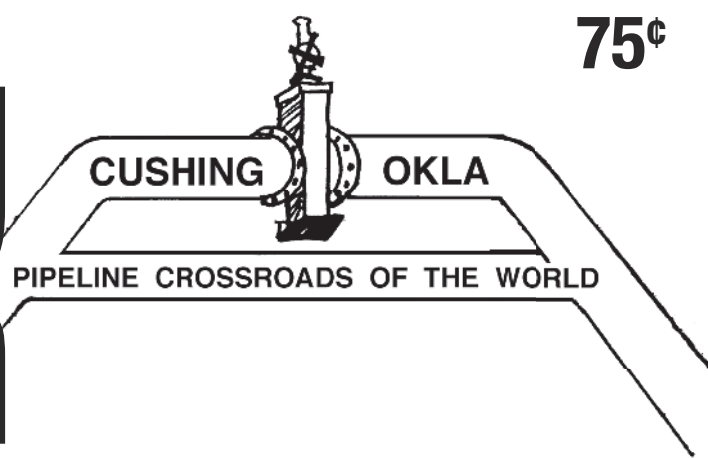

Have you attended Festival in the Park or the Christmas Parade throughout the years?

Are you familiar with programs such as, Tomorrow's Leaders, Leadership Cushing, or Women in Business?

All of these events and programs are planned and brought to reality by the Cushing Chamber of Commerce. It is unfortunate that many have little to no knowledge of a 100-year-old industry that is such an impactful part of their local business community.

The Chamber of Commerce is involved with a vast amount of activities ranging from planning and hosting community events to charitable works

and much more.

Chambers are located in nearly every community across the nation. The goal of every chamber is similar; to help local businesses succeed, but they are not all the same. Hillcrest Hospital Cushing recently received a new transformer, replacing the old one that had been in service since the expansion of the hospital in 2006. COVID-19 Update

As of Monday, May 3, Oklahoma State Department of Health reports 10,396 active cases of COVID-19. The total cases are at 447,279 since beginning testing total recoveries reported are at 430,095 and deaths are reported at 6,788.

Payne County has 133 active cases. There have been 8,653 total cases since testing began with 8,449 recovered and 71 deaths attributed to the virus. Pawnee County has 41 active cases. There have been 1,777 total cases since testing began, with 1,688 recovered and 48 deaths attributed to the virus.

Creek County has 134 active cases, There have been 6,891

total cases with 6,603 recovered and 154 deaths attributed to the virus since testing began

Agra's report remains the same from last week with 4 active cases. 118 total and 112 recoveries.

Cushing has 26 (an increase of 1 from last week) active cases. There have been 1,401 total cases, 1,353 recoveries and 22 deaths attributed to the virus.

Drumright has 10 active cases, remaining the same as previously reported. There has been an increase of one in total cases bringing that number to 328 from last week. 309 recoveries and 9 deaths have been reported since testing began.

Jennings has 7 active cases, a decrease of three from last week. A total of 200 cases have been reported with 189 recoveries and 4 deaths.

Mannford has 10 active cases, a decrease of two. There have been 762 total cases since testing began, with 735 recovered and 17 deaths.

Oilton has a decrease of two active cases bringing the number down to 3. There have been 102 total cases since testing began, with 95 recoveries and four deaths attributed to the virus.

Ripley currently has no active cases leaving their total cases at 89 with 88 recoveries and 1 death.

Terlton currently reports 6 active cases an increase of 2 from last week. The total cases is 149 with 142 recoveries and 1 death.

Tryon has 3 active cases reporting the same as last week with a total of 86 and 83 recoveries.

Yale has 6 active cases, up one from last week. Total cases are at 220 with 207 recoveries and 7 deaths reported.

Statewide, the Oklahoma Department of Health has administered more than 2.6 million doses of the COVID-19 vaccine.

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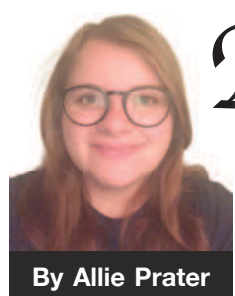

Let's Talk History

Recently, Governor Stitt signed a bill (HB 2030) that would make taking the naturalization test, or citizenship test, a requirement for all graduating high school seniors. Let's talk about what this means.

Let's start off with a little history on the naturalization process.

According to an article published by Virginia Commonwealth University, The first naturalization act, passed by Congress on March 26, 1790 (1 Stat. 103), provided that any free, white, adult alien, male or female, who had resided within the limits and jurisdiction of the United States for a period of 2 years was eligible for citizenship.

