Five more deaths due to COVID-19 reported

Five more residents of Bastrop County have died due to COVID-19 since last week, bringing the total number of fatalities since the beginning of the pandemic from 42 to 47.

As of Monday morning, 3,281 people have recovered from COVID-19 in Bastrop County, leaving 488 active cases, according to the county's dashboard, which can be found online at www.co.bastrop.tx.us/page/em.coronavirus.

So far, Bastrop County has reported a total of 2,977 confirmed

positive cases and 839 probable

The probable case count includes cases where an individual has either had a positive antigen "rapid" test, or had known exposure to someone with the virus and has symptoms of COVID-19.

As of Monday, 902 residents of

Bastrop County have received their first dose of a COVID-19 vaccine, according to a dashboard from the Texas Department of State Health Services, found at dshs.texas.gov/ news/updates.shtm. Last week, 154 people had received a vaccine. See more COVID-19 news on page 8B.


Amos Jimmie Wenzel

Ascension Seton Bastrop reflects on first year

This month marks one year since Ascension Seton Bastrop opened its doors to the community. As we celebrate our first anniversary providing medical care for Bastrop County and its surrounding areas, we also reflect on the emergence of the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) in early 2020, which presented our healthcare facility-and the world-with an unprecedented challenge.

Shortly after opening our doors to the public, it was clear our hospital, healthcare system, government and every American citizen would need to work together to conquer this invisible threat. Ascension Seton Bastrop doctors, nurses, facility management teams and other support teams quickly made adjustments in a new facility to address challenges faced due to COVID-19.

Ascension Seton Bastrop administrators worked closely with Bastrop Coun-

ty's Health Authority and **Emergency Management** teams, including leaders from other local healthcare systems and clinics, to implement a coordinated response to COVID-19 in Bastrop County. We consistently communicate with these community leaders to appropriately coordinate care for all patients in Bastrop County and beyond. Our dedicated caregivers are on the front lines providing exceptional and compassionate care to the community. We are so proud of their incredible and selfless work; they are

the embodiment of our mission to serve.

While some services were halted earlier this year due to COVID-19, we are now offering our full scope of services, including 24-hour emergency care, cardiac rehabilitation, pulmonary care, radiology services and more. As of last month, we've served more than 4,500 patients in our emergency room. Our outpatient clinics continue to care for patients virtually, or in-person.

As the Bastrop community grows, we have the opportunity—and the re-

sponsibility—to continue providing high quality care and identifying new ways to connect with the communities we serve. We are in the process of expanding our laboratory capabilities and various clinical services, such as pulmonary and respiratory care. Additionally, two new surgical specialty teams began outpatient clinic services this summer.

While the last year had its challenges, I was personally inspired by the innovation, creativity, and teamwork I witnessed at Ascension Seton Bastrop. On behalf of all of our dedicated workers on the frontlines at Ascension Seton Bastrop, I want to thank the community for rallying behind doctors. nurses and support staff during the COVID-19 pandemic. We appreciate your acknowledgement and support throughout these unprecedented times, and look forward to serving Bastrop County for years to come.

New year can't yet shake focus from COVID-19

It's a new year, but the news out of the capital continues to focus on COVID-

Gov. Greg Abbott tweeted last week that "a significant portion of vaccines distributed across Texas might be sitting on hospital shelves as opposed to being given to vulnerable Texans. The state urges vaccine providers to quickly provide all shots. We get plenty more each week."

Many health providers and county health department officials responded that they were working as quickly as they could to give shots to front-line health care workers and lacked the doses necessary to move to what Texas calls phase 1B recipients. According to the Texas Department of State Health Services, phase 1B recipients include those 65 and older and those 16 and older with medical conditions that would put them at greater risk from COVID-

Various state news outlets reported Texans in phase 1B could not find any vaccine available to them yet. The state health department encouraged the public to check its website weekly for updates on vac-

cine availability.

AG blocks Austin

The city of Austin and Travis County tried to impose New Year's weekend restrictions on restaurants, but Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton and Gov. Abbott won the final round of a legal battle. The local officials' order

limited restaurants to drivethru, curbside pickup, takeout and delivery services between 10:30 p.m. and 6 a.m. from Dec. 31 to Jan. 3. Austin Mayor Steve Adler and Travis County Judge Andy Brown imposed the three-day restriction to limit social gatherings over the holiday weekend after

District Judge Amy Clark Meachum denied Paxton's motion, saying the state had not shown "imminent and irreparable harm." The AG immediately asked the 3rd Court of Appeals to block the order, but that court rejected his appeal. Paxton then went to the Texas Supreme Court for an emergency stay of the order. The high court granted the injunction late Jan. 1 without comment.

