Board appoints Campbell as interim superintendent

Piedmont Public Schools Board of Education on May 8 met to discuss – and ultimately appoint – an interim superintendent as Dr. James White prepares to leave the district.

But first on the docket – saying goodbye to retiring Piedmont teachers and staff members. Sue McLemore, Shelly Nutter, Judy Wilkerson, Frances Williams, Denise Woodson and Johnny Tatum will end their careers at the conclusion of this semester.

Assistant Superintendent Lisa Campbell was appointed, after

the board discussed placing an interim superintendent into place to assure a smooth finish to the school year. Board President Layne Jones suggested consideration of Campbell, a long-time Piedmont education professional already in the know on superintendent duties and someone ready to bring a seamless end to the school year. 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Also moves forward with search for new district leader

Piedmont Public Schools Board of Education met in a special meeting Thursday, May 4, in order to hire a company to begin the search for Piedmont's new superintendent.

After listening to two presentations - the first by Oklahoma Public Schools Research Center (OPSRC) and the second by the Oklahoma State School Board Association (OSSBA) - the board made and passed a motion to hire OSSBA to conduct the search.

The board discussed the similarities in the cost and packages of both companies, but in the end

the experience and relationships built by OSSBA earned board members' votes. Stephanie Hyder, who is in her 11th year with OSSBA and serves as its executive search services and strategic initiatives director, presented her company to the board. In the opening of her presentation, she mentioned that OSSBA has facilitated over 100 superintendent searches – compared

Desperate for drivers

PPS to host May 20 Donuts and Drivers

Piedmont Public Schools has a critical need for bus drivers, and Director of Transportation Josh Critchfield has found a new and different way of welcoming new members to the family.

That way is a May 20 event, "Donuts and Drivers," held from 9:30 a.m. to noon at the district bus barn at 802 NW 2nd Street in Piedmont.

"The idea is to give anyone interested the chance to come and experience the culture, have a cup of coffee with us," Critchfield said. "We want people to see it's not a big scary school bus, it's a great opportunity to do something great for the kids and see our department is a wonderful environment."

The district needs seven new bus drivers for the start of the 2023-24 school year, which starts in August. When searching for new drivers, it can sometimes be a challenge to recruit them in the same way many other staff members and teachers apply – via the

Piedmont sales tax revenues mixed for May

City of Piedmont this month saw a drop in sales tax revenue when compared to May 2022 – but did exceed April’s collections on the Canadian County side of the map.

Oklahoma Tax Commission in its May 8 report indicated the bulk of Piedmont’s sales tax revenues – collected in Canadian County – this month total \$218,652. The same time last year, that amount was \$231,120; in April the state tax agency stated the city generated sales tax revenues of \$212,901.

In Kingfisher County, Piedmont in May posted \$5,923 in sales tax revenues; in May 2022, that sum was \$11,966 and in April it was \$7,795.

Piedmont and El Reno were the only two Canadian County municipalities that posted drops in sales tax collections from May 2022 to May 2023. Both cities fell by just over 5%.

Piedmont’s fellow Canadian County municipalities’ May sales tax collections, as reported by the state tax collection agency, were:

- Calumet - \$24,328
- El Reno - \$1.025 mi
- Geary (Canadian County) - \$29,990
- Mustang - \$1.295 million
- Okarche - \$39,540
- Oklahoma City (Canadian County) - \$2.838 million
- Union City - \$94,102
- Yukon - \$2.433 million


For Canadian County itself, sales tax revenues this month remained strong – easily surpassing both the same time last year and April, the OTC report showed.

The county in May collected \$870,851. Last month that total was \$804,532, and in May 2022 it was \$801,379, according to May 2023 records.

County sales tax revenues are allocated by law to operations at Gary E. Miller Canadian County Children’s Justice Center.

USE TAX REVENUES

OTC records showed Piedmont’s use tax revenues attributed to Canadian County this month easily surpassed April’s 88,776. The state agency reported the city in that county collected \$109,652 – which also topped May

2022’s \$105,923.

In Kingfisher County, the city generated \$4,840 in use tax in May. In April that total was \$7,837; in May 2022 it was \$6,225, OTC records showed.

Canadian County’s May use tax collections topped \$213,193, which topped both April’s reported \$175,934 and the \$203,513 recorded the same time last year. Other Canadian County municipal use tax collections were:

It’s ‘Home and Community Education Week’ in Canadian County

An organization that is focused on strengthening the family unit is being celebrated this week across Canadian County.

