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## Medical Center's email server hit in web shell attack

Pagosa Springs Medical Center (PSMC) recently discovered it was on the receiving end of an attack on its email servers.

According to a statement sent to The SUN by PSMC CEO Dr. Rhonda Webb, on March 5, the Office of Civil Rights alerted PSMC of a "known cyberattack targeting organizations that use Microsoft Exchange Servers for email management."

The statement explains, "PSMC immediately began the investigation to determine if our server had been compromised and discovered on Sunday March 7, 2021, evidence that it had."

The statement describes the attack as a web-shell attack on the server, which "silently searches for administrative credentials that can be used by the hackers to exploit the organization."

PSMC reported that, by Sunday night, it had purged and rebuilt its email server to eliminate the web

## Short-term rental owner appealing planning commission decision

At its Feb. 24 meeting, the Archuleta County Planning Commission held a hearing for a short-term rental (STR) property permit.

The hearing was for a property located on East Golf Place, known as the Caddy Shack.

The property has received nine noise complaints since April 2020 and was in violation of the county's policy in regard to how many guests are allowed to stay at the property, according to Development Director Pamela Flowers.

Flowers presented the discussion on the property to the planning commissioners.

Flowers explained that a public hearing is required for any property seeking an STR renewal permit that has had multiple complaints filed

## Jollon receives Award for Outstanding Government Service from American Medical Association

On Monday, Liane Jollon, executive director of San Juan Basin Public Health (SJBPH), was presented with the American Medical Association's (AMA) Nathan Davis Award for Outstanding Government Service.

Considered one of the most prestigious awards honoring elected officials and career government employees, Jollon is one of five recipients of the award this year.

Citing her resourcefulness and strong advocacy for southwest Colorado and public health agencies across the state, Jollon was honored in the "Career public servant at the local level" category for her exemplary work as a leader



in public health during pandemic response. Jollon was nominated for this award by U.S. Sen. Michael Bennet.

"I am proud to accept this award on behalf of all of the public health superheroes at SJBPH and Colorado's 53 local public health agencies, who spent the year sacrificing in every way to fight the COVID-19 pandemic," said Jollon. "If we've learned anything living through the last year of the pandemic, it's that we're all in this together, and extraordinary team efforts in public health and across our entire society are what truly make a difference."

In a news release, Bennet applauded Jollon's leadership in the

## Wolf Creek Ski Patrol Prepared for the unexpected

Spending a day up at Wolf Creek Ski Area (WCSA) is something people from all around the country aim to do at least once in their lives. Some do it for a living.

Working on a mountain takes a special level of dedication, endurance and strong will. Winter storms and hazardous driving conditions are no excuse to not show up. If anything, it means get there earlier.

While there are many working parts that keep operations at WCSA in motion, the ski patrol crew is one of the most important aspects of operating the ski area.

Ski patrollers have a wide range of daily tasks and show up to work everyday prepared for the unexpected.

WCSA CEO, President and Area Manager Davey Pitcher provided some insight on what the patrollers do day in and day out on the mountain.

He explained that patrollers usually have at least five daily tasks, which require them to cover the entire ski area.

These tasks range from making sure all the proper signs are up on the mountain to setting up rope lines and tower pads for guest safety, using explosives to mitigate avalanches, deploying crews for search and rescue missions, and helping set up and take down snow-making equipment during early parts of the season.

"They're kind of our eyes on the mountain, and that requires a lot of hard labor," Pitcher said.

Pitcher explained the patrollers also deal with guest safety by responding to disturbances with intoxicated guests. If a disturbance is reported, patrollers will respond and evaluate the situation to decide the safest option for the guest in regard to leaving the ski area.

"We try to reduce the likelihood of a driving

## Vietnam-era veterans will be honored at public event

The Veterans for Veterans of Archuleta County will hold a public event on March 29 at 6 p.m. at the Tennyson Event Center, 197 Navajo Trail Drive, to honor and welcome home all Vietnam-era veterans.

The commemoration recognizes all who served on active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces at any time during the period of Nov. 1, 1955, to May 15, 1975, regardless of duty location, and their families. There is no charge for admission. Plan to arrive early for best seating.

We make no distinction between veterans who served in-country, in-theater or who were stationed elsewhere during the Vietnam War period. All were called to serve, and none could self-determine where they were stationed.

Special recognition will be made to the memory of three "Sons of Pagosa" whose names are inscribed on the Vietnam Wall in Washington, D.C., as well as their families:

- Jesus Magin Archuleta.
- Marcus Guy Fiebelkorn.

Invited guests to the event are Sen. Michael Bennet, Congresswoman Lauren Boebert, State Congresswoman Barbara McLachlan and State Sen. Don Coram.

At the end of the ceremony, there will be a screening of the award-winning documentary film "In the Shadow of the Blade."

"In the Shadow of the Blade" captures the untold stories of Vietnam War veterans and their families as it follows the journey across America of a restored Vietnam War UH-1 "Huey" helicopter.

As they again fly in the iconic aircraft that once carried them to war, veterans are inspired to share their experiences, reunite with wartime comrades and pay tribute

### Let government know who's boss

When government fails, it's the rare public official who says, "Oops. My fault."

That's human nature, particularly for officials in the public eye who may have to run for office again. No one wants to be held directly responsible for letting the public down.

Case in point is the recent catastrophe in Texas, when unexpected winter storms left 4 million homes without power, ruptured pipes and tainted the water supply for many.

Texas' energy grid essentially collapsed. While Texas Gov. Greg Abbott was quick to blame frozen wind turbines, the cause was much more complex than that. To truly understand how things went so terribly wrong will require time, study and research.

So, too, with the coronavirus vaccine distribution. In some states, residents are frustrated with the slow rollout of vaccines. Is it poor distribution? Politics? A flawed strategy? These are literally matters of life and death.

But how do you get to the truth when public officials so rarely step up to take direct responsibility for failures?

The answer is public records. And public meetings. And access to the information that taxpayers deserve.

States throughout the country have laws that guarantee access to government records and meetings. But the

details vary widely and there are many statutory exceptions. New challenges to access emerge every year in virtually every state.

The need to fight for government transparency is reaffirmed each year during Sunshine Week, a national awareness event overseen by the News Leaders Association and keyed to the March 16 birthday of James Madison. The fourth president of the United States drafted the Bill of Rights — including the guarantee of a free press — in 1791.

That journalism connection reflects the role news media play in the free flow of information, but it unfortunately can also leave the public with a sense that Sunshine Week reflects the concerns of a single industry.

To the contrary, access to government information is critical to every American who cares about the quality of his or her community, state and nation.

It's important to see government employees — including elected officials — as the people we hire through our tax dollars to do a good job for all of us. If you run a business or hire a contractor, you wouldn't hesitate to demand a full understanding of how something went wrong. That should be exactly our relationship with government.

Getting that information, though, requires public meetings where residents can ask questions. It also means

access to the documents that led to a poor decision. Words on paper can be much more forthright than the dissembling of politicians.

It's critical that we hold government accountable, for better or worse. (It's also important to acknowledge when government leaders are doing a good job.)

How can you help? I have two suggestions.

First, keep doing exactly what you're doing at this moment. Read and support your local newspaper. Local journalists, more than anyone else, will stand up for your right to information. Facebook will not be going toe-to-toe with your mayor.

Second, when you believe government isn't doing its job, demand an explanation. Ask to see the documents. Attend public meetings. And above all, support legislative efforts to make government more transparent.

It's too easy for officials who have failed us to point fingers, blame the media and wait for their side of the partisan fence to rally to their defense. We deserve better. We all pay taxes to support the work of government. We should get our money's worth.

### 100 years ago

March 11, 1921

The reputation of Pagosa's hot water is already far-reaching, yet even more fame will be added on Friday, March 18, when a quart of the all-healing liquid will be used in christening the battleship "Colorado," which is to be launched on that day. Mrs. Max Melville, of Denver, daughter of Senator Nicholson, is sponsor to the ship and will do the christening act. Since champagne is tabooed under the Volstead act, it was deemed proper to use the next best thing with a "kick" in it, and Pagosa hot water was the choice, Senator Nicholson wired Fred Catchpole Tuesday for a quart of the water, and the same was shipped by express to him at Washington Wednesday morning, as a gift from the people of Pagosa Springs.

Pagosa Springs has the most beautiful natural surroundings in the state. It ought to be the most beautiful town in the state. The town trustees have taken a step in the right direction in compelling the construction of proper business buildings. The next step in the right direction is a creditable school house in the heart of town.

### 75 years ago

March 15, 1946

Reported missing, a prisoner of the Japanese since shortly after Pearl Harbor, Bart Pinson, well known Pagosa Springs youth is making the rounds and renewing acquaintances this week here at home. Pinson, still in the Navy, is visiting his grandfather, Fred Flaugh after having stopped in Colorado Springs and Grand Junction where he is well acquainted. A victim of the Japanese at Corregidor, Pinson was not heard from for more than two years. He finally was released by the Japanese in Manchukuo after a series of experiences typical of the now defeated nation.

The completion of the 149 kits brought the total prepared by the Archuleta chapter of the Red Cross to an approximate 900 today. Mrs. Al Thomson, production chairman, announces that the quota of 149 kits has been completed, and they are ready to ship. She also plans to award pins to those who have earned them with Red Cross work since the war began.

School attendance this week has been very poor due to colds.

### 50 years ago

March 11, 1971

The Pagosa Pirates came within two points of winning the regional basketball tournament at Telluride last Saturday. They were defeated by Dove Creek 65-63 and Dove Creek will represent this region in the state tournament this weekend.

The Colorado State Commission of Game, Fish and Parks has said that it will make drastic changes this year in the big game seasons in Colorado, including a split season and state-wide dates coinciding. This was said to be an effort to reduce hunter pressure.

There have been two below zero nights to date this month and warm spring weather is not much in evidence at this time. Precipitation has been very light.

A contractor, Elder Construction Co., has announced plans to start immediate construction on a duplex home at Pagosa. Mr. Elder said that he proposes to build apartments, or townhouses, later this year upon land at Pagosa purchased from Eaton International.

### 25 years ago

Local law enforcement authorities continued last week with efforts to determine who was responsible for the bomb scare that emptied Pagosa Springs High School on Feb. 2. The incident occurred shortly before 9 a.m. when a youngster phoned Archuleta County Dispatch, warning that bomb had been placed in one of the school buildings in the community. Shortly after the call was received, a student apparently discovered a suspicious object in a women's restroom at the high school building. Soon after the student reported her discovery to school officials, the students and staff were evacuated from the building and classes were canceled for the remainder of the day. Police personnel who looked at the object (stuck behind a toilet in a restroom stall) believed it looked enough like an explosive device to require the attention of an explosives expert. A Durango-based expert arrived late in the afternoon, examined the object and determined it was a fake.

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# State updates dial public health order

Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment

The Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) released an amended public health order that provides updates to the COVID-19 dial framework on Sunday.

The new changes, effective as of March 7, include:

- A new disease incidence metric buffer allows counties to exceed their dial level's disease incidence metric and remain in that level as long as they do not exceed the minimum of the next more restrictive dial level's incidence rate by more than 15 percent for five consecutive days. This cre-

ates more predictability with dial moves and prevents counties moving back and forth unnecessarily by ensuring a consistent trend is present first.

- Restaurants and seated indoor events (including at casinos) in Level Blue may expand capacity to 225 people without using the distancing space calculator.

- Restaurants and seated indoor events (including at casinos) in Level Yellow may expand capacity to 150 people without using the distancing space calculator.

- Seated indoor events in Level Red may calculate distancing without using the distancing space calculator.

- Last call to order alcohol at

restaurants has been expanded from levels Blue to Red:

- Level Blue: 2 a.m.
- Level Yellow: 1 a.m.
- Level Orange: 12 a.m.
- Level Red: 10 p.m.

• Masks may be removed in a school classroom setting for the purpose of playing a musical instrument that cannot otherwise be played while wearing a mask, but students must continue to physical distance. Performers with masks can be 12 feet away and without masks 25 feet — and instrument players with bell covers could be 12 feet apart and without 25.

- Performers at events who are wearing masks may be a minimum of 12 feet away from spec-

tators. Performers not wearing masks must remain a minimum of 25 feet away.

- 5 Star-certified businesses in Level Blue may expand capacity limits by 50 people above the Level Blue caps.

### 'For the People Act'

Dear Editor:

Colorado has one of the best voting systems in the country. Every registered voter gets a ballot. You can register to vote when you get your driver's license. You can return your ballot by mail, by drop box or in person. If you want someone else to deliver your ballot, they can do it up to a limit of ten ballots. Registration can be checked or changed online. Counting starts at least a week before election, and final results are usually available by the day after the election. There are paper ballots. During the 2020 election, Colorado had the second highest voter turnout in the country. And, most importantly, there are redundant methods to prevent fraud. What is there not to like?

Unfortunately, state officials in Republican controlled states are doing everything they can to restrict access to the polls. The reason, of course, is to create unnecessary roadblocks so that minority and poor voters have difficulty accessing the polls because they have historically voted for Democrats in higher numbers. Call it what it is: Jim Crow, circa 2021.

House bill HR 1, For the People Act, is an act that would prevent states from enacting laws to disenfranchise voters by making it more difficult to vote. Among other provisions, it would restore, by legislation, the parts of the Voting Rights Act that were ended by the Supreme Court, such as having states that have a history of discrimination get prior clearance for changes in voting laws. It would require balanced boards to redistrict congressional districts. It would also further prevent foreign money from being donated to political campaigns. For unfathomable reasons, our own Representative Boebert did not support HR 1. If you really believe in democracy, you will encourage our senators to vote for this act: For the People Act.

### Silver Thread Health District

Dear Editor:

Just as the COVID19 vaccine roll-out is going smoother and more quickly in Archuleta County than almost anywhere in the state, or indeed in the country, thanks to San Juan Basin Public Health (SJBPH), Pagosa Springs Medical Center and other service providers, Archuleta County Commissioners are considering joining Silver Thread Health District instead. Last year, they considered forming a separate district but thought better of it in the midst of a pandemic.

I assume Silver Thread has qualified staff and provides quality services. Last year, the BoCC was concerned that residents of Archuleta County have to drive to Durango for services, but learned that most health district services are available right here in Pagosa Springs. Somehow it would be better for us to drive to Lake City or Creede for services unavailable here?

The BoCC has a responsibility to choose what is best for Archuleta County residents. Commissioners cite "problems" with SJBPH, including state-mandated regulations such as those regarding onsite wastewater treatment ("septic") systems and COVID19 guidance. While it may be prudent to re-examine contracts every so often, as the saying goes, "if it ain't broke, don't fix it." I would add, "don't break it."

I tried to compare the services offered by both health districts. The COVID19 data, tracking and business resources that SJBPH provides are not offered by Silver Thread. This is not surprising, since Silver Thread serves about 1,500 people and Archuleta County alone would be nearly ten times that. Our commissioners are concerned that we pay for 64 employees in Durango but only about 4 in Pagosa Springs, not recognizing that the expertise, knowledge and resources provided by Durango staff are available to all of us. We all benefit from some of the most qualified staff in the state. We are fortunate to have a health district director who is one of the best in Colorado, and in the country, who has stayed in her job despite having other offers and being harassed by people at her own home. (Even the anti-maskers would have a longer drive to go harass employees in their homes.)

As of February 25, 19 percent of Archuleta County residents had been vaccinated. This includes 75 percent of educators and 70 percent of people over the age of 70, and is higher than the state average of 15 percent and the national average of 14 percent. So far, I have not heard back from Silver Thread about vaccination rates or available services in their district.

We residents and taxpayers of Archuleta County pay the salaries of our commissioners and the staff they direct. These commissioners have a list of grievances against SJBPH but no criteria, requirements or even a wish list for joining a smaller health district with lesser capacity. Hopefully, our elected officials will weigh the options with a clear eye and choose the option that serves us, rather than a personal agenda, then stop wasting our money looking for problems that don't exist.

