Legal Aid Health Care Navigators Ready to Help Oklahomans Enroll

Fifteen health insurance Navigators, trained and certified by the federal government and the Oklahoma Insurance Department, are ready to provide free, unbiased, local help to Oklahomans with questions about health insurance including assistance enrolling in a policy through the Marketplace. The Navigators are attorneys, paralegals and other member of the legal staff of Legal Aid Services of Oklahoma. This year’s open enrollment period, the six weeks in which consumers may sign up for a new health insurance policy through the Marketplace and/or make changes in their current coverage, began Sunday, Nov. 1 and continues through Dec. 15.

Navigators are located in Oklahoma City and Tulsa as well as Altus, Ardmore, Bartlesville, Guymon, Hugo, Lawton, McAlester, Muskogee, Norman, Poteau, Stillwater, Weatherford and Woodward. To find out the phone number of the nearest Navigator, call 405.313.1780. Legal Aid Services of Oklahoma is a not-for-profit law firm providing free civil legal assistance to eligible low-income individuals and their families and to elderly persons in the areas of family, consumer, housing, health and employment. Legal Aid attorneys and staff work through a network of fully-staffed law offices and satellite offices, serving eligible clients in all 77 counties of Oklahoma. Funding for Legal Aid is from the Legal Services Corporation, the State of Oklahoma, the Oklahoma Bar Foundation, scores of United Way and United Fund organizations and aging agencies across the state as well as generous attorneys, law firms, foundations, businesses and individuals.



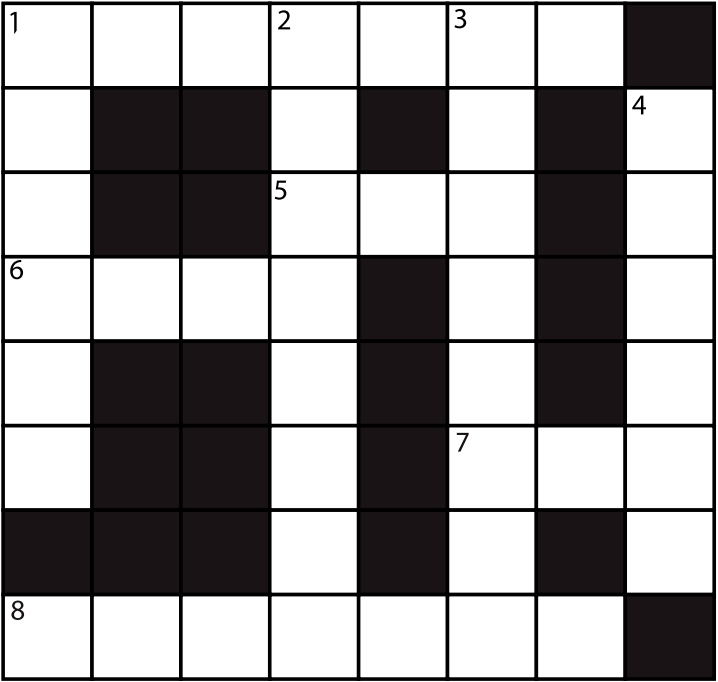

year due to health safety concerns. “This younger generation could now be hosting their own holiday celebrations for the first time with their own smaller bubble of family and friends,” Brown said. “A recent survey indicated 71% of all age groups will be celebrating the holidays in smaller groups.” Those who are new to hosting might also be novices about food safety. Clean counters and utensils are important during food preparation. Brown said to be sure to disinfect counters, cutting boards and knives several times during the food preparation process, especially after raw meats. Proper internal food temperatures are a must. For example, when cooking a turkey dinner, make sure to reach a minimum internal temperature of 165 degrees. A food thermometer needs to be a standard kitchen tool. Keep raw meat separate from other foods. Brown also said to use one cutting board for meats and another for fresh fruits and vegetables. Following the meal, make sure foods are

