MOMENTS IN TIME

* On Jan. 5, 1914, Henry Ford introduced a revolutionary pay deal of \$5 per day wages for all of his employees. When asked about it, he told reporters that he wanted his workers to earn enough to be able to afford to buy a Ford motor car.

* On Jan. 3, 1938, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, who contracted polio at age 39, founded the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, later renamed the March of Dimes Foundation. The moniker came courtesy of comedian Eddie Cantor, who said in a donations appeal: "Nearly everyone can send in a dime, or several dimes. However, it takes only 10 dimes to make a dollar, and if a million people send only one dime, the total will be \$100,000."

* On Jan. 2, 1941, The Andrews Sisters recorded "Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy" for Decca Records, about a Chicago trumpeter drafted into the Army in World War II who shakes up "Reveille" with his masterful licks. Originally intended for Lou Costello to perform in the comedy "Buck Privates," it was reworked for The Andrews Sisters, who introduced it in the film.

* On Jan. 6, 1973, the 1939 Mercedes-Benz 770k sedan that Hitler was said to have used in a parade march was

sold to Earl Clark at an auction for \$153,000. Clark planned to exhibit the vehicle at his Dutch Wonderland Amusement Park in Lancaster, Pennsylvania.

* On Jan. 7, 1981, truck driver Peter Sutcliffe admitted to being the "Yorkshire Ripper," who killed 13 women in northern England over five years. Sutcliffe was caught on Jan. 2 after being stopped by the police with Olivia Reivers, a prostitute, and was arrested for having fitted his car with fake license plates.

* On Jan. 4, 2012, Saudi Arabia's King Abdullah decreed that men could no longer sell female underwear in lingerie shops. The country previously allowed only men to work as shopkeepers, but after female customers complained that they made the women uncomfortable, a new law allowed women to take their place.

* On Jan. 8, 2014, Mexican officials found two gray whale calves in a lagoon. The case was even more unusual because they were conjoined. Though found alive, the whales died soon after, and samples were taken for scientists to study their rarity.

Pelé remembered for transcending soccer around the world

NEW YORK (AP) — Pelé was remembered for a life beyond the field, for transcending the sport of soccer and becoming perhaps the most well-known person on Earth.

"Before Pelé, '10' was just a number," current Brazil forward Neymar wrote following the soccer great's death Thursday at the age of 82. "That line, beautiful, is incomplete. I would say that before Pelé soccer was just a sport. Pelé changed everything. He transformed soccer into art, entertainment. He gave voice to the poor, to the Black and above all he gave Brazil visibility. Soccer and Brazil elevated their standing thanks to the King! He is gone, but his magic will endure."

Pelé scored 12 goals in 14 World Cup matches and is the only three-time world champion, winning titles in 1958, 1962 and 1970. His death was especially impactful for generations of Brazilian players who idolized him.

"Today Brazil waves goodbye to one of its most illustrious children," wrote Romario, a 1994 World Cup champion who used Pelé's full name in his post. "Edson Arantes do Nascimento made the world bow to his talent and took Brazilian soccer to the altar of gods. Throughout his life, Pelé inspired generations of athletes and deserves every tribute."

Ronaldo, who led Brazil to a fifth World Cup title in 2002, described Pelé as "Unique. Genius. Skilled. Creative. Perfect. Unmatched."

"What a privilege to come after you, my friend," Ronaldo wrote. "Your talent is a school through which every player should go. Your legacy transcends generations. And that is the way you will continue to live."

Pelé was a revered sports figure to a level probably not comparable to any athlete other than Muhammad Ali. As comfortable mingling with heads of states and celebrities as he was evading defenders, Pelé made an impact in capitals across continents.

"As one of the most recognizable athletes in the world, he understood the power of sports to bring people together," former U.S. President Barack Obama wrote.

President Joe Biden tweeted: "For a sport that brings the world together like no other, Pelé's rise from humble beginnings to soccer legend is a story of what is possible."

Pelé's greatest impact was in Brazil, a unifying figure celebrated during the 2014 World Cup.