### Beneficial conversation

Dear Editor:

The "Racism" letter (March 4) was very clever, well-written and persuasive. Problem is, it only looks at one half of the story. It ignores the fact that, even if you just go back 100 years (not to mention 200, or 400), almost all the "What if" statements worked to the benefit of white people in our society, to the detriment of black people, Native Americans and other people of color. If white fear, anger and resentment is now boiling over because we need to finally redress this long-standing imbalance, imagine how angry you'd feel if you were black or Native American, after sustaining centuries of systemic unfair treatment? Treatment which goes on to this day: For instance, last year CARES Act billions went to wealthy (white) corporations that didn't need it when "just 12 percent of black and Latino business owners who applied for the small-business loans received the full amounts they requested." Racial disparities in labor and health care mean that people of color are more likely to get Covid yet less likely to have access to vaccinations. And today, there are 250 bills in the legislatures of 43 states that would effectively work to restrict

voting access for blacks and other minorities.

Striving to be a color-blind society may sound noble, but if it means being blind to racism as well as to race then it is a dangerous mirage. Acknowledging this and accepting it does not threaten or make me ashamed of my whiteness. But I don't want to talk about "what-ifs." I'll talk from personal experience, for that is where bridges are built between people.

I don't think of myself as racist: hey, I was born into this system, I didn't create it; my family never owned slaves; I have worked hard and earned the fruits of my labor; I have done so without trammeling the dignity of others and strive to treat all people fairly and equally. I was lucky enough to be born into numerous advantages: access to a stable family home life; educated parents; good schools; the relative absence of dream-crushing debt and an easy trajectory into the workstream. But it still didn't even really occur to me to see the privileges that being white conferred. I'm white, that's just the way it is... the privilege was all on the socio-economic side. But if I look at the privilege of being able to function in the society without ever having to think — no less worry — about my right to exist and belong in the society, my safety and the prospect of my continued success, or to consider the systems that allow and sustain that and systematically preclude others from gaining the same peace of mind ... then that "white privilege" can be racist. I'm not guilty about being white, but I'm guilty of allowing my role in perpetuating an unfair system to go unexamined and unaddressed. How to meaningfully fix that system is a conversation we would all benefit from having.

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# Celebrating a local hero serving in AmeriCorps

AmeriCorps Week 2021 is March 7-13, an opportunity to recognize the service of the 270,000 Americans engaged in AmeriCorps and AmeriCorps Seniors programs annually.

Despite the unprecedented challenges posed in 2020, dedicated citizens continue to help communities, serving those impacted by COVID-19, ensuring students stay on track to graduate, combating hunger and homelessness, responding to natural disasters, fighting the opioid epidemic, helping seniors live independently, supporting veterans and military families, and much more.

Dylan Lindberg, of Pagosa Springs, is currently serving with the National Civilian Community Corps (NCCC), a 10-month, full-time AmeriCorps program.

Founded in 1994, AmeriCorps NCCC strengthens communities and develops its young adult members into leaders.

AmeriCorps NCCC operates out

of four campuses, which serve as regional administrative hubs and training facilities. These campuses — located in Sacramento, Calif.; Aurora, Colo.; Vinton, Iowa; and Vicksburg, Miss. — train and deploy new classes of members several times each year.

Lindberg began his term of service on Oct. 7, 2020, at the Pacific Region campus in Sacramento, Calif., and will graduate from the program on July 14.

As a Corps member, Lindberg is completing a series of different six- to 12-week-long service projects in different places across his assigned region as part of a five- to 12-person team. Projects support disaster relief, the environment, infrastructure improvement, energy conservation, and urban and rural development.

Lindberg said, "I chose to do a term of National Service because I wanted to take a year off after college and I wanted my year to be meaningful and have an impact. I also believe that, with the state the country is in now, service is the best way to make connections and have a lasting impact."

Lindberg is currently serving with the Salt Lake County Health Department to assist with the community's response to the COVID-19 pandemic. He is helping the health department with a number of activities, including delivering important necessities, such as food and

hygiene supplies, to residents, supporting testing sites, educational outreach, and contact tracing.

Earlier this year, Lindberg served with the city of San Rafael to support the community with wildfire prevention and COVID-19 response efforts. The team helped low-income, elderly and disabled homeowners reduce wildfire risk around their home and supported food and personal protective equipment distribution in response to the pandemic.

Before joining the NCCC, Lindberg attended Pagosa Springs High School and Adams State University, which he graduated from in 2020 with a degree in interdisciplinary studies.

AmeriCorps NCCC members complete at least 1,700 hours of service during the 10-month program. Corps members are all 18 to 26 years old; there is no upper age limit for team leaders. In exchange for their service, all program participants receive \$6,345 to help pay for college. Other benefits include a small living stipend, room and board, leadership development, team building skills and the knowledge that, through active citizenship, they can indeed make a difference.

### 'Alternative realities'

Dear Editor:

I am writing in response to a general trend in several letters to the editor published in the last month or so. The "proof" offered to support this "fact" is that Maehr says that Joe Biden's eyes were blue when he was on the campaign trail, but now, in the inauguration record, his eyes are brown; he also claims to see other evidence of video ma-

nipulation (Biden is wearing a mask of some kind that covers his whole face, his ears don't look like his usual ears, and so on), all proving that the inauguration was falsified.

Maehr signs off, as many conspiracy-themed letters do, by scolding readers for their apparent ignorance of the "facts" and their gullibility in believing that Joe Biden is actually the duly-elected President of the United States. He promises that "all [evidence] shall be revealed" in time, and that all of us need to care about the "truth" of these events, because the future of our republic is at stake.

Indeed it is. In giving conspiracy theories like this one the time of day in a mainstream community newspaper, you give these ideas a whiff, however faint, of legitimacy when—really, take a look at these assertions again, please—the claims are not only absurd, but completely out of touch with not only common sense but reality.

I think it's time to call these things out for what they are. But even more important, I think it's time for you, as responsible journalists, to invoke some editorial ethics and standards and decide not to print things like this that have absolutely nothing in common with genuine political discourse, which entertains honest disagreement and an open exchange of ideas. On the contrary, letters like Mr. Maehr's rely on vague, unspecified sources of information (if sources are identified at all), offer no concrete, specific evidence in support of their claims, and invite no discussion. In short, material like this does not promote civil discourse, but propaganda, and as such I feel it should not be legitimized by publication. I know you will get hammered by readers who feel you are restricting their First Amendment right to free speech, but this is not a question of one's right to his or her own opinion. Letters like the one I mention are not expressing opinions; they are attempting to cultivate alternative realities and fabricate "truths" where no concrete evidence exists to support either.

beneath this story was the headline "BoCC exploring option of joining Silver Thread Public Health District". This article is about the commissioners ordering staff to initiate an exploration of leaving our current public health agency, San Juan Basin Public Health (SJBPH), and joining a public health agency currently serving two adjacent counties, Mineral and Hinsdale, with a combined population of less than 1600 people. The disconnect between these two articles shocked me into wondering what was going on. Surely the commissioners were over their irritation with the SJBPH over septic system regulations that developers don't like. Given the events of the past year, the commissioners must be aware of the importance of a competent and prepared public health agency.

What is the rationale for this "exploration"? Commissioner Ronnie Maez is reported to note that Archuleta County is "more comparable to Hinsdale and Mineral counties in terms of population" Based on the population data provided in the Sun's report, this statement seems mathematically ridiculous. Commissioner Alvin Schaaf expressed the belief that "just like a business owner" BoCC should find ways to save money while still being able to provide necessary services. One has to ask what resources the two small counties could bring to the table that would lower costs. How can a public health agency serving a small population provide the diverse expertise and services that a larger agency serving a larger population can?

Even in the unlikely event that there are some savings, does it make sense to switch public health agencies in the middle of a pandemic? I hope the citizens of Archuleta County will not accept simplistic rationales from the BoCC on this matter.

## Public health services

Dear Editor: San Juan Basin Public Health is an entity located in Durango that has been providing public health services for Archuleta County. One year ago the Covid-19 "emergency" allowed the staff to vacate their offices and work from their respective homes. Their offices are closed. The only way for the public to communicate with this entity is through Zoom and phone Zoom public meetings held only every 60 days. The public is only allowed to speak. Period. No questions answered. No conversation. They said they will not meet with the public unless you bring your attorney.

I was on the phone for the last meeting on 02/25/2021. I printed out the agenda which said the public is allowed 3 minutes to speak. I prepared my speech and timed it so as not to go over the time allowed. Once I was logged into the call, they changed the requirement to only 2 minutes claiming it was because there were five residents who signed up to speak. Really? They don't have

time for 15 minutes of public input every 60 days? The meeting was held at 9 o'clock in the morning on a weekday when most people are working. They made it clear they would not answer questions or respond in any way and they held their ground. Not only that, they muted a public speaker mid-sentence. They disabled the chat option I was using to try to ask valid questions. They did not introduce themselves so a caller had no idea who was speaking. They did not engage with the public at all.

During this "emergency" while SJBPH is pushing painful orders and mandates on local businesses, schools and churches, we should expect much more. SJBPH is successfully distancing itself from the public it is beholden to. They have obviously forgotten who they work for. I am encouraged that our County Commissioners are researching other options for our public health services. We certainly deserve better than what we're getting.

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# Town council debates trail width and thickness for Town-to-Lakes Trail project

A discussion on the preferred trail surface and width for the Harman Hill phase of the Town-to-Lakes Trail project was held by the Pagosa Springs Town Council during a regular meeting on Feb. 18.

According to Town Manager Andrea Phillips, the Harman Hill phase is going to be the third phase that the town and its partners will be working on.

So far, the west phase, near Walmart, and the eastern phase, which connects 8th Street up to 10th Street, have been completed, Phillips noted.

"We, at this point, are just looking for feedback from council on how we want to finalize this design. Our goal would be to put this out for bid at the end of this year or early in 2022, with construction to be completed in 2022," Phillips said.

A 10-foot-wide trail surface is the current recommendation from the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO), Phillips explained.

The reasoning behind this recommendation is that the surface allows for 3 feet of width for two bicycles and some clear space in between, she described.

"Both asphalt and concrete are utilized throughout the community and they are popular options because of the long-term upkeep that is involved with that," she said, adding that the section near Walmart is asphalt, while the section between 8th and 10th Street is concrete.

Jared Lee of Bohannon Huston, the engineering consultant on the project, explained during the meeting that the current design for the project is based on a 10-foot-wide trail.

Options for the trails include 3-inch thick asphalt as the base, which is usually cheaper, Lee noted, adding that other options include a thicker and more robust section with

4 inches of concrete or another that has 4 inches of reinforced concrete.

The 10-foot-wide trail with asphalt is estimated to be about \$1.1 million dollars, while the option with the thick concrete is increased to \$1.3 million. The reinforced concrete option comes with a price of \$1.39 million, Lee noted.

Additional alternatives were looked at. These included increasing the thickness of the trail to the Colorado Department of Transportation's standards for vehicular traffic, Lee noted.

"The thought was by increasing that, it would allow for light-duty vehicles to access the trail for maintenance purposes, knowing that's not the regular intent. It is a pedestrian trail, pedestrian and cyclists," Lee said. "It would still provide some additional strength and longevity as well, going with that thicker section. That cost increase is pretty nominal. For an extra inch of asphalt you're only looking at \$22,000 extra."

Scaling the trail down from 10 feet to 8 feet wide with a 3-inch-thick asphalt would have the project cost be around \$1,097,353.63.

An 8-foot-wide trail with 4-inch-thick concrete would be about \$1.2 million and an 8-foot trail with reinforced concrete is about \$1.29 million.

"I would recommend council really considering the value of that extra width," Lee said, citing that the town would see minimal savings and the trail would not meet the AASHTO minimum for a multiuse trail.

There was a hybrid scenario that included an 8-foot-wide trail with 4 inches of concrete and then another 3 inches of asphalt along the trail, Lee noted.

This option came with a projected cost of about \$1.165 million, he noted.

Lee noted that there needs to be considerations to the life cycle of the trail in regard to what materials council chooses to use.

Other considerations to make for town council include long-term maintenance of the trail, and the safety and use of the trail, he added later.

Increasing the thickness of the asphalt would double the amount of work for a contractor, Lee explained later in the meeting.

"Having to install asphalt along that steep slope may actually lead to some additional cost from the contractors," Lee said.

## Additional thoughts

Following more discussion, Parks and Recreation Director Darren Lewis noted that the biggest obstacle so far has been that if any problems with the concrete section of a trail exist is finding a contractor that is willing to come in to make repairs.

"Because it's such a small job, in a sense. That's been the biggest hurdle in having a concrete trail as opposed to an asphalt trail that public works has all of the equipment to reseat that trail," Lewis said.

In regard to trail width, town staff can do snow maintenance such as plowing with either width, Lewis

noted.

"At the end of the day, a 10-foot-wide trail, whether it's asphalt at 4 inches or concrete at 6 inches, we can put a light-duty truck on it and plow in that manner. An 8 foot is going to be too tight to put that type of vehicle on it to plow with, for instance," Lewis said.

However, town staff could use a side-by-side to plow either width of trail, Lewis noted.

"It may cost just as much to put the 10-foot-wide asphalt in as the 10-foot-wide concrete because of the way we have to come down that hill. We don't know that until we put it out for bid and we talk to someone," Lewis said. "I'm feeling like more the decision tonight is kind of really the width. If you're definitely set on asphalt, great. But if the concrete and asphalt is going to be possibly the same price, that's something to consider as well."

Lewis added further that he recommended the 4-inch asphalt because of the added durability to the trail system.

"Right now, if those numbers were true, I would lean towards the 10-foot wide, 4-inch-thick asphalt trail. It kind of lines up with the rest of our trails; it ensures that if for some reason I need to get a light-duty truck on there I can," he said. "When you look at the cost of that, to get an extra 2 feet wide for \$20,000, it might just be worth it."

Council member Shari Pierce noted that she would be leaning toward an asphalt option, citing the cost effectiveness and the ease of maintenance.

"The whole 8 feet versus 10 feet, I haven't heard a compelling argument for the 10 feet other than it is in line with these standards, which I don't know if that's important to us," council member Nicole Pitcher said. "I feel like at 8 feet, that's definitely still comfortable for two across, and I don't know if at 10 feet, it's actually more comfortable for three across."

Pitcher added that she was in favor of an 8-foot-wide trail and also of council looking at bid alternatives.

"My concern about this entire alignment is that if this is a commuter trail, you're getting way off the highway, and if part of it is, we're trying to have a way for people to get uptown to downtown and all these sections in between. I just think if I were to walk this, it's kind of circumnavigating. I would probably just do the tangent and walk next to the highway," Pitcher said. "Obviously, getting off the highway is nicer if this is just a trail that you want to go for a walk on, but I always thought of this Town-to-Lakes Trail as more of a commuter trail."

Pierce added that she thought council should revise the idea of a commuter trail versus a regular trail.

"I think being off the highway is way better. It doesn't add an incredible amount of distance for the benefit of not having to suck exhaust. I think is awesome," council member Mat deGraaf said.

Later in the meeting, Pierce added that she would support what Lewis recommended in regard to a

10-foot-wide trail with 4-inch-thick asphalt.

"I think we would see savings in snow removal because we would be able to use a light pickup truck on that versus smaller equipment that has to make multiple passes," she said.

Looking at long-term maintenance and being able to do it in house is another added benefit, council member Matt DeGuise added.

"Initially, I was really in favor of the trail closer to the highway as more of a commuter trail for a number of different reasons. One was the cost, one was the visibility. I thought that the cost was going to be cheaper because it was shorter," Mayor Don Volger said. "As far as 10 foot, 8 foot, I got to go with the 10 foot. I love the idea of asphalt."

Another advantage to asphalt is it's easier on the bodies of those who exercise on the trails, Volger added.

Later in the meeting, Lewis posed the question to Lee about whether or not he had any concerns about putting asphalt along the trail through the wetland environment adjacent to the trail.

"We try to stay on the outside of those wetlands. We kind of impact them just barely. We encroach upon them. Where we do encroach, we are actually having to fill quite a bit to meet those fill requirements," he said. "In the areas where we do have wetlands, we would actually be bringing material, and asphalt would be sitting higher up, so really those are kind of the impacts from the trail down to those in the ultimate conditions. They will be sitting higher and further back based on our slope tiebacks."