put into storage containers and refrigerated or frozen within two hours. Brown said family favorite recipes are traditional for get-togethers, but hosts may opt for easier foods to bolster safety. “We’ll probably be seeing a lot less finger food on the table this holiday season to reduce viral and microbial spread. Research shows people are seeking easy pre-meal appetizer replacements and encouraging safe handling and serving practices,” she said. “Lots of finger food appetizers may be a tradition for your family’s holiday festivities, but maybe this is the year to start something new.” Consider more casserole and pasta dishes to help simplify the serving process. Individual desserts also are a good option. “Obviously, traditions are important to families, and if those can be carried out safely, go ahead with them,” Brown said. “However, since 2020 has been anything but traditional, don’t be afraid to follow a new path this year.” For more food safety information, visit OSU Extension’s website.

Barbara Brown, Oklahoma State University Extension food specialist, said millennials and others who typically travel to their parents’ or grandparents’ homes for holidays should consider staying away this



Coronavirus Food Assistance Program 2 (CFAP2): Signup for CFAP 2 will end December 11, 2020. CFAP 2 provides eligible producers with direct financial assistance due to market disruptions and associated costs because of the COVID-19 pandemic. CFAP 2 is a separate program from the first round of the Coronavirus Food Assistance Program, now referred to as CFAP 1. Farmers and ranchers who participated in CFAP 1 will not be automatically enrolled and must complete a new application for CFAP 2. Details on how to apply can be found on farmers.gov/cfap/apply. There are more commodities available for CFAP 2 than there were for CFAP 1. A call center is available for producers who would like additional one-on-one support with the CFAP 2 application process. Please call 877-508-8364 to speak directly with a USDA employee ready to offer assistance. The call center can provide service to non-English speaking customers. Customers will select 1 for English and 2 to speak with a Spanish speaking employee. For other languages, customers select 1 and indicate their language to the call center staff.

FSA Encourages Farmers & Ranchers to Vote in the County Committee Elections: The 2020 Farm Service Agency County Committee Elections will begin on Nov. 2, 2020, when ballots are mailed to eligible voters. The deadline to return ballots to local FSA offices, or to be postmarked, is Dec. 7, 2020. County committee members are an important component of the operations of FSA and provide a link between the agricultural community and USDA. Farmers and ranchers elected to county committees help deliver FSA programs at the local level, applying their knowledge and judgment to make decisions on commodity price support programs, conservation programs, incentive indemnity and disaster programs for some commodities, emergency programs and eligibility. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out federal laws. To be an eligible voter, farmers and ranchers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age but supervises and conducts the farming operations of an entire farm, may also be eligible to vote. Eligible voters in Local Administrative Area (LAA) #1, who do not receive a ballot can obtain one from their local USDA Service Center. Newly elected committee mem-

bers will take office Jan. 1, 2021.

Stuart Hutchison - Stuart is a producer of crops and vegetables and livestock in the Wheelless area of the county. He is currently serving as a County Committee Member.
Leross Apple - Leross is a livestock producer in the Kenton area of the county. More information on county committees, such as the new 2020 fact sheet, can be found here County Committee Elections-2020 or at a local USDA Service Center.

Noninsured Assistance Program (NAP) 2020 Grazing Losses: Producers were initially informed that a "Notice of Loss" would not have to be filed with FSA for the 2020 crop year grazing losses. Due to complications with the NAP software, this has changed: Producers MUST Sign a "Notice of Loss" for their 2020 Grazing Losses to be Eligible for NAP benefits. If you have suffered a grazing loss on wheat, cool season grasses, native grasses and sorghum for grazing, you MUST file a "Notice of Loss" in the FSA Office. At this time, Cimarron County has qualified for wheat & cool season grass grazing losses for the 2020 crop year. If you have had a grazing loss for these crops, contact the Cimarron County FSA office to sign a "Notice of Loss" to be eligible for NAP benefits.

