

Most land mine use by US military banned, except for Korea

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Joe Biden's administration announced Tuesday that it would restrict the use of antipersonnel land mines by the U.S. military, aligning the country's policy more closely with an international treaty banning the deadly explosives.





Pieces of the Past: Pounding the pavement

This article is a reprint of one that appeared in the June 2022 issue edition of Citrus Industry Magazine.

I was reading a book about Dundee Citrus Growers Association, "D Is for Diamonds," by Gordon Smith when I came across a story about Hoyle Pounds. He was inducted into the Florida Agricultural Hall of Fame in 1980 and the Florida Citrus Hall of Fame in 1986.

Pounds had a long career as an innovator. He was born in Ocoee, Florida in 1893 and moved to Winter Garden in the early 1920's where he founded Pounds Motor Company and sold Fordson tractors "to grove owners who were replacing mule power." For decades, he was instrumental in designing and building fertilizer attachments, hedgers, sprayers, grove tractors, dusters and many other pieces of specialized grove equipment.

Pounds also designed a lawn mower deck for his good friend and fishing buddy, Neal Smith, who was a creator of the Snapper lawn mowers. Although they initially kept the idea a se cret, when the project was completed, the two en had made the first Snappin' Turtle lawn mower decks, and Pounds sold them at Pounds Motor Company.

In the 1940's, Pounds formed the Pounds Industrial Gas Company to meet the rising demand for liquefied petroleum gas for farm and grove businesses. He originally asked Green Fuel of Orlando if it would keep a full gas truck truck at Pounds Motor Company 24 hours a day. Green Fuel declined the request, so Pounds built his own gas-storage facility to supply his customers. The facility was so big that a company in Oklahoma had to design it because no one in Florida knew how.

Pounds Industrial Gas served Winter Garden and surrounding areas between the 1940s and 1980s. Pounds incorporated his business after two of his sons, Herbert and Russell, were discharged from the Air Force after World War II. They worked with Pounds and helped him run the family business. Another son, Donald, operated the tractor company in Winter Haven.

Pounds also served as the volunteer fire chief of Winter Garden for 41 years. The origi nal fire truck that he bought and donated to the city in 1954 was recently returned to Winter Garden and restored by the Winter Garden Heritage Mu-

But it was the patent he received in 1928 for the first rubber tractor tires that earned him economic success and the nickname "Mr. Tractor." Rubber tires turned a clunky steelwheeled tractor that couldn't gain traction in Florida's sandy soil into a road friendly, smooth-riding machine that pulled and traveled well both in and out of the field.

Pounds sold so many of his conversion kits with his tractors that his sales outstripped "his quota of tractors from Ford Motor Company and he had to

get tractors from other Ford auto dealers who had to take some tractors with their allocation of cars but were less adept at selling tractors than Pounds.'

At the time of his invention, steel tractor wheels could destroy tree roots and also damaged the new roads that were being built as Orlando continued to grow, so it was illegal to drive tractors on a paved street.

Gordon Smith recounts this story: "Pounds fitted one of his new Fordson tractors with un inflected used truck tires held firmly on the rims with specially designed steel clamps. On December 22, 1926, he no doubt shocked the local citizenry by driving his rubbertired Fordson tractor for five miles down the forbidden public highway. The occasion was the first public demonstration of his new invention at a grove owned by H.E. and Warren Patrick."

Maybe that's where the term 'pounding the pavement" orig-


We need more cars named for places in the Sunshine State. Instead of a Toyota Tundra, a Toyota Tampa, instead of a Chevrolet Malibu, something catchy, like a Chevrolet Micanopy, an Orlando in the place of a Colorado, a Mt.Dora instead of a Montana, the possibilities are endless.

Speaking of Tucson, in 1950, its population was 45,454, ten years later it was 212,892. Wow, what happened? Air conditioning became available for the common man and he then retired to Arizona. (And to Florida, of course, one of whose two statues in the National Statuary Hall in the U.S. Capitol honors John Gorrie of Apalachicola. He is credited with inventing the process now known as air conditioning)

Sara Jacobson passed away in late May. Sara lived in Sanford most of her life, except for a time in the Peace Corps in Chile and a stint with PBS in New York. Sara was instrumental in getting both the downtown commercial and the residential immediately to the south, designated as historic districts. When Pete Knowles threw out all the building plans from the 1920s and 30s, Sara supposedly rescued and stored them out at the airport. Wonder where they are





You've worked hard all your life, played by the rules, only to have most of your nest egg wiped out due to something you could NEVER have controlled. For most of us, this would be devastating and possibly life-changing!

For most pre-retires and retirees, the #1 concern is fear of running out of money in retirement! What options do we have as we wonder whether Social Security will be around, and the days of pensions being gone?

