

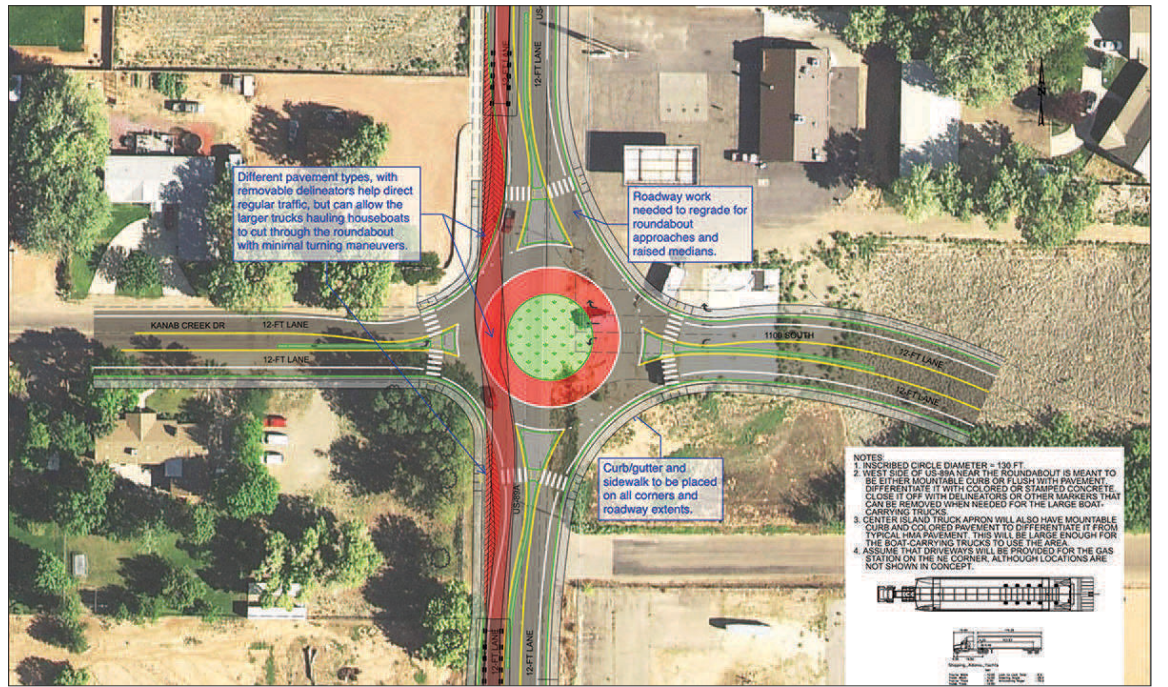
## Kanab City Council plans for roundabout on intersection of 89A and Kanab Creek

During the liaison report portion of the November 12 meeting of the Kanab City Council, Mayor Johnson acknowledged the service of the late Jeff Turner. Said Johnson, "He was a great friend to the city. He did everything, he helped us, he saved us a lot of times. He was a great man and our thoughts and prayers are with his family." City Manager Kyler Ludwig recalled some moments that demonstrated Turner's dedication, including a series of sleepless nights this year preparing to open the pool. "It was an easy conversation for me," Ludwig said, "you know, 'let's make sure that pool opens on time.' Jeff took that and translated it into multiple nights, working here till 2 a.m. to

make sure that pool was open for those kids ... I just want the people to know what kind of man Jeff was." The council also thanked Officer Darrin Coleman for his service, as this would be the last City Council Meeting Officer Coleman would attend in his capacity as law-enforcement on-site.

Following the regular opening ceremonies, the meeting set into the planned agenda. The first four items were straightforward plat updates, the second of which included a development agreement and preliminary site plan for the Hidden Canyon subdivision. Most of the proposals moved forward with minimal need for discussion and were approved unanimously, with the preliminary plat for the Willow Meadows subdivision hav-

ing the added caveat that the developers come into compliance with city recommendations on cul-de-sacs

and water drainage. The following item on the agenda was a consideration of traffic controls on the

intersection of Highway 89A and Kanab Creek

## Protest outside Re-Creation Retreat in Fredonia

On Tuesday, November 12, 2024, at about 3 p.m., a group of girls started protest on the side of the road

in front of the Re Creation Retreat (RCR) in Fredonia, Ariz. The girls of the group had "graduated" from the establishment, meaning

they'd been residents previously.

