LOS ANGELES (AP) — California is facing its highest chance of blackouts this year as a brutal heat wave continues to blanket the state with triple-digit temperatures. State energy officials said the electrical load Tuesday afternoon could top 51,000 megawatts, the highest demand the state has ever seen.





Heating Up Fast: Seminole County Fire Department, Sheriff's Office give hot car demo to showcase dangers of kids in hot cars

With the long-lasting heat wave in Florida, first responders recently warned parents about the dangers of heat strokes (or hyperthermia) of children left in hot cars ... even if it's for a couple minutes. Children heat up 3 to 5 times faster than adults. Every year, about 38 kids across the country die from being left in hot cars. So far this year, 22 children have died in the U.S. through this type of tragedy, with a recent incident in New Jersey.

The Seminole County Fire Department, the Seminole County Sheriff's Office and Safe Kids Worldwide recently teamed up to put out a large digital thermometer display to show

Sunny Days Are Just Around The Corner

Deputies arrest Deltona man accused of aggravated stalking of 6-year-old girl

A Deltona man is charged with aggravated stalking of a 6-year-old girl after her father and neighbors reported a long pattern of his harassing behavior toward her and others.

Mark Greenburg, 55, of Fayson Circle in Deltona, was taken into custody Saturday afternoon after detectives obtained a warrant for his arrest.

The arrest followed a series of complaints from close to a dozen witnesses who have reported his behavior, including at least 11 incidents reported to the Sheriff's Office over the past 8 months. Those reports involved Greenburg harassing neighbors, yelling at them and their kids using a megaphone, and driving past houses while recording children on his phone.

Deputies responded to Greenburg's neighborhood Friday evening after a father reported Greenburg walked to the end of his driveway and made several unusual comments to his 6-year-old daughter. The comments included words to the effect of "I'm going to make you famous" and "I'm going to turn you into a woman" or a "big girl."

Several witnesses gave similar accounts of Greenburg's comments to the child, including that he was going to pick her up and take her to Disney World.

The father told deputies this and prior incidents have made his daughter afraid to go outside in the neighborhood. He said Greenburg's comments have been getting progressively worse and more frequent.

The 6-year-old often visits her grandmother's house in another neighborhood, where it was reported Greenburg parked outside Thursday and Friday and took pictures. Because he's never been invited there and had no reason to know where she lives, the family believed Greenburg followed someone there.

Deputies attempted to speak to Greenburg Friday evening, but he refused to answer the door and said he would talk another day.

After obtaining a warrant, deputies with the Deltona Crime Suppression Team returned Saturday and arrested Greenburg without incident. He was transported to the Volusia County Branch Jail, where he remained in custody as of this writing on \$5,000 bond.



Student Loan Forgiveness: A Payoff for the Woke

"A Bailout for Woke Higher Ed" reads the headline on the stringent analysis by the Wall Street Journal's Allisia Finley of the Biden student loan forgiveness program.

It's a program that's economically regressive, "even worse than you thought," with big bailouts for the most affluent, as economist Tyler

Cowen points out.

It's wildly more expensive than advertised, according to Penn Wharton, with costs rising to the magnitude of \$600 billion to \$1 trillion, two to three times the expected price tag.

To understand why this policy is so rotten, go back to its origins. Many years ago, some policymakers noticed

that the small minority of Americans who graduated from college earned more than the large majority who didn't. They deduced that if more people went to college, they'd earn more themselves and increase the gross domestic product. So let's loan them money for tuition and ex-



Retirement can mean many different things to many people. For some, it will be a time to travel and spend time with family. For others, it will be a time to start a new business or begin a charitable endeavor. Regardless of what approach you intend to take, here are nine things about retirement that might surprise you.

1. No Age Restriction on When You Can Retire

In the past, most people retired around age 65. However, retiring later in life has become more prevalent in recent years. In fact, there's no age restriction on when you can retire. As long as you have the financial means to do so, you can retire at any age.