"I saw Pelé play, live, at Pacaembu and Morumbi (stadiums)," former Brazil President and current President-elect Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva wrote. "Play, no. I saw Pelé give a show. Because when he got the ball he always did something

special, which often ended in a goal. ... Few Brazilians took the name of our country as far as he did. As different from Portuguese as one's language was, foreigners from the four corners of the planet soon found a way to pronounce the magic word: 'Pelé.'"

For a half-century, people who knew the name of only one soccer player knew Pelé.

"He made people dream and continued to do that with generations and generations of lovers of our sport," France coach Didier Deschamps said in a statement. "Who, as a child, didn't dream of being Pelé? ... Pelé was the alliance of beauty and efficiency. His talent and his list of achievements will stay engraved in our minds forever."

French soccer star Kylian Mbappé tied Pelé for sixth in career World Cup goals with a hat trick in this month's loss to Argentina in the final. Four years ago, Mbappé became only the second teenager — after Pelé — to score a goal in a World Cup final.

"The king of football has left us but his legacy will never be forgotten," Mbappé wrote.

"Pelé not only filled football stadiums with exhilaration but he filled hearts and homes with hope and the knowledge that adversity was surmountable," South African President Cyril Ramaphosa said in a statement Friday. "His endurance and impact on the field of play inspired the resilience with which Pelé worked for peace and justice globally."

When Pelé's condition worsened last month during the World Cup in Qatar, get well messages were flashed on the sides of buildings in Doha. The English Football Association lit Wembley Stadium's arch in Brazil's colors on Wednesday night. FIFA, soccer's governing body, changed its website's homepage to photos of Pelé with a black background.

"Pelé did things that no other player would even dream of," FIFA president Gianni Infantino wrote. "The sight of him punching the air in celebration is one of the most iconic in our sport, and is etched into our history. In fact, because televised football was still in his infancy at the time, we only saw small glimpses of what he was capable of."

When Pelé played for the New York Cosmos of the North American Soccer League from 1975-77, he helped spark soccer's rise in the United States, leading to the nation hosting the World Cup in 1994.

"Pelé was truly a remarkable figure — on and off the field," said FIFA Council member Sunil Gulati, a former U.S. Soccer Federation president. "The world has lost a once in a lifetime sportsman who leaves an extraordinary legacy."

Radiofrequency Ablation Considerably Lessens Back Pain

DEAR DR. ROACH: I suffered a lower back injury in 2001, with crushed and bulging discs in the L2, L3, L4 and L5 vertebrae. After over a year of physical therapy and drugs, my pain doctor tried an epidural injection, which did not work, and then suggested I try something new at that time called a radiofrequency ablation (also called a lumbar facet rhizotomy). It's done as an outpatient surgery and may have to be repeated.

I've done so many that I opt for no anesthesia. It works great; I even get up and drive myself home! I've learned to limit my activities, so as to not cause more damage due to my disabled pain receptors.

I have been pain- and drug-free for almost 20 years. The treatment usually lasts nine to 14 months, and when I feel the nerves starting to fire again and cause me pain, I just schedule the procedure and have them ablated again.

Whenever I see somebody walking funny due to back pain, I mention this procedure to them. Several of them have come back and thanked me for saying something.

Doctors don't seem to promote this procedure, and I don't understand why. It's clearly another option besides surgery and addictive medication. It's been a win-win for me, as opposed to surgery.

Please help promote this wonderful yet "unknown" procedure. I'm still living an active normal life at 64, 20 years after I was told I may end up in a wheelchair. -- M.T.

ANSWER: Radiofrequency ablation of the nerves in the back has been used since the 1970s in people with in-

tractable back pain. The procedure uses an electrode that heats the nerves in the facet joints of the back, stopping pain conduction. This is done when the treating physician is sure that the pain is coming from these particular nerves, called the lumbar medial branch nerves. This procedure is not appropriate for all types of back pain. Typically, the physician will perform a block using an injection, and if this is successful, but short-lived (as is often the case), a radiofrequency ablation is considered.

When it works, a year of relief is typical (sometimes shorter or, for a few, up to three years) before the nerve fibers regenerate, at which point the procedure can be repeated. Burning or numbness around the injection site is the most common adverse effect.

Effectiveness rates in the published literature range from 50% to nearly 100% in small trials of carefully chosen subjects. However, a large randomized trial of this procedure in subjects who were being treated with an exercise program and psychological support did not show a significant improvement in pain or function.