The group, calling themselves Past Peers, had been using Instagram to reach out to more girls that had attended RCR, asking questions and getting responses. Using social media, the group went live during the protest for those who could not attend and for others to show their sup-

port. Over the live stream, a few protestors gave final testimonies, sharing their stories of their time in the establishment and some of the experiences they'd had during that time in their lives. The group asked any parents viewing to listen to their daughters, hear their experiences and do their research.

When asked to share their experiences at RCR, the protestors in attendance mentioned the facility was understaffed and would require the girls to help with cooking, cleaning and pulling weeds - some protestors claimed the facility was not only understaffed, but not accredited to perform their assigned jobs such as therapy, education or

medication management. The girls talked about the standards imposed on them during their stay, like wearing bright yellow or orange clothing so they could be easily spotted if they tried to leave or run away, being forced to wear certain styles of clothes or not being allowed to express themselves. Multiple testimonies stated their mental health care consisted of watching Dr. Phil episodes and reading self help books, and that denial of therapy was used as a punishment.

According to the girls, one of their challenges was all of the rules and consequences. "Don't speak unless you're spoken to," and if they

## Log truck overturns passing over North Fork Road

At about 1 a.m. on the morning of November 7, a semi-truck and trailer carrying a load of lumber bound for the East Zion Visitor's Center attempted to navigate a sharp turn on North Fork Road about two miles north of Orderville Gulch. The trailer lost trac-

tion on the road and overturned, only just avoiding tumbling down the cliff face entirely.

Road crews were called that morning, and responded with tractor support and a crane to draw the trailer back onto the roadway - for

safety's sake, the original semi-truck was towed back toward Salt Lake, and the cargo was attached to a new tractor to be pulled the rest of the way. Kane County Roads personnel commented on the state of the trailer, stating, "It was

a bit of a surprise, but [the driver] had secured the load really well. It was leaning a bit, but the lumber did make it to its destination."





Road crews reiterated that the route along North Fork may be shorter in

time, but the road is not suitable for large loads or heavy vehicles. The driver of the semi is unharmed, and cleanup was minimal once the crane and tractor had restored the lumber load to the road.

# Orderville places Town Pool up for sale

The Orderville Town Board met at the town offices on Wednesday, November 6, 2024. Board members Marianne Leigh, Shaun Sharkey, Rory Hatch and Susan Esplin were in attendance. Mayor Lyle Goulding called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. Minutes from the previous meeting and bills presented for payment were unanimously approved.

First on the agenda was discussion around approving or denying a donation to the VHS music department for its annual Christmas Music Festival to be held on December 6, 2024. Robert Lacey described the importance of the event and thanked the board for its support in past years. The board unanimously approved a \$500 donation for this year's event.

The board then moved to the fourth item on the agenda, a discussion with possible action regarding the town pool located at 84 E State Street. Marianne Leigh noted that more pool and grounds repairs would be needed before being able to open in 2025. Rory Hatch commented that the pool continues to be a significant source of expense, with repairs due to age and maintenance needed every year. Shaun Sharkey suggested the town begin

budgeting for a new facility to be built in the near future. Mayor Goulding noted that it would make sense to sell the property now and use that money to jumpstart the process. Board members Leigh and Esplin said they'd prefer to have a plan for a new location sooner rather than later. The board voted 3-2 to place the property up for sale.

Next up was discussion about the possibility of changing 100 East to a one-way street to facilitate pickup and drop-off at Valley Elementary School. Kerry Reese of the Kane County School District provided background on the proposal, including ongoing planning with the Utah Department of Transportation. The board voted unanimously to change 100 East to a one-way street at least 45 minutes before and after school, pending a completed plan from UDOT.

The board next unanimously approved a departure bonus for

retiring Town Clerk Carol Lamb.

A motion was made for the board to go into Executive Session at 7:37 p.m. They returned to General Session at 7:55 p.m.

At this time the board voted unanimously to approve, at the Planning & Zoning Commission's recommendation, a request by Thunderbird Acquisitions LLC for a minor subdivision (zoned Commercial) from one parcel to two parcels at 3900 S State Street in Orderville. A zone change application request for 0-4-157 Annex from Commercial to Industrial was also unanimously approved.

A motion to adjourn at 8:18 p.m. was approved by the board.