Canadian County Commission Chairman Dave Anderson read a proclamation declaring the week during the commissioners’ regular meeting May 8.

“We believe the family is the catalyst of our society,” said Anderson, the District 2 commissioner. “The stability of the family is the primary purpose of society.”

OHCE’s areas of focus are healthy living,

leadership development, resource management, cultural enrichment and family living.

A dozen Canadian County OHCE members brought home-baked goodies as a thank-you to the commissioners, who shared them with others after the meeting.

“Thank you for the wonderful treats,” District 1 Commissioner Tom Manske said.

Canadian County OHCE is a continuing education program in all aspects of home and community life. Their slogan is, “Working Together to Build Better Communities Through Leadership and Service.”

The organization’s ultimate aim is to educate its members to be well-informed and able to guide change in their homes and communities.

Canadian County has six OHCE groups – Friendly Circle, Frisco, Katies, Lamplighters, Sunshine and Underwood.

“They used to be called home demonstration groups, home extension groups,” said Donna Jung, Canadian County’s OHCE advisor and

an OSU extension educator for family and consumer science.

“We have 69 members, and they’re from Mustang, Yukon, Union City, Calumet and El Reno. They stay very busy. ... I appreciate all my members being here.”

OHCE groups “will strive to continue to focus on significant betterment of strong family life for communities across our state,” according to the Canadian County resolution presented Monday morning.

Through a partnership with the Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Service, OHCE presents research-based information to its members and the public through monthly leader lessons and district and state meetings.

Leadership development and community service projects provide OHCE members with further opportunities to apply this research-based information to practical use for their homes and communities.

district website.

“The people we’re looking for – sometimes they are retired or semi-retired and they aren’t as familiar with or care that much about technology, so it’s not easy or convenient for them to apply online,” Critchfield said. “We’re also hoping that coming and meeting with us in person, asking questions and being able to talk about what it takes to become a bus driver will relieve any hesitation someone might have – and it also gives them a chance to see and get on a school bus.”

Drivers are hired on a six-hour contract, and they can work full- or part-time. Depending on that staffing option, bus drivers can be eligible for benefits, including healthcare – and they can elect to pay into teacher retirement, as well.

Hours may vary slightly but are generally 6-9 a.m. and 2-5 p.m. on days school is in session, Critchfield said.

Base pay for someone with no experience is \$17 per hour, with increases based on experience. All district employees are paid once a month – for bus drivers the contract is for 173 days annually.

“Whatever they make annually gets broken into 12 equal payment,” Critchfield said.

Most people who can drive a car can be a bus driver, the transportation director said.

“We provide all start to finish training in-house and will work with everyone step-by-step,” he said. “You don’t need to have experience – we’ve had people who haven’t driven a car for 30 years who are excellent bus drivers.”

District personnel go to the state driving test with new hires and help walk them through the licensing process.

The need for drivers is especially significant this year because several bus drivers have

retired or left the district; several teachers and coaches serve as bus drivers and some have left the district or have been reassigned, Critchfield said. There has also been significant growth in the PPS district, with large subdivisions cropping up, particularly near County Line Road, he said.

Campbell if she was okay with this idea, a quick discussion followed. With all board members in favor, Campbell was named interim superintendent.

Should a permanent replacement not be decided upon by June 30, the board will reconvene and continue discussions.

Public participation during the proceedings included Piedmont citizens Terry Herndon and Jason Thomas, who voiced their concerns, respectively, about returning basketball from Surrey to Piedmont for the 2023-24 school year, and about seeking positive and open communication with incoming superintendent candidates.

Board reports included a \$9,000 grant for jazz band equipment, continuing education seminars for teachers, construction updates for the middle school project and upcoming sports activities for the Wildcats. Preliminary results for state testing are available, with highlights to be presented at the next board meeting in June.

After a quick break for celebratory cake and well wishes to outgoing staff members, the

board convened into executive session to discuss employment positions for the 2024 fiscal year. After less than half an hour, the board reconvened into open session, approving all items within the list of new and existing employees; no further action was taken.

Final business included a few member questions about consent agenda items, but all were ultimately approved, and the meeting adjourned by 7:30 p.m.

to OPSRC’s eight searches and placements in the last three years.