There are three common methods people use to secure income in retirement. It's important to note that we are focusing on our "retirement years", because we may still have time to make up for any losses in our younger working years. Working longer may no longer be an option when we are older, and our health may be compromised.

Here is the retirement strategy most people take:

Here is the most important thing to consider, which most people overlook. For exam-

ple, if you use a 5% withdrawal rate from a "market-driven" account and that account (portfolio) goes down in any given year, let's say 10%...you just reduced your account value by 15%! That's not even considering a modest 2-3% inflation rate. In that case, you may have reduced the account balance by 17-18%! Now, most would say you need 17-18% to recover those losses. That's the wrong strategy. It would be best to have more because you are starting with a lower value.

Proper comprehensive financial planning needs to provide an appropriate mix of market-driven investments for growth and protected types of investment vehicles like annuities and CDs, to name a few. One should never solely rely on market-driven accounts to generate consistent, reliable income in retirement because it's impossible, and it will always depend on "performance."

When the stock market starts tumbling, daily injections of bad news can spark anxiety, fuel uncertainty, and trigger radical decisions in even the most seasoned investors. Panic isn't a strategy! It's essential to keep focused when markets are volatile.

3. Always stay diversified, and the old saying "never put all your eggs in one basket" still holds true.

4. Pay close attention to risk management as it is always a good idea to determine if you could get similar results by taking on less risk.

5. Stay on top of what your financial professional is doing, and remember it's YOUR money, and play an active role in managing it.



VETERANS POST:

10-Foot Stack of Mail Sits Unopened at VA

Imagine a pile of mail heaped 10 feet high sitting unopened for 10 months. That's what was found in the basement of a rented Department of Veterans Affairs facility in Atlanta. When investigated, the stack was determined to contain 17,660 pieces of mail that included claims, correspondence from veterans, 10,020 medical records and \$207,000 in checks, some of which had already expired.

The problems began when a health care arm of the VA wanted to commandeer the basement space being used by a VA payments group. They came to a verbal agreement that the new group would take over dealing with the mail if the payment group left. A handshake later, it was done. Except nobody asked the new group if they even knew how to process correspondence, records and checks. And, apparently, nobody did.

So, although the new people took a stab at dealing with the mail, for the most part the pile sat and grew as more mail came in.

And sat and grew some more. The new group asked the old group for help. The old group said no. Enterprising souls in the new group sent off some of the mail to other facilities -- 14 boxes to one facility alone -- which sent it right back. They tried again, sending another 13 boxes.

What happens when payment requests are ignored? Veterans can't go to that outside provider and treatment is delayed or denied. Appeals can be denied if not received in time. Veterans with bad test results may not be notified.



Making an immediate splash

Hagerty High's Riley Greene makes his much anticipated Major League debut


And it didn't take long for the Oviedo native to make his





Today's deal from a duplicate game provides a case in point. The deal was played at eight tables, and at every table the final contract was four spades by South, against which West led the queen of hearts. At seven of the tables, declarer made 10 tricks — five

spades, two hearts and three clubs.

Since seven declarers achieved this

result, and since 10 tricks seem to

be there for the taking, this would

seem to be the normal outcome.

But it shouldn't be, as demon-

strated by what happened at the eighth table.

First, let's see how the play went at the other tables. South won the heart lead, cashed the A-K of spades and led a spade to the jack. Declarer then tried a club finesse, losing the queen to East's king.

At this point, the defense varied. Some Easts shifted to a diamond, and after the defenders collected two diamonds, declarer had the rest, eventually discarding the heart six on dummy's nine of clubs. At the tables where East returned a heart, declarer similarly finished with 10 tricks.

At the table where the contract failed, East found a way to give South a chance to go wrong, and it made all the difference. Here, when declarer led a club to the jack at trick five, East did not take the king.

South naturally assumed that West had the king, in which case repeating the finesse was necessary and might even yield an overtrick. So declarer crossed to his hand with the heart king and led a club to the queen. This time East won, and the defenders quickly cashed a heart and two diamonds to set the contract.

East's refusal to win the first club is a play that has much to gain and little to lose. All it takes is a bit of thought and a natural reluctance to play mechanically.



Despite Western arms, Ukraine is outgunned in the east

BAKHMUT, Ukraine (AP) — Holed up in a bombed-out house in eastern Ükraine, Ukrainian troops keep a careful accounting of their ammunition, using a door as a sort of ledger. Scrawled in chalk on the door are figures for mortar shells, smoke shells, shrapnel shells, flares.

Despite the heavy influx of weapons from the West, Ukrainian forces are outgunned by the Russians in the battle for the eastern Donbas region, where the fighting is largely being carried out by way of artillery exchanges.

While the Russians can keep up heavy, continuous fire for hours at a time, the defenders can't match the enemy in either weapons or ammunition and must use their ammo more judiciously.