Livestock Forage Program (LFP): Cimarron County is eligible for 2020 LFP benefits on small grain pasture, native/ improved pastures, and forage sorghum (grazing) for 2020. You must complete a CCC-853 AND supply the required supporting documentation (leases and livestock sales/purchases) no later than January 31, 2021, for 2020 losses. Qualifying livestock must be held for commercial ag production purposes AND ARE OR WERE on grazing acres at the time of the qualifying loss dates of January 9, 2020 for small grain pastures or as of May 26, 2020 for native and improved pastures in Cimarron County. Eligible livestock include Cattle that are adult breeding stock (bulls, cows & bred heifers), calves over 500 pounds, weaned calves under 500 pounds, Sheep, and Goats. All livestock located in feed yards are INELIGIBLE for the LFP program.

December 11, 2020: CFAP 2 Signup Deadline.
December 15, 2020: Triticale Reporting Deadline.
January 15, 2021: Wheat/ Small Grains Reporting Deadline.

Be prepared for wildfire season

Ice storms demand attention, but so does Oklahoma's persistent risk of wildfires once the ice has melted. John Weir, Oklahoma State University Extension associate specialist, said although parts of the state received good rain during the summer, it's the season for vegetation to go dormant and dry out. Precipitation can be fickle. Vigilance and preparation are always good ideas. "As we get fronts coming through with higher wind speeds and lower humidity like we typically see this time of year, the fire danger can elevate pretty quickly," Weir said. "One of the things we need to be thinking about is managing that fuel." Weir said the biggest concerns should be around homes and property structures such as barns and outbuildings. It is important to think about such factors well before a fire comes your way. "Make sure you have those fuels mowed down in equipment yards. If you have fenced-in areas, put some livestock on that land to knock down the fuels," he said. "It's a whole lot easier to contain and knock down a fire on land that has been managed." Landowners must consider where they put their hay. Most often it is stored in an area that has easy access, but is not necessarily safe. Hay stacked along a fence close to traffic runs the risk of a discarded cigarette or spark from a vehicle. "Keep the old adage in mind of not putting all your eggs in one basket. The same is true for your hay," he said. "Don't put it all in one place. Spread it out. That way if something does happen, you don't lose all the hay you have." Winter 2020-2021 is predicted to have La Niña aspects according to a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration advisory. Weir said La Niña – a complex weather phenomenon that shifts typical wind and precipitation patterns – will have an impact on wildfire possibilities. "With warmer temperatures and drier conditions, the fuels you see on the land are going to continue to be dry and continue to stay dry, which means the fire danger goes up," he said. "There will be some rain, but we have what is called a one hour lag time fuel. What that means is it only takes about an hour for those fuels to go back to dry conditions following a moisture event." The fire danger is not just for rural land. Property owners within city limits also need to be cautious. David Hillock, OSU Extension consumer horticulturist, said there are a number of steps homeowners can take to improve safety around their homes. "Things as simple as keeping the grass

mowed down, raking back leaves and cleaning out gutters can help save your home from a fire. Also, remove items from around the home that can burn easily, such as firewood, dense vegetation and flammable trees like redcedar," he said. "Keep the trees pruned on your property to cut down on fire fuel." While some homeowners enjoy lots of trees on their property, Hillock said flames can move through them quickly. He advised residential tree pruning. SUNUP, OSU's Division of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources' agricultural television program, has an informative segment on wildfire prevention. OSU Extension also has additional information online regarding wildfire prevention and management. Another useful source of fire management information is the Oklahoma Mesonet, a world-class network of environmental monitoring stations designed by scientists at OSU and the University of Oklahoma. The site also offers complete weather information, as well as educational material for teachers.

Robotic milking comes to OSU students at Ferguson Family Dairy Center

Candy is for more than people with a sweet tooth; it's also a great way to train dairy cows how to use a robotic milking system, much to the delight and educational benefit of students working at Oklahoma State University's Ferguson Family Dairy Center. The robotic milking system highlights how the OSU Department of Animal and Food Sciences provides students with firsthand experience of technological advances that are changing how the dairy industry does business, said Nicole Sanders, OSU graduate student and interim dairy herd manager. "If you want to work with high-tech agricultural companies in developing new programs and supporting new technology, we have that at Oklahoma State," she said. "Not a lot of university [undergraduate and graduate] students in the United States get to work with robotic milking systems." And, yes, there is candy involved. Training dairy cattle begins with a special kind of pelleted feed with sweets in it that entice the animals to enter the robotic milking system. This goes on for several weeks before the actual milking process starts. The idea is to get the cows used to the presence of the technology – and eating the pellets. "Everything has gone very well, especially with the Jersey cattle. After a while, it all becomes just a normal part of the cow's day," said Kristin Pronschinske of DeLaval, the manufacturer of the robotic milking system. "The students working at the center have had a lot of fun learning all about the new system and