There isn't a whole lot of information to find on what the earliest forms of the citizenship test looked like. Naturalization exams from the 19th and early 20th centuries are nearly impossible to locate because during those years judges conducted the exams orally in the court room.

With no written record, one can only assume that there were an abundance of inconsistencies with the citizenship test, giving each person applying for citizenship a disadvantage.

It wasn't until 1986 that the citizenship test became written, and standardized.

It is now common knowledge that all prospective US citizens must take the naturalization test.

Why isn't the contents of that test common knowledge?

Why has it taken so long for this to become a known issue?

Why has it taken an act of government interference to make the naturalization test a requirement for all high school students?

Maybe I have an unusual perspective on this subject, because I had an absolutely phenomenal history teacher in high school, who did require us to learn about the citizenship test (thank you Mr. Minshall).

Maybe it's because I come from a family of immigrants and I have heard first hand accounts of what taking the test is like.

Maybe it's because my mom is a teacher who made a point of educating her children just like she educates her students.

But the bottom line is, that in general, our education system is bent and twisted. I refuse to say the word broken here, because if it were broken, every single student would struggle to learn.

It is bent and twisted and needs to be repaired, not replaced.

My experience with Oklahoma schools has taught me that history is not a valued subject in our education system.

I have never seen a school in Oklahoma that hires history teachers. History is an after thought. They hire coaches, and hope they have a history degree.

Now, I have nothing against coaches who are also teachers, my favorite history teacher was also a basketball coach (again, thank you, Mr. Minshall), my issue is with prioritizing extracurricular activities over education.

This would be equivalent to a hospital hiring a family medicine doctor, in the hopes that they know how to do brain surgery.

If hospitals operated the way we allow our schools to operate, people would die.

History needs to be made just as important as all of the other core subjects like math, reading, and science.

We need to start pushing the importance of learning from the past, or it is bound to repeat itself.

If we fail to educate our children on the mistakes, or golden ages, of the past, then how can we ever expect them to lead our country into the future?

I think that house bill 2030 is an excellent step

in the right direction, and I applaud our state representatives for pushing this forward.

But there is a long way to go still.

Our children deserve to know how they got to where they are today.

Our children need to know how they got to where they are today.

The history of the naturalization test is important knowledge for every American.

But it is just a minuscule fraction of the true history of America, and we have failed our students by depriving them of this knowledge.

The Oklahoma School Testing Program reported in 2017 that the average percentage for students testing proficient or above on the 10th grade history test was 46.5 percent.

That is less than half of our students testing proficient.

That number is not a reflection of the students.

That number is a reflection of the education they are given.

We are failing our students and we need to do better.

Students that want to learn, are created by teachers that want to teach.

Senate Review

Work continues on the state budget as we head into the final month of the legislative session. Ongoing negotiations will ultimately determine how the budget pie will look for Fiscal Year 2022.

While we don't yet know what the final numbers will look like, we can look at a snapshot of the current budget year and how the budget sits right now. For budget year, FY'21, I can tell you that the total state appropriations were \$7.8 billion. The lion's share of those dollars, 51 percent, went to education. Twenty percent went to health and social services, while human services and public safety and judiciary received 11 percent each. Natural resources and regulatory services received two percent, and

general government and transportation received five percent.

Remember that in addition to state appropriations to the Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT), the agency also receives earmarked funds, which are dollars that are set aside for specific purposes that do not go through the appropriations process. This special earmarked money was the result of legislation approved in 2006 called the Rebuilding Oklahoma Access and Driver Safety (ROADS) Fund. It's used for construction, maintenance and the planning of state highways, farm-to-market roads, county highways and bridges. The apportionment to the ROADS Fund has been increased multiple times since then, and it's current level of \$575 million was established in FY'13, helping address long neglected

transportation needs due to inadequate funding.

Because of the ROADS Fund, ODOT's 8-Year Plan will repair or replace 609 bridges, 804 miles of rural two-lane highways with deficient shoulders, and improve 3,126 miles of highway pavement. In all, the plan contains 1,350 projects with an estimated cost of \$6.2 billion. These investments are making a huge difference in our transportation infrastructure. In 2004, Oklahoma had 1,168 structurally deficient bridges, ranking our state 49th in the nation. In 2019, that figure was reduced to 86, and we were ranked 9th in the nation for our bridges. That's a vast improvement and shows the program has been a major success for our transportation system.