Hyder also said her company has a retention rate of almost 90% across the state of Oklahoma.

One point that stuck in the heads of the board members was the rolling applicant pool Hyder mentioned, meaning the board can decide to extend the deadline on the applications if they do not find a candidate they deem worthy of the role.

Hyder mentioned that she knows Piedmont feels pressured to find a candidate quickly, so a proposed idea was to open the applicant pool a week from Friday, May 12, and leave the pool open for a few weeks.

With this proposed timeline, the board could begin interviews by the second or third week of June, which leaves the board with the possibility of rolling into July 1 with a new superintendent.

The 2023-24 school year begins Aug. 10, according to the district calendar.

However, since Piedmont is moving into Class 6A, Hyder mentioned they will most likely have fewer applications, due to their larger size. If the board does not think the candidates are a good fit for their district, then they could extend the application deadline or keep an interim superintendent in the role for the first portion of the school year to ensure the chosen applicant is what the community and district needs to improve. (See related story on Page 1A concerning the board’s appointment of an interim superintendent.)

The service fee with support for OSSBA is \$8,000, with additional packages that could be added on, including a communication team, due diligence searches or focus groups. The mentioned packages, along with others, would ensure that the board and community know the candidates more in-depth, can find what makes Piedmont special, and find the overall message they want to spread as they search for the superintendent.

PHS, Grove to tussle in state baseball quarterfinals

It's time to finish the job.

That's the mindset that Piedmont's baseball team is traveling with to the Tulsa area as the Wildcats make their fourth consecutive Class 5A State Tournament appearance today at Jenks High School.

Piedmont (29-9) is hopeful that its steady climb toward its first-ever state championship in program history will reach a crescendo by late Saturday afternoon.

Two years ago, the 'Cats lost in

the quarterfinal round, then last season PHS advanced all the way to the finals before falling to Duncan, 15-4.

"We kind of want revenge on last year. We got to the spot that a lot of teams wish to get to, and we just didn't play the game the way we wanted to," head coach Adam Skokowski said, referencing the 'Cats' loss to the Demons. "Taking a 15-4 loss in state...that will stick with you. We want to finish the job we started this time."

First, Piedmont has to get past Grove in its opening round game today at Jenks, where first pitch

is set for 11 a.m. The Ridgerunners (29-6) have won 12 straight games entering Thursday's contest.

"They can pitch it a little bit," Skokowski said. "They have a lefty that runs it up there at 87 (MPH)

and they have some guys that come in relief after him. That's what I've heard from everybody, they have three or four top-end pitchers."

The Wildcats will counter with a lineup that features nine hitters with batting averages over .300, making it one of the most well-balanced attacks in 5A.

PHS can hit for power — leading slugger Noah Smith has a .384 average with two home runs, 10 doubles and 36 RBI's — but also has the speed and versatility to

Lady Wildcats beat Coweta, forge rematch with Bishop McGuinness

Piedmont will have its shot at revenge. The Lady Wildcats got a pair of goals from star forward Jordan Hahn and an assist each from Mal-

lory Esau and Ali Daugherty as PHS rolled into the Class 5A soccer state finals with a 2-0 win over Coweta on Tuesday night at F&M Bank Stadium.

The Lady Wildcats didn't feel like celebrating their second consecutive semifinal victory for too long after the clock struck zero, though. Piedmont's players and coaches snapped some photos to commemorate the win over the Tigers, but there wasn't much interest in a prolonged victory lap.

The Lady 'Cats (12-5) had already turned their attention to a looming matchup with archrival Bishop McGuinness (13-0). The defending state champions beat Bishop Kelley 1-0 on Tuesday evening to set up a

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Piedmont hosting NJCAA Tournament this weekend

College softball postseason play is on its way to Piedmont for the second consecutive season. PHS will play host to the National Junior College Athletics Association Region 2 Tournament May 11-14 at F&M Bank Stadium.

Connors State, Rose State, Northeastern Oklahoma A&M, Seminole State, Eastern Oklahoma State, Western Oklahoma State, Northern Oklahoma College-Tonkawa and Northern Oklahoma College-Enid make up the eight-team field.

"This is good for our brand," PHS head softball coach Keith Coleman said. "It gets a lot of softball people into Piedmont and lets them see our facilities."

Here are five of the region's top players with local ties that are headed to Piedmont next weekend.