I agree with you that this procedure is safer than surgery, and while I'm glad it's worked for you, the evidence of benefit from the highest-quality trials is lacking.

COVID Only Accelerated the Blue State Exodus

Where are Americans moving? And where, to make things more specific, have Americans been moving since the sudden onset of COVID lockdowns? Answers to these questions come from the annual Christmastime release of the Census Bureau's estimates of the population of the 50 states and the District of Columbia as of last July.

Comparing those numbers to the decennial census count of April 1, 2020, just when COVID restrictions were put in place, provides a view of how Americans moved, or didn't, during the pandemic and post-pandemic 27 months.

Domestic out-migration -- the number of U.S. residents leaving the state minus those entering -- in 2020-22 was 3.3% of the 2020 population in New York state and 2.2% in Illinois and California. These are staggering numbers, far higher than any other state. The losses are undoubtedly concentrated in central cities, as suggested by the District of Columbia, where pre-COVID population was growing but in 2020-22 was down 3.8%.

Not coincidentally, these states have some of the nation's highest state and local tax rates

and high housing costs due to restrictive regulations. That has spurred out-migration for more than a decade. The post-COVID woes -- lockdowns and masking mandates, the post-George Floyd upward zoom in violent crime and the spread of homeless encampments -- have sparked a larger exodus that seems unlikely to be fully reversed.

What else is striking? Looking at the map, you see domestic out-migration from all five states touching the Pacific Ocean, which was once the scenic promised land for many people. And you see domestic in-migration along Interstate 15 to Nevada, though it's longer leading the nation in growth as in the 2000s, to heavily Mormon Utah and north to Idaho and Montana.

There's also been movement eastward, along Interstate 10 to Arizona and Texas. The domestic in-migration into these five Mountain States (413,000) and Texas (475,000) almost precisely matches the domestic out-migration from California (871,000).

Turning to the east side of the map, you see enormous growth in the states along Interstates 95 and 85 south of metro Washington and Richmond. In 2020-22, while the na-

tional population grew by 0.6%, North Carolina was up 2.5%, South Carolina 3.2%, Georgia 1.9% and Florida up by 3.3%.

Domestic in-migration in these four states (1,128,000) comes close to matching the combined out-migration from New York and the I-95 states from Virginia north to Massachusetts, plus Illinois (1,285,000).

Florida has been a particular standout. Its domestic in-migration (622,000) almost exactly matches New York's domestic out-migration (664,000). Total 2020-22 domestic in-migration into Florida was 2.9% of its 2020 population, a rate exceeded only by the much smaller states of Idaho, Montana and South Carolina.

The migration along these Interstate corridors is moving in the opposite directions of movements in the wartime and postwar decades from the 1940s to the 1970s. Then you saw substantial migrations of both Black and white Southerners up to the great cities of the Northeast -- Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia, New York -- and to Chicago, Detroit and Cleveland in the industrial Midwest.

Similarly, wartime industries and postwar growth led people

from Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana to the fabled promised land of California and the Pacific Northwest.

Those migrations were larger in absolute numbers and much larger in percentage terms than what we see today. Which makes the really large movements today -- out of New York, Chicago and coastal California, into Florida and Texas -- stand out so vividly.

For in much of the country, you see something like stasis, people staying in place, with birth rates lower than at any other time in history and with more deaths than births in 25 of the 50 states. In eight Southern states, outside Texas and the South Atlantic, and 11 Mid-

western states outside Illinois, the population was up only 0.2% and domestic in-migration was 0.1%.

It should be obvious now that the old cliché about the Snow Belt emptying out into the Sun Belt is obsolete. Instead, you see movement from the supposedly idyllic Pacific coast north on I-15 and east on I-10 to Mountain States and Texas. You see an even larger shift from metro Washington to metro Boston southward on I-95 and I-85 to the Carolinas, Georgia and most of all to Florida.

In a generally prosperous and tolerant society -- more prosperous and tolerant than the tenor of Twitter debate, in

my view -- it takes a lot to get people to move. What the census numbers show is that COVID lockdowns, piled atop high taxes and restrictive housing regulations, got several million people on the move in the 27 months from April 2020 to July 2022.