I'm also very pleased to report that two Senate bills to help manage dramatic spikes in energy costs after February's historic winter storm have

been signed into law by Governor Stitt. These measures create a framework for securitization of the approximately \$4.5 billion in increased energy costs from the winter storm. Without legislative action, customers could have seen their utility bills climb by thousands of dollars over a period of months, and that would be financially devastating to most Oklahomans. This allows that increased cost to be spread out over a period of years, protecting seniors, families, individuals and small businesses in every part of our state, including here in Senate District 21.

Payne County Becomes Second Amendment Sanctuary

A request from Payne County sheriff Joe Harper to make Payne County a Second Amendment Sanctuary County was approved Thursday April 29, immediately following Gov. Kevin Stitt's signing of the bill that made Oklahoma a SAS State.

District 1 Payne County Commissioner Zach Cavett said. "This approval is a continuation of what the state has done. It is a way to encourage and show support of Gov. Stitt's decision."

Caveat said the Payne County resolution has been a plan in their office for the last few weeks, even before the state approval.

A Second Amendment Sanctuary, also known as a gun sanctuary is defined as a state, county, or locality that is in opposition of enforcing certain gun control measures that may be implemented by a higher legislative entity to infringe upon an area's law-abiding citizens rights to keep and

bear arms as stated in the Second Amendment of the U.S. Constitution.

The need for SAS began to arise when extreme risk protection order (ERPO) laws or "red flag" laws started making way through our nation in the last couple years. These laws would allow judges to deny the sale of firearms and ammunition to individuals that they deemed at risk of illegal actions such as, harming themselves or others.

Before that, states like Alaska and Kansas had begun passing resolutions similar to SAS that created a foundation for the movement to be built upon. In Oklahoma, the first SAS county began with Sheriff Devereaux declaring Logan County as one.

These regulations being passed in a multitude of areas is an undeniable way of local government saying to federal governments that they support their citizens' rights and will work to protect those rights.

is put back into the business community and programs. The chamber gives out grant funds and scholarships through the Foundation of Progress, a non-profit organization that the Chamber manages.

The inner workings of all Chambers did a "drastic 360" around 2015.

"It was at this time that the chamber industry completely shifted on its head," said Caulfield. "First came the title change. Tracy's position as Executive Administrator changed to CEO and president. Then came the changes to the board.

"You had started to put younger board members on...a very eclectic and diverse

board," Caulfield said explaining that the board is composed of 12-15 business professionals who choose between three, two or one year terms.

A seat on the board is no longer given to individuals that are pillars of their community but to professionals in a specific industry. The board is now compiled of those that are industry leaders and have shown they are knowledgeable about a specific type of business.

"The chamber attempts to make sure each board member acknowledges that that seat is not a crown...You just represent your industry," she said.

Caulfield says that presently, the chamber has an exceptional board of directors as well as an amazing staff.

She describes the positions as follows; the board governs and the staff manages.

Caulfield said the board oversees that things are done properly in accordance with regulations and comes up with ideas that the staff figures out how to make a reality. Staff works personally with local businesses and are responsible for planning and doing day-to-day work.

"In an indirect way, we are the front door of the community," said Caulfield.

Caulfield said the staff at the chamber are currently integrating customer relation management software into their website. Once that software is set up, she said that people will be able to interact with the chamber website to view upcoming events, pay invoices, and accounts online. The hope is that by the end of May, that software will be ready for public use.

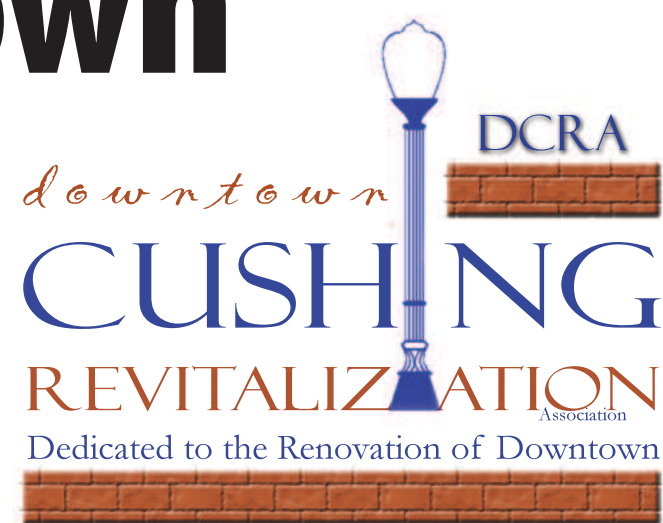
News we have been waiting on! The Dunkin Theatre is opening. Not a movie on the opening but live performance

