a telephone crew rebuilding lines around Ellis, Kan.

When Darlene and Melford Schaben moved to Ness City in

1960, Larry moved to the farm where he remained until he needed the cared of Cedar Village on January 28, 2018.

It was on a cold night in January 1964, when he asked for a ride in Marian's new 1964 Chevy Impala SS. Their bonding began and they were married March 6, 1965 at the Bazine United Methodist Church.

Larry was a lifetime member of the Bazine Methodist Church, worked hard, enjoyed the cattle, brothers-in-law, family, and friends and still wanted the chickens in his later years. He enjoyed going to auctions with Neal and Dean and collected Minneapolis-Moline tractors and many old cars. He preferred FORDS.

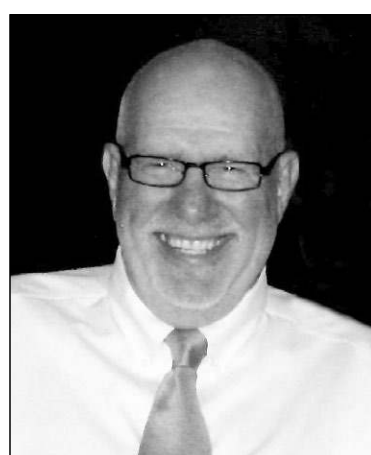
He was Dad to Laura and Linn and Grandpa to Taylor Murray and Samantha Kleweno.

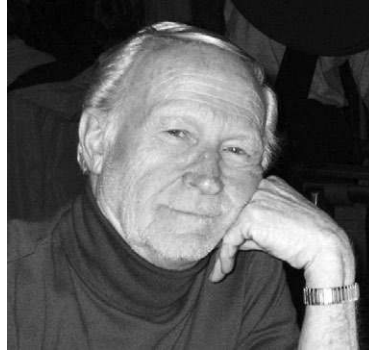

## Robert Walker "R.W." Yeager

Robert Walker "R.W." Yeager, passed away peacefully on October 15, 2020 surrounded by family at the Andbe Home in Norton, Kansas. He was 89.

R.W. was born on September 28, 1931 in Ashland, Kansas to William Raymond and Margaret (Piatt) Yeager. When he was young, his family moved to Wichita, Kan., where he attended Blessed Sacrament grade school through the 8th grade. He attended high school at St. Joseph Military Academy in Hays, Kan., graduating in 1949. R.W. received a degree in Business Administration from Kansas State University in 1953. At K-State, he met the love of his life, Doris L. Schwab. On December 30, 1952, they were married at Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church in Wichita, and would have celebrated their 68th wedding anniversary this year.

At K-State, R.W. was a member of ROTC and the Phi Kappa Theta social fraternity. He and Doris made their home in Manhattan, Kan., until R.W.'s graduation, when they moved to Ft. Benning, Georgia for R.W.'s basic officer training. For the remainder of his military service,

he was stationed at Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo. Following his military service, R.W. and his family returned to Wichita, where he was a salesman for Triple S Steel Buildings. During this time, R.W. met Bill Sharp, and in 1957, he relocated his family to Norton to join Sharp Construction Company, which he eventually owned until his retirement.

R.W. was a loyal friend and devoted community member. He was part of a group that was instrumental in Norton's growth, bringing the Pizza Hut and Sunflower Apartments to Norton. R.W. has been a longtime season ticket holder and supporter of K-State athletics and an Ahern Fund contributor. He was an avid golfer and card player at the Prairie Dog Golf Club. He enjoyed the art of creating stained

glass and has many pieces displayed throughout Norton. R.W. was a staunch conservative and an active member in the Republican party.

R.W.'s greatest joy and love in life was his family. When I was a little girl, the older women in the church my family attended used to say, "Forgive and Forget." It didn't matter that the other individual never sought my forgiveness; I needed to forgive for my own peace of mind.