McKenna Johnson, Seminole State

A Yukon native, Johnson has put together a massive freshman season for Seminole. She's batting .459 with 16 home runs and 59 RBI's.

Caton Muncy, Rose State

The Amber-Pocasset product has bashed nine home runs and driven home 40 this season as the Raiders' starting first baseman.

Teagan Honer, NOC-Tonkawa

Honer, a Piedmont native, has collected 11 RBI's and hit a home run in 21 games this season.

Kendall Hannon, NEO

Hannon plays first base and catcher for the Golden Norse. The former Mustang High star is batting .376 with 14 home runs, 51 RBI's and 28 runs scored.

Kaylee Bradley, Western Oklahoma State

Bradley is a true two-way player for WOSU. The former Yukon Millerette is hitting .368 with 16 RBI's and has thrown 149.2 innings while striking out 98 batters.

Kelley had held off the Wildcats. Unfortunately for the Comets, when their runner sprinted past the finish line, he tossed the baton in celebration, which earned Kelley a disqualification in the event. That gave second place to Piedmont and the 16 points needed to claim back-to-back regional championships.

"That's the craziest ending I've ever been a part of," head coach Kelly Beck said afterwards. "It was a hot, nasty day and the kids laid it all out on the line."

In the end, Piedmont edged Bishop Kelley 122.50-120.50 as the Wildcats crowned four individual regional champions ahead of the state meet this Friday and Saturday at Yukon High School.

Dade Humes was a champion in the 1600-meter run and took runner-up in the 3200 while Reese Fricke placed second in the 800-meter run. Kanyon Cobbs claimed a regional title in the 400-meter dash while Nelin Kimery was third in the 3200 and Landry Finch was sixth.

The Wildcats' dominance in the 4-by-800 relay continued as the foursome of Humes, Fricke, Cobbs and Finch were two seconds clear of runner-up Tahlequah in a time of 8:25.34. The defending state champions are seeded third headed to Yukon but remain the favorites to win another title.

Cobbs and Fricke joined Rowan Ayers and Mikah Rocco to claim second place in the 4-by-400 relay, just more than a second behind regional champion Carl Albert.

The Wildcats also got impressive contributions in the field events, led by Colton Sydnes' late-season charge in the high jump. The senior jumped 6-4 in the finals to edge Eli Rodgers of Clare-

more for the top spot at Broken Arrow. Sydnes will enter the state meet seeded second overall.

In the shot put, Talan Owen finished runner-up with a throw of 46-10.75 while Jacob Cardwell was third in the discus with a throw of 142-09.

Sophomore Hudson Woods (high jump) and Rocco (200-meter dash) also qualified for the state meet.

Lady Wildcats finish runner-up

Led by sophomore Rylie Burnett's regional title in the 100-meter dash and her second place performance in the 200-meter dash, Piedmont finished second overall behind regional champion Bishop Kelley.

The next best placer for the Lady 'Cats was the 4-by-800 relay team of Lily Scheck, Rachel Caldwell, Emily Caldwell and Claire Collins, which easily qualified for state with a runner-up finish behind only Bishop Kelley.

Piedmont's 4-by-100 (Burnett, Braelynn Foster, Brooke Butts and Chloe Chlouber), 4-by-200 (Burnett, Bailey Howard, Chloe Chlouber, Kylee Chlouber) and 4-by-400 (Macy Bird, Summer Foster and Chloe and Kylee Chlouber) relay teams also will be in the field at Yukon.

Chloe Chlouber qualified in the 300-meter hurdles. Scheck, Collins and Rachel Caldwell also made the cut in the 3200. That trio finished second, third and fourth, respectively, at regionals.

Brooklyn Eck (pole vault) and McKenna Auringer (high jump) qualified, along with Howard, in the long jump.



Expo center interim director named

She will serve on an interim basis until the commissioners select

District 1 Commissioner Tom Manske agreed.

"She understands the system out there and I highly agree about using her as the interim (director)," Manske said.

Davis previously was the executive director of the Great Plains

Tribes demolish El Reno Denny's to reinvigorate development plan

A wrecking crew made quick work of a former restaurant and service station that had stood on South Country Club, just south of I-40 since the early 1970s.

First built as Hensley's and later becoming a Denny's, the restaurant and nearby service station were leveled last week as the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes move forward with plans to one day develop the area.