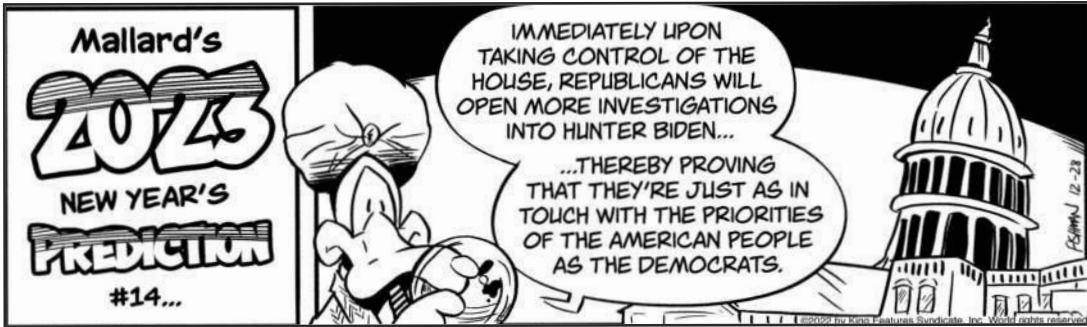
Those who moved are likely to be better off, but the self-damage inflicted on the places they left will be hard, in some respects impossible, to repair.

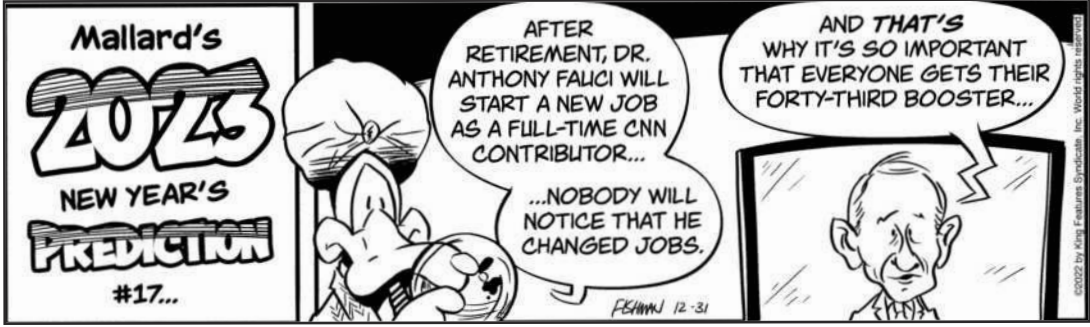

The amount of benefits your survivors receive depends on your lifetime earnings. The higher your earnings, the higher their benefits. That's why it's important to make sure your earnings history is correct in our records. You can do this by

creating a personal my Social Security account at www.ssa.gov/myaccount. A personal my Social Security account is secure and gives you immediate access to your earnings records, benefit estimates, and Social Security Statement.

You may also want to visit our Survivors Benefits page at www.ssa.gov/benefits/survivors. This page can help you understand your and your family's Social Security protections as you plan your financial future.

Chandler & Gizzy blessed by Local Angels

Not all heroes wear capes. For Lake Mary resident Anita Chandler and her dog Gizzy, their heroes live right next door.

Chandler is retired and spends most of her days at home in an apartment community called Station House. Back in 2020, at the height of the pandemic, she began searching for an emotional support animal to keep her company and decrease her Lupus flare ups. She turned to a friend who helped her find a two year old, seven pound Shih Tzu named Gizzy.

Gizzy quickly gained popularity within the Station House community. He spends his days greeting residents and making sure everything is in tip top shape with the maintenance staff. When Gizzy is ready for a nap, he heads to the leasing manager's office where he has a bed specially made just for him. Chandler said, he is so well known around the property that "he's like the building mascot."

One day, Gizzy had a fatal emergency. After a playdate with a neighbor's dog, Gizzy got sick. Chandler anxiously called the neighboring dog's owner for help bringing Gizzy to the

hospital.

"I called Wayne (who I had known an entire night) and he came over and was my guide to getting Gizzy to a hospital and not coding myself. It was so embarrassing because it was like we were a couple and I had gone into labor," Chandler said.