We are taught from an early age that we are supposed to forgive, toddlers are instructed to forgive other children who just snatched their favorite toy or ran into them or even deliberately pushed them down. At that age, we probably do not understand what forgiveness means; we just know the adults we trust tell us to do it. As we grow older, we begin to understand a little more of

what forgiveness means, one definition suggests that when we forgive, we give up the right to use whatever the action was against the other person, and that it is more difficult than we might have thought as toddler.

And most of us have at least one major event in our lives when forgiving another seems impossible because of the enormity of the offense against us, betrayal by a family member, loss of a job we really liked because of "office politics," someone spreading untruths about us which turns friends against us. Executive Director of Public Affairs, Randall Bowman, stated, "At Norton, as with most of our facilities for men, upon determination that they are positive for COVID-19 we transport them to the Lansing Correctional Facility (LCF)." Housing them at the Lansing facility, he added, provides quick access to large hospital facilities in the Kansas City area that none of the other facilities have available should that become necessary for any resident. "LCF also is our only modern facility, which benefits from having 2 person cells, closed cells with individual ventilation, and modern environmental systems that can exchange air out of the cells and units more effectively to help reduce further spread of the virus."

According to Bowman, offenders who test positive for the coronavirus are moved to a quarantine room until arrangements can be made for them to be transported to Lansing. Following their period of quarantine, offenders are then transported back to the Norton Correctional Facility.

The Norton Correctional Facility is taking a variety of precautions and actions at this time to attempt to slow the spread and protect the health and safety of the staff and the incarcerated population. "Norton staff are following all public health guidelines, including mandatory mask wearing for both staff and residents," Bowman said. Entry screening, which includes temperature checks, is being conducted at the entrances for staff, and access is being limited to only those necessary for continued operations, for example maintenance, repairs, and pest control. Living units are being provided with access to bleach water mix to help with sanitation, and staff are encouraging the incarcerated population to clean their areas, wash their hands, not touch their faces, and maintain social distancing as much as possible.

Living units have also been divided into Cohorts to minimize the chance of cross contamination between units and other Cohorts. "This allows the separation of things such as yard times and sick calls," Bowman

said. Medication lines are being held in the living units and any sick call issues are handled in a way that prevents interaction between different floors and units. "Staff and medical are being observant for residents that are exhibiting signs of possibly having COVID, and those that are exhibiting symptoms are reported to medical." At this time, meals are also being delivered to the living units.

### Precautions

Due to the resurgence of COVID-19 cases in Norton County and the surrounding area, Norton County health entities are encouraging the public to increase personal awareness and precautions. To mitigate COVID-19 positive cases and protect the health care workforce and necessary supplies, the Norton County Hospital, Norton Medical Clinic, and the Norton County Health Department are asking Norton County residents to consider the following: (1) Health care staff and other essential personnel in the county may not be able to work due to isolation and quarantine requirements. Staff shortages are a real possibility, and we need to work to keep ourselves and the health care workforce healthy; (2) It's a possibility that larger area hospitals could fill up and not accept transfers from smaller rural hospitals. This issue is happening in Kansas and Nebraska currently. Norton County Hospital has a maximum capacity of two COVID-positive inpatients currently, as these cases require negative pressure rooms. This is a main reason to remain vigilant with protective procedures against the virus; (3) The hospital may need to make quick changes to its visiting policies and the allowance of elective (non-emergent) procedures as the local COVID-19 environment changes. As of 9 p.m. on October 16, 2020, no visitors are being allowed in the hospital and clinic facilities. There are exceptions to this; for example, one visitor serving as a guardian to a minor child or advocate for a patient with certain specific needs may be allowed. It must be the same visitor per patient under these circumstances (no swapping people as the one visitor). There are also exceptions for end-of-life circumstances

(two visitors per patient at any given time). All people in the facilities must wear a mask at all times and adhere to social distancing guidelines; and (4) Please remember, if you are a patient in need of medical attention, do not wait. Make an appointment at the clinic or visit the Emergency department as needed; some medical needs beyond COVID-19 cannot wait. Also, please bring a mask to the hospital and clinic facilities to help preserve the supply. If you use a cloth mask provided by the hospital, please be sure to return it to the labeled receptacles at the exits to be laundered and reused.

