Past Presidents Martha Sauer

Martha Sauer, owner of The Kloset, in Towne Centre Weatherford remembers her year as chamber president as one full of adventure and success saying the chamber generated more than \$250,000 in 1989.

Sauer's year was highlighted with 14 active committees who all understood they were not sitting on a board to build a resume but to work. She recalls board member Dick Anthony who was 3M plant manager at the time, arriving from a flight in a 3-piece suit and

expensive shoes.

"He immediately got into Weatherford grabbed a weed eater and trimmed the weeds around the rodeo arena so it would look nice before the rodeo starts, and in a 3-piece suit," Sauer said.

Sauer credited her hardworking board and committee chairs for all the success. She said it was a year of firsts with the first chamber rodeo, an education banquet featuring local scholars, just to name a few.

Her active committees included: Rodeo, Economic Development,

Ag-Business, Oil & Gas, Retail Trades, Senior Citizens, Spring Fest, Arts Festival, Education, Membership Development, Convention and Tourism, Health Education and Development, Community Affairs and Ambassadors.

Sauer said all-in-all it was a wonderful time in Weatherford.

"Just to see all the people out at the arts festival and numerous events just brought the community together in so many ways," Sauer added.

Past Presidents Bruce Magill

Most memorable meetings during my year as president were centered around the question of "liquor by the drink."

Custer County had placed the option of liquor by the drink on the 1986 ballot to be decided by voters. The chamber had many members on both sides of this issue, and some members felt very strongly the chambers should take a public stand, either for or against the issue, depending on their beliefs.

We had several lengthy and lively board meetings to discuss the issue. Finally, the Board decided that rather than split the long-standing Weatherford Chamber of Commerce over the matter, we would remain neutral and let the voters decide.

Being an avid country

music fan, I distinctly remember the SWOSU live concert with "up and coming" Reba McEntire scheduled during my year as president. Of course, I felt it was important she be given a special Weatherford welcome. TG&Y, currently still operating in Weatherford, had scheduled a promotional personal appearance by Reba earlier

that afternoon in the store.


I contacted the manager and he allowed me to welcome her on behalf of the chamber and present her with a Weatherford Diamond Jubilee Belt Buckle. I will never forget how gracious she was, and the big kiss she planted on my cheek.


There isn't room to mention all the reasons I am proud of Weatherford. I was born in Weatherford, so I remember it as it was in the 40s. I have seen so many wonderful changes in the past 70 years. I am extremely proud of

SWOSU and the positive influence the university has on our community.

Our public-school system is one of the best in the country and a chief reason so many young parents want to live and raise their families in Weatherford. Our city officials and our citizens supported three Yes campaigns allowing them to make significant improvements to Weatherford, with more to come. Historically, when there is a need or project with overall benefits to the City of Weatherford, the people support it.

Our Weatherford Area **Economic Development** Foundation, with the help of the chamber, the City of Weatherford, and many dedicated volunteers, has promoted projects to significantly increase business and economic development in the city. Two 160-acre business and industrial parks have been developed and occupied. Recently the Weatherford **Industrial Trust** purchased an additional 70 acres currently under development. I am proud to live and serve in Weatherford.





Past Presidents Richard Ratcliffe

Specific memories

I remember how much help Brian Adler, Chamber EVP and Gene Burch, Office Manager, were to all members and directors. They took care of the day to day business with ease.

First Pitch: The 89ers baseball team in Oklahoma City had community nights at the ball park, then at the fairgrounds. Weatherford night was June 1, 1985. The first pitch honor was very memorable. I threw a 100-mph fastball strike, as I remember.

Dr. John Huser was the traditional emcee for the chamber banquet. He would typically have the crowd laughing so hard the rest of the banquet was easy.

Specific events

We tried to raise money to buy land for industrial development by "borrowing" from individuals. We made a note to repay each donor with interest.

We had an early morning meeting at the Mark Restaurant banquet room. The room was full of chamber members and guests. With pressure and by staying for one more round after round, we raised \$245,000.

As chamber president, I signed each note. It seemed really dumb at the time but it worked out fine. Most donors never called the note, they just donated the note to the chamber.

George Nigh invited

community chambers to the governor's mansion for a reception. Several from Weatherford went with Rose and I.

At that time in history, we would have an annual joint meeting with the Clinton chamber directors and officers. We found many areas of common interest and areas where we could work together.

Steve Stroud was the chair of the Parks Committee and their work began the process to add irrigation sprinklers to the golf course, Rader Park and the athletic fields. Irrigation at Rader Park has been a 40-year-long attribute for this city.

I wanted the chamber to be more political and take a stance on issues. There was reluctance from many members. We polled the membership in the spring to position us on an upcoming ballot on Liquor By The Drink.

The question for the membership was A. Support LBTD, B. Oppose LBTD, C. Stay out of endorsing either side. Wisely the position was to STAY OUT OF ENDORSING EITHER SIDE. LBTD did pass later that fall. We did become more political as time went on.

In 1985 my board of directors included Bruce Magill, president-elect, Ronnie Walker, immediate past president, John Hays, treasurer. Board members were David Duncan, Joe Anna Hibler, Jane Karlin, Joe Martin, Jimmie McPhearson, Jack Sanders, Richard Soenen and David Williams. Also noted was Sheila Koch, on the Oil and Gas Golf Committee. She must have been about 6 years old then

Lastly, in 1985 the Weatherford Chamber celebrated the 100th anniversary of the Weatherford chamber. That was the theme of the annual banquet.

Proud of Weatherford

We have been very fortunate and I expect to be very fortunate in the future. It speaks well we had the right people in place to make the following events occur to make Weatherford successful in time.

- 1. Someone helped us acquire Southwestern State University.
- 2. The city voted to drilled water wells so Weatherford had soft water.
- 3. Someone was in the right place to make sure Interstate 40 came close to Weatherford.
- 4. Citizens, my mother and father Lee Ratcliffe included, raised money to start a Weatherford Hospital in the 1950s.
- 5. Someone was in the right place to get 3M plants to come to Weatherford.