At the hospital, Chandler found out that Gizzy had something wrapped around his intestines and needed emergency surgery that would cost \$4,800. Chandler was forced to turn down the surgery due to the steep price. The only option left was to put Gizzy down or send him to a rescue.

"I texted a Leasing Agent Catara, Wayne and Tina and came home to die. And then Meghan found out," Chandler said.

As soon as the leasing manager, Meghan Kimber, heard about Gizzy's condition, she knew she had to do something to help. Kimber put everything else to the side and called the community together to raise enough money to pay for Gizzy's procedure.

"Instead of Gizzy being euthanized or sent to a rescue, a network of angels, strangers and friends, banded together and said, 'not on our watch,'" Chandler said.

Gizzy had touched so many lives that everyone, including current and past residents, contributed to the cause.

A week later, Chandler got the surprise of her life. Gizzy was delivered to her door all fixed up and ready to get back to his regular mischief.

Chandler was beyond grateful for the community's efforts. They have had her back time after time, and she feels blessed to have them by her side. She added, "I always go out of my way to be kind to people, no matter what. Depression is frightening and real and we all need to be kinder to each other."

Dietitian - Gluten Sensitivity, Celiac & Wheat Allergy



Dear Dietitian,
I've been experiencing a lot of digestive problems like stomach cramping and bloating. My friend has celiac disease and thinks I may have it, too. I have an appointment with my doctor and have been reading up on celiac disease. I don't understand the differences between gluten sensitivity, celiac disease, and wheat allergy. Can you help?

Dear Susan,
It can be very disruptive to have a digestive problem, and I'm glad you are taking the proper steps to resolve this. First, gluten is a protein found in wheat, barley, rye, and triticale (a hybrid of wheat and rye). It is also used as a binder in some products, such as soy sauce, ice cream, and hot dogs. Binders are used in food processing to thicken and improve the product's texture.

Celiac disease is an autoimmune, genetic disorder that affects as many as three million Americans. It is caused by a reaction to gliadin, a component of gluten. The body's response to gliadin causes a flattening of the villi, the fingerlike projections in the small intestines that facilitate the passage of fluids and nutrients. This damage, in turn, results in the malabsorption of nutrients.

Symptoms of celiac disease include diarrhea, abdominal cramping and bloating, and possible weight loss from malabsorption. One may also experience headaches and joint pain. A physician will perform a blood test for specific antibodies. If these are found, the next step is an intestinal biopsy to look for damage to the villi, providing a definitive diagnosis of celiac disease.

Gluten sensitivity, sometimes called non-celiac gluten sensitivity, is not well-defined in the medical community, and there are no blood tests to diagnose this condition. Symptoms produced after consuming gluten are similar to those with celiac disease, but damage to the small intestine is not found. It is usually diagnosed after ruling out celiac disease and wheat allergy.

Wheat allergy is sometimes confused with celiac disease, but these conditions differ. With a wheat allergy, the body produces antibodies against the proteins in wheat. In celiac disease, the body responds to a specific protein, gluten, and the body's reaction is different than a typical allergic reaction.

A wheat allergy occurs when the body mistakes wheat as harmful. Symptoms occur after eating wheat and sometimes when inhaling wheat flour and may include itching, hives, diarrhea, and even anaphylaxis. Anaphylaxis is a severe, life-threatening allergic reaction that requires immediate medical attention.

If you are sensitive to gluten, you are also sensitive to wheat. However, if you are allergic to wheat, you will react to other components of wheat, not just gluten. Therefore, you need to be sure all the products you buy are labeled "wheat-free" and "gluten-free."

It is important to note that certain nutrients may lack in gluten-free and wheat-free diets. While wheat flour is enriched with nutrients that have been stripped during processing, gluten-free manufacturers are not required to enrich or fortify their products. Consult a Registered Dietitian Nutritionist to design a healthy meal plan that works for you.