2. Retirement Income Can Be Taxable

Depending on your retirement account type, you might have to pay taxes on your retirement income. If you have a traditional IRA, you may owe taxes on the money you withdraw in retirement based on your overall income. If you have a Roth IRA, you won't owe any taxes on the money you withdraw.

3. You Might Need to Adjust Your Withdrawal Rate

The 65-and-older population is the fastest-growing age group in the United States and has grown by 34.2% over the past decade. The percentage of money you can safely withdraw from your retirement account each year depends on several factors, including the size of your nest egg and how long you expect to live. However, as a general rule of thumb, you should withdraw no more than 4% of your nest egg each year.

4. Consider Delaying Your Social Security

You'll receive a reduced benefit if you start collecting Social Security benefits at age 62. For example, suppose your full retirement age is 67, and you start collecting benefits at 62. In that case, you'll receive only 70% of your monthly benefit. If you wait until age 70 to start collecting, you'll receive 132% of your monthly benefit. The average Social Security retirement benefit is \$1,536 per month or about \$19,000 per year. The maximum possible Social Security benefit for someone retiring at full retirement age in 2020 is \$3,345 per month or \$39,000 annually.

5. Don't Forget The Cost Of Nursing Homes.

Most health insurance plans don't cover the cost of long-term care, such as the cost of a nursing home. Consider purchasing a long-term care insurance policy or set aside funds

to cover any future care costs. The average cost of nursing home care in America is expected to be more than \$8,000 a month by 2023. However, actual costs will vary from state to state.

6. You Might Have to Downsize Your Home
If you plan on downsizing your home in retirement, you might be surprised to learn that the cost of living in some areas is quite high. For example, the cost of living in Manhattan is more than double the national average. As a result, you might have to downsize your home to a smaller apartment or condo.

7. Consider Working in Retirement

If you don't have enough saved for retirement, you might need to work during retirement. In fact, about 1 in 4 Americans over the age of 65 are still working. Working during retirement can help supplement your income and allow you to stay active.

8. You Might Need to Save More Than You Think

The amount of money you need to save for retirement depends on a number of factors, including your lifestyle and how long you expect to live. However, as a general rule of thumb, you should aim to have at least 10 times your annual income saved by retirement. For example, earning \$50,000 a year, you should aim to save at least \$500,000 by retirement.

Bonus Fact About Retirement: Don't Forget About Inflation

Inflation will have a significant impact on your retirement savings. For example, if inflation is 3%, the cost of living will be 33% higher after 10 years. As a result, you'll need to save more money for retirement than you think.

penses. But at some point, there are diminishing returns.

Not everyone has the talents and temperament to profit from college. When you get majorities entering higher education -- colleges and universities, or just community colleges -- many drop out, and some end up making less than if they’d skipped college and just gotten a job. Even worse, they end up owing more.

America seems to have reached that point some time

ago. Graduates’ unemployment rates and the (perhaps more wrenching) percentage living with parents rose from the 1990s to the last decade. Economists David Autor and Arindrajit Dube have found that college graduates’ wages have fallen more since 2020 than those of college dropouts or high school graduates. Returns on college seem increasingly dismal -- negative, even -- for dropouts and marginal graduates and may be reducing rather than increasing total GDP.

The result is what economic historian Peter Turchin calls “the overproduction of elites,” people with elite credentials but not necessarily superior

abilities. Such overproduction, Turchin argues, has historically produced “socio-political instability,” which he predicted in 2010 would be a feature of the 2010-20 decade. We’ve seen plenty of instability in politics, the economy and higher education, where students have been shunning humanities for more practical majors, and an oversupply of Ph.D.s has resulted in competition for fewer tenure track positions and more teaching by near-minimum-wage adjuncts.

So, where has all that government student loan money gone? Not to increased capacity: Even schools with huge endowments haven’t increased enrollments.

Instead, colleges and universities have mopped up the money by raising tuition and charges for gold-plated dorms and gyms -- and for staff. From 2000 to 2020, tuitions increased 170%, more than twice the inflation rate, while prices of

market-provided goods barely rose (cars, furniture, clothing) or sharply fell (cellphones, software).

