Waterway access points abundant across Putnam

Putnam County citizens are fortunate to live just footsteps from the St. Johns River and all its tributaries. The river's shores are dotted with marinas, public and private ramps to enhance quality time on the water.

There are approximately 29 boat ramps across the entire county, which include clear, sand bottom lakes as well. The facilities are for all water sports, including fishing, swimming, boating, canoeing and kayaking.

Private marinas offer off-ramps, mooring docks, boat rentals, motel rooms, cabins and bait and tackle shops, as well as RV hook-ups and concession areas.

Public ramp facilities available are simply for launching and pulling out boats and other watercraft from our local water bodies. Parking space varies according to the site and some ramp areas also have ample dock space for fishing.

Palatka's Riverfront Park is able to accommodate major fishing events with its large ramps, docks and parking lot. Recent events include Wolfson Children's Hospital's Annual Bass Tournament, in which more than 400 boats have taken part. This year's event is slated for May 18-20, according to the tournament's website. More information about the tournament and how to register can be found at https://giving.baptistjax.com/event/wolfson-childrens-bass-tournament-2023/e410375.

The Palatka riverfront has also been host to the Bassmaster Elite Series kick-off for four-years running. In 2022, the AFTCO Bassmaster Elite at St. Johns River drew at least 100 boats. While this past February's kick-off was held in Lake Okeechobee, local anglers have said they anticipate the series' eventual return to Putnam County.

The Palatka City Dock also serves as home to other, locally organized bass tournaments and remains a destination point for American Cruise Lines' eastern U.S. river cruise ships.

Just north of Palatka off Hwy. 17, Crystal Cove Marina also hosts bass tournaments. The marina's wide ramps and long docks make for easy usage. The marina also offers boat rentals, moorings, boat storage, RV hook-ups, a tackle & bait shop, motel rooms and a bar and grill.

Heading south on Hwy. 17, Georgia Boys Fish Camp can be found along Dunns Creek. The spot is one of Putnam County's oldest and well-known fish camps. It offers a good ramp, fishing and pontoon boat rentals, cottages, a bait and tackle shop, snacks, cold drinks and ice.

Rodman Reservoir: Nearly 60 years of fishing and recreation

Located southwest of Palatka and near the Ocala
National Forest, the Rodman Reservoir has evolved
into a rich ecosystem and popular fishing location for local
residents and visitors. The site is a sought-after spot for bass
tournaments, offering trophy bass for pros and amateurs
alike.

On Feb. 27, 1964, President Lyndon B. Johnson set off the explosion marking the beginning of the Cross Florida Barge Canal. President Richard Nixon halted the project in 1971 and it was officially decommissioned in 1990. Still, the remnants of the project still stand today. It's a place some people, like Putnam County Commissioner Larry Harvey, have visited since they were young.

Harvey said he's been fishing and boating there for 50 years and hopes other people will take advantage of the reservoir.

"It's such an environmental treasure we have out there," Harvey said.

When visiting, try to catch a glimpse of the otters that frolic in the waterbody or watch the cormorants hunt for their breakfast as a new day dawns over Putnam County.

The Rodman Reservoir is more formally known as the Kirkpatrick Dam. The dam was renamed in 2003 to honor the late Sen. George Kirkpatrick, a longtime ally of the Rodman Reservoir.

The area attracts more than anglers, with hikers, families and school groups using the facilities. The Rodman recreation area is free and open to the public. There is a boat ramp to the Ocklawaha River, fishing piers, picnic areas and restrooms.

There is also Rodman Campground, located near the reservoir with more than 60 camping sites that include primitive tent sites or 38 sites with power and water hookups, according to floridastateparks.org. A two-lane boat ramp is located in the campground for campers to use. To make reservations, contact the campground at 386-326-2846 or visit reserve.floridastateparks.org/Web/#!park/57.

The St. Johns River

A place to play and a place to preserve

The St. Johns River offers 310 miles of recreational opportunities and there's no shortage of fun in Putnam County.