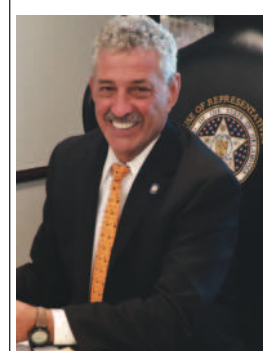

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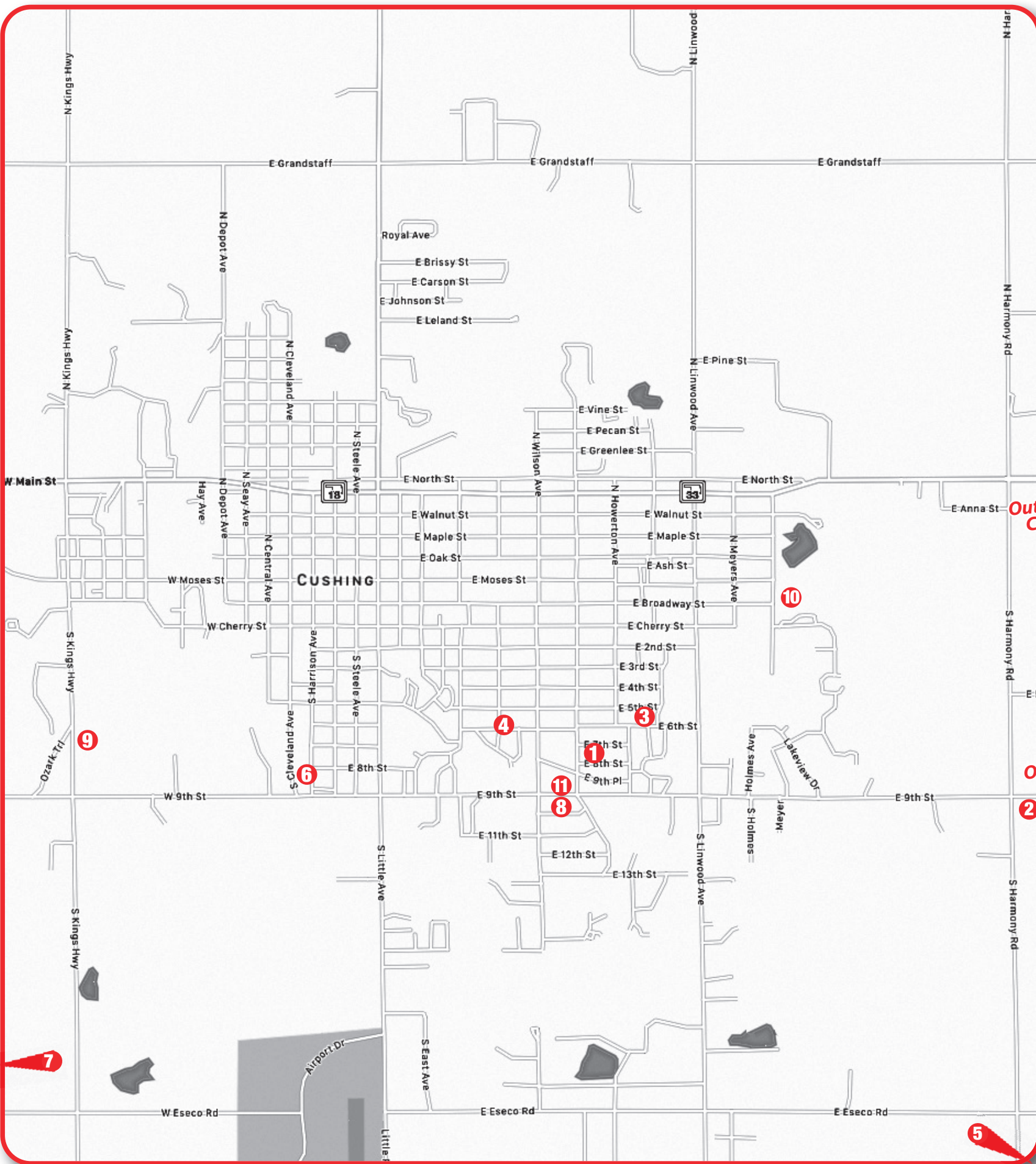