Institutions of higher education have gobbled up this immense flow of government student loan cash and have spent it largely on administrators, who for nearly two decades have outnumbered teachers and who, in my view, bear something not totally unlike the relationship to the larger society that Attila the Hun’s armies bore to ancient Rome.

Their main work seems to be regulating premarital sex, suppressing speech and stamping out dissenting thought. As the Wall Street Journal’s Walter Russell Mead points out, this all risks making American higher education less attractive to foreign elites -- a diminution of American soft power but also a risk to a higher education cash cow. (Foreign students pay full-freight tuition.)

Meanwhile, like other left-leaning institutions, higher education has been inflicting great harm on itself. Masking and quarantine regulations have been imposed despite the minimal and now near-zero risk of COVID fatality to people of student age. Speech codes and sexual kangaroo courts make higher education unattractive to many potential applicants.

People have been noticing. As 538.com’s Nate Silver points out, the percentage of young people going to college has not been growing for 10 years, even as total federal and institutional grants and loans have increased. Enrollment declined with the onset of COVID, falling by 1.2 million students between fall 2019 and fall 2021. And it keeps falling, with total higher education enrollment down 4.1% between spring 2021 and spring 2022.

Student loan forgiveness has moral hazard effects. For the

Biden White House, that’s a feature, not a bug. The 2020 Biden campaign received \$64 million from higher education employees, and many people may figure that this loan forgiveness is just the first of many rounds. Among the “highly problematic impacts,” writes Obama Council of Economic Advisers head Jason Furman in a devastating tweet-storm, are “encouraging higher tuition in the future, encouraging more borrowing (and) creating expectations of future debt forgiveness.”

That’s a future, as higher education administrators know, in which the number of 18-year-olds will start dropping precipitously in 2026, reflecting the low birth rates after the 2007-09 recession. Higher education hopes the precedent will be firmly established by then, for continued student loan forgiveness and eternal bailouts for the woke.

DELAND — Stetson football coach Brian Young knew when he added Concordia University from Ann Arbor, Michigan, to the schedule for the start of the 2022 season that his team would have its hands full.

He was right.

After watching the visiting Cardinals, who are ranked sixth in the nation among NAIA teams, march down the field for a touchdown on their opening possession, the rest of the Hatters knew they were in for a battle as well.

The Hatters battled through the early deficit as well as the loss of their starting quarterback to down Concordia 24-14 on Saturday night at Spec Martin Memorial Stadium.

Stetson relied on its defense to slam the door on the Cardinals for the majority of the night, and sophomore quarterback Brady Meitz made the most of his first opportunity

to play by throwing for 350 yards, including a school-record 98-yard touchdown pass to junior Quinton Lane in the second quarter to put the Hatters in front to stay.

Meitz, a native of Cumming, Ga., was forced into action late in the first quarter when graduate starter Alex Piccirilli went down with an injury. He got his feet wet with a five-yard completion to Lane to set up a 36-yard Cameron Gillis field goal with 59 seconds left in the first quarter.

Defensive standout Rassie Littlejohn got the ball back for Stetson early in the second quarter with the first of his two interceptions in the game, but his leaping catch left the Hatters at their own two-yard line.

On the first play after the turnover, Meitz fired deep down the left sideline, hitting Lane in stride in front of the


Standout sophomore running back Taeavon Swint scored on a run to put the hosts on the board shortly before a 1:41 delay with 3:18 left in the first half.