# BLM Holiday tree cutting permits now available

Many of today's families still enjoy the age-old tradition of roaming the hills together on a cold winter's day in search of a unique, naturally grown Christmas tree. The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) is offering permits to harvest Christmas trees now through Dec. 24.

The BLM Arizona Strip Field Office has begun selling non-commercial permits to cut pinyon pine and juniper trees in-person and online. To obtain a tree permit from the Arizona Strip or St. George Field Office online go to: [forest-products.blm.gov](http://forest-products.blm.gov)

For information on purchasing tree permits for the Dixie National Forest, please visit the website for the Pine Valley Ranger District or the Cedar City Ranger District. To request information and assistance by phone during regular business hours, excluding weekends and federal holidays, call 435-688-3200.

To purchase a permit in person, please visit the Public Lands Information Center located at 345 East Riverside Drive, St. George, Utah during the operating hours of Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Please note this location is closed on the weekends and federal holidays.

A permit is required for the harvest of each individual tree. The tree tag is validated by attaching it securely to the tree in a visible location and cutting out the date, month, and year. Permits are only good for the land agency in which the tag was purchased.

Permits enable holders to cut personal-use pinyon pine or juniper trees on lands managed by the BLM and the United States Forest Service (USFS) in the following areas:

- BLM Arizona Strip Field Office (\$10 per permit for each tree)
- BLM St. George Field Office (\$10 per permit for each tree)
- Dixie National Forest (\$10 for trees from one - 10 feet high/\$20 for trees 11-20 feet high)

The Dixie National Forest is excited to once again offer free Christmas tree permits to 4th graders who participate in Every Kid Outdoors program which introduces them to the joy of exploring public lands. To receive a free Christmas tree permit, fourth graders can sign up for the program at [everykidoutdoors.gov/index.htm](http://everykidoutdoors.gov/index.htm), download and print their pass, then with a parent or guardian, bring it to the Public Lands Information Center to receive their free Christmas tree permit.

**Important note:** Christmas tree har-

vesting is not allowed in wilderness areas, campgrounds, developed recreation areas, national monuments, research natural areas, areas of critical environmental concern or posted tree plantations, within 200 feet of state highways or on private lands. Permit holders can easily avoid non-permitted areas by carrying their tree permit and map with them, along with the appropriate USFS or BLM map which can be obtained along with a permit purchased at the Public Lands Information Center.

The BLM encourages everyone to keep safety in mind when participating in this exciting holiday tradition. Early season cutting is advised as winter weather conditions in the mountains are unpredictable. Be prepared for wet or snow-packed roads and carry chains.

Stay on designated roads and trails and respect private property boundaries. Let someone know where you are planning to go and the approximate time you will return. Remember to carry a cell phone, bring additional warm clothing, gloves, boots, a container of hot liquid, water, and a lunch or snack. Carry a flashlight, shovel, first-aid kit, matches, axe or handsaw and rope to secure your tree.

spoke about off-limits topics, it would result in a "solo" where they weren't allowed to speak to anyone at all, including in their rooms and in private time. The group spoke about consequences of running away, such as taking away shoes, making them wear light clothes in the cold and restraint by

handcuffs for return to the facility. Some protestors recounted being restrained for up to three hours for not being out of bed on time or hiding extra food.

Some of the quotes during the live stream show the girls' perspective, including "We were constantly told we were broken, so we acted broken;" "They told us we were bad people, and that if we didn't do what they told us to, the

whole town, even our families, would come down on us;" "Listen to your daughters;" and "I hope that you hear me: if your kids are here, they need communication, they need a hug!"

*Editor's Note: These allegations are the accounts of the protestors and are unconfirmed. The Southern Utah News is in the process of contacting RCR staff and ownership for a statement.*

# AES team presents new plan for reinvigorated solar power plant outside Big Water to Kane County Commission

Big plans were evident for the Tuesday, November 12 meeting of the Kane County Commission, as the commission chambers had been prepared with additional desks and presenting space for the public-facing microphone. The public comment set the expectation of what the majority of the meeting might be about, as Mayor Shmucker of Big Water spoke in support of AES, the power generating company responsible for the solar farm project in the Big Water area. Said Shmucker, "We don't like seeing land used to be taken away from ranchers ... but at the same time, we're losing coal plants, we

have a power problem. I guess this is the new way to do things. We support AES, they've been good to work with." A rancher from the Big Water area presented an opposing perspective, stating, "Ultimately I am 100 percent against the solar farm out there, it takes away from ranching operation. I ask that if it does go forward, we don't put the cart before the horse, that we make sure all the proper paperwork is in place. If we do go forward, I look forward to working together to make sure it is the best deal for everybody, we don't always get what we want, but it's up to us to do the best we can with the hand we've been dealt."