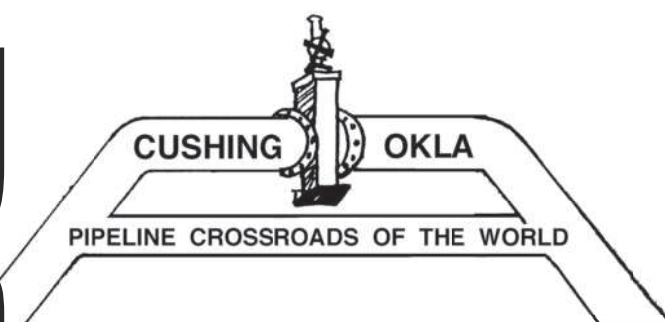

Payne County Gains Mileage

A roadway plan by the Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT) was approved during a recent County Commissioners meeting to include another 12 miles for Payne County. This number may seem small and insignificant but it is actually better news than one might expect. An increase such as this means Payne County may be able to receive more funding; due to road mileage being one factor the Oklahoma Tax Commission (OTC) uses to calculate the County Highway Fund.

The County Highway Fund provides a

substantial amount of financing for the County Highway System by providing the primary source of maintenance funding for equipment, tools, and labor cost needed for sustaining all county roads. State tax revenue sources for the fund include portions of the state's gas, diesel, and gross production taxes among others.

The County Highway Fund is calculated through 4 main formulas. The formulas are used each month to determine the funds that are apportioned to each county. These formulas use road mileage, proportions of county land area, population, and the County

Road factor (provided by ODOT to OTC at the beginning of every year in January) to calculate each county's County Highway Fund.

January 2018 ODOT reported Payne County had 1,071.23 in road mileage. In January of 2020 that number had gone up to 1,079.76 showing an 8.53 increase in road mileage over the last two years. Although it may seem a minor number a significant amount of work goes into those increases and each increase means more funding for road improvements.

The Pride in Hard Work

We're rounding the final corner of this legislative session, with only one more month before session must conclude.

Right now, we're considering amendments the Senate made to our House bills. When we choose to reject Senate amendments on our House bills, the bill's author will often request conference committee.

In these situations, the members of the committees that the bill initially passed through in each chamber will come together to discuss the bill and consider a compromise. If a compromise is reached, the updated bill will again be presented to each chamber so that lawmakers can consider the changes. The deadline to request conference committee is Thursday, May 13.

A bill I coauthored was sent to the Governor this week. Senate Bill 57 protects the

rights of patients to receive prescribed opioids and ensures that physicians can prescribe this medication to those with valid medical needs.

This change was requested by a House District 33 constituent, and the bill is supported by several organizations that promote care for people with chronic pain or illnesses. I was happy to support this legislation.

Over the past year, I've had dozens of constituents reach out to me for assistance with unemployment claims. I know for many people in District 33, the additional unemployment benefits coming from the federal level helped them stay afloat during a time when finding work was difficult. But now I'm excited to see so many places across District 33 offering work opportunities, from restaurants to oilfield jobs.

Doing a job well brings a sense of pride and overall well-being. Sadly, I've heard people say that work is somehow a bad thing or a punishment. The way I read the Bible, Adam and Eve were given the responsibility of taking care of the garden from the very beginning, before eating the forbidden fruit. For me, growing up on a farm taught me to love working. It not only enables me to take care of my family, but it also gives me purpose and direction.

If you're looking for a job, be sure to attend one of the upcoming job fairs offered by the Oklahoma Employment Security Commission. The career fairs closest to House District 33 are at the Tulsa Expo Square on May 6-7 and the Oklahoma City Convention Center on May 17-18. The virtual career fair runs from May 5-28.

The in-person career fairs will be open to the public from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Veterans can begin participating early - from 8:30 a.m. to 9 a.m. - at each

in-person event. If you plan to attend, you can register at <http://regpack.com/reg/oesc21>.

From Ernie Barsamian - The Tank Tiger Tomorrow is Cinco de Mayo and, one thing for sure, is that the Renewable Identification Number (RIN) market is going loco. The rally in RIN prices last week saw ethanol RINs and the Renewable Volume Obligation (RVO) assessment set all-time highs. The RVO value is essentially the cost of RFS compliance for refiners and importers of gasoline or diesel who do not blend biofuels. To say that these costs have been un fuego would be an understatement. If Gene Simmons and Paul Stanley were RIN traders, they would say that the market has been "Hotter than Hell" and it will take more than a margarita to cool it off. Surely, a lot of the excitement about product exports to our friends to the south has been driven by the incentives to

circumvent the RVO liability, which has been running as high as 18 cents per gallon. The Tank Tiger has been flooded with requests for tank storage in South Texas.