Following more discussion, Phillips noted that council had some consensus around the 10-foot wide, 4-inch-thick asphalt trail, but council should decide on two alternatives for the bid package.

"It's sounding like, potentially, there's some interest in looking at the 10-foot wide, 3-inch, which is the base bid originally," Phillips said. Phillips also suggested that town council potentially consider an 8-foot-wide option for the bid package.

"I would recommend that we go with the 8 foot wide, 3 inch thick because what I'm hoping we avoid is we end up with bids for these alternatives that are pretty similar and then we have to make a determination," Lee said.

deGraaf later added that he would like to see town council just to stick with 10-foot options.

"If we are going to look at an 8 foot, I think we should go with the one with the product that we're most interested in, which is the 4-inch asphalt," DeGuise said.

Following more discussion, Lee outlined town council's options for the trail to a 8-foot wide, 3-inch-thick trail with asphalt; a 10-foot wide, 3-inch-thick trail with asphalt; a 10-foot wide, 4-inch-thick trail with asphalt; and then a 10-foot wide, 6-inch-thick trail with concrete.

our country to people of color.

Being told that their "ethnic group is inherently evil" and therefore sub-human is what Americans of color have been told for the last three hundred years.

I have had some exposure to anti-racism work, and I have yet to encounter anyone who says that we are racists "simply because of the color of [our] skin," as Bolland's letter suggests he has been told. If anyone is told that they "can no longer take pride in famous people of their own ethnic group" then we ought to correct that as a misunderstanding of anti-racism.

Bolland has given us a great opportunity to think about what it means to be "color-blind." The more I discover about my own biases the more complex becomes the work of untwisting those biases. I have not found "blindness" to serve well as an antidote; instead, seeing clearly offers a better way forward to equality, equity, and justice.

Creating equality and equity means being honest about how institutions, cultures, and policies have conspired to keep non-white people in a second-class status. The work demands uncovering where we have made errors, where those errors have become entrenched, and working in the long-term to correct the errors and the entrenchment. Anti-racism, and the realization of a fully fair and equitable society, does not come quickly or easily. When one people group has held on to power for over three hundred years, sharing that power requires that people group to offer it actively to others. Human power has some zero-sum qualities: If only some people have most of the power and privilege, then they must give some away in order for all to have equal power and privilege.

Good news: sharing power, sharing privilege, and pursuing robust justice makes everyone better. In a central paradox of human community, if you share your blessing with me then you are made greater by generosity and I am made greater by your gift. When I share what I have received from you, I am made greater by generosity and another is made greater by the gift.

The work of anti-racism lifts up all of us. What if I told you that I am willing to hear your story and help you find peace and justice as you need it, no matter what your skin color is?

■ **Continued from front** incident on the highway," Pitcher said.

Unique to this year, ski patrollers are responsible for resolving issues with guests who are not in compliance with COVID protocols.

Pitcher explained that the patrollers are extremely skilled with handling situations in a calm manner.

"They have to be a moderator to some degree," he said.

Although ski patrollers are dealt a diverse list of tasks, their reasons for becoming patrollers are fairly simple: a passion for skiing and the outdoors and the will to help people.

Ski Patrol Director Eric Deitemeyer has been working at WCSA for more than 15 years and said he couldn't imagine not being a patroller.

Like most of the patrollers, Deitemeyer has a deep passion for skiing and saw being a patroller as a way to incorporate his passion in with a way to make a living.

He mentioned that ski patrollers spend nearly half of the year, more than 150 days, on their skis.

Deitemeyer mentioned that when hiring new patrollers, he looks for people who aren't just strong skiers, but also have a strong work ethic.

Every ski patroller at WCSA is also EMT certified due to the fairly remote location of the area.

Deitemeyer explained that ski patrollers typically work 50 hours per week or more. He noted that they usually show up to work at 4:45 a.m. and don't leave until 5 p.m.

"Everyday, we are the first ones up, making sure things are in good shape and as safe as they can be, and then we're the last ones down," Deitemeyer said.

There are four ski patrol stations located throughout WCSA where ski patrollers are stationed throughout the day.

Deitemeyer explained that patrollers are constantly moving around the mountain throughout the day, responding to calls and making regular routine safety runs down the mountain.

Due to the wide variety of tasks that patrollers deal with, it is essential that they are able to communicate with every other department on the mountain.

Deitemeyer explained they need to be able to communicate with the lift department in order to respond to incidents on the slopes while also maintaining communication with base operations to respond to any incidents in the parking lot

or base area.

Deitemeyer went on to explain how patrollers start their days by assessing the weather from the night before to see if any avalanche hazard reduction work needs to be done.

According to Deitemeyer, there are 107 known avalanche paths at WCSA. Ski patrol has a map of each path on the mountain and every path is assessed daily to ensure guest safety.

Deitemeyer explained that along with basic first aid kits, patrollers also carry around avalanche rescue gear like airbags, beacons, avalanche probes and shovels.

Patrollers are also equipped with radios and transceivers that allow for clear communication all across the mountain.

Deitemeyer added that the most important thing patrollers carry with them is their knowledge.

Patrollers receive basic EMT training and avalanche hazard training, but the bulk of their knowledge comes from experience from being on a mountaintop for almost half a year.

Patrollers are also trained to use rope and belay harnesses to use in the event that guests need to be evacuated from a chair lift.

Deitemeyer explained how there is a "tight peer group" amongst the patrollers.

"We deal with everything you can imagine, medically," Deitemeyer said.

Although there are many days that go by smoothly, tragedies do occur and patrollers are usually right in the middle of them.

Deitemeyer explained that it takes a certain mentality to be able to deal with difficult situations and that is why the patrollers have such a strong and supportive peer group.

"We all signed up for this," Deitemeyer added.

Another aspect of the ski patrol team is the dogs.

Deitemeyer explained that they have six trained search and rescue dogs on staff.

He added that the dogs do a great job of finding people who have gotten lost or trapped in an avalanche.

WCSA ski patrollers are not just limited to the boundaries of the ski area. They often help with the search and rescue missions conducted by Archuleta County.

Archuleta County has an agreement in place with Mineral County to assist with any search and rescue operations, with that agreement covering most of the Wolf Creek Pass area.

Archuleta County Director of Emergency Operations Mike Le Roux offered some comments about the work he has done in coordination with WCSA ski patrollers.

"I think we have an excellent relationship with them," Le Roux said.

He explained that the ski patrollers are the area's "primary winter go-to subject-matter experts" along the Wolf Creek Pass corridor.

"We add to their skill set and they add to ours," Le Roux said.

He explained that the county's emergency response crews have worked with the ski patrollers to train for multiple different scenarios, including rope-evacuation training and avalanche-rescue training.

Le Roux mentioned that by having the ski patrollers involved with winter search-and-rescue missions along the pass, it makes everyone responding to the call feel more safe about being out there.

"We rely on their technical ability and expertise in that arena," Le Roux said.

He mentioned the ski patrollers were crucial in recent successful search-and-rescue mission involving two stranded snowmobilers in the Fall Creek drainage area along the pass.

"They're kind of the skilled resource that can help execute the overall mission," Le Roux added.

Le Roux spoke about a search-and-rescue mission in 2016 where his crews worked with the ski patrollers to recover a body in Conejos County.

"I have no doubt that wherever we need them to go, and if they have the resources available, they will make themselves available," Le Roux added.

Archuleta County Sheriff Rich Valdez also praised the work that the ski patrollers do.

"Wolf Creek and the Pitcher family have done an excellent job in supporting the search-and-rescue program," Valdez said.

He noted the ski patrollers are involved with so many search-and-rescue operations and, oftentimes, they don't receive any credit.

"They are like the forgotten heroes ... when we need them, they are there to help us," Valdez said.

He also expressed his gratitude for their dedication to helping the county with search-and-rescue operations.

"They give a lot back to the community and they don't get recognized enough for everything they do behind the scenes," Valdez added.

Ski patrollers deal with many different scenarios during their time at WCSA, from saving lives to manning snow-making equipment.

Deitemeyer explained that the ski patrollers show up to work ev-

eryday prepared to deal with the unexpected.

From the exciting and heart-racing rescue missions to the daily mundane tasks of adjusting ropes and signs around the mountain, Deitemeyer described his job as the

ski patrol director as an extremely rewarding experience.

All day long "I get to ski and help people," which is why Deitemeyer said he finds his job to be so rewarding.

"There is no evidence at this point that anything other than our email was compromised. We are seeking the advice and expertise of our Cyber Insurer and will be working with the federal authorities as required," the statement notes, adding later that there is no evidence PSMC's electronic health records or patient information were compromised.

It further indicates that PSMC will address any additional mitigations that are recommended as the investigation proceeds.

"PSMC takes the security and safety of the data with which we are entrusted very seriously. Please be assured that we will take all necessary actions to protect our information systems," the statement notes.

In February, Microsoft warned that web shell attacks are on the rise.

"One year ago, we reported the steady increase in the use of web shells in attacks worldwide," an article on the company's website states. "The latest Microsoft 365 Defender data shows that this trend not only continued, it accelerated: every month from August 2020

to January 2021, we registered an average of 140,000 encounters of these threats on servers, almost double the 77,000 monthly average we saw last year."

The article adds, "The escalating prevalence of web shells may be attributed to how simple and effective they can be for attackers."

She noted that this was a "very high number of complaints at one property."

Flowers also noted that the complaints were coming from neighboring properties, less than 500 feet away.

During the hearing, the owner noted that two of the noise complaints filed were against him while he was at the property.

Out of the more than 500 STR properties in the county, only 10 other properties received any noise complaints during that time, Flowers noted.

No other STR property in the county has received multiple noise complaints.

"That's what made this one stand out," Flowers said.

The owner of the Caddy Shack property also owns four other STR properties in the county and has only received one complaint at the other properties since April 2020.

Some of the neighbors of the Caddy Shack property attended the hearing and voiced their concerns over the issue.

Multiple residents stated that excessive noise is coming from the property late at night, after 10 p.m., and that what they are struggling with "is just being able to sleep."

Residents noted how due to the geographic location of the property, with it bordering the golf course, sound travels and echoes easily in the area.

Residents also stated that "this is nothing personal" with the Caddy Shack owner, and that they also own STR properties in the county and understand the struggles of maintaining a STR property.

During the hearing, Flowers also mentioned that the Caddy Shack property was in violation of the county's land-use regulations for STRs by advertising for up to 12 people to stay in the house under a single booking.

Flowers explained that, according to the land-use regulations, STR properties are only allowed to have two guests per bedroom, plus an additional two guests.

She noted that the Caddy Shack property is a three-bedroom house, therefore it is allowed to house only up to eight guests at a time.

Flowers added that the property "does not currently meet approval because of the violation in the bedrooms."

However, Flowers suggested to

the planning commission that the renewal permit be approved contingent upon the property owner meeting four conditions laid out by the planning commission.

The conditions include changing rental ads to reflect a maximum number of eight guests and to accurately reflect the neighborhood setting of the home, the house being reconfigured to only have eight sleeping spaces, and that the owner provide information sheets to the guests that outline local ordinances including noise and parking violations.

The property owner will be required to submit the information sheets to the planning commission for approval.

The fourth condition is that once the other conditions are met, the permit be approved for renewal with a six-month probationary period.

Flowers explained in a later interview that once the Caddy Shack owner meets the proposed conditions, the planning commission will approve a one-year permit, but during the first six months, if two complaints of any form are filed, the permit will be suspended for the remaining period.

Flowers added that if that happens, the Caddy Shack owner would have to wait until that permit expires and then would be able to apply for a new permit as a new applicant.

"We're not saying he can never rent it, we're just saying unless you get the behavior of your guests under control, you are not going to be able to continue renting it," Flowers said.

Until the conditions have been met, the owner of the Caddy Shack has been instructed to remove all advertisements for the property and cancel all bookings, to which Flowers clarified that all ads have been removed, but she indicated that the property owner is still housing guests.

Residents also spoke at the hearing with concerns about how the county will be able to enforce its policies.

One resident asked, "What happens when someone does break a rule? There doesn't seem to be any recourse."

In the interview, Flowers noted the Planning Department simply does not have the resources on hand to respond to every complaint.

"I don't have a staff designed to

respond to complaints," Flowers said.

She stressed that majority of her work keeps her tied to the office and doesn't allow sufficient time to respond to complaints or perform property inspections.

"Inspections of properties essentially stopped when COVID started," Flowers added.

She noted that funding for the department was also reduced right around that time.

However, Flowers indicated that the Archuleta County Board of County Commissioners (BoCC) will be considering the addition of two more full-time employees within the Planning Department to help with code enforcement.

During the hearing, the Caddy Shack owner mentioned how he has reached out to all of his neighbors and that on all but two occasions, he was able to contact the guests and have the issue resolved.

"We've never had the cops there. ... You would figure with that much partying going on, we would have somebody knocking on the door and we haven't had that," he added.

He stressed how he has been trying to mitigate the issues by communicating with the guests and neighbors.

Additionally, he asked, "What's to keep these people from filing false complaints to kick me out?"

In the interview, Flowers indicated that the Caddy Shack owner has appealed the decision of the planning commission and will be taking the matter to the BoCC for review.

The property currently does not have a STR permit.

The BoCC will review the issue at its next regular meeting, set to be held on March 16 at 1:30 p.m.

Flowers also mentioned that the planning commission is seeking public input at its next regular meeting, to be held on March 24 at 6:30 p.m.

The planning commission will be reviewing the standards of the code and are looking to "tighten up on some of the rules so we can enforce some of the things that have been a problem," Flowers explained.

The next planning commission meeting will be held via Zoom.

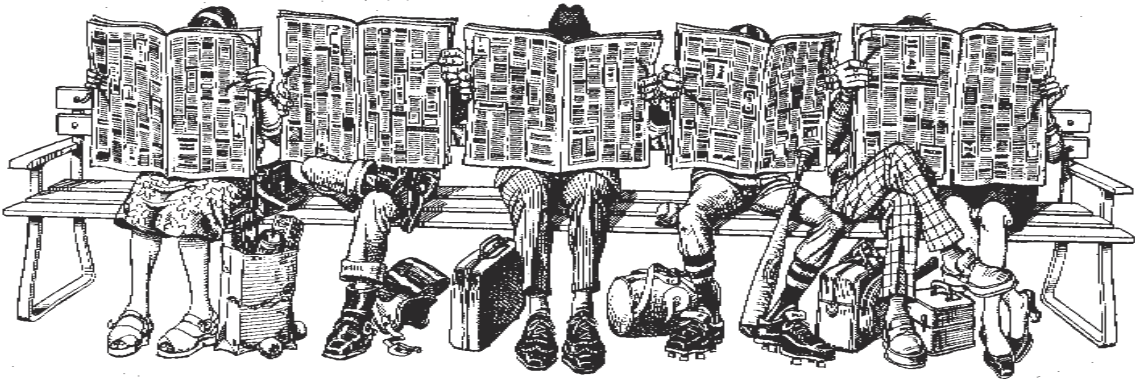

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# Second COVID variant found in region

On March 5, Gov. Jared Polis extended an executive order "ordering individuals in Colorado to wear a medical or non-medical face covering due to the presence of coronavirus-2019 (COVID-19) in Colorado."

The move came days before a second variant was confirmed to be circulating in the region.

On March 1, San Juan Basin Public Health (SJBPH) reported that cases with variants of the virus that causes COVID-19 have been identified in Archuleta and La Plata counties, including the B.1.427/B.1.429 variant, which Brian Devine, the agency's deputy incident commander for COVID-19 response, noted is known as the West Coast variant or the California variant.

Then, on Wednesday, SJBPH reported via a press release that a case with the B.1.1.7 variant — also known as the United Kingdom variant — has been identified in La Plata County.

"SJBPH continues to conduct contact tracing of those identified with, and exposed to, the new variants," the press release states.

The United Kingdom variant was first detected in Colorado at the end of December 2020 and is currently the most prevalent variant in Colorado, according to SJBPH.