2 and should be treated as a last resort. To contact Tow-2-Go call (855) 2-TOW-2-GO or (855) 286-9246. AAA has offered Tow to Go during major holidays for nearly 25 years. During that time, AAA has removed more than 25,000 impaired drivers from the road. How does it work? When someone calls Two to Go, AAA dispatches a tow truck to transport the would-be impaired driver and their vehicle to a safe location within a 10-mile radius. The service is free for anyone, yet AAA asks that it be treated as a last resort. Nationwide, AAA expects this to be the third-busiest

year for holiday travel (state-specific newsroom link) on the roads in history. Crash data from NHTSA proves that combining cocktails with crowded roads can be deadly. It was recently disclosed that in the first half of 2022, there were over 1 billion recalls across the country of products that we buy. That’s billion, with a “b.” Depending on the level of the recall, some of them can be extremely serious ... even deadly. How do we know whether we missed an announcement about a product we own? We can go online to Recalls.gov and look. They cover everything from sports equipment to electronics, household items and more. You can search on that site by date, the type of hazard and the country where an item was manufactured. I searched for clothing. It was

shocking to see a dozen children’s items recalled for fire hazard. And the padded rolling desk chair with the legs that can break. And the smoke and carbon monoxide alarms that don’t work. And laundry detergent with dangerous bacteria in it. To be notified about recalls, go to www.cpsc.gov/Newsroom/S subscribe and sign up for the free email alerts. If you need to keep up with recalls and alerts for a vehicle, go online to www.nhtsa.gov/recalls. You’ll need the vehicle identification number (VIN), which can be found on the door jamb behind the driver door. Or you can search by year, make and model of your vehicle.

For the very latest vehicle recalls, Kelley Blue Book also has them listed on the front page at www.kbb.com/recall. Food is another area where we need to keep up with any recalls and warnings. Search for “FDA Recalls, Market Withdrawals, & Safety Alerts” for the latest information on cosmetics, veterinary items, medical devices and food. Right on the front page was a list of alerts for products with undeclared wheat, potential listeria, salmonella and more. In the medical devices it was disturbing to learn of rust on needles. You’ll see a link there to sign up for alert emails. Let’s make 2023 our year to be aware and safe.

VETERANS POST:

In a matter of weeks, we’ll have a new year when, ideally, we’ll have more control over our lives. Here are two things we can all do to start with a clean slate. Clean out your medicine cabinet. Pull out expired drugs (both prescription and over the counter) and go on a hunt for a location to drop them off. Some towns have only one drug disposal day per year, but other towns keep a machine in their police department to drop off drugs anytime. Ask if your local Department of Veterans Affairs medical facility has disposal. Or you can go to https://apps.deadiversion.usdoj.gov/pub-dispsearch to search for a controlled substance public disposal location near you. Whatever you do, don’t put them down the sink or toilet. Organize your military files and information. If the worst should suddenly happen to you, don’t add to your relatives’ grief by making them dig for your information or wonder what your final wishes would be. Here are some of the things you’ll need to gather up: -- Your DD214 or service equivalent. If you

don’t have one on hand, send for it. -- Your birth certificate. -- Your final will. If you don’t have one, now is the time to make an appointment for January with an attorney. Call the nearest military base and ask for Legal Aid to see if you qualify for a free will. --Any life insurance policies, copies of marriage certificates and divorce decrees, and a list of all the places you served while on active duty along with the dates. Download or send away for the following: -- Application for United States Flag for Burial Purposes (VA Form 27-2008) -- Claim for One Sum Payment Government Life Insurance (VA Form 29-4125e) -- Application for Standard Government Headstone or Marker (VA Form 40-1330) Print out the Federal Benefits for Veterans Dependents and Survivors book or send away for it by calling the VA (800-827-1000) and add that to your stack. Once you’ve gathered all this information (a box on a closet shelf will be enough), make sure someone knows where it is. Remember: Once it’s done, it’s done.