With public comment

concluded, the commission entered into their regular agenda, starting with the appointment of Johnny Roundy to the county 401k trustee board. According to board representative Devin Reed, "Isis Smith has been elected as our recorder for the coming year, and I don't know if it's law or not, but the commission has a policy of not having elected officials on the trustee board ... so we put some feelers out. Johnny pays close attention, closer than most, to investment, to opportunities, so we reached out to him and asked if that would be a service he would provide; the recommendation of the existing trustee board is that the commission appoint Johnny Roundy." The council unanimously agreed to appoint Roundy, and the next agenda item formally thanked Smith for her sterling service on the 401k trustee board.

The following item would take the majority of the meeting's time, the aforementioned presentation by AES on the Glen Canyon Solar Facility near big water - a project which Commissioner Heaton described as "a sore spot" for Kane County. The solar power facility had made significant progress in its construction - a pro-

cess which cost acres of grazing-friendly land - before essentially coming to a complete halt when AES lost the ability to transfer their power because of

a transmission capacity complication. In the presentation by the AES team, they explained that they had come up with a new solution, with a new

transmission contract that would incorporate battery-storage on-site.

The new proposal for

Drive/1100 South Ludwig reported on the three different traffic studies done on the intersection to determine which method of intersection control would be best. Per Ludwig, "Within that study they found that for this intersection from a safety standpoint, from a cost standpoint, a roundabout was the option that brought the most safety to our community, and had the potential to reduce accidents by up to 76 percent ... reducing not only the amount of accidents but the severity of accidents." The resolution on the agenda would present Kanab City's official support for the findings of the study to the Utah Department of Transportation - with hopes to have some temporary traffic control installed by the beginning of 2025. Mayor Johnson expressed some concerns with the viability of a roundabout, stating, "I don't especially like the idea of kids crossing the street over a roundabout, seems like a stoplight is a better

place to cross. For the public that's questioning the roundabout, I question it too. I don't really love the idea of kids crossing the road on a roundabout. We don't really get to decide this in the end, if we don't write this letter we just slow the process way down and I'm not willing to do that, we need something there." The council discussed the pros and cons of signing the letter of support, with the general tone of the discussion being that while the roundabout may not be ideal, the intersection is not safe and calls for immediate action. The council approved the resolution to present the letter of support to UDOT unanimously.

The council then considered a resolution that would add additional roads to the chipseal project within the city. Per Ludwig, "With these additions, all of our roads will have been chipsealed within a seven year period ... we're looking to make that more consistent." The council considered the cost of chipseal as road maintenance, and with a consulta-

tion with City Roads officials, the council approved the resolution unanimously - a map of the chipseal project can be found in the city council packet.

The following few items involved approval of funding for some city projects, including flood management, equipment for sports field maintenance and the apron and fuel farm extension at the city airport. According to Ludwig, the federal grant funding going into the airport projects has increased, estimating that where the grants were covering 90 percent of the cost previously, that had increased to 95 percent in the next two years. These proposals were approved unanimously.

The city council then heard a proposal from the city arts board considering a new arts facility in town. The proposal is in the initial stages, so the city council agreed to look into details and potential sites for the facility.

Following a discussion on some ordinance changes to come into compliance of state code and some quarterly financials, the meeting adjourned.

Lumber Plus expects uninterrupted operations during True Value bankruptcy proceedings

Hardware supplier True Value declared bankruptcy in recent weeks, along with their intent to sell remaining stocks to other co-op suppliers, leading to some concern over its independent cooperative partners - including Kanab's Lumber Plus. According to Lumber Plus' ownership, aside from a few inventory items becoming temporarily harder to stock, Lumber Plus operations

should proceed mostly uninterrupted.