"The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) lists the B.1.1.7 variant as a variant of concern, as preliminary data suggests the B.1.1.7 variant spreads more easily and can cause increased severity of disease. Currently there

is no evidence to suggest decreased vaccine effectiveness against the B.1.1.7 variant," the press release states.

The press release further notes the best defense against virus variants is to prevent the spread of COVID-19 through public health precautions, include testing and quarantine, physical distancing, getting vaccinated when eligible, and wearing a mask with improved fit and filtration.

"With more contagious variants circulating in the region, it's a good idea to ensure you have a properly fitting mask, or double-up on cloth masks," said SJBPH Executive Director Liane Jollon. "This is especially important in higher-risk situations, such as going to the grocery store or any other place that might be crowded."

In a later interview, Jollon indicated the state is going to put more resources into working with the CDC to study the spread of variants.

She noted Colorado is trying to test 200 to 300 samples per week for variant strains, with 5 to 12 percent of cases coming back as positive for variants.

Surveillance, she noted, is "definitely indicating" spread of variants.

Variant cases are investigated by the state, she noted.

## Continued caution urged with potential uptick in cases

Jollon indicated the area is also seeing a slow in the decline of cases coming off the area's winter surge and is potentially seeing the first signs of an uptick.

"Our winter surge really hit later than the rest of the state's," she

said, noting that much of state began surging in October, whereas this area followed in November and started coming off the surge around January.

"We're now seeing a slowing of that decline and potentially seeing the first evidence of an uptick — the first uptick since we started coming off of this winter surge," Jollon said.

Because of that, Jollon noted, SJBPH wants to encourage community members to continue to follow the protocols.

"We have lots of good news, we've seen cases drop ... so fast, much faster than anyone expected, from this winter surge," she said, noting that the leveling off and potential beginning of an uptick are worrisome after how quickly cases took off in the fall. "We would hate to see something like that happen again this spring when we've worked so hard as a community to bring cases down."

Jollon noted that continuing to follow protocols will also help students remain in classrooms, with little to no transmission occurring in classrooms.

As of Wednesday, SJBPH reported 691 cumulative cases of confirmed COVID-19 among permanent residents in Archuleta County, with 12 new cases confirmed on March 9.

## Testing available

"SJBPH especially encourages residents of Archuleta County and La Plata counties to be tested for COVID-19, in response to the discovery of variants in people living and working in these communities," Wednesday's press release states.

SJBPH suggests that testing is critical if you have symptoms, believe you've been exposed, work in a high-contact job, or if you have been gathering with people outside your household.

Additional testing allows public health officials to sequence more samples and identify if COVID-19 variants are more widespread, the agency notes.

The free COVID-19 testing site at the fairgrounds, located at 344 U.S. 84, continues to be operated in partnership with COVIDCheck Colorado.

The testing takes place under the all-weather Hughes Pavilion, with the site open Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

You can register for your free test by going to [www.covidcheckcolorado.org](http://www.covidcheckcolorado.org) and selecting "Get My Test."

According to a COVIDCheck Colorado flier, "COVIDCheck Colorado uses a highly sensitive and reliable nasal mid-turbinate swab PCR test that is administered by licensed medical professionals. Please arrive wearing a mask."

# Area vaccine events distribute thousands of doses

San Juan Basin Public Health (SJBPH) announced via press release Tuesday that nearly 3,400 doses of the Johnson and Johnson single-shot vaccine were administered March 5-7 in Archuleta and La Plata counties.

Also on Tuesday, Pagosa Springs Medical Center (PSMC) announced on social media that it administered 557 doses Friday, with the medical center distributing more than 5,000 doses so far.

The organizations are two of several distributing the COVID-19 vaccines in the two counties.

According to the press release, as of Tuesday, 21 percent of Archuleta County's total population has completed vaccination, while 26 percent of the county's total population has received at least one dose of a vaccine.

Someone is considered fully vaccinated two weeks after their second shot of Moderna's or Pfizer's two-dose regimen, or two weeks following the single-dose Johnson

and Johnson (Janssen) vaccine, according to SJBPH.

The press release notes the figures are calculated from official state databases and SJBPH internal data and "will differ from official published statistics as data from the weekend undergo validation."

"We're truly moving along very quickly in our two counties," SJBPH Executive Director Liane Jollon said, noting later that the state has suggested that rural communities can dip into the next phase if vaccine supplies exceed the current phase.

The current vaccination push comes, the press release states, as the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) released new guidance for people who have been fully vaccinated against COVID-19.

According to the CDC guidance, fully vaccinated people can safely visit in small numbers indoors without masks or social distancing with other fully vaccinated people and unvaccinated people at low risk of severe COVID-19.

The press release notes, "SJBPH joins the CDC in strongly urging everyone, including those who

have been vaccinated, to continue wearing masks in public settings and following all public health protocols including social distancing."

## How do I get the vaccine?

Archuleta County has five enrolled vaccine providers: SJBPH, PSMC, Pagosa Medical Group, City Market and Walmart (Walmart is enrolled directly with the federal government).

# Remains found along Wolf Creek Pass identified as missing woman

On March 1, the Colorado Bureau of Investigations (CBI) released a statement confirming the identity of remains found along Wolf Creek Pass.

The remains have been identified as 49-year-old Marlana Rena Mizell. The Mineral County Coroner's Office performed an autopsy confirming Mizell's identity.

Mizell was first reported missing by the South Fork Police Department on Jan. 2.

According to the CBI press release, "the preliminary findings show Mizell died as a result of multiple blunt force injuries" and that "Toxicology results are pending."

The CBI press release also states, "Investigators do not believe foul play was involved."

According to a previous press release from CBI on Feb. 23, search

and rescue crews from Archuleta County and Mineral County, along with the Colorado State Patrol, Colorado Department of Transportation and the Mineral County Sheriff's Office located the remains approximately 150 feet away from the victim's car.

That same press release states that the victim's vehicle was located "hundreds of feet from the roadway on Wolf Creek Pass."

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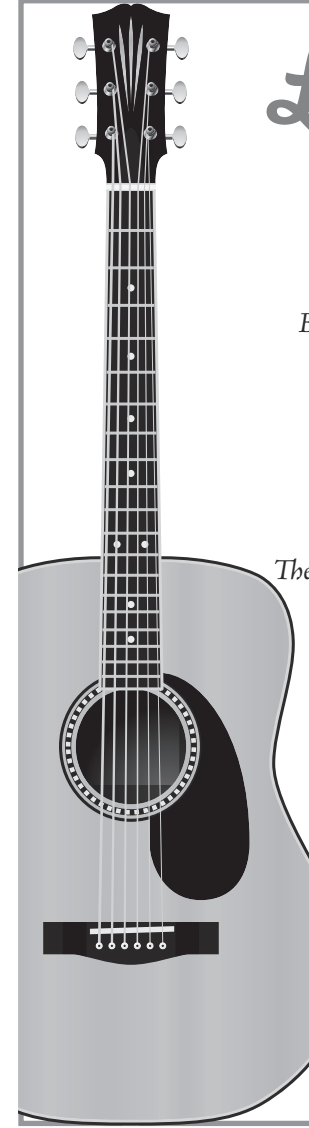

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# Town approves franchise agreement with LPEA

On March 2, the Pagosa Springs Town Council approved a franchise agreement with La Plata Electric Association (LPEA) — with no franchise fee added on — following a discussion and vote during a second reading of an ordinance.

Ordinance 947 was initially approved on first reading by town council at a meeting on Jan. 21, and the ordinance outlines that the agreement is a utility franchise agreement and would implement a fee that would be used toward burying overhead power lines.

According to agenda documentation for that meeting, the town has nonexclusive franchise agreements with every utility that conducts business within the town limits except for LPEA.

Those agreements dictate how certain utilities locate infrastructure, use public property and rights of way, among other things, agenda documentation notes.

Town Manager Andrea Phillips explained during the meeting that Colorado state law requires a public utility to enter into a franchise agreement with local governments and this is also a requirement within the town's home rule charter.

The agreement notes that the terms of the agreement are for 10 years and can be extended beyond that.

Within section nine of the contract, a franchise fee is outlined and that fee would not be absorbed by LPEA, but rather customers in the service boundaries of the town, she explained during the January meeting.

A franchise fee can be used for burying overhead power lines, subsidizing connection fees for workforce housing or for broadband, Phillips noted.

The fee would be collected by LPEA and passed on to the town, Phillips explained.

## Another perspective

During the meeting on March 2, Phillips explained that the franchise fee would be 2 percent.

The city of Durango has implemented a franchise fee of 4.67 percent, she added.

"I think council is aware that this agreement has been in the works

for several years and has been discussed with the LPEA board as well as their staff on multiple occasions," Phillips said.

The franchise agreement was developed between Town Attorney Clayton Buchner and LPEA's legal counsel, Phillips added.

If approved, the agreement would be effective 30 days from council approval, or around April 1, she added.

The franchise fee could be implemented right away or at a future date, she added further.

"Council did feel at first reading that was too high," Phillips said of the Durango 4.67 percent franchise fee. "The direction was set to make that fee 2 percent with the goal of using the funds towards burying the overhead lines in town and improving downtown beautification and neighborhoods."

The cost for that sort of work runs anywhere between \$35 per foot to \$65 per foot, she explained further.

"Ideally, we would do those line burials in conjunction with another project when we already have a plan to have the ground open, so that we can help to reduce the project cost," she said.

The number of current residential accounts within town limits is 1,026 and there are 683 commercial accounts, Phillips noted, with LPEA numbers adding that the average residential bill is \$70.57 and the average commercial bill is \$322.50.

"Should the town include this 2 percent franchise fee, that amount would then show up on the bill with La Plata Electric and it would generate roughly about \$70,000 annually from all of those accounts," she said.

The charge for the residential accounts would be \$1.41 and for commercial customers the charge would be about \$6.45 additionally per month, she added further.

## Council thoughts

Council member Mat deGraaf raised the question to other council members about whether or not the language within the motion should be changed to give flexibility on whether or not the council can use the franchise fee funds for other uses outside of burial of power lines.

Examples of additional lan-

guage and uses of funds could be affordable housing waivers, he added.

"I'd like to see the funds be a little more broad so that we can use them for things like fee waivers," council member Matt DeGuise said.

As much as it would benefit the community to bury the power lines, council member Madeline Bergon pointed out, the town has bigger issues that need to be addressed.

"Putting a solid funding mechanism, dedicating that towards some fee waivers for affordable housing and or broadband or something to that nature could be beneficial as well," she said. "I think tackling some of these bigger issues is going to create better community buy-in."

If the town allows the funds to be used for workforce or affordable housing, it would be great for the town, but other utility providers do not have that benefit, deGraaf noted.

"It's not going to be a major source of revenue, they estimate about \$70,000 a year, so I like the idea of keeping it to a really specific objective which is the burial of the power lines," council member Nicole Pitcher said.

Council member Shari Pierce suggested that council not implement a franchise fee.

Pierce explained that she had talked to some community members in certain financial situations and, given various increases on various utilities in the community, that an additional franchise fee might be too much for some.

"I'm not saying that burying electric lines is a bad thing, I just don't want to do it on the backs of these people that really can't afford it," Pierce said. "I think a lot of the people that we serve in our community, it will make a difference to. I don't want to lose sight of those people."

According to information gathered from census.gov, in 2019, it was estimated that Pagosa Springs has 25.3 percent of its people in the community living in poverty and 18.3 percent of those have no insurance, she noted.

"I just really feel like I can't vote for this increase even though it is a small one to a lot of people. It's a big one to a lot of people on top

of the other increases that they've seen," she said.

If this issue is that important to the council, then maybe it needs to revisit its budget and see if it can find money within the budget to do this without having citizens who can't afford it pay for it, she added later.

"Regardless of the fee, we still need the franchise agreement," Bergon said, adding that council could revisit the fee issue at a later date.

Town council was in discussions about not even implementing a franchise fee until the beginning of 2022, according to DeGuise, with him later voicing support for an approved franchise agreement with no franchise fee at the moment.

"If we're going to push it down the road, I would rather not put a date in it, but we can put it on our own calendar to look at it later and bring it back, just that piece, and have the rest already approved," Pierce suggested.

According to deGraaf, if the town collects \$70,000 on average for the burial of power lines from the franchise fee agreement, that would mean that every year the town has the funds to bury about 1,000 linear feet of power line.

"I just don't see that being all that much and then when we get an engineering report for a project and they tell us the cost to put those overhead power lines is a quarter of a million dollars, I guarantee any council that's sitting there, probably won't be us, is going to balk at that number and not want to do it," he said. "This is long-term planning for our community. We most likely won't see the benefit of that, and if we do, it's going to be the tail end of it. I think other people, 10, 20 years from now, are going to appreciate these efforts. I'm fully in favor of keeping the fee and making it specific to overhead power lines."

Following more discussion, Pierce made a motion to amend Ordinance 947 to include a zero percent franchise fee and to approve the ordinance on second reading, entering into the franchise agreement with LPEA.

That motion passed via a 4-3 vote, with Bergon, DeGuise, Pierce and Mayor Don Volger voting for Pierce's motion and Burnett, deGraaf and Pitcher voting against.

"Because of the nature of our community and the way it is going to affect some of those who aren't as well off, I think you can see where this is going for me, I'm going to support this motion and vote aye. But I would also like that this be readdressed next year when we go into budget season, see how we're doing. I think one year's delay for just 1,000 feet is not that great," Volger said. "I would like to readdress this soon for next year."

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## County opts to allow more public comment at meetings

The Archuleta County Board of County Commissioners (BoCC) will now allow for public comment at its regular meetings for items listed on the agendas.

At a work session held by the BoCC on March 9, County Administrator Scott Wall discussed the new policy with the commissioners.

This change in policy comes after the recent decision by the BoCC to raise short-term rental (STR) permit fees in the county.

The BoCC held a regular meeting on Feb. 16, in which it voted on the county's fee schedule.

More than 90 people virtually attended the meeting, with many hoping to voice their opinion on the matter.

However, the BoCC's policy at the time did not allow for public comment on items on the agenda.

"I don't know why that was not allowed in the past, because that's probably the reason they came," Wall said at Tuesday's work session. Commissioner Ron Maez add-

ed, "I don't know why we've done it like that."

The county fee schedule was approved at the meeting on Feb. 16 with the exception of the STR permit fees, as the BoCC decided more discussion on the matter was needed.

The BoCC encouraged the public to reach out to the commissioners individually via phone or email and also encouraged citizens to attend a work session held the following week on Feb. 23 to voice their concerns.

After the work session on Feb. 23, the BoCC decided to allow for public comment on items on the agenda at its next regular meeting, which was held on March 2.

At that meeting, the BoCC voted on a resolution to approve STR permit fees.

The new comment policy will be effective at the next BoCC regular meeting scheduled for 1:30 p.m. on March 16.

The policy will allow for members of the public to have three minutes to speak on any topic or item that may or may not be on the meeting's agenda.

"That, I think, should improve citizen input," Wall said.

Also, to help facilitate the meetings in a more timely manner, those who wish to give public comment will be required to complete a request for public comment form prior to the meeting.

The form can be found online at the county's website at [www.archuletacounty.org](http://www.archuletacounty.org) and can be emailed to a county administrative assistant, hand-delivered to an administrative staff member before the start of the meeting, or all the information on the form can be typed into a Zoom chat prior to the start of the public meeting.

Wall mentioned he hopes the new format will allow for better communication between the BoCC and the citizens of Archuleta County.

"They wanted to speak before the meeting before an agenda item, not after you've already voted on it," Wall added.

## LPEA seeks members due to receive capital credit refunds

La Plata Electric Association (LPEA) is seeking current and former members who are due to receive capital credit refund monies.

Capital credits represent ownership of LPEA and are credited to members based on the amount of electricity they use. As LPEA is a nonprofit cooperative owned by its members, it returns capital credits to its membership when the board determines that financial circumstances allow it.

Each fall, the LPEA Board of Directors determines how much patronage capital should be retired that year. Those funds are then returned to members either as a bill credit (for amounts less than \$100) or as a check (for amounts greater than \$100). Sometimes, these checks go uncashed or LPEA is not able to find a valid address on file to remit them.