Dock in Palatka to stop by Ravine Gardens State Park, or hike your way through the Welaka State Forest in the south end of the county.

These two stops sit along the St. Johns River but people don't even need to get out of the river to make memories.

There are plenty of boat ramps and marinas to start kayaking, canoeing or boating along the St. Johns River. These locations include:

Anderson's Lodge, 10 Boston St. in Welaka.

3 Bananas, 11 S. Lake St. in Crescent City. Welaka Lodge & Resort, 1001 Front St. in Welaka. Renegade's on the River, 1171 County Road 309 in Crescent City.

Bass World Lodge & Marina, 209 Browns Fish Camp Road in Crescent City.

Crystal Cove Riverfront Resort, 133 Crystal Cove Dr. in Palatka.

Jessica Finch, community engagement coordinator for the St. Johns Riverkeeper, said the St. Johns River is Putnam County's largest economic drive. The St. Johns Riverkeeper is a privately-funded organization chartered in 1999 to be a watchdog and advocate for the river.


Finch, a Welaka Town Council member, formerly owned the Welaka Lodge & Resort and works to keep the community engaged.

"And with what we have in Putnam, the natural beauty and the recreational opportunities, I think we have a chance to define our future with the river as our centerpiece," she said.

The river flows north starting at Blue Cypress Lake in Indian County and it empties into the Atlantic Ocean east of Jacksonville, according to the Riverkeeper's website. The massive waterway touches 12 counties and covers an area about 9,000 square miles, the agency states.

If the weather permits, there isn't a day in Putnam County where someone isn't kayaking, fishing or boating along the river. The river is populated with bluegill, catfish, largemouth bass and striped bass, which is why south Putnam's Crescent City is known as the "Bass Capital of the World."

While Finch said it's great that people take advantage of the river's recreational opportunities, people can also help keep the river clean. She encouraged people to visit stjohnsriverkeeper.com to learn more about the river and become an advocate for its health.


"It's a whole ecosystem that you're putting yourself in the middle of, which is great," Finch said. "I mean, I want people to enjoy the river – it's absolutely the best thing we have here – but to be mindful of the environment and the surroundings that we're in."

People don't even have to live near the river to help keep it clean, she said, because runoff that comes from yards finds its way back into Florida's aquifers. Putnam County residents can create a river-friendly yard by planting native plants.

Finch also recommended people report blue-green algae outbreaks or instances of illegal dumping and try to cut back on water usage.

"(It) sounds kind of simple," she said, "but it actually would be an impactful thing for the river."

Meander Putnam's main waterway in style

Major domestic cruise line includes stop in Palatka

 $\mathbf{F}^{ ext{olks}}$ strolling Palatka's riverfront may occasionally notice a rather large vessel moored near Riverfront Park and wonder to themselves, "What is this big ship and what's it doing in Palatka?"

American Cruise Lines, which bills itself as the largest domestic cruise line in the U.S., has a fleet of 17 riverboats and small cruise ships. Several of the vessels are small enough to navigate Florida's

inland waterways, yet large enough to support anywhere between 90 and 180 passengers, according to the company's website.

One of the tours available to American Cruise Line customers is called the Great Rivers of Florida tour. The 8-day/7-night tour features eight Florida stops, including Palatka. It begins in Jacksonville and travels along the St. Johns River south to Green Cove Springs and Palatka, back north to Amelia Island and then south along the Tolomato River to St. Augustine. It then returns to Jacksonville.

Two of the line's Southeastern U.S. vessels are listed on the company's website for booking a local luxury cruise: The American Star, a Independence Class ship which can accommodate up to 90 passengers, originally set sail in 2007 and has often been the one visitors see moored in the river here. And new to the fleet, the American Eagle is expected to host St. Johns River tours next year, according to booking information on the company's website. The Coastal Cat Class ship can hold up to 100 passengers, the website


states, and was built with the intention of being nimble and stable enough for the sometimes shallow inland Florida waterways.