According to a press release issued last Friday, here are some ways to take appropriate precautions: (1) Make community health a top priority. Wearing a mask protects the people around you by trapping droplets that are released when talking, coughing, or sneezing. Protection increases when all people wear masks. Also, practice social distancing and washing hands; (2) The virus that causes COVID-19 has been asymptomatic in some people. Someone who begins having symptoms could have been shedding the virus before symptoms start. This means if you test positive, anyone you have been in contact with would potentially need to quarantine for 14 days; (3) If you are gathering indoors with people from outside your household, you could be at high risk for either contracting or transmitting the virus. Large gatherings at this time are discouraged, but if you attend a large event it is recommended to mask, social distance, and wash hands frequently; (4) If you suspect you have COVID-19, it is important to call before arriving at the clinic (785-877-3305) or tell dispatch. COVID-suspecting patients can quickly infect health care workers and other staff to cause more staff shortages; and (5) Get your flu vaccine! Influenza season is upon us. Getting the influenza vaccine protects you, those around you, and the health care workforce by keeping us all healthy and preserving supplies. in this year's YEC event. There were no students enrolled in the applicable class at USD 212. We decreased our event budget by \$500 this year; grants were submitted to the Norton County Community Foundation, Net-Work Kansas, and Nex-Tech for this year's Corporate sponsorship. The remaining portion of the event budget will be covered by Economic Development funds. Posson has attended three

classes to work with students on their projects.

In his Director Report Posson shared with the board that as a portion of the SPARK Fund spending plan, Norton County Emergency Management budgeted nearly \$30,000 to support the cost of placing hand sanitizer stations in as many buildings in the County as possible which have public access to increase Covid safety. Our office staff had contacted Norton County businesses that have public ar-

reas to solicit the need for sanitizer stations and orders were placed. The sanitizer has been received and delivered to those entities just needing sanitizer. Stands should begin arriving later this week and with assistance from Troy Blevins, Norton County Emergency management Coordinator, delivery of the stands and sanitizer will begin as soon as received.

the consultant through Southwest Plains has paid off. The district is currently in its fourth year and are on a positive track for moving into year five of the 5-year plan.

Superintendent Wilson asked the board for final approval of the board policy changes recommended by KASB that were presented at the September regular board meeting. Motion was made by Michael Terry to approve the changes to the board policy as recommended by KASB.

Superintendent Wilson and Angie Alexander, District Nurse, discussed some COVID-19 situations that had come up recently and updated the board on how they were treated and why, citing discussions and case-specific recommendations that were made by the local health department and KDHE.

The board discussed the use of indoor facilities during the fall and winter months for both district sponsored sports and outside group events. Regarding district sponsored sporting events, the board decided to take no action at this time, al-

lowing Junior High sports to begin in November without a specific limit on spectator attendance, but to revisit the issue at the November regular meeting to discuss the possible need for limiting spectators for high school athletic events. Motion by Jamie Amlong to allow the use of district facilities for youth wrestling and basketball, but no non-district adult activities, and limit occupancy in Stull Gym to 500 people, which is 25% capacity. After further discussion the motion was amended by Jamie Amlong to add a 25% capacity limit to East Campus gym as well. The motion to amend the original motion was approved 6-0.

Jennifer Miller summarized the recent NCKSEC board meeting that she attended when they welcomed back Wes Tope from his National Guard deployment and received an overview of several operational reviews and audits recently completed. Deena Wentz gave an update of the last curriculum council meeting and Michael Terry reported on the last PDC meeting with few updates. Superintendent Wilson asked

the board for permission to sell an extra one-man lift to the Norton County Hospital. The money from the sale could be applied towards the purchase of a bigger and safer two-man lift. Motion by Sean Kats to sell the 1984 Model I one-man lift to Norton County Hospital for \$1,800 was approved.