After three years, these funds become "unclaimed" and are then

used for educational or charitable purposes as determined by the LPEA Board of Directors, as set forth in the LPEA Bylaws. Unclaimed capital credit funds currently support LPEA's scholarship and grant programs, and contribute to educational and nonprofit community projects in La

Plata and Archuleta counties.

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## Water conservancy district discusses future support services

The San Juan Water Conservancy District (SJWCD) Board of Directors held a discussion at a regular meeting on March 4 regarding how to proceed with a future support services position for the district.

In an email sent in February, current board consultant Renee Lewis informed SJWCD board Chair Al Pfister, as well as fellow board member John Porco and SJWCD legal counsel Jeff Kane, that she did not want to take on a new agreement with a continuation of services.

Lewis noted in that email she was interested in extending her existing contract for another month.

During a regular meeting on Dec. 10, 2020, the SJWCD board voted unanimously to extend the current contract with Lewis for an additional two months while contract negotiations took place for 2021.

Lewis was initially brought on to assist the SJWCD as a volunteer consultant in September of 2018 and the two parties eventually came to an agreement on a professional consulting agreement in March of 2019.

It was through that agreement that Lewis would assist the SJWCD in its primary focus of developing its strategic plan.

Additionally, the 2019 agreement outlines that Lewis would help the board develop long-term relationships and effective partnerships with various government officials and water organizations while developing the strategic plan.

Lewis also assisted the board's treasurer during the budgeting process.

The March 2019 professional consulting agreement was set to end on Dec. 31, 2019, according to the agreement.

On April 20, 2020, the SJWCD agreed to a revised professional consulting agreement with Lewis that was set to expire on Dec. 31, 2020.

The most recent professional consulting agreement describes that in addition to assisting the district with its strategic plan,

Lewis would perform the duties of "Recording Secretary to the Board."

The duties of the recording secretary include drafting meeting minutes, preparing documentation for board meetings and work sessions, and creating board books.

### Navigating the future

During the meeting on March 4, Pfister explained that Lewis helped draft an advertisement to find a replacement for her services.

SJWCD board member Bill Hudson noted that the replacement for Lewis does not need to do bookkeeping or minutes for the board.

"If we want someone to push our strategic plan and move it forward with us, I'd like us to decide what those accomplishments we want to do in the next year are and find someone who could help us accomplish those particular goals," he said.

The SJWCD board needs someone who can "maintain consistency," SJWCD board member Doug Secrist added.

"We need to get someone like you," Secrist said of Lewis. "But to put that into specifics I think would be very difficult."

The current job description, according to Secrist, provides a good overview of the position and the duties of a potential candidate.

Lewis described her position as having a "phenomenal amount of task mastering," adding that the board doesn't necessarily need someone with the level of experience that she has to fill the role.

"You could be looking at two different people. You could hire someone, or look for someone, who could do your minutes, who could take care of your board books, make sure that you get all of those executed documents into the board books or whatever filing system you try to do after I'm gone," Lewis said. Through her work, Lewis noted that she has been trying to "leave the district in a better place" than three years ago.

"Prior to this other opportunity coming about, my thought about this year was that I would be maybe helping you to implement and make more policy decisions and maybe be sitting in more on those

meetings as time and resources allowed," she said. "You do have to remember your budget constraints, we're probably looking at, say, \$10,000 left for this year, and if you got someone who was just going to be the administrative person, you could definitely cover that, I would think."

Someone who would help the district with policy changes might involve the board having to take on some of those administrative duties, she noted.

The job description was written vaguely enough so as to attract interest from a candidate who has management experience and possibly some "big-picture ability," Lewis described.

"I feel like we're kind of crossing the line between what I would call an executive assistant and almost a general manager. Someone that is going to help us with policy decisions and more of what Renee's capabilities are," SJWCD board member Joe Tedder said.

What the district is really looking for is a general manager, but the district does not have the funds to pay for one for the amount of time the district needs them for, Lewis noted.

"I expressed to Al that it was never my intention to leave the district in a bad place," Lewis said. "I am more than willing to stay on as long as necessary, but we just need to be mindful that I'm not going to quite have the level of availability that I did have."

The job description was written with the intent of hiring a contractor with certain duties rather than an employee, Pfister added later in the meeting.

"I think we need to be cognizant of the fact that there is a line between hiring an employee and hiring a contractor," Secrist said, adding that the verbiage in the job description be tailored more for a contract employee rather than an employee.

Later in the meeting, Hudson pointed out that the job description has a mix of language for duties of both an employee and an independent contractor.

"One who wants to help us work with the CWCB [Colorado Water Conservation Board] is not going to

want to take board minutes. I don't think we understand what kind of person we're looking for," Hudson said, adding that the job description was a "mix of two completely different kind of people."

Hudson suggested that the district not publish a job description until it has an idea of what it really needs.

"I think we put it out there and see what we get. If we don't get anybody then we're going to have to come up with plan B," Secrist said.

Porco pointed out that the job description doesn't necessarily state that the position would require any sort of negotiating with entities such as CWCB, but rather "coordinating."

"I would agree that if we wanted somebody to go up to Denver and negotiate on our behalf rather than a board member or board members, it would be two different people. But the way this is structured with the term coordinating, which is vague. I think it's clear that's a different level of person than somebody who would be our negotiator," he said.

Pfister added that he did not believe the position was looking for two different people, but rather someone with all of the listed skills.

Lewis suggested that Tedder provide the board some language that would "soften" the larger policy tasks to bring it more in line with an executive assistant.

"Ideally, it would be great to get a manager, but you don't have the budget for that, so you wouldn't really be looking for that right now," she said.

Secrist explained he did not see the position as being a managerial type of position, adding that it was still "within the confines of an assistant."

Later in the meeting, Pfister suggested that someone who is intimidated by working with governmental agencies might not be the best candidate for the district.

Additionally, Pfister added that the board have a deadline for applications at the end of March.

## Town, sanitation district approve fee waivers for Habitat for Humanity home

The Pagosa Springs Town Council approved a development fee waiver for a Habitat for Humanity home located at 642 Florida St. during a meeting on March 2.

Town council also approved the expenditure for capital investment fees for that same home during the same meeting.

According to agenda documentation, the request to waive building permit application fees, right of way permit application fees and sanitation plant investment fees from the Pagosa Springs Sanitation General Improvement District (PSSGID) is to reduce construction costs that will be paid by the new homeowner.

Planning Director James Dickhoff explained during the meeting that Ordinance 878, adopted by town council on March 22, 2018, allows town council to grant an exemption for all or any part of the development review fees of a project that meets the definition of low-income, very-low income, moderate-income or workforce housing.

The waiver would be up to \$2,550 for a building permit fee and

\$50 for the right of way application permit fee; however, the right of way application bond for road cuts will still be required, Dickhoff noted.

Additionally, the sanitation plant investment fee waiver request to the PSSGID is for \$4,725, Dickhoff added.

"Habitat for Humanity has standard forms that really ensures that these homes are affordable for at least 20 years. They are in kind of a graduated scale of an amount of appreciation that they get each year within that 20-year period. If at any time the property decides to sell, Habitat has the first right of refusal to take that house back to ensure that it is sold to a qualifying family that meets their income level requirements," Dickhoff said.

Council member Shari Pierce noted that she had brought up the idea of potentially putting a lien on the property to ensure that when it sells the funds that are being waived would be reimbursed to the town.

"As James indicated we're looking at a form of, I guess a lien," Town Manager Andrea Phillips said.

Habitat for Humanity of Archuleta County Executive Director Lori Henricksen explained that the organization is familiar with working with specific deeds and using different funding sources.

"Generally, it can be anywhere from five years to 20 years that they would provide these funds for that, after the homeowner has been in the home for a period of time, those fees are forgiven, or that grant that is provided," she said. "We're used to dealing with these types of things and layering things together."

Council member Matt DeGuise explained that he liked the idea of the homeowner staying in the home for 20 years to "sunset" those fees, but if anything shorter were to come about, putting the money back into the town's hands for different projects.

"How do we make sure that we

invest in this in a way that if it's, quote, unquote flipped, what we consider prematurely that we're reimbursed, but at a certain point that should be forgiven and 20 years seems like a good enough timeframe for me," council member Mat deGraaf added.

Henricksen noted that groundbreaking for the project would be around the first part of May and the home would be completed by the end of November.

The home's mortgage would be a U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) loan that is converted into a mortgage, she noted.

"When town council originally considered Ordinance 878, they really were trying to keep in perspective the amount of the fee waiver in relation to the deed restriction," Dickhoff said. "When you think about the amount of the fee waiver versus the difference in market-rate value in either a rental or ownership and a reduced rent or ownership amount because of an affordable program, I think town council is being sensitive to ensure that people would take advantage of this with a shorter deed restriction."

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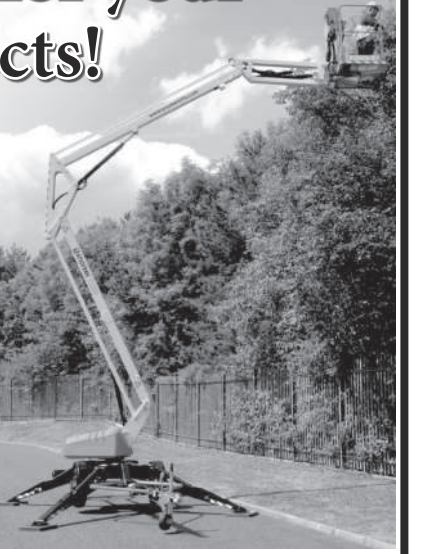

## Detect to Protect Challenge seeks a live animal test for chronic wasting disease

Sensis, on behalf of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)–Agricultural Research Service and NASA Tournament Lab, is putting up a total of \$170,000 in prize money, with \$60,000 going to the team or person that can develop a live animal screening test for chronic wasting disease (CWD).

CWD is a fatal disease of cervids (deer, elk, reindeer and moose) that causes damaging changes in the brain. Clinical signs of infection can take years to develop. Animals without clinical signs can still spread the disease.

Currently, there are two approved official postmortem tests for CWD detection. The goal of the Detect to Protect Challenge is to develop a diagnostic test for the early diagnosis of CWD in a live animal, before clinical signs, which only occurs in the late stages of the disease.

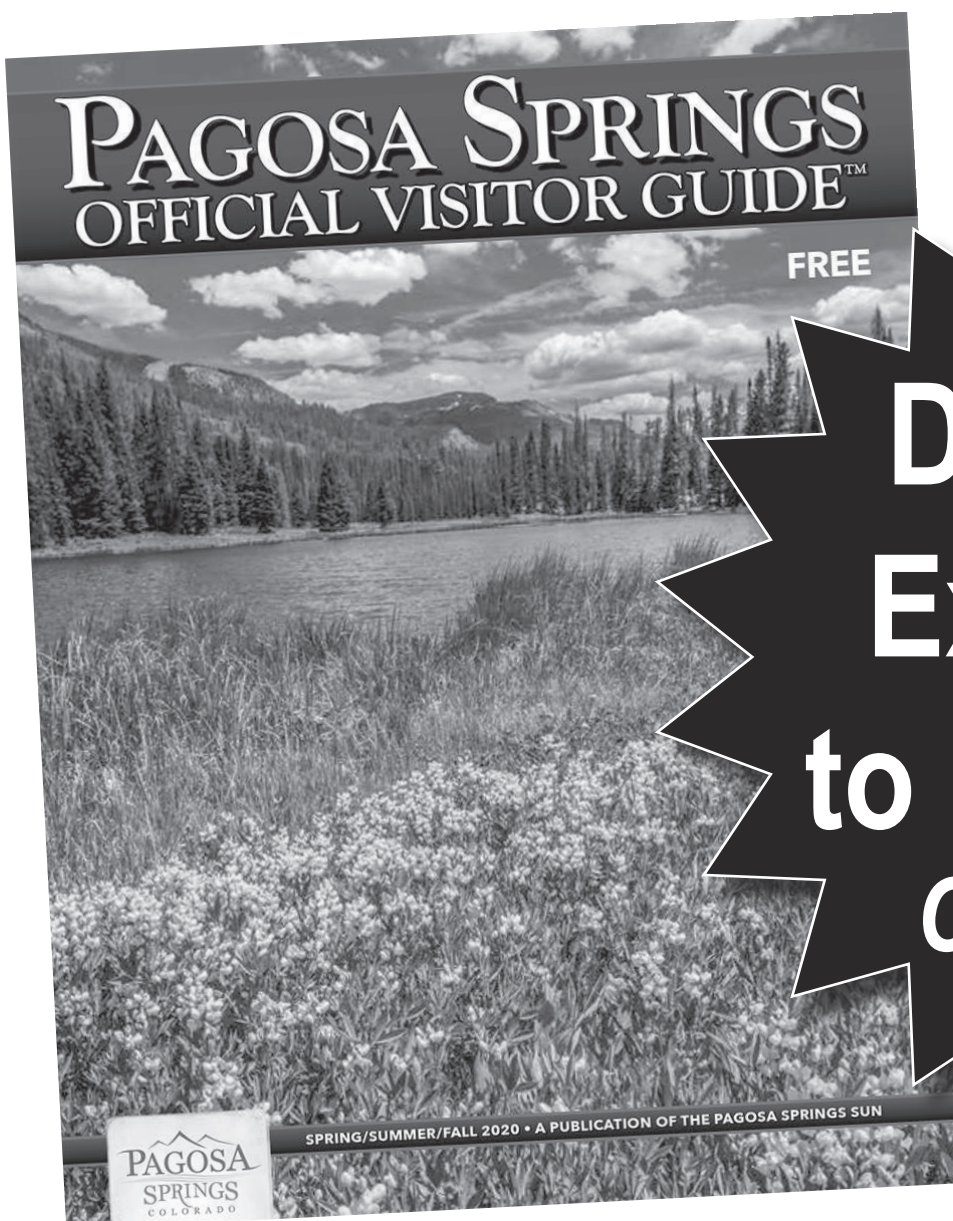
Competitive solutions to this challenge shall consist of novel

diagnostic tests that are sensitive and specific for CWD, producing timely and reproducible results from samples easily obtained from live animals. Competitive solutions will also be cost-effective and readily deployable. The ideal solutions to this challenge are diagnostic tests that would be eligible for approval as an official CWD test by the administrator of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), USDA.

Participants must register and create an account at the Detect to Protect Challenge website at [www.cwdchallenge.com](http://www.cwdchallenge.com). The deadline for the first phase, a concept paper, is April 23.

Up to seven teams will receive awards of \$10,000 each and be invited to participate in Phase 2, early development of their test. First place will receive \$60,000, with \$30,000 going to the second-place team. Judges will have the option of awarding a \$10,000 third-place prize.

### Pirates dominate at regional tournament, seven advance to state

The Pagosa Springs High School Pirate wrestling team hosted the state's Western Regional tournament last week, with seven Pirate wrestlers qualifying for the state tournament.

As a team, the Pirates also earned the regional title.

Coach Dan Janowsky commended his team's performance.

"We had a good performance from everybody," he said.

Janowsky noted this region was the toughest in the state this year in terms of individually ranked wrestlers, and has been the toughest region for the past five years.

He also mentioned "every kid represented themselves well and competed well" at the tournament.

The Pirates have the most wrestlers from one team in the region advancing to the final tournament.

Janowsky explained how this year's state tournament is slightly different compared to normal, non-COVID years.

Typically, for each weight class, the top four finishers from the regional tournaments qualify for the state tournament. This year, only the top two finishers advanced.

Janowsky noted that this is the largest number of first- and second-place finishers the Pirates have had in a regional tournament.

He also noted that "every kid on the team placed in top six" for their respective weight class.

Luke Tressler went 1-2 on his matches at the tournament in the 113-pound weight class.

Tressler went 9-4 on the season, with five wins from pins.

Erik Wyman went 2-1 on his matches in the 120-pound weight class, placing second in the tournament and advancing to the state tournament.

Wyman defeated his opponent from Coal Ridge by a technical fall four minutes and 10 seconds into the match. He pinned his opponent from Summit four minutes and 53 seconds into the match. He was defeated by his opponent from Alamosa in the first-place match by a

major decision of 9-1.