Gov. Reggie Wassana said nothing is "in black and white" as of now, but "at some point in time," eventually a travel plaza as well as possibly a "strip shopping center, a trading post or western wear store" could occupy the property.

"I've always thought a western store would be good in this area. People have to go into Oklahoma City for boots, jeans and coats, so I think a store that offered these would do well in this area," he said.

C&A purchased the property

within the past couple of years. The tribes also own the Best Western Motel and more than 100 acres to the east of it. Nothing has been announced, but speculation has been that a casino-type resort could eventually be built there.

Wassana said he expects the land will be placed into trust for the tribes within the "next five to six months."

The governor said the motel will remain and plans are to make

County plans to utilize workforce program

Workforce Oklahoma offers training, on-the-job experience

EL RENO – Canadian County government leaders plan to utilize services provided by a nonprofit entity to find and train skilled, productive workers.

Canadian County commissioners at their May 1 and May 8 meetings discussed an agreement with the Central Oklahoma Workforce Innovation Board (COWIB) to participate in a Work Experience (WEX) program.

“They will help us to find employees who will come here to gain experience,” District 3 Commissioner Tracey Rider said. “If it turns out that they are a good fit, we’ll be able to (employ them).”

“It’s another avenue to find good hires. Workforce Oklahoma has great training and on-the-job experience opportunities.”

This is a “countywide” agreement so all Canadian County departments will be able to utilize the program, Rider pointed out.

Rider serves on the COWIB board of directors.

A nonprofit organization, COWIB provides employment and education assistance to central Oklahomans in a nine-county area. It is the policy and guidance board for the Workforce Oklahoma system in central Oklahoma.

“I like the idea of working with the Workforce Board to develop opportunities for our unemployed workforce,” Canadian County Commission Chairman Dave Anderson said. “And help us develop employees.”

COWIB’s stated mission is, “Improving lives in our communities by building a quality workforce through education and creating connections between job seekers and businesses.”

320 HOURS

Through the WEX program, an Oklahoma Workforce employee may work for Canadian County up to 320 hours.

“They are here just to get experience with Canadian County,” Canadian County Human Resource Director NaCole Majors said.

Oklahoma Workforce would pay the “temporary” employee while they work for Canadian County.

“That gives us the time to see if that employ-

ee is a good fit, if they are trainable (and) if we want to have them as part of the team,” Commissioner Rider said.

“If they are, great. They can slide over to be a county employee. It’s a really great partnership.”

Canadian County commissioners are considering a separate agreement for COWIB’s On the Job (OJT) program. They tabled action indefinitely May 8 as county officials seek to remove an indemnity clause.

If the clause is removed, that program would provide training for current Canadian County employees.

COWIB is recognized by the Governor’s Council for Economic and Workforce Development, the State Workforce Investment Board and the governor as the proper body to carry out the purposes and functions of the Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act of 2014.

The service area covers Canadian, Cleveland, Hughes, Lincoln, Logan, Okfuskee, Oklahoma, Pottawatomie and Seminole counties.

There are seven Oklahoma Works centers, with one located at 201 N. Choctaw in El Reno.

COWIB was established in compliance with the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 to act as a full partner with local elected officials in setting policy and overseeing workforce investment programs.

improvements to it. He said eventually a restaurant could also be added to the area.

“We’d like it to be something that could serve the travelers as well as the local community,” Wassana said. “There’s so much potential there. We just needed to get the site cleaned up and ready so when we are ready we can move forward.”

Wassana said Love’s Travel Stops was approached about building at

the location, but with the recent expansion of Love’s at Radio Road, the Country Club site was not suitable for the Oklahoma-based company. He said other similar entities could be considered.

“We want to help El Reno, we have as much invested in El Reno as anyone does and we want to see the community grow and prosper,” Wassana said.

The possible return of Fort Reno to the C&A will continue to be a particular area of focus, Wassana said.



Country Association, an organization promoting tourism in southwest Oklahoma. She also has economic development and chamber of commerce experience.

In a related matter, commissioners authorized Davis to execute booking agreements up to \$25,000.

They also acknowledged the designation of Kim Kaes and Commissioner Manske as requisitioning officers and Amy Ferguson and Davis as receiving officers for the Canadian County Expo & Event Center.

Canadian County commissioners, during a special meeting May 2, decided to dismiss Smith as the center's director and marketing manager. He held the position for nearly four years.
