Bulldogs set to open stadium, challenge for NBC crown

The Rossford football team enters the new season with high hopes.

The team that finished 2-8 overall, and sixth in the Northern Buckeye Conference will look to reverse its fortunes this fall as they play in a refurbished Jackson-Ferguson Stadium that boasts new seating and artificial turf.

Head Coach Todd Drusback likes the Bulldogs' chances of turning things around.

"We lost five games in the last two minutes last year. Five more wins and we would have been a playoff team."

To prepare for a run at a league title and a playoff berth, Rossford has ramped up its off-season conditioning program.

"Conditioning is paramount to finishing games," Drusback emphasized.

He also wants to utilize the Bulldogs' depth to keep players fresh.

Drusback believes the team has already made strides in the right direction. In practice alone, their intensity has increased.

injuries last year, which wasn't good; but the other side of that is it gave some young players a chance to get in and get experience."

Of those injured, quarterback **Kyle Kromenacker** returns to lead the Bulldog huddle for the third year. Through five games, he was one of the more prolific signal-callers in the league, amassing more than 1,500 passing yards and 500 yards on the ground.

While Drusback isn't sure how much Kromenacker will run the ball, he confirmed the senior is healthy and throwing the ball as strong as ever.

The team also returns **Jacob Shiffert**, playing at safety and wide receiver along with **Lukas Klotz**, who will also see time as a defensive back.

Running the ball will be sophomore **Trent Bachmayer**. He will run behind a mostly veteran offensive line with **John Sanders, Luke Rhue** and **Gavin Linkous** leading the way there.

Linkous, an Honorable Mention All-League recipient last year as a freshman, returns as linebacker on the defensive side of the ball. Senior **Noah Fosgate** returns at defensive end to provide a pass rush.

Again, competition in the NBC will be steep with the top half quite solid.

Eastwood and Genoa are predicted to be the teams to beat, but for now Drusback isn't thinking that far ahead. Instead, he is concentrating on the game against Swanton in the new stadium.

"We haven't won a season opener since 2013. It would be nice to start 1-0," he said.

The team's biggest change is its venue, and Drusback claims the stadium's facelift will contribute to the team's improvement this year.

Because the field is 100 yards and is

clearly marked all the time, the Bulldogs have been able to practice more efficiently.

"Everything we do is based on landmarks, yard markers," Drusback explained.

"It helps us to know where we need to be; it really helps with the quality of our practice."

The Bulldogs will focus on increasing their tempo this year on the new surface, a strategy that should enhance their chances.

"When we go fast, we have been really good," Drusback added.



house," Lorenzen added.


"If you have four golfers that can be steady, you have a chance to win."





However, Wilson believes that if the team can stay healthy and unified, the season holds a lot of promise.


We need to support each other," he said, 'especially when things aren't going well."