Wyman has a record of 12-2 on the season.

Trevor Torrez went 1-2 on his matches in the 126-pound weight class, placing in the top six.

Torrez had a record of 7-10 on the season, with four wins coming from pins.

Tommy Barker went 2-2 on his matches over the weekend in the 132-pound weight class. Barker placed in the top six in that weight class.

Barker had a record of 11-8 on the season, with seven wins coming from pins.

EJ Monterroso went 2-2 in the

138-pound weight class, placing fourth in the tournament.

Monterroso had been sidelined for close to a month due to a torn ACL, according to Janowsky.

Janowsky explained that Monterosso's mobility was compromised due to his injury, as he was still not 100 percent recovered.

"He showed a lot of courage," Janowsky said.

Janowsky also noted how, even with his injury, Monterosso was able to finish every one of his matches without having to scratch due to his injury.

### Pirates end shortened season with 6-7 record

The Pagosa Springs High School Pirate basketball team's season came to an end March 5 in La Jara.

The team finished the season with a 6-7 overall record and 4-4 league mark, landing them third in the Intermountain League standings behind the Centauri Falcons (No. 5 in the state tournament bracket) and the Alamosa Mean Moose (No. 12 in the state tournament).

Pagosa fell behind early Friday, with Centauri building an 11-5 lead by the end of the first.

Coach Wes Lewis noted Centauri "banked in a 3-pointer right at the end of the first," which left Pagosa down by eight instead of five at the end of the quarter.

The Pirates limited the Falcons to seven in the second, but the Falcons returned the favor, limiting the Pirates to three, leaving Centauri with an 18-8 lead at halftime.

"We made some adjustments, came out in the third quarter, and ran a back-door set and got a layup, cut it to eight," Lewis said, adding the team changed offenses at half-time and "got some good looks, hit some 3s."

Lewis noted the Falcons were packed in on Mitch Lewis in the paint, with the Pirates switching things up "and actually were gettin' some good looks and hittin' some shots, but, unfortunately, so were they."

Centauri narrowly outscored Pagosa in the third, 15-14, but broke out for 17 in the fourth while limiting Pagosa to four to claim their 12th win of the season and seventh league win by a final score of 50-26.

"We didn't play well," Wes Lewis said. "And, give Centauri some credit, they're pretty darn good."

The coach noted the Pirates

played well offensively in the second half, but finished with too many turnovers with 21.

"Give them some credit for the pressure they apply," the coach said of the Falcons. "They play extremely hard, play with extreme high energy for 32 minutes ... seven or eight guys do."

Wes Lewis said the team practiced several things to prepare for the pressure, but didn't handle the pressure as well as he had hoped.

"It was just a tough game for us," he said, noting Pagosa didn't shoot a single free throw on the night. He added, "Some things didn't go our way that wanted to or needed to."

Mitch Lewis was the sole Pirate to score in double digits on the night, logging 10 points, including a pair of 3-pointers, as well as three rebounds and a block.

Kayson Shahan followed with six points, which included a pair of 3-pointers, four rebounds and an assist.

Gunner Dozier and Logan Harper each landed a 3-pointer in the game. Dozier also had a rebound and an assist.

Aidan O'Donnell and Breck Wilson each contributed two points. O'Donnell also had a rebound and four assists, while Wilson contributed a rebound.

Dylan Manzanares added two steals in the game, and Wyatt Shuhart added a rebound, an assist and a steal.

The Pirates ended up not being short-handed in the affair against the Falcons thanks to a late change in quarantine rules for athletes which the team found out about the day of the game.

"That was a pleasant surprise," Wes Lewis said, noting he was glad senior Wyatt Zeigler was able to come back and play again with the team.

This year, the Pirates will say

goodbye to five seniors: Zeigler, Mitch Lewis, O'Donnell, Manzanares and Shuhart.

"I appreciate the seniors' willingness to accept me and my philosophy," the coach said, noting the seniors had great attitudes and work ethic. "When you take over a program, I think your seniors kind of set the tone for how it's going to go, and if they'd have had bad attitudes, bad work ethic and didn't really buy in, I think it could have been a much tougher transition and a much longer transition. But, I felt like all of them were just very bought in and very committed to what I was trying to get done, and it made the season very enjoyable."

With his first season at the helm of the boys' program in the books, Wes Lewis spoke about the team's growth.

"I think coach [Randy] Sorensen had laid a good foundation," he said, noting he tried to change a few things, put his thumbprint on a few things and build. "And I think we were getting better."

The coach noted the team lost two seniors to graduation last year, as well as senior Kyler Hammer to a season-ending injury before this season started, leaving Mitch Lewis and O'Donnell as the team's players who had "any significant varsity experience."

"So, we had a lot of new faces. A lot of new kids, ... obviously a new

program, a new coach," he said. "There's a lot of new stuff this year, and I thought we were getting better as the year went on."

The coach noted the team lost four games by three points or less, and those games could have turned the tide.

"You know, we win those games, we're in the playoffs," he said. "And we were in a position to win them, we just didn't ... quite get it done at the end."

Wes Lewis noted that while he would have loved time in summer leagues and a normal-length season, he enjoyed the season and working with the athletes, especially the seniors.

"I'm really looking forward to the next year and the kids we've got coming back and some eighth-graders coming in," he said, calling this season a learning experience.

He also thanked his assistant coaches, Nathan Morales and Yul Wilson.

Morales, he noted, did a great job despite not having coached a lot of basketball previously.

"He's just got a real good mind for coaching," Wes Lewis said.

Wilson, a volunteer coach, was there for every practice, whether it was open gym or a regular-season practice, Wes Lewis pointed out, adding that he helped Morales and took the JV under his wing.

# Lady Pirates fall in opening round of state tournament

The No. 9 Pagosa Springs High School Lady Pirates fell out of contention during the first round of the state tournament Tuesday, falling prey to the No. 24 Grand Valley Cardinals at home.

The Cardinals upset Pagosa 47-44 in the back-and-forth affair.

"Give them all the credit," coach Charles Rand said of the Cardinals.

Pagosa took an 11-8 lead by the end of the first quarter, with Molly Graham logging all of the first-quarter points for the Lady Pirates.

However, the Cardinals put up 17 points in the second half and limited Pagosa to 12 to take a 25-23 lead into the second half.

Pagosa, helped by a trio of 3-pointers from Adelyn Dozier and one from Chantelle Caldwell, outscored the Cardinals 12-8 in the third to reclaim the lead, despite the team suffering injuries throughout the second half.

Rand noted Dozier pulled a hamstring.

"She missed probably a good quarter of the game," the coach said. "And it was, unfortunately for us, it was in the second half — the winning half."

Then, he pointed out, Graham twisted her ankle, though the Pirates still had a chance to come back.

Unfortunately, the Cardinals picked up 14 points in the game's final quarter while the Lady Pirates only picked up nine and were unable to make a shot in the game's final moments to take it into overtime.

"We just did not execute," Rand said about the game. "I'm more disappointed in the defense than anything else, I believe, because turnovers are going to happen, but we're so much better to me than what we showed defensively. We just did not get locked in well enough."

The coach added later that the team didn't execute down the stretch after getting themselves back into the game, adding the athletes may have put a lot of pressure on themselves.

"Kind of the game plan ... was to play inside out, and we did accomplish that," Rand said. "We did leave some points on the floor ... Just down the stretch there, ... unfortunately, they were the better team, executing-wise. We just had way too many unforced turnovers."

He said of the Cardinals, "I have to give them credit. When you're making shots ... and we're not, it's ... heading into the fourth quarter, they were up by two. Playing at home, that's a game you should win. We could never get a real rhythm on the offensive side of the ball."

The Lady Pirates worked with a deeper rotation in the game, with freshman Kelby Enjady-Vigil seeing increased minutes.

"She's been coming on," Rand said.

Graham led the team with 20 points, which she complemented with six rebounds, four assists, three blocks and a steal.

Dozier followed with 14 points,

which included four 3-pointers, and a rebound, two assists and two steals.

Caldwell picked up nine points, 12 rebounds, four assists, a block and a steal in the game.

Kori Lucero added a fourth-quarter free throw, as well as a rebound and a steal.

Keira Torrez pulled down two rebounds and logged four assists and a block.

Bea Carpenter pulled down two rebounds, while Enjady-Vigil had one.

Pagosa landed five of nine free throws and turned the ball over 21 times.

Grand Valley advances to take on the No. 8 Brush Beetdiggers this evening in Brush.

Tuesday's loss followed a 47-25 loss to the Falcons on March 5.

Pagosa led Centauri 10-7 after the first quarter, thanks in part to 3-pointers from Torrez and Dozier.

Unfortunately, the Falcons held the Lady Pirates to four points in the second while putting up 13, giving the home team a 20-14 advantage at the half.

The Falcons continued the trend in the third, logging 16 points while holding the Pirates scoreless.

Rand noted it was the first time in his 20 years of coaching that his team hasn't scored in a quarter.

"I've done it to people before, but, boy, when you're on the business end of that paddle, it doesn't feel so well," he said, noting the team had shots, but they didn't go in, which fed into Centauri's defense and, subsequently, offense.

The teams each put up 11 points in the fourth, sending Pagosa home with the 47-25 loss.

While the Pirates didn't end up being short-handed in the game due to last-minute quarantine rule changes that took effect the day of the Centauri game, Rand noted the team was out of sync.

"We had prepared ... different kids were already stepping up to be in those roles," he said. "We played really well that first quarter against Centauri. I mean, really well. And then when they went zone, we looked like we'd never seen a zone before. It just fell apart, almost instantly. Give them a lot of credit — a lot of credit. They did a great job of communicating where Adelyn was at, a lot of ball pressure."

Centauri got hot and shot the ball well, he added, and Pagosa was unable to stop the tide.

"It was coming high and hot," he said, adding, "They're such a good team. They're such a good team. They're well coached, they do a lot of things right."

Dozier and Graham led the Lady

Pirates on the evening with seven points each, with Dozier logging a pair of 3-pointers. Graham also tallied eight rebounds and two assists.

Caldwell added six points, which included a 3-pointer, five rebounds, two assists and two blocks.

Torrez put up three points and pulled down a rebound.

River Pitcher contributed an assist and a steal, while Bea Carpenter logged three rebounds and a block.

Lucero picked up a steal, and Enjady-Vigil logged a pair of rebounds, a pair of assists and a steal.

Pagosa made three of eight attempts from the free-throw line and turned the ball over 19 times.

The Lady Pirates finished the season with a 10-4 record, which included a 6-2 record in Inter-mountain League (IML) action.

Pagosa finished second in the IML, behind Centauri's perfect 8-0 league mark, but ahead of Alamosa, Montezuma-Cortez and Bayfield.

The Falcons entered the post-season as the No. 2 team, earning a bye in the first round. They face No. 15 Coal Ridge this evening in La Jara.

"I want the kids to feel it was a successful season for them," Rand said of the Lady Pirates, noting he told them that while they didn't meet their goal of playing in the Great 8 this year, that's not a true measure of success or failure.

He noted the team played a lot better than in the beginning of the season.

"I could see the hunger and the disappointment in the kids' eyes when we left today," he said after Tuesday's game, adding he challenged them by asking what they are going to do to continue to grow and make the team better next year.

Pagosa will lose two seniors from this year's squad — Dozier and Pitcher — but is expected to have everyone else return.

"We can be better," he said.

Rand also reflected on the team's seniors.

"She's such a team player," Rand said of Pitcher. "It's all about 'we' and not 'me' with River."

Pitcher was willing to do whatever the team needed to help, he noted, though she didn't play her junior year.

Her team-focused attitude was a "breath of fresh air" in 2021, he added, and she helped teach the other kids and set a good example.

"Losing Adelyn is going to be big shoes to fill," Rand said, adding later that she was the team's best player all year. "We have lost best players in the past, but she's ... she's different."

Dozier shoots the ball well and draws a lot of attention, which makes others better by helping them be open.

"We're gonna have to replace Adelyn by committee next year," Rand said, noting he was glad the team had this year because freshmen learn to become better players from watching seniors practice.

Like Pitcher, he added, Dozier was a team player, and she was one of the better captains who has come through the program and worked to pick up her teammates.

with a record of 13-3, with nine wins coming from pins.

"It's heartbreaking, but also inspiring," Janowsky said about Monterosso's performance.

Dylan Tressler went 2-1 on his matches in the 145-pound weight class. He pinned his opponent from Rifle just one minute into the match and defeated his opponent from Gunnison by a major decision of 10-2.

Tressler was defeated by his opponent from Bayfield in the first-place match. Tressler placed second in the tournament and is advancing to state.

Tressler has a season record of 11-3, with 10 wins coming from pins.

Brae Bergdolt went 3-0 in his matches in the 152-pound weight class, finishing first in that division and advancing to state.

"It's not just what he does on the mat, it's what he does off the mat that truly helps us a lot," Janowsky said.

Grant Aucoin took first place in the 170-pound weight class, advancing to state.

Janowsky noted that he had a "real dominating performance."

Grant Aucoin pinned his opponent from Steamboat Springs just one minute and 18 seconds into the match. He pinned his opponent from Basalt one minute and 18 seconds into the match. He won the first-place match by pinning his opponent from Moffat County in one minute and seven seconds.

Grant Aucoin has a season record of 13-1, with nine wins coming from pins.

Janowsky mentioned this is a special reward for Grant Aucoin after he was forced to miss the past two seasons due to injuries.

Janowsky noted his "determination to keep trying" prevailed and "to work through all that and be a regional champion is extra special."

Wil Aucoin took first place in the 182-pound weight class, advancing

to state.

Janowsky noted that Wil Aucoin was one of two Pirate juniors to claim the title of regional champion.

Wil Aucoin pinned his opponent from Gunnison one minute and six seconds into the match. He pinned his opponent from Delta in two minutes and 58 seconds, and he pinned his opponent from Steamboat Springs in the first-place match three minutes and 50 seconds into the match.

Wil Aucoin has a season record of 12-2, with the majority coming from pins.

Sophomore Aaron Aucoin stepped in for senior Trevor Moore in the 195-pound weight class.

Janowsky explained that the injury bug had also struck Moore during practice last week and he was unable to compete due to a knee injury.

Aaron Aucoin went 2-2 on his matches at the tournament, placing in the top six.

Aaron Aucoin ended the season with a record of 5-3, with four wins coming from pins.

Skyler Hill took first place in the 220-pound weight class, going 3-0, making him the second junior on the squad to advance to the state tournament.

Hill pinned his opponent from Gunnison two minutes and 29 seconds into the match, pinned his opponent from Delta in one minute and two seconds, and pinned his opponent from Alamosa in the first place-match just one minute and four seconds into the match.

Hill has a season record of 14-0, with 12 wins coming from pins.

Kaden McKee went 2-1 on his matches in the 285-pound weight

class.

McKee initially placed second, but had not faced off against the third-place finisher and was required to wrestle an extra match, called a wrestleback.

McKee was defeated in the wrestleback and did not advance to the state tournament.

Janowsky noted McKee has been severely underweight for the heavy weight class and has been wrestling against opponents who are usually 20 to 50 pounds heavier than him.

McKee ended the season with a record of 10-3, with seven wins coming from pins.

Janowsky explained that preparations this week for the state tournament will involve some rule refreshers and building on the techniques they already have in place.

He also noted they will be working on the mental side of things by "deemphasizing the fact that it's the state tournament" and focusing more on just giving their best effort.

"We want them to recover as much as possible so they have full energy going into the tournament; we want them to have full confidence," Janowsky added.

He also explained that the "one thing you can control is your effort."

With the tournament being smaller compared to other years, he noted, "Everyone is going to have to adjust."

He also explained they are just excited to be in this position.

"We're excited to compete this Friday. I feel good about our chances," Janowsky said.