"We've got our alternate inventory avenues in place," Says Debbie Buck, Lumber Plus' proprietor. "There might be a few items out of the warehouse for a little while, but the new company buying out True Value has warehouses of their own. In a way, that means we have two warehouses for supplies for a while, we'll be able to get everything we need." True Value's bank-

ruptcy could be better characterized as a buyout; while the brand and supplier has declared bankruptcy, it is not a cessation of operations as other members of the co-op take control of True Value's assets and partnerships. Lumber Plus expects the new cooperative to proceed with operations as usual, and assures their clientele that the business should be generally unaffected by the bankruptcy proceedings.

# Stellar Vista Observatory collaborates with KCWCD to create Educational Observatory at Jackson Flat Reservoir

Stellar Vista Observatory (SVO), a 501c3 nonprofit organization based in Kanab and the Kane County Water Conservancy District (KCWCD) are pleased to announce an agreement to guide the creation of an educational astronomical observatory for public enjoyment of southern Utah's star-filled skies at the Conservancy's Jackson Flat Reservoir property.

The vision for creating an observatory in Kanab to explore the planets, star clusters and other fascinating objects in the night sky with telescopes emerged nearly five

years ago when a group of residents foresaw the potential for an entirely new range of evening activities focused on the beauty and inspiration of the stars over southern Utah. In a letter of intent to Stellar Vista Observatory from KCWCD dated August 9, 2023, Conservancy General Manager Mike Noel states, "This area represents one of the most stunning and preeminent locations for dark sky observing and enjoyment in the nation. Through this partnership with SVO, we envision the creation of a state-of-the-art observatory facility that will serve

as a hub for educational programs, public events and community engagement regarding the night sky ... an investment in the pursuit of knowledge and the cultivation of curiosity. It's a chance to foster a love for science among the young minds of our community, sparking a passion that could shape the future." Rich Csenge, founder and president of the nonprofit believes the spectacularly dark skies over southern Utah are a priceless treasure of humanity's heritage, and a universal source of inspiration in our everyday lives. "To witness the ineffable majesty of a

truly dark star-filled sky stimulates humility and a perspective important to one's fulfillment. Traveling to a distant star cluster through the eyepiece of a telescope evokes a sense that one has touched the Infinite and Eternal."

Over the past five years SVO has carefully assessed the rising public interest in the night sky, developed and refined an architectural plan for its observatory with Architect Robert Kaczowka of Mesa Design in Kanab, and cultivated a team of skilled astronomy interpreters to deliver its community outreach programs. Among its ongoing public activities are free monthly stargazing events, a private night sky experience program for families and groups

and a solar science program offering opportunities for safe daytime observation of the sun.

SVO's observatory facility is to be constructed in two phases to provide proof of concept and begin operating in a Phase 1 stage. This strategy will allow time to develop a comprehensive capital campaign in the local area and beyond with which to finance the full build out of its observatory design in Phase 2. Construction of Phase 1 facilities is expected to begin in early 2025.

Stellar Vista Observatory provides observational experiences for people to enjoy, appreciate and comprehend what we can see in southern Utah's starry night skies. The observatory will be a locus of community engage-

ment with the night sky and an integral part of the recreational amenities surrounding the Jackson Flat Reservoir.

Under the agreement, KCWCD will own the land and buildings while SVO will fund their construction and produce programming to benefit the community through a lease agreement with the Conservancy.

Financing for Phase 1 of the project has been secured through grants awarded by the Utah Governor's Office of Outdoor Recreation and the Kane County Recreation and Transportation Special Service District, as well as with funds raised privately through SVO's Night Sky Experience program at the Amangiri resort in Big Water, Utah.

## Church of Jesus Christ donates to American Red Cross relief efforts for Hurricane Helene

More than 20 Utah Red Cross volunteers have been deployed to help. "This extraordinary donation from The Church of Jesus Christ

of Latter-day Saints arrives at a critical time," said Heidi Ruster, Chief Executive Officer of the American Red Cross Utah/Nevada Region. the project estimates construction starting in spring 2025, and finishing by the end of 2026. Per the AES rep, "Best case scenario, it's less than twelve months of actual construction, with the rest of the time being commission and testing of the facilities." The facility would consist of 220,000 solar panels, 64 battery

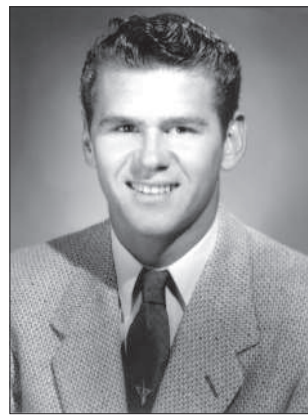
units and a \$325 million investment by AES. According to their team, consistent, dispatchable energy is in high demand, and the inclusion of battery storage and a discharge schedule that avoids peak hours justifies the increased cost and complication of the project. There was some concern on the Commission's part, and with the presentation concluded, the commission agreed to consider the project

further - the proposed plan was tabled to allow more time for research and questions.