Product exports are not subject to the RFS obligations, and this can provide a certain level of relief to stressed out refiners. With soybean oil prices at a 13 year high, the proposition of dumping food into fuel becomes more and more suspect, especially if this fuel is eventually leaving our heartland. Certainly, this has contributed to the runup in RIN prices. Speaking of which, we planted our garden this week, but that produce is going into my salad, not my gas tank. The Tank Tiger also has most recently listed renewable fuels storage in Northeast Iowa. If you build it, they will come.

Oil prices rose to a six-week high with

bullish oil demand and a positive outlook for the US economy. A hailstorm of earnings reports will arrive this week. The Q1 earnings season so far has seen a record 87% of S&P 500 companies top estimates and earnings growth on average of 46%. On the week closing, Brent crude price rose to \$67.26 per barrel and WTI ascended to \$63.54 per barrel. Prices have been encouraged by the continued reduction of global oil inventories as well as the turn up in US refinery utilization. With all of this good news, we mustn't turn a blind eye to the tragic effect of the pandemic in India and South America. Hopefully, the world will respond quickly with aid to our neighbors. It's a small world, after all.

Creek commission signs interlocal agreements

The Creek County Commissioners Monday approved a series of inter-agency agreements, and approval of electrical work at the Creek County Jail.

The Commissioners signed Inter-Agency Agreements with the Creek County Industrial Authority for Sapulpa, Drumright, and Bristow industrial sites for the period of July 1, 2021 to June 30, 2022, and an Inter-Cooperative Agreement with the City of Mannford and Creek County District 2.

The Commissioners approved a quote of \$9,000 for electric work at the Creek County Jail to Gilley Electric, Inc. Other companies submitting bids included A&M Electric, Inc., and Freedom Electrical Services, Inc.

In other matters, the Commissioners approved the sale of property located at 426 S. Park Street in Sapulpa via public sale auction to Brayden Hackler for \$2,378, plus \$100 for filing and publication for a total of \$2,478, and the surplus of a 2019 John Deere Skid Steer and 2019 John Deere 60G Excavator and disposing of the same by trade.

"We are going to trade the equipment in for a new model of each, this is the first process

to start that trade-in," said District 2 Commissioner Leon Warner.

The Commissioners approved using the ACCO (Association of County Commissioners of Oklahoma) deductible fund to pay for the damages to a District 2 2020 Kenworth Patch Truck in the amount of \$9,244.97 that was damaged when the passenger

side front tire blew out, damaging fender, hood and tire rod assembly.

"This is a new truck, we just got it out of the shop and have noticed some steering issues since repair," Warner said. "This is a new truck and there should have been no reason for the tire to explode. It caused more damage than we expected, so we submitted it to ACCO."