UCF Volleyball wins own UCF Challenge



ORLANDO – In a match that featured 45 ties and 19 lead changes, it was the UCF volleyball team (2-0) that emerged victorious, 3-2 (20-25, 25-18, 28-30, 25-21 and 15-11) against future Big XII foe Kansas State (5-1) in the final of the UCF Challenge at The Venue on Saturday. The crowd no doubt played a factor. Knight Nation was loud from the very beginning and the Venue stayed that way until the very end. “I 100% absolutely fed off of Knight Nation tonight,” Head Coach Todd Dagenais said. “Every emotional swing came from them. Our players fed off of it. Does this match go differently on the road? Maybe. But that’s a match where the crowd really helps you. I commend Knight Nation for coming out. I hope they continue to come out and bring the energy.” The Knights dropped the first set 25-20. It was a closely contested set with 11 lead changes. The Wildcats used a 4-1 run to take the set. The second set was another back-and-forth affair. After a beautiful set from Amber Olson, Abby Hansen ended the set with a kill to knot things up.

The third set was filled with momentum swings and emotional swings. Just when UCF thought they went up two sets to one, a replay review changed the call. After trading points back and forth, Kansas State eventually took the set to go up 2-1. In the fourth set, with their backs against the wall, the Knights were down 10-7. They rattled off a 5-1 run to re-take the lead. Up 19-18, the Knights would take six of the next nine points to clinch the fourth set, sending it into a winner take all race to 15 fifth set. UCF raced out to a 5-2 lead in the fifth set and forced a Kansas State timeout. Kansas State would make a mini-run to make it 8-7, but the Knights would take three of the next four points to take an 11-8 lead forcing another Wildcat timeout. McKenna Melville had a team-high in kills, but none were bigger than her 27th and final kill as it would end the match. Chloe Scheer led the team in digs with 21, and Hansen led the lead in blocks with five. The Knights had started off both their season and their first match in the UCF Challenge in style, defeating the Syracuse Orange in straight sets, 3-0 (28-26, 25-20 and 25-11), on Friday. Melville, who would be named the Tournament Most Valuable Player, had a historic night, recording her 2,000th Kill in the second set. The Eagan, Minnesota, native joins Renata Menchikova (1995-97/2,151) in reaching the historic mark and is likely to break the record later this season. On the night she had 19 kills, seven in the final third set, to go along with two blocks. Hansen (6) along with both Kari Zumach (5) and Emily Wilson (5) led UCF in kills behind

Concordia bench, with the Cardinals’ coaches and players watching helplessly as Lane went the distance for the first touchdown of the season, and the first in Meitz collegiate career. Stetson pushed its lead to 17-7 at half-time after junior Jalen Leary capped a nine-play drive on the next Hatters possession, scoring from two yards out. It was another interception, this one by sophomore David Stubbs, in the third quarter that set up the final Stetson points.

Following the interception, sophomore Kaderis Roberts blasted through the right side of the line and down the sideline for a 42-yard run to the Concordia four. Three plays later, Leary headed for the goal line, but officials determined he fumbled before crossing into the end zone. Fortunately, Lane was on the spot to recover for the touchdown. Concordia made the final score a little closer with a late touchdown that got help from a pass interference call and a roughing the passer penalty. Cardinals’ quarterback Gavin Brooks made a perfect throw to Harmon Devries over solid coverage for the score. Overall, the Stetson defense allowed just 311 yards of total offense, with 139 of those coming on the two scoring drives. The Hatters had four interceptions, including one by Ja’Veon Ensley, and had two sacks among six tackles for loss. Meitz led the Stetson offense, completing 26-of-38 passes for 350 yards as the two Hatters quarterbacks combined to throw for 384 yards. Lane was on the receiving end of 10 of those passes for 130 yards while sophomore Nazevia Burriss had nine receptions. Overall, 12 different Hatters caught at least one pass. Stetson added 134 rush yards to the offensive total, giving the Hatters 503 yards of total offense. Davion Maxwell led the Stetson defense with eight tackles, including 1.5 for loss. 

Judge grants Trump bid for special master in document search

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a legal victory for former President Donald Trump, a federal judge on Monday granted his request for a special master to review documents seized by the FBI from his Florida home and temporarily halted the Justice Department's use of the records for investigative purposes.

The decision by U.S. District Judge Aileen Cannon authorizes an outside legal expert to review the records taken during the Aug. 8 search and to weed out from the rest of the investigation any that might be protected by claims of attorney-client privilege or executive privilege. Some of those records may ultimately be returned to Trump, but the judge put off a ruling on that question.