Following a break, the commission heard a series of grant proposals from Economic Opportunity specialist Kelly Stowell, seeking various grant funds from the state. Each proposal was approved in short order.

The following items involved a few dense legal considerations to bring county code into compliance with newly instituted state statute regarding land use and land use agreements. The exact wording is contained in the commission agenda and recordings.

Following some updates to interlocal fire agreements and a commission assignment response, the meeting went into closed executive session.

# FREE prediabetes testing in Kanab in November

Did you know that your chances of getting struck by lightning are about one in a million, but your chances of having prediabetes as an adult in the United States is one in three? Since prediabetes usually doesn't have symptoms, 80 percent of people with this condition don't know they have it. That's why the Southwest Utah Public Health Department is offering free testing for prediabetes during the month of November, 2024.

Prediabetes happens when blood sugar levels are higher than normal but not enough

to be diagnosed with type 2 diabetes. With simple lifestyle changes, prediabetic people can reverse the path to type 2 diabetes, which is why getting screened and tested is so important.

The first step is to complete a short questionnaire (found online at swuhealth.gov/diabetes). If you score a five or above and have never been diagnosed with diabetes or prediabetes before, call your nearest health department office (see numbers below) and make an appointment to get a free A1C test. An A1C is a finger-prick blood test that

shows if you're in the normal, prediabetic, or diabetic range. You'll be provided with information on what to do next, depending on your results. After November 30, A1C tests at the health department will return to their original cost of \$25.

# Boldly staged presentation of "The Music Man" marks debut of Director Colt Reeve

Meredith Willson's highly-acclaimed production of "The Music Man" made its Broadway debut at the Majestic Theater on December 19, 1957, continuing its 1,375 performances after winning five Tony Awards, including "Best Musical" in

1958. The Original Cast Album featuring such memorable numbers as "Seventy-Six Trombones," "(Ya Got) Trouble," "The Wells Fargo Wagon," "Shipoopee," "Lida Rose" and "Till There Was You" went on to spend 245 weeks on the Billboard charts and, also, winning the first-ever

Grammy in that category. Its popularity subsequently spawned a 1962 Warner Bros. film, a made-for-television movie on Netflix and three Broadway revivals.

On November 7, 8, 9 and 11, the show graced the boards of Valley's Little Theater under the impressive direction of senior Colt Reeve. The veteran of his soon-to-be alma mater has been involved with the school's productions since his sixth-grade, most notably offering his deep voice as Buffalo Bill Cody in "Annie Get Your Gun!" from January of 2022.

Prior to the curtain rising on Closing Night, he expressed his gratitude for the opportunity and trust of his esteemed Theatre Department Coach, Kelly Lamb, by presenting

him with a long flowing black knight's cape bearing a "K" insignia inscribed "My Hero" on its silver lettering. After the evening's congratulatory fistbump meet-and-greet with the cast as the appreciative audience was leaving down through the hallway entrance, the starring actor of his final dual role shared some parting thoughts, "Well," he quietly said, "sad to be leaving, but they're a talented group of kids. It was really good to just do the show with them; I started bawling after. I'm happy to leave Valley High School Theatre in these hands. I think I trained them up well. We performed well; I think it all came together and it was really nice!"

Now, another generation of hopefuls 'Pickalittle' bit of the

bandmaster's baton up from here. As junior Nyola Schreiner in her initial leading-role as Marian "the Librarian" Paroo shares her enthusiasm after having this stellar achieve-

ment under her belt, "I really like Theatre! It's really something that can help me express myself. It's always fun to do something that's out of your comfort zone."