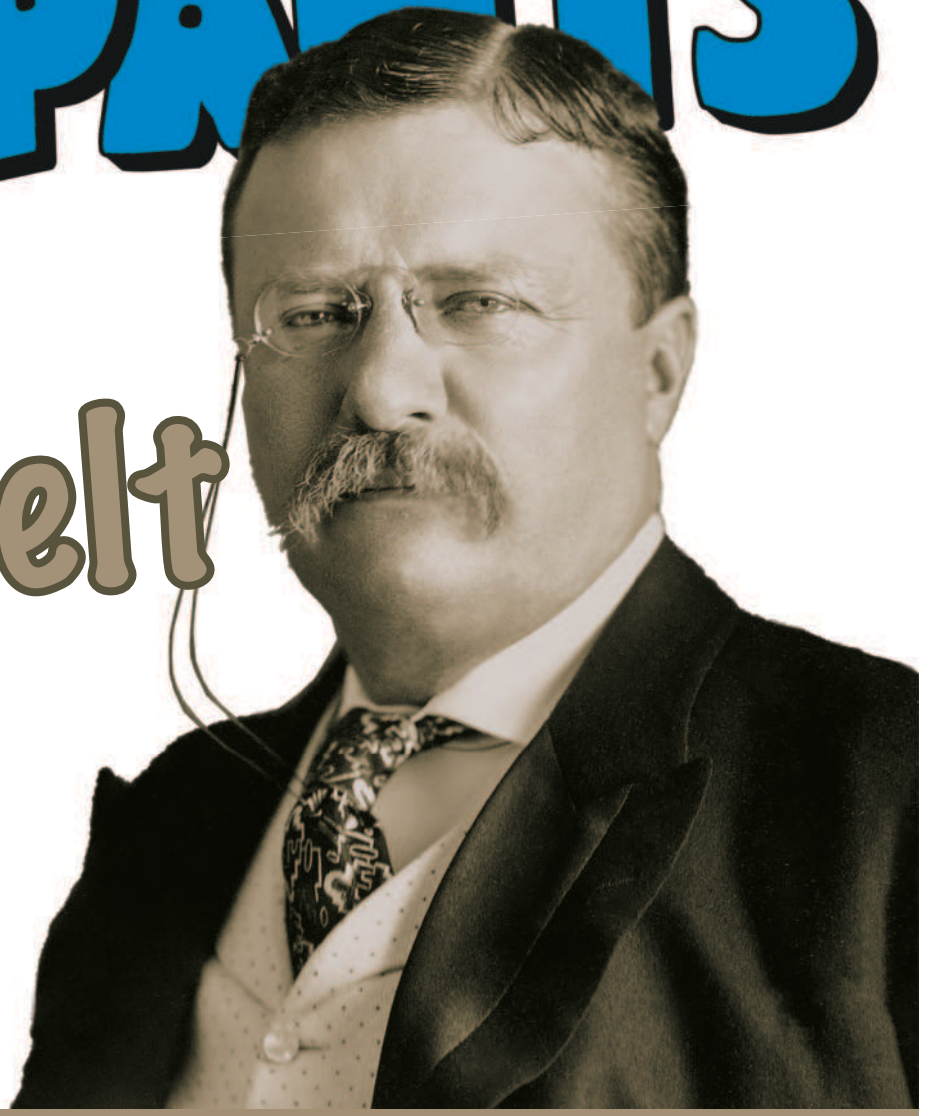

Theodore Roosevelt

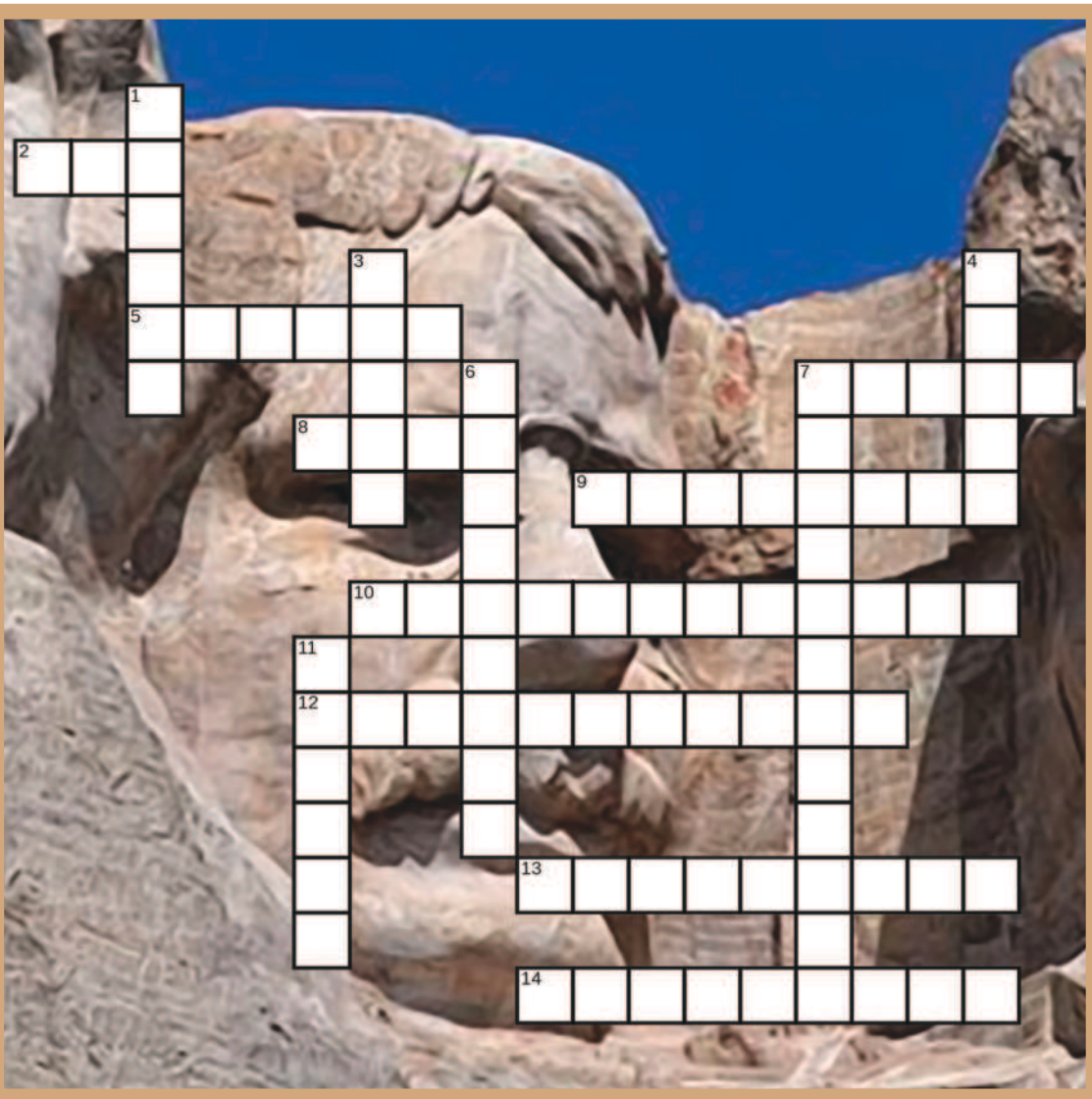

More than 18,000 ships use the canal every year.