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training the cows, and we have had just as much fun working with the students – and the cows." OSU agribusiness student Lora Wright agreed, citing how student access to cutting-edge technologies at the dairy center, combined with research-based educational experiences focused on best management practices, gives her and her fellow dairy enthusiasts working at the center the practical, applicable skillsets needed to pursue a variety of career options in the dairy industry. "New technologies are an evolution in the dairy industry," Wright said. "The center was the reason I came to Oklahoma State. Growing up on a registered dairy farm in southwestern Missouri, I wanted to continue that and pursue a degree in agriculture." Robotic milking systems are increasingly becoming the dairy industry's default mode of business, in turn driving technological enhancements that affect related job functions – from feed advisors to veterinarians who are experienced with the interaction of animal and machine, to designers of dairy and other on-farm equipment. "OSU's Ferguson Family Dairy Center is a working dairy farm in addition to its role as an historically important research facility. The combination instills students who work there with a perspective that incorporates many different facets of the industry," said Susan Allen, manager of industry affairs at Oklahoma Dairy MAX. "That is a valuable contribution to the industry, and to agriculture in general, in terms of turning out our next generation of producers, dairy scientists, livestock nutritionists, agricultural engineers, economic analysts, educators, entrepreneurs and community and government leaders." Enrollment in the OSU Department of Animal and Food Sciences typically accounts for about 1,000 students from 40 or so states, making it one of the most popular academic homes for students on campus. Department Head Clint Rusk said a highlight of projects undertaken during the last few years has been improvements at the dairy center. "The Ferguson Family Dairy Center clearly is an excellent educational and career-building resource for current OSU students, but from the outset, we also envisioned it being a place where busloads of third or fourth graders might come and see the latest innovations related to dairy production and animal management practices, maybe help them learn a little bit more about agriculture," Rusk said. "We thought, potentially, some of them might even want to come to school here someday." For current student Wright, the technologies and programs at the center are examples of how life is changing for the dairy industry and those pursuing agricultural

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degrees. "At OSU, we still milk some animals in the parlor in addition to those going through the robotic milking system," she said. "The combination of traditional and cutting-edge practices gives students the best of both worlds, and the knowledge to operate in each." After all, adoption of new technologies across an entire industry does not happen all at once. Wright said OSU is helping its dairy students position themselves for whatever comes next, both in terms of a potential career in industry, research and academia, and life in general. The Ferguson Family Dairy Center and OSU Department of Animal and Food Sciences are part of the university's Division of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources, which is comprised of the Ferguson College of Agriculture and two state agencies: OSU Extension and the Oklahoma Agricultural Experiment Station system.

priorities and suffer isolation—and all that was before COVID. The pandemic brings even more challenges for caregivers. Some of the new challenges facing caregivers are as follows:

- Video Appointments. These are great but they come with their own challenges.
- Keeping Loved One at Home and Out of Nursing Home. Some loved ones are needing to transition to assistant living or nursing homes, but because COVID has visitations limited, families are reluctant to make that move.
- Added Costs. It’s hard enough to cover the added cost of caring for a loved one at home, but many caregiving families are dealing with unemploy-

ment.

- Isolation. COVID has limited to visitors to home caregivers causing additional stress and loneliness.
- Risk. With COVID, how much risk is too much? A question with which we all are dealing.

The North West Planning Service Area 11 (NWPSA 11) Area Agency on Aging (AAA) has programs that benefit many caregivers in northwestern Oklahoma.