Food benefits increased The Texas Health and

Human Services Commission will provide \$204 million in emergency SNAP food benefits during January as the state continues its response to the pandemic.

Recipients of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program also will see an additional 15 percent in their total benefits in January because of recently passed federal legislation.

"As we continue through the new year, these benefits offer nutritious food to those who need it most,

especially in these trying

times" Wayne Salter, of

HHS, said in a statement.

The state received federal approval from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to extend the maximum allowable amount of SNAP benefits to recipients based on family size. The emergency January allotments are in addition to the almost \$2 billion in benefits previously provided to Texans between April and

December. Beginning in January, recipients will receive a 15 percent increase in their total benefits, which will continue monthly until June 2021. The additional 15 percent increase and the emergency allotment amount should appear in recipients' accounts by Jan. 23. Administered by the state agency, SNAP is a federal program that provides food assistance to 1.7 million eligible low-income families and individuals in

Texans in need may apply for benefits, including SNAP and Medicaid, at YourTexasBenefits.com.

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COVID-19 cases: 488 active, 3,281 recovered

As of Monday, 902 residents of Bastrop County have received their first dose of a COVID-19 vaccine, according to a dashboard from the Texas Department of State Health Services, found at dshs. texas.gov/news/updates. shtm. Last week, 154 people had received a vaccine.

According to the Bastrop County Office of **Emergency Management** (OEM) weekly update last Tuesday, the county's two community testing sites in Bastrop and Elgin performed 440 tests between December 22 and December 28. The positivity rate for the molecular PCR tests given at the county testing sites between these dates is 11.2%.

Hospitalizations for COVID-19 across the 11-county Trauma Service Area O, which includes Bastrop and Travis coun-

ties, was at 10.88% as of last Tuesday, which is higher than the previous week but still the lowest in the state, the update from OEM said.

"Please continue minimizing the spread of COVID-19 by following CDC guidelines by following the three W's: wearing masks correctly, washing hands frequently, and watching social distancing," last week's post said. "Consider keeping your gatherings small and holding them outdoors or limiting them to those that live within your household."

Beginning January 4, only the testing site at St. David's in Bastrop will remain open. For more information about receiving a test at the county testing site, visit www.bastropcountycovid19.org or call 512-972-5560. For local questions about COVID-19, call the Bastrop County hotline at 512-303-4300. For the latest update,

posted each Tuesday, visit @BastropCountyOEM on Facebook.

According to the City of Austin's COVID-19 dashboard, found at www.austintexas.gov/covid19, the portion of the 78621 zip code in Travis County has reported 246 cases. Last week, this number was 244.

The City of Austin dashboard also includes information about hospitalized patients in the five-county Austin-Round Rock Met-

(MSA), in addition to the case numbers for Austin and Travis County. The MSA includes Bastrop, Caldwell, Hays, Travis and Williamson County.

As of Monday afternoon, the MSA has 484 inpatients in the region's hospitals, with 151 patients in the intensive care units (ICU) and 92 ventilators in use.

Last week, 422 people were in the hospital as inpatients due to COVID-19, 132 patients were in the ICU and 77 ventilators were in use.

In May, the U.S. Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) began gathering and reporting data from nursing homes about the number of confirmed and suspected cases of COVID-19 in residents and staff. As of Monday, data was available through the week ending on December 20 at data.cms.gov. Since August 2, the Elgin

ropolitan Statistical Area Nursing and Rehabilitation Center has reported no new confirmed COVID-19 cases or deaths among residents. and no new staff members have tested positive for COVID-19 during the last two weeks of data. A total of 36 residents and 21 staff members have been confirmed with COVID-19 over the 28 weeks of data reported so far, and six residents have died due to the

19 has been reported for January: one staff member at a non-campus facility tested positive on January

Throughout December, a total of 19 cases were reported at Elgin ISD. This includes two students and one staff member at Booker T. Washington Elementary School; three students and two staff members at Elgin Elementary School; two students and one staff member at Neidig Elementary School; one student and two staff members at Elgin Intermediate School; one student and one staff member at Elgin Middle School; one student at either Elgin High School or Phoenix High School; and two staff members at non-campus facilities.

According to the Federal Bureau of Prisons website, www.bop.gov/coronavirus, the federal correctional institution in Bastrop has 15 inmates and 26 staff members with active cases of COVID-19 as of Monday afternoon. Last week, 62 inmates and 26 staff members had active cases. One inmate has died of COVID-19, and 453 inmates and four staff members have recovered so far.

Eric Gibson—Assault a pregnant person, enhanced, a third-degree felony enhanced to a second-degree felony.


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