The order came despite the strenuous objections of the Justice Department, which said a special master was not necessary in part because officials had already completed their review of potentially privileged documents. The department said Monday that it was reviewing the decision but did not indicate if and when it might appeal.

The order almost certainly slows the pace of the department's investigation into the presence of top-secret information at Mar-a-Lago, particularly given the judge's directive that the Justice Department may not for the moment use any of the seized materials as part of its investigation into the storage of government secrets at the Florida property. The injunction is in place until the yet-to-be-

named special master completes his or her work, or until "further court order."

"The Court is mindful that restraints on criminal prosecutions are disfavored, but finds that these unprecedented circumstances call for a brief pause to allow for neutral, third-party review to ensure a just process with adequate safeguards," Cannon, a Trump appointee, wrote in her 24-page order.

Even so, it is not clear that the decision will present a long-term impediment to the investigation's progress or significantly affect investigative decisions or the ultimate outcome of the probe. And a separate assessment by the U.S. intelligence community of the risk posed by the apparent mishandling of classified records will continue under the judge's order.

"While this is a victory for the former President, it is by no means an overwhelming win for him," David Weinstein, a Florida criminal defense lawyer and former Justice Department prosecutor, said in an email. "While it is a setback for the government, it is also not a devastating loss for them."

He noted, for instance, that the judge did not immediately order the seized documents returned to Trump or suppress any of the evidence.

Justice Department spokesman Anthony Coley said Monday that "the United States is examining the opinion and will consider appropriate next steps in the ongoing litigation." A lawyer for Trump did not respond to a request for comment.

cause it is something that won't end tonight. It will continue much farther than tonight," Equal Ground President Jasmine Burney-Clark said.

Denise Burton from League of Woman Voters of Florida explained that many redistricting changes are swept under the rug and go unnoticed by voters because important terms like gerrymandering, packing, and cracking are not common knowledge.

The meeting invited Seminole County residents to the Sanford Civic Center to teach them about the history of congressional district 7, highlight the changes that have been made, and discuss the next steps for making a difference in the community.

Maps of congressional district 7 were presented to represent how Florida lawmakers are creating districts that skew the votes in their favor.

The previous congressional district 7 map was made in 2015 and included Seminole County and overlapped into part of Orange

County. After recent updates, congressional district 7 now includes Seminole and Volusia County, excluding Orange County.

Burney-Clark used specific data and statistics to demonstrate how the changes increase the percent of white voters in congressional district 7 to 64.59% and decreases the percent of Hispanic and Black voters to 28.32%. The change was deemed as highly unnecessary and obstructive by the data shown.

The advocacy groups found that this redistricting is in violation of Article III, Section 20 of the Florida Constitution for diminishing minorities' ability to elect the candidate of their choice and favoring a specific political party.

When it comes to taking action, these advocacy groups are wasting no time. After winning their previous lawsuit against the redistricting changes, the nonprofits are teaming up to sue Governor Ron DeSantis for the discriminatory violation against minority groups and political parties.

"Everyone in the state of Florida must abide by the law including the governor," Burney-Clark emphasized.

The main goal of the ini-

tiative is to catch the attention of state lawmakers to ensure that every Florida citizen receives equal recognition.

The effort does not stop there. The advocacy groups want to create a spark in the community and promote citizens to take action with them. Florida residents are strongly encouraged to spread the word and vote. While Florida is home to 14 million active voters, only 3.5 million votes were cast during the primary election.

Jamil Davis from Black Voters Matter stressed that "we have the people and the power to draw the lines" if the community gets involved and casts their votes.

Davis explained the different ways to vote and emphasized important deadlines. The last day to register to vote is Oct. 11 and the last day to request a vote by mail ballot is Oct. 29. Early voting in Seminole County begins on Oct. 24 and goes through Nov. 6. Nov. 8 is the day to head to the polls for the Midterm election.