Superintendent Wilson reviewed the current budget position with the board and pointed out some foreseeable issues for future budgets, based on several factors such as decreasing enrollment, decreased at-risk funding, increasing special education costs, and increasing salaries and other expenditures. As the district moves forward, some action will need to be taken to respond to some of these issues.

A motion by Deena Wentz to approve the hiring of Jesus Saez as ELL paraprofessional. Staci Breiner as Concessions Coordinator and Tyus Henson as Assistant Junior High boys basketball coach were approved.

President Wentz adjourned the meeting at 10:09 p.m.

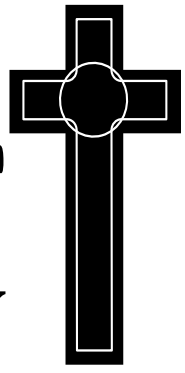

# Weekly Sermonette

## "Pastoral Appreciation"

There is no greater blessing than to see obedient Christians exercise their gifts under the guidance of agape love. Whether it be the gift of helps, administration, evangelism or any of the other gifts clearly described in the Bible, each one is equally important to God, useful to Jesus Christ and can be empowered by the Holy Spirit.

In 2 Corinthians 1:11 there is a very special person that pastors are especially thankful for—prayer warriors. The greatest missionary of all time, the apostle Paul wrote, "As you help us by your prayers, then many will give thanks on our behalf for the gracious favor granted us in answer to the prayers of many." (2 Corinthians 1:11) Paul writes this as a statement of fact proclaiming that it was the power of God in answer to prayer that enabled him and the ministry team he was working with to complete all that God had for them to do.

Paul's life was often in danger and it was only by the hand of God that he had been delivered out of it. Paul also wrote "...But this happened that we might not rely upon ourselves but on God." (2 Corinthians 1:9) Yes, Paul knew that it was God who protected them through and delivered them out of their great perils. He also was not so foolish as to deny or undervalue the secondary cause. Having first praised God earlier in this chapter, 2 Corinthians 1:11 shows how Paul remembers with great gratitude the earnest prayers of many loving prayer warriors.

The greatest ministry to the pastor of any Bible-believing church is the ministry of fasting and prayer. The church that looks past the world's way of doing business and gets serious about praying for their spiritual leaders is the church that God will use to reach the lost and make true disciples of Christ. Your pastor faces great perils every day, the flesh often tempts him, the world continually draws him and the devil attacks in many different ways. Most pastors every week search desperately for times of fasting, prayer, Bible reading and study. Spending time alone with the Lord is the pastor's food for strength to fulfill God's calling. Pastors, now and especially in the near future, need the faithful prayers of those they oversee for the Lord.

An American preacher became the pastor of a London Church. On the first Sunday there were many converts. For the next year the Lord's messages were delivered with power and many lost souls came to Christ. At the end of that first year this pastor was called to the bedside of a very ill member of the church who told him how she had passed through a period of rebellion and spiritual darkness because of poverty, lameness and sickness. Upon repentance God revealed to her that He had given her the privilege of intercession. On the Saturday night before the pastor's first Sunday this woman spent the entire night in prayer and had done that every Saturday night since. As her weak voice ceased, the pastor knew that this wonderful child of God had most certainly ministered to him and the Lord.

October is pastoral appreciation month. Will you be the one to uphold your pastor in agape love? Sacrificial prayer warriors have the most appreciation of their pastors.

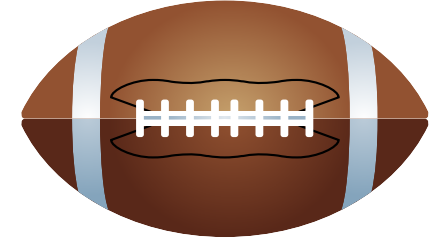
#### Stats

Garrett Urban, who gained two net yards. Urban had two kick-off returns and gained the team 44 yards. Ryan Schrum received four passes to gain 61 yards. Sean Anderson received three to gain 18 yards. Gavin Sproul received two to gain 14 yards. Jones received two to gain 13 yards, and Urban received one, gaining one yard. Anderson led the team in scoring, with all six of the Bluejays' points.