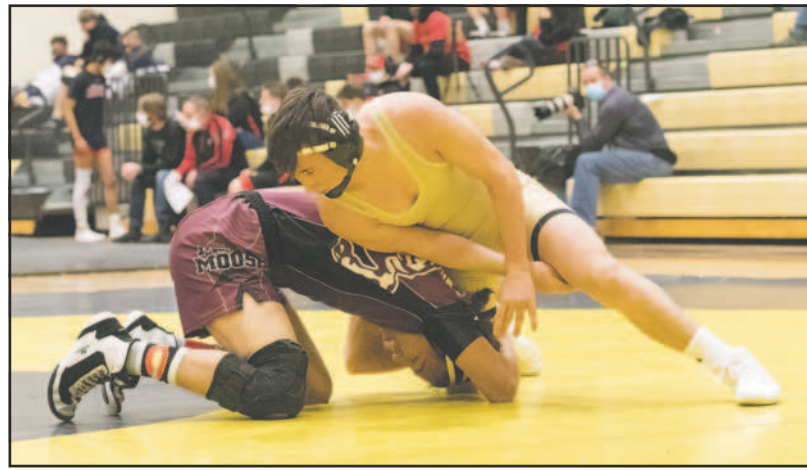
The tournament is scheduled for this Friday, March 12, at the Southwest Motors Event Center

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

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## Many St. Patrick's Day traditions are not from Ireland

St. Patrick's Day is made special by various traditions. Everything from dyeing major cities' rivers green to parades to enjoying green foods have become part of the pagantry of St. Patrick's Day.

The next time you raise a green beer to your lips, you may wonder which traditions are authentically Irish and which ones were created by regions with an abundance of Irish emigrants. Surprisingly, many seemingly Irish traditions likely began elsewhere.

### First parade

It would be accurate to assume that various elements associated with St. Patrick's Day began where St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, once resided, including the first St. Patrick's Day parade.

However, some of the first parades held in St. Patrick's honor took place in two North American cities, New York and Boston, that had high numbers of Irish immigrants. But historians say the first ever St. Patrick's Day parade was actually held in St. Augustine, Fla.,

in 1601, a year after gunfire blasts were used to honor the saint. The parade may have been at the request of an Irish priest living there at the time.

### Corned beef and cabbage

What would St. Patrick's Day be without an authentic meal of corned beef and cabbage? This dish is not so authentic after all, and actually is an American innovation. Ham and cabbage was widely eaten in Ireland, but corned beef was a cheaper alternative found in America by immigrants. Therefore, corned beef became a staple of poor Irish immigrants living in lower Manhattan. The salted meat was boiled three times to remove some of the brine and make it palatable.

### Green beer

Green beer is not an Irish custom, but an American one. The most common beer consumed in Ireland is Guinness, which is dark brown to black in color, making green dye useless in Irish pubs since it would be largely invisible in the stout.

### Golf tournaments

One would not associate golf with St. Patrick's Day unless they reside in Nome, Alaska. Golf is a popular Irish pastime, and each year the Bering Sea Ice Classic Golf Tournament takes place right around St. Patrick's Day. Bright green golf balls are used, and breaks are factored in between holes to warm up at local bars.

### Wearing green

According to The Christian Science Monitor, individuals in the United States started wearing green to celebrate St. Patrick's Day in the early 1700s. They believed it "made one invisible to leprechauns." The official color for the holiday used to be a sky blue known as "St. Patrick's Day Blue," established during the reign of King George III.

In addition to these traditions, specialty items, such as coffees and shakes, also are very popular. However, most of these do not have origins on the Emerald Isle, either. Yet, no matter where traditions began, there's no denying St. Patrick's Day has long inspired celebration.

St. Patrick is widely recognized to be the person who brought Christianity to Ireland. From his own autobiography, we know he was captured by pirates from his home in Britain at age 16 and taken as a slave to Ireland. He lived there for six years, taking care of animals in the lush green pastures. He finally escaped to his family back in Britain, yet the call back to Ireland was undeniable. He trained as a priest and returned to Ireland as a Christian missionary. By the 17th century, Patrick was revered as the

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# Lesser-known Irish foods

Chances are many people have heard of Irish soda bread and corned beef and cabbage, both of which are especially popular on St. Patrick's Day (although the latter isn't entirely authentic Irish cuisine). But there are many different traditional Irish dishes that may not be as well-known and enjoyed outside of Ireland. Irish cuisine is loaded with rich meat and potatoes dishes, and there are some delicious delicacies to be discovered along the way.

## Boxty

Many different cultures have boxty-like dishes in their culinary repertoires. Boxty is similar to latkes or German kartoffelpuffer. It is made from both grated raw

potatoes and mashed potatoes. Historians believe it originated during the potato famine of the mid-19th century.

## Coddle

Being frugal with leftovers means finding delicious ways to reimagine ingredients into new meals. Coddle is a byproduct of that line of thinking. A coddle is a one-pot meal made from leftover sausage, potatoes, onions and even bacon. The name comes from "coddling" or simmering the stew.

## Shellfish

Individuals outside of Ireland may not immediately associate shellfish with the Emerald Isle, but shellfish are plentiful in the waters around Ireland. Dublin Bay prawns, cockles, mussels, and

clams all can be scooped out of the waters. Galway even has an oyster festival each year in September.

## Irish stew

Irish stew is a dish made with potatoes, onions and mutton. Mutton is meat from a sheep that is more than 1 year old and ideally 3 years old, according to The Spruce: Eats. The flavor is very strong and it contains a considerable amount of fat. Mutton is more popular in Europe and the Middle East due to its gamey flavor. It is best for slow-cooking methods, which is why it is the perfect addition in a stew that should be simmered for hours.

## Champ

Fans of mashed potatoes are likely to take to champ, a very

(If only that were true in Pagosa Springs.) He is usually depicted carrying a walking staff in one hand and a sprig of shamrock in the other. Legend says that when he stopped to preach, he stuck his staff into the ground and it would turn into a living tree. The symbol for St. Patrick's Day, celebrated each year on the anniversary of his death on March 17, has always been the shamrock. Story goes that Patrick often held up the shamrock while preaching to illustrate the renewing, ever-green power of the Holy Trinity.

No doubt the most cherished traditions around St. Patrick's Day revolve around food and beverages. Who doesn't love soda bread, Guinness stew, corned beef and cabbage, and a pint of good Irish beer? One overlooked yet traditional recipe for this special day is colcannon. It's simple to make and simply delicious. Boil one pound of cabbage, one pound of potatoes and two leeks until soft. Mash with one cup of milk and a half cup of butter. Season to taste. Happy St. Patrick's Day.

## The Meeker Massacre

This week's column is continued from last week. We've been writing about the creation in 1878-1879 of the Southern Ute Indian Agency in Ignacio.

The Utes gave up almost 1,894,400 acres of land in exchange for their new reservation. The government intended to compensate the Utes with money for the lost land, but it never happened. A provision in the contract to do so was mistakenly omitted. It mattered little because Congress failed to ratify the contract.

Unfortunately for the Utes, they and their agent stationed at Ignacio were left in limbo after this agreement was not signed. The agent, whose name was Weaver, had but two small buildings from which to tend the needs of 800 Utes.



### Pagosa's Past

Camp Lewis was probably established at Pagosa Springs at this time because the Army thought the proposed reservation would be approved by Congress. Pagosa Springs would then have been an ideal location for the fort, with the agency headquarters south on the Navajo River.

The Utes were not happy about being back in Ignacio, according to Weaver. He complained in his annual report that they had

similar dish. It is made with potatoes, milk, butter and scallions. It is customary to make a well of melted butter in the center of a serving.

### Colcannon

Mashed potatoes shine once again in this dish that also includes cabbage. Colcannon is typically served with boiled ham in Ireland.

### Pudding

Irish pudding is not a dessert but a savory sausage dish. The "black" variety includes pork, fat

and blood and is mixed with barley, oatmeal and suet. White pudding is similar, but it doesn't include the pork blood. A slice of both black and white pudding is traditionally served in a complete Irish breakfast

### Barmbrack

Usually shortened to "brack," this dish is an Irish fruitcake that features fruit, raisins and spices. Most people soak it in tea and whiskey overnight.

Traditional Irish cooking will include one of the delicious foods mentioned above.

■ continued from previous page threatened his life for putting the agency in Ignacio instead of on the Navajo River.

Nevertheless, Weaver attempted to carry out government policy, which was to make self-sufficient farmers of the Utes.

Evidence of Ute discontent mounted across Colorado. Finally, at the White River Agency near Meeker in northwestern Colorado, the smoldering resentment of the Utes exploded into tragedy.

Led by Chief Douglas, the White River Utes killed Agent Nathan Meeker, driving a wooden stake through his mouth and navel. All of the male agency employees, including three freighters, were slaughtered. The womenfolk and children were

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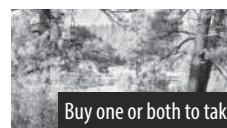

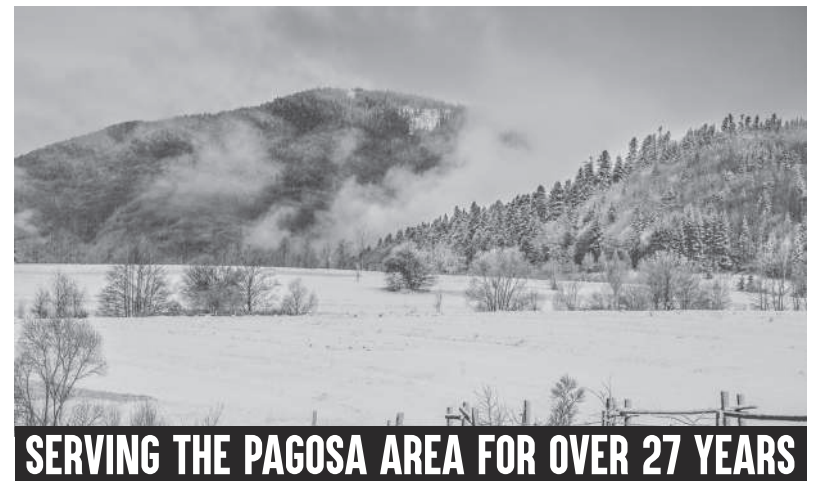

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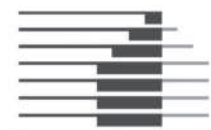


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# Congratulations on being savvy about scams

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) is where scams in the U.S. are reported and investigated, and, with any luck, resolved. Back in 2014, the FTC launched Pass it On based on a pair of simple truths:

- Most older adults are active and engaged in their communities; and

- Sharing what you know can help protect others in your community.

This approach is working. Far from being the vulnerable victims that most people perceive older Americans to be, the FTC reports that:

- Older adults are the least likely of any age group to report losing money to scams.

- Consumers who are 60 and better spot and reported fraud before losing money at nearly twice the rate of people between 20 and 59.

That said, the scams that do gain the greatest traction for those 60 and better are phone scams. This type of fraud includes tax and benefits schemes — targeting those aspects of people's lives where individuals feel they have little control and so are more likely to respond to phone communications.

Government imposters ranked second in the November 2020 FTC list of most damaging scams against those 60 and better. The Better Business Bureau Scam Tracker reports that bogus tax collection came second in their on-line survey in 2019. In tax-related identity theft, stolen Social Security numbers may be used to get a tax refund or a job. Thieves posing as members of the Social Security Administration (SSA) hit record levels, up 30 percent in 2020.

The Area Agency on Aging wrote about another government imposter scam — Medicare fraud — in the March 4 Pagosa SUN (Volume 113, No 24).

## What can you do?

Here at tax-time, you can foster awareness. Your experience, expertise and trusted place in our community serve as a force for good against scammers. 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## Five statistics that shed some light on the nature of customer loyalty

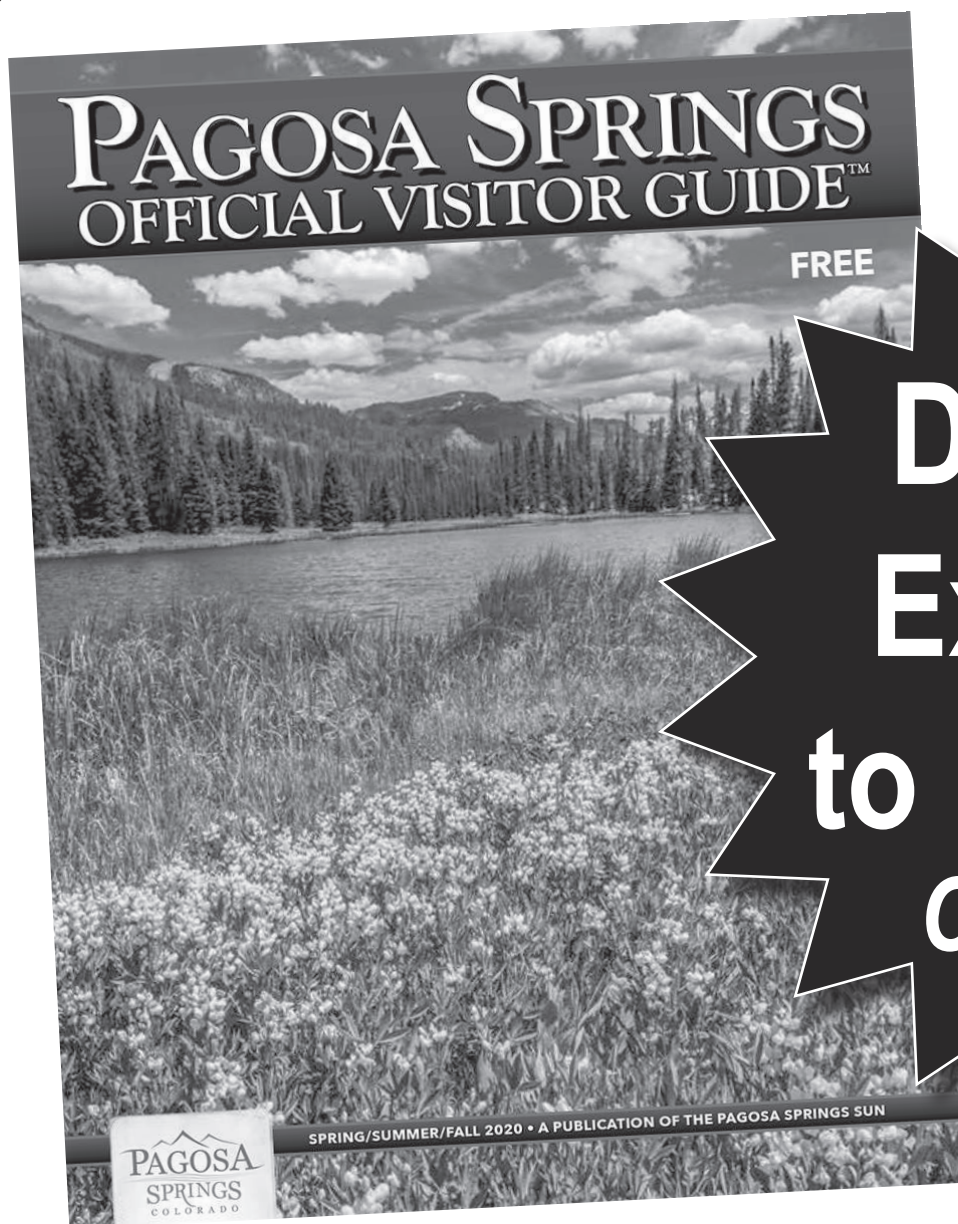

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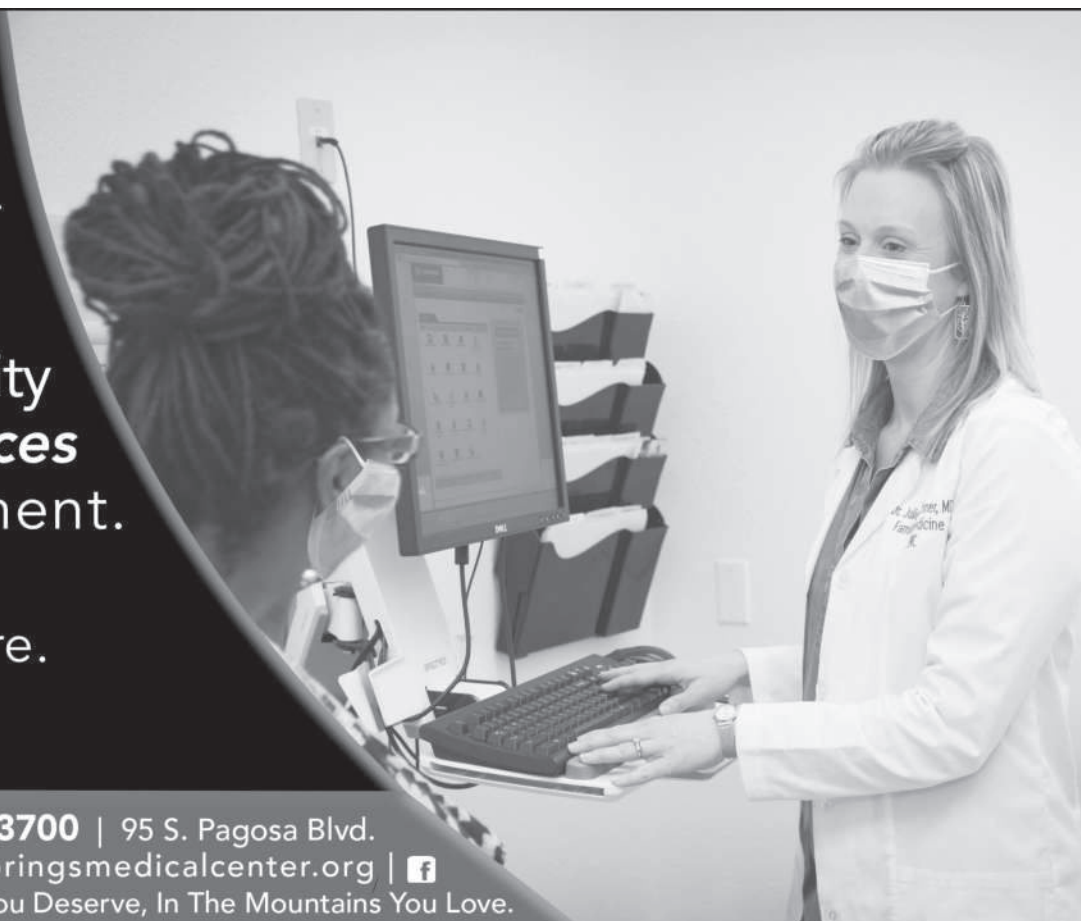