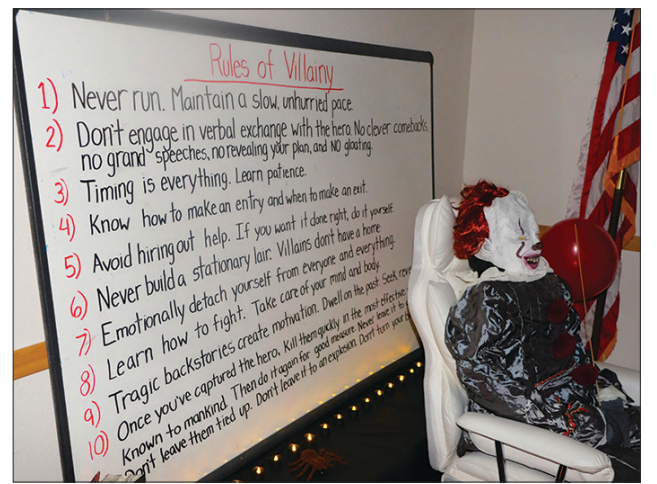
Most importantly, we took the time to honor our local veterans, recognizing their invaluable contribu-


## Spotted wildlife in your neighborhood? Here's when to report it to the DWR

Utah's growing population and related urban expansion have increased the number of wildlife encounters across the state in recent years. However, not every encounter or animal sighting needs to be reported to the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources. Wildlife encounters during the summer of-

ten occur when people are hiking or camping in the mountains or canyons, which are natural wildlife habitat areas. However, these encounters are also common in cities and other urban areas during the winter months. As snow falls in the mountains, deer, moose and other big game species move to lower elevations looking for

### Jane Austen's Persuasion

BBC film with Sally Hawkins, Rupert Penry-Jones

"Persuasion" is the last novel completed by English author Jane Austen and has been adapted in many different forms. When in the mood for a classic film, I love those done by the BBC and this made for TV stands out as a favorite. Filmed using Bath locations, Sally Hawkins as Anne with Rupert Penry-Jones as Captain Wentworth, the scenes are so beautiful. With little understanding about filmmaking but knowing when I really enjoy a movie, the experience of walking the streets of Bath with Anne has stayed with me.

The definition of cinematography is the art and science of visually telling a story through motion pictures. Cinematography is a major contributor to the mood and storytelling of visual media. food. Cougars, which prey mostly on deer, often follow the deer into the valleys. While it may seem like cougars and other wildlife are migrating into neighborhoods more frequently, it is actually a combination of a few things:

- Increased building in the foothill areas and canyons (where wildlife are naturally located).
- An increase in the number of doorbell and security cameras on people's homes (which capture more wildlife sightings that previously went undetected).

If you do happen to see wildlife in your neighborhood or yard, you should always keep your distance for your own safety and for the safety of the animal. "Getting too close to a wild animal can cause the animal to feel threatened," DWR Big Game Coordinator Concentrating deer and other wildlife near inhabited areas can sometimes result in increased traffic accidents and other human/wildlife conflicts. Attracting deer to your property through feeding can also attract predators, like cougars that follow deer herds. And while deer and moose are not predators, they are still wild animals and can be aggressive, particularly around dogs.

Any time you are injured by wildlife, you should receive immediate medical attention, if needed, and report the incident to the DWR.

Caregivers made sure he ate three yummy meals a day and kept him comfortable with tons of cozy blankets and beds to lie on while he healed. In no time at all, his sores cleared up, his gorgeous coat regained its luster and his skinny frame plumped up beautifully. His incontinence also improved.

"It's amazing to watch him now," Sharon exclaims. "He was always happy, but seeing him go on walks and join playgroups with other dogs is incredible. And he plays now! He loves to play with soft squeaky

toys and walks around squeaking them. It's just so wonderful to see his transformation."

Today, Baja still doesn't quite have full use of his rear legs, and he hops a bit like a bunny. But he certainly doesn't let it slow him down. He spends his

days joyfully playing with his doggy friends and sharing his snacks with them. And, as sweet as he is, it likely won't be long until he's sharing snacks with a new family in a loving home of his own.

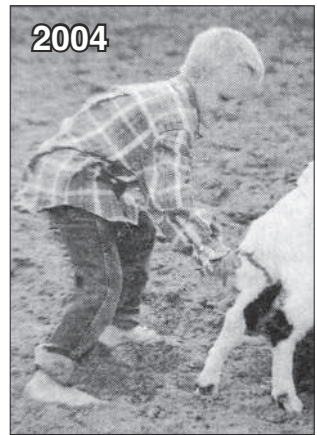