Alexa Paolella, public relations manager for the domestic line, said the company aims to launch two Coastal Cats able to navigate Southeast U.S. waterways later this year.

"American Eagle & American Glory... begin sailing in August and October 2023," Paolella said in an email. "These new Coastal Cats will also begin sailing many of our cruises to/from Florida, including the Great Rivers of Florida itinerary."

The American Eagle design boasts 56 "luxury staterooms," 85% of which include private balconies, is 241-feet long and 56-feet wide. American Cruise Lines states that all ships have elevators to each floor and are handicap accessible.

Fine dining and casual dining is offered, and the line states they often use locally sourced foods in its vessels.

"Our team of master chefs prepares a traditional American menu with a regional flair that features the freshest local ingredients," the website states. "Fresh foods are brought aboard daily, some from the farms and vineyards that we visit along the way."

While the company says prices are subject to change, fares, as of March 8 on the website, started at \$4,125 per person for a standard stateroom on the American Star, to \$10,295 per person for a Grand Suite with private balcony on the American Eagle.










The State Forest "is one of the best-preserved natural sections of the St. Johns River," according to the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. The forest is home to river swamps, pine flatwoods, sandhills and flatwoods lakes, the department states. Take a dip into Mud Springs, which reportedly "empties 13,750 gallons per hour of clear spring water into a half-mile spring run that flows into the St. John's River."

In 1935, the federal government began the Welaka Forestry and Wildlife Conservation Project on a State of Florida fish hatchery site. It was later transferred, according to the state agency, to the University of Florida as the "University of Florida Conservation Reserve, Welaka" for researchers to study forestry and wildlife.

In 1992, the state department states, the property lease was transferred from the University of Florida to the Florida Forest Service to manage as a state forest.

The forest is open from sunrise to sunset and a day pass can be bought for \$2. An annual pass for all Florida state parks can be purchased for \$45. All passes can be purchased at fdacs.gov/Forest-Wildfire/Our-Forests/State-Forests/State-Forest-Recreation/Passes-and-Reservations.

"Welaka State Forest is part of the Bartram Trail in Putnam County, which follows the route of William Bartram's travels via waterway, hiking, biking and driving routes," the state department said online.

Welaka State Forest offers hiking trails up to 4.5 miles, a 6-mile equestrian route named Sandhill Horse Trail and a path to observe the scenery from inside a vehicle called Indian Pond Road.

People hoping to be a little more adventurous can take part in the state forest's primitive camping options. Make camping reservations at floridastateforests, reserveamerica, com.

Ravine Gardens State Park

Opened July 4, 1933, the Palatka state park is most known for its blossoming azalea plants.

The park is located at 1600 Twigg St. and offers 152 acres of sloping ravines, a spring-fed stream that flows into the St. Johns River and plenty of picnic spots.

While peak azalea season is from January to March, according to the state park's website, there's plenty to see all year. The park is open 365 days, including holidays, 8 a.m. to sundown and the Ravine Loop Drive is open to vehicles from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily, according to the park's website.

People can bicycle on the gardens' 1.8-mile loop, which is closed to vehicles one hour before sunset but remains open for pedestrians, bicycles and wheelchairs. Take a hike on trails like the Springs Trail, which is labeled "moderate," and includes narrow paths and stone stairs, or hike the "strenuous" Azalea Trail which includes numerous stone stair, slope changes and suspension bridges but features an "unbeatable view of the ravines," the state park's website explains.

Admission is \$5 per vehicle, exact change only, or \$4 for a single-occupant vehicle. Pedestrian prices are \$2 per person.

Ravine Gardens used to be city-maintained and was home to the Miss Azalea Queen beauty pageant that coincided with Palatka's Azalea Festival.

"In January 1970, the gardens were deeded to the Florida Internal Improvement Trust Fund and Ravine Gardens officially became a Florida State Park," the state park's website shows. "Ravine Gardens State Park is one of the nine New Deal-era state parks in Florida"