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# I sure hope that staple holds

On Dec. 20, 1956, I was officially released from active duty at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., and returned home by Greyhound bus in time to spend Christmas with my parents and three brothers. It was certainly wonderful to be back in Colorado, even though when Mom and Dad picked me up at the bus station, it was a cold winter night, but at least the cold was much more bearable in Colorado.

Now that I had fulfilled my active duty military obligation, it was time to find a job for the next nine months until I started college in the School of Engineering at the University of Colorado. Because I wanted to start working in the area of engineering and surveying, I applied for a job with the United States Geological Survey at the Federal Center in Lakewood, Colo.

I was accepted into the Topographical Division and assigned to work as a rodman for an engineer named Eugene Alexander. Gene and I spent the next eight months working together, the first four months in Denver and the second four months in Kremmling, Colo. Gene's job as a field engineer was to take a preliminary copy of an upcoming topographical map to the field and with a plane table and alidade verify the location of various physical elements shown on the map.

This preliminary map, compiled from aerial photos, is printed on yellow mylar with red lines representing contours, houses, roads, et cetera. Because it is difficult sometimes to distinguish a haystack from a house or barn, or get a precise ground elevation because of trees and brush, or accurately locate section corners, property lines or contour lines, it is necessary to field verify these items to ensure the accuracy of the map, or quadrangle.

My job as rodman was to stand at various points with a stadia rod so Gene could sight through an alidade to verify the location and elevation of these points. In addition, I helped look for section corners and sometimes drove the station wagon as we moved down a country road with Gene sitting on the front fender holding the plane table over his shoulder and alidade in the crook of his arm. I had to be very careful not to accelerate too fast or stop too quickly, or I could send Gene backward over the fender or shoot him forward like a rocket. Of course, OSHA would have a fit today if they saw us doing this.

Gene and I had many adventures and one of the most memorable for me occurred that spring right after the farmers started planting their fields. We were doing the Eastlake Quadrangle northeast of Denver,

which at that time was just farmland. Gene asked me to walk down the road about 500 feet, cross a small, 2-foot wide irrigation ditch full of dirty water, climb over an old barbed wire fence and take a shot next to a huge old cottonwood tree located in a low spot in an old cornfield.

I had just crossed the ditch, and while standing on the middle wire of this three-wire barbed wire fence getting ready to swing one leg over to jump on the ground, an old farmer stepped out from behind the cottonwood tree about a hundred feet away and said, "Jump off that fence kid, and I'll blow your damn head off."

There he stood with a Winchester .30-30 pointed straight at me and I am wondering what's going to happen next. The staple at the fence post holding the middle wire I was standing on was starting to give way. I didn't know whether I should fall to the left and get shot, just stand there until the staple gave way and I straddled the top wire (Heaven forbid), or fall to right into that ditch full of dirty water. The old farmer, whose name I still remember, yelled, "The last surveyor who came through my property cut a 10-foot-wide swath for a pipeline right through my cornfield and that ain't going to happen again."

Somehow, I managed to explain that we were just making a map for the government and if he would give me his name, I would make sure that he received a "free" copy. The word "free" certainly perked up his ears because he leaned his rifle against that old cottonwood tree and told me to come on down. That was a relief because that staple was

about to give way. I climbed off the fence and walked over to him to get his name and address, and get that last shot that Gene was waiting for.

As government surveyors, we were instructed that if we ever met an irate citizen, we were to get their name and address and the government would send them a free copy of the map when it was completed. After Joe and I talked a minute and I explained what we were doing, we parted company on amicable terms and I climbed back over the fence, being careful to make my crossing next to a more secure fence post.

I then walked back to Gene, who could see me by the cottonwood tree but was too far away to hear anything. Obviously curious, he simply asked what all the commotion was about. After I explained everything and gave him the farmer's name and address, his only comment was something to effect that incidents like that go with the job. As far as I was concerned, that was the first time I was threatened with a gun and, as it turns out, it would not be the last time. But that is another story.

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# Advocates find issue with current waivers

I advocate for residents in skilled nursing and assisted living residences as the regional long-term care ombudsman. I also am trained as a Senior Medicare Patrol and State Health Insurance Assistance Program counselor, all as an employee of San Juan Basin Area Agency on Aging (SJBAAA). The many aging and care concerns will be addressed here.

Now that residents and staff of long-term care homes who choose to receive COVID-19 vaccinations have priority in the United States, advocates are asking for reinstatement and strengthening of rules that were waived in 2020 to the present. The devastating toll the pandemic has had on residents, elders and caregivers is well known, including ongoing depression and other mental and physical effects of isolation on health.

As the Center for Medicare Advocacy reports, the reduction in training requirements and waived competency evaluation for temporary nurse aides must be addressed, since the original law required that such aides work no more than four months. Some members of Congress also are asking for reinstatement of this and other laws enforced prior to the pandemic.

For example, advocates seek more protection for long-term care residents from antipsychotic medications, which often require a black box warning of their dangerous side effects for individuals living with dementia. A physician must prescribe these medications. However, evidence from national inspection surveys show that facilities tend to overuse these drugs to control behavior without enough attempts at noninvasive, person-centered methods, especially during the pandemic with its staffing issues. The requirement to try other methods to find the cause of harmful behavior and to calm a person, as well as to document it, is already in the Nursing Home Reform law and amendments.

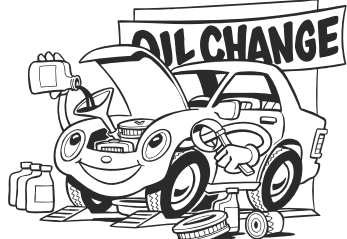
Advocates also ask for better data reporting on facility use of antipsychotics and more openness about facility ownership. They want to easily track the relationship between ownership and quality of care. Although a data resource exists, people who monitor resident rights state that its usability and access need to improve.

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# Techniques to revitalize a lawn after a long winter

Pristine, snow-covered landscapes can be wonders to behold. While that blanket of white is idyllic, a lawn's delicate blades may be paying a hefty price beneath the cold, heavy piles of snow.

Snow plows push salt and sand up on the grass while subterranean animals like mice and moles dig burrows beneath piles of snow as they try to find food and stay warm. Such conditions are not favorable for thriving landscapes. When the spring thaw arrives, lawns may be in dire need of some TLC.

The following techniques can mitigate winter-related lawn damage:

- Clear out debris. Remove any scattered leaves, branches and other debris that has been strewn across the property due to storms or snow-laden trees. This will give you a clean canvas to work on.

- Dry out snow mold. The Family Handyman says snow mold is a cold-season fungus that causes gray-colored circles or patches on the lawn where there has been snow. To alleviate snow mold, rake the lawn to loosen matted grass and facilitate the drying-out process.

- De-thatch the lawn. Heavy snow can compress the grass and cause some of it to die off. De-thatching helps to remove dead grass blades and separate any matting. This enables water, nutrients and air to reach the lawn's roots more effectively. Thinning out old organic matter also helps encourage new growth.

- Aerate the soil. Coupled with dethatching, aeration involves

loosening the soil or poking holes to allow nutrients to move freely to the roots.

- Kill weeds before they spread. Weeds may be the first to start growing when the weather begins to warm. Address them promptly by manually pulling them or applying an herbicide.

- Overseed the lawn. Chances are there are some bare spots that have formed over the winter. Overseeding can help to fill in the lawn. Make sure that frosts are largely a thing of the past and soil temperature is around 50 degrees F to 60 degrees F before seeding. Water daily until grass fills in.

- Apply nutrients. Fertilizer and compost can restore nutrients to the lawn that may have been used up over winter. A soil test at a nearby horticultural center can tell you which nutrients are needed, according to the Chemistry Cachet, a guide to using chemistry secrets for healthy living, beauty, cleaning and gardening.

Lawns can be restored to their pre-winter glory after some sweat equity and about five to six weeks of consistent sunshine and warm weather.

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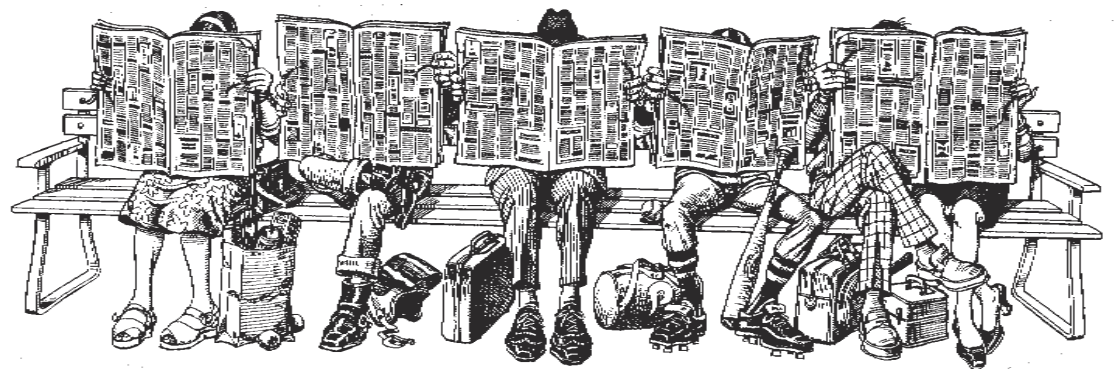
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# Tax filing time is a good time to look ahead to next year

With tax time upon us, one message we keep hearing is that you should file as early as possible.

You may recall that last year, there were numerous delays in getting tax refunds after the pandemic caught everyone, including the IRS, off guard. If you have a refund coming, the sooner you file, the sooner that refund will make its way into your bank account.

If you're like most Americans, you also want to do everything you can to reduce your overall tax bill. We all understand that taxes are needed to run the government, but there's no need for you as an individual to pay more than you owe.

Let's face it, though. It's a little late in the game to put into play most steps that can help you reduce your 2020 tax bill. You really need to have done whatever you were going to do before the end of the tax year.

But now is definitely a good time to start thinking about ways you can improve your tax situation for next year. Here are a few areas to consider or understand as you do so:

- Funding tax-preferenced accounts. One way to save on taxes is by putting money in a variety of tax-preferenced savings accounts such as an IRA, a 401(k) and others. Depending on the account, you can deduct your contribution each year, defer paying taxes on growth, or take withdrawals tax free. In at least one case — health savings accounts (HSAs) — you can do all three. Since an HSA gives you that triple whammy of tax avoidance, it's definitely something you want

to consider, although there are eligibility requirements you need to meet. Also, unlike retirement accounts, an HSA can only be used for medical expenses. With a traditional IRA or a Roth IRA, you don't get that triple whammy that comes with an HSA, but there are still significant tax advantages. With a traditional IRA, you don't pay taxes on your contributions and you defer taxes on the account's growth. You do pay taxes on withdrawals you make in retirement. A Roth IRA has different advantages. You can't deduct your contributions now, but your money grows tax free and you aren't taxed when you make withdrawals.

- Using a 529 for K-12 private education. Many people are familiar with 529 plans, but often they think of these solely as a way to save for a child's college education. But a 529 can also be used to pay for private school in elementary and high school if you so desire. The big tax advantage with a 529 is that you don't pay federal income taxes on the account's growth, but you must spend the money on qualified educational expenses and nothing else. That last point is important to remember and understand because if you use the money for other reasons, you will pay taxes on that withdrawal and you will also pay a penalty. A 529 account is definitely something to consider if you have children or grandchildren and want a tax-efficient way to save either for K-12 or college educations.

- Making charitable contributions. Charitable contributions are a powerful tool for reducing your tax bill and they come with the added bonus of allowing you to make a positive impact

in your community or the world. What could be better? Through charitable contributions, you can reduce your income tax, your capital gains tax and your estate tax. Some people view this in the most straightforward way — you choose a worthy cause that qualifies under the tax rules, and you write a check. But there are other tax-advantaged ways to approach charitable giving. Here's just one of many examples: You can establish a donor-advised fund, which is a personal charitable account opened in the name of one or more donors and held in custody by a nonprofit organization. How does that work? Let's say you sell a stock and, instead of paying the capital gains tax, you place the proceeds in a donor-advised fund. You can claim the full amount as a charitable deduction, but you don't have to donate the money all at once. The money remains in the fund and can be donated in small amounts over a period of years. All the while, it is drawing interest.

These are just a few examples of strategies you can consider as you seek ways to reduce that tax bill. Certainly, all of this is complicated, but your financial professional should be able to help you work your way through the IRS weeds and find what works best for you and your personal situation.

Your future tax-filing self will thank you.

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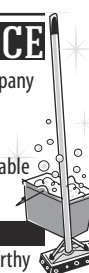

# Bird of the Week

This week's Bird of the Week, compliments of the Weminuche Audubon Society and Audubon Rockies, is the black phoebe.

Soon it will be time to watch for our summer birds and this is one of them. The Say's phoebe has already arrived and the black phoebe won't be far behind. These are birds of the south and west, usually not straying far from their winter grounds. They range from southern North America to as far south as Argentina. Here we are north of their interior range, but some adventuresome birds spend the summer in our part of Colorado.

Although they may be found in a variety of habitat types, these birds are never far from water. They perch in the open, low to the ground on a branch or rock, on the lookout for food. They will fly out to catch an insect midair, or snatch one from the ground, on leaves or on the water's surface. On occasion, they will also catch minnows near the surface of a pond.

Mud is required for building the cup-shaped nest, plastered to a vertical, protected surface. Increasingly, black phoebes are utilizing man-made surfaces, like building eaves or culverts, for nest sites. Nonsocial outside of the breeding season, pairs aggressively defend their breeding territory from other phoebes, flycatchers and songbirds.

Black phoebes are charcoal-gray colored with a white belly and a large, peaked head. A small hook on top of a thin, sharp beak helps in catching larger insects. In typical flycatcher fashion, this bird pumps its tail when perched.

Aided by their tolerance for human activities, population numbers of black phoebes are increasing.