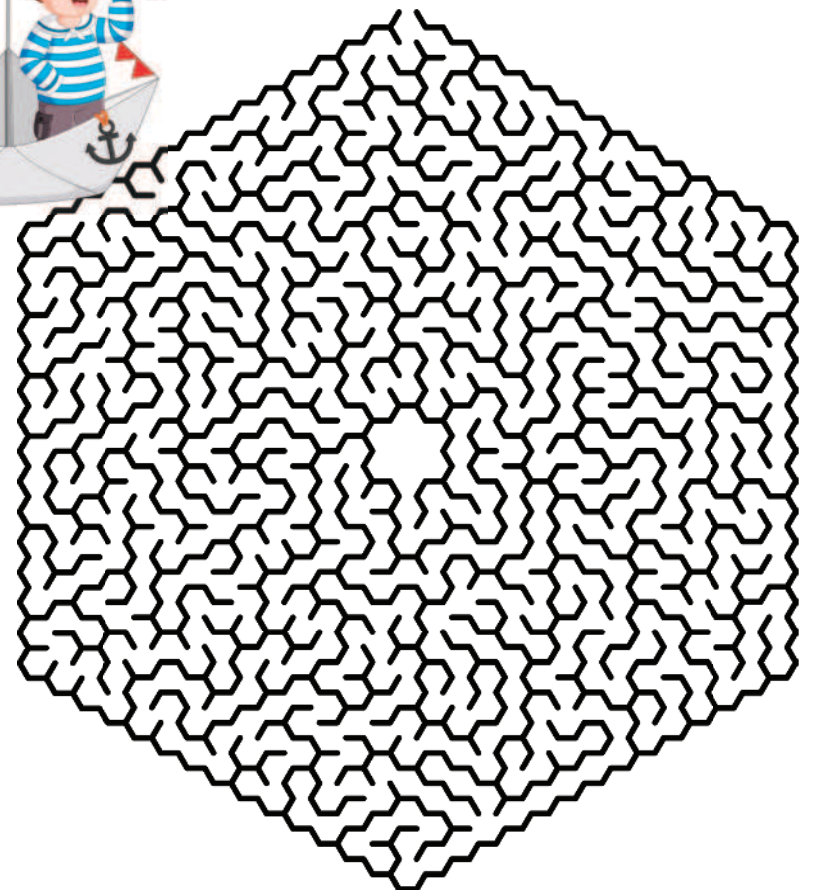

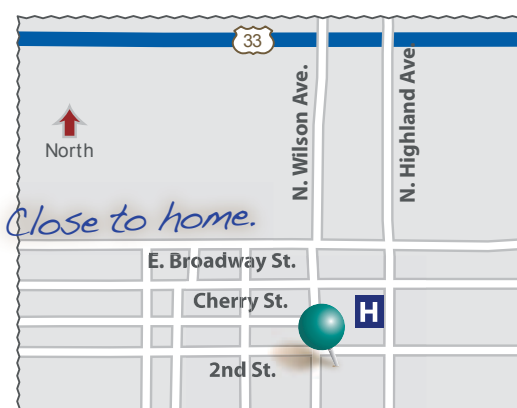

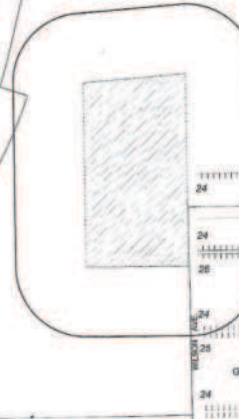