At the outpost in eastern Ukraine, dozens and dozens of mortar shells are stacked up. But the troops' commander, Mykhailo Strebizh, who goes by the nom de guerre Gaiduk lamented that if his fighters were to come under an intense artillery barrage, their cache would, at best, amount to only about four hours' worth of return fire.

Ukrainian authorities say the West's much-ballyhooed support for the country is not sufficient and is not arriving on the battlefield fast enough for this grinding and highly lethal phase of the war.

While Russia has kept quiet about its war casualties, Ukrainian authorities say up to 200 of their soldiers are dying each day. Russian forces are gaining ground slowly in the east, but experts say they are taking heavy losses.

The United States last week upped the ante with its largest pledge of aid for Ukrainian forces yet: an additional \$1 billion in military assistance to help repel or reverse Russian advances.

But experts note that such aid deliveries haven't kept pace with Ukraine's needs, in part because defense industries aren't turning out weaponry fast enough.

"We're moving from peacetime to wartime," said Francois Heisbourg, a senior adviser at the Paris-based Foundation for Strategic Research think tank. "Peacetime means low production rates, and ramping up the production rate means that you have to first build industrial facilities. ... This is a defense-industrial challenge which is of a very great magnitude."

The Kiel Institute for the World Economy in Germany last week reported that the U.S. has delivered about half of its pledged commitments in military support for Ukraine, and Germany about onethird. Poland and Britain have both come through on much of what they promised.

Many foot soldiers say they can't

even begin to match the Russians shot for shot, or shell for shell.

Earlier this month, Ukraine's ambassador in Madrid, Serhii Phoreltsev, thanked Spain — which trumpeted a shipment of 200 tons of military aid in April — but said the ammunition included was enough for only about two hours of combat.

Ukrainian filmmaker-turnedfighter Volodymyr Demchenko tweeted a video expressing gratitude for guns sent by the Americans, saying, "It's nice guns, and 120 bullets to each." But he lamented: "It's like 15 minutes of a fight."

Part of the problem, too, is that the Ukrainian forces, whose country was once a member of the Soviet Union, are more familiar with Soviet-era weaponry and must first be trained on the NATO equipment they are getting.

An untold number of Ukrainians have traveled abroad to get training on the Western weapons.

Of the \$1 billion pledge from the U.S., only slightly more than onethird of that will be rapid, off-theshelf deliveries by the Pentagon, and the rest will be available over a longer term. The pledge, which includes 18 howitzers and 36,000 rounds of ammunition for them, addresses Ukraine's plea for more longer-range weaponry.

That's still far short of what the Ukrainians want — 1,000 155 mm howitzers, 300 multiple-launch rocket systems, 500 tanks, 2,000 armored

vehicles and 1,000 drones — as President Volodymyr Zelenskyy's adviser Mikhail Podolyak tweeted last week, before the latest big Western pledges.

"What the Ukrainians have got to do is conduct what military people tend to call a counter-battery operation" to respond to Russian artillery fire, said Ben Barry, a former director of the British Army Staff who is senior fellow for land warfare at the International Institute for Strategic Studies. "To do this, you need accurate weapons with a high rate of fire and a range that allows them to keep out of the way of the other side's artillery."

"The Ukrainians are saying they don't have enough long-range rockets to adequately suppress Russian artillery," he said. "I think they're probably right."

As it now stands, Ukrainian fighters often have to use "shoot and scoot" tactics — fire, then move before the Russians can zero in on

Better NATO hardware, even in small quantities, is often welcome.

On a nearby front on Saturday, a Ukrainian unit granted The Associated Press rare access to the firing of U.S.-supplied M777 howitzers — towable, 155 mm weapons - on Russian positions.

A lieutenant who goes by the call sign Wasp touted the M777's precision, speed of fire, simplicity of use and the ease with which it is camouflaged, saying the new hardware "raises our spirits" and "demoralizes the enemy because they see what the consequences are."

Denys Sharapov, Ukraine's deputy minister of defense in charge of procurement, told a publication of the U.S.-based National Defense Industrial Association that the weapons systems that have been received cover only 10% to 15% of the country's needs. He noted the breadth of the challenge — a front line with 1,000 kilometers (620 miles) of active combat.

Interviewed by National Defense magazine in an article published Wednesday, Sharapov said no single supplier could satisfy Ukraine's needs alone.

'Quite unfortunately for us, we have become the biggest consumer of weapons and ammunition in the world," he said.

Friends of Ukraine are digging in for the long haul.

Time may be on Ukraine's side, the experts say. Ukrainian fighters are both motivated and mobilized all men in the country of 40 million have been called to fight, whereas Russia has so far avoided a call-up of conscripts, which could vastly tilt the war in Russia's favor but may not be popular domestically.

As for how long such fighting could last, analyst Heisbourg said a years-long war of attrition is "quite possible.