calls were made reporting gunfire. After a search of the apartment and statements from relatives and neighbors, police eventually charged Jonathan Jiles, 36, with the second-degree murder of his wife Brandi Jiles. Jonathan’s newly released arrest affidavit revealed what led them to this conclusion. Initially, Brandi and Jonathan told police there was a break-in, and that was how Brandi was shot. Jonathan said he left to buy cigarettes, but when he returned the front door was open and Brandi was sitting in the hallway with a gunshot wound. However according to the arrest affidavit, Brandi’s sister told police she believed Jonathan was responsible for the shooting and said that Brandi was talking about leav-

ing the relationship. Brandi’s sister also told police that Jonathan had physically threatened Brandi before, including shooting a firearm into their couch once during an argument. The sister also noted that Brandi had sent a picture of a “large” gun to her, stating it was Jonathan’s. Because of Brandi’s concerns, the sister told police, Brandi had installed a Ring camera - one that is typically used on people’s front doors - on the interior of her home. The affidavit also notes that despite a handgun belonging to Brandi being found on the kitchen table, no larger guns were located in or around the apartment. Because of bullet casings found around Brandi’s body, police knew it was a rifle-styled firearm that shot her. Eventually, once police were able to obtain a search warrant, they located the Ring camera in a grassy area outside of the apartment and were able to look at Brandi’s

phone. Her phone had a Ring notification at 4:30 a.m., when the shooting occurred. The affidavit read: “The Ring notification contained a still image of the recording at that time, which captured a black male suspect holding a rifle inside the apartment near the front door. The suspect is captured wearing the boxers, black jeans below his buttocks, has visible tattoos on his right arm and chest, and has facial hair on his chin. The suspect appears to match the identity of Jonathan, as he is wearing the same boxers as captured on the Ring footage, has the same style of tattoos in the same location, and same facial features.” Based on this evidence, Jiles was charged with second-degree murder and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon. Because of the drugs found in the apartment, Jonathan was also charged with trafficking cocaine, trafficking MDMA, and trafficking marijuana.

UCF football falls to Duke in Military Bowl

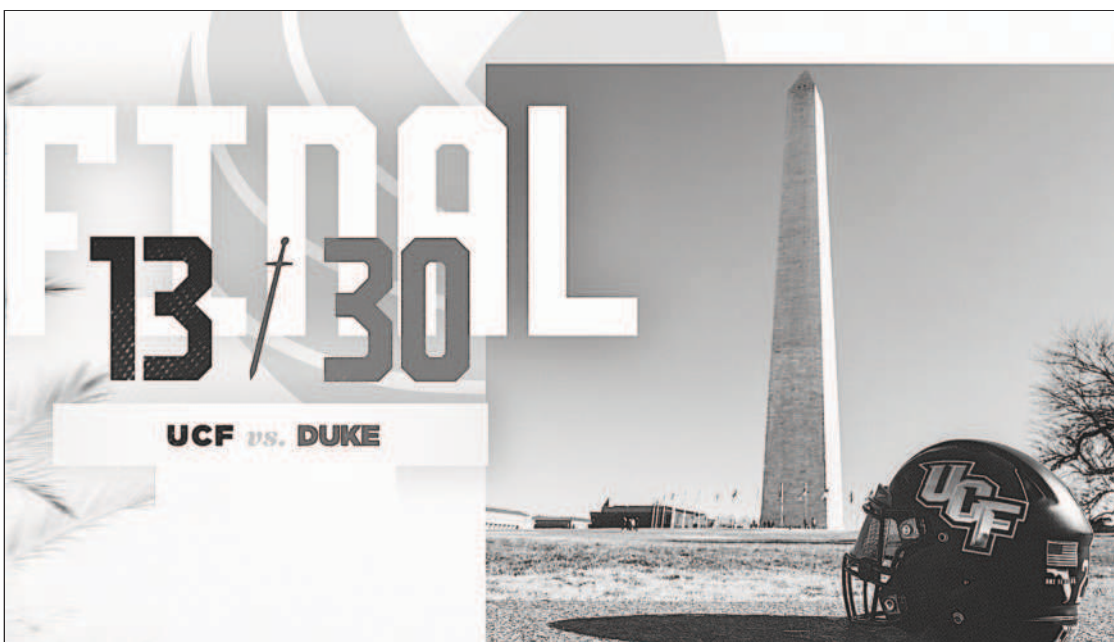

ANNAPOLIS, Md. — In its first appearance in the Military Bowl presented by Peraton, the UCF football team was defeated by Duke, 30-13, Wednesday afternoon at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium.

The Knights came up short of achieving their ninth 10-win season in program history, as UCF finishes the 2022 season with a 9-5 overall record while Duke concludes its campaign with a 9-4 mark.

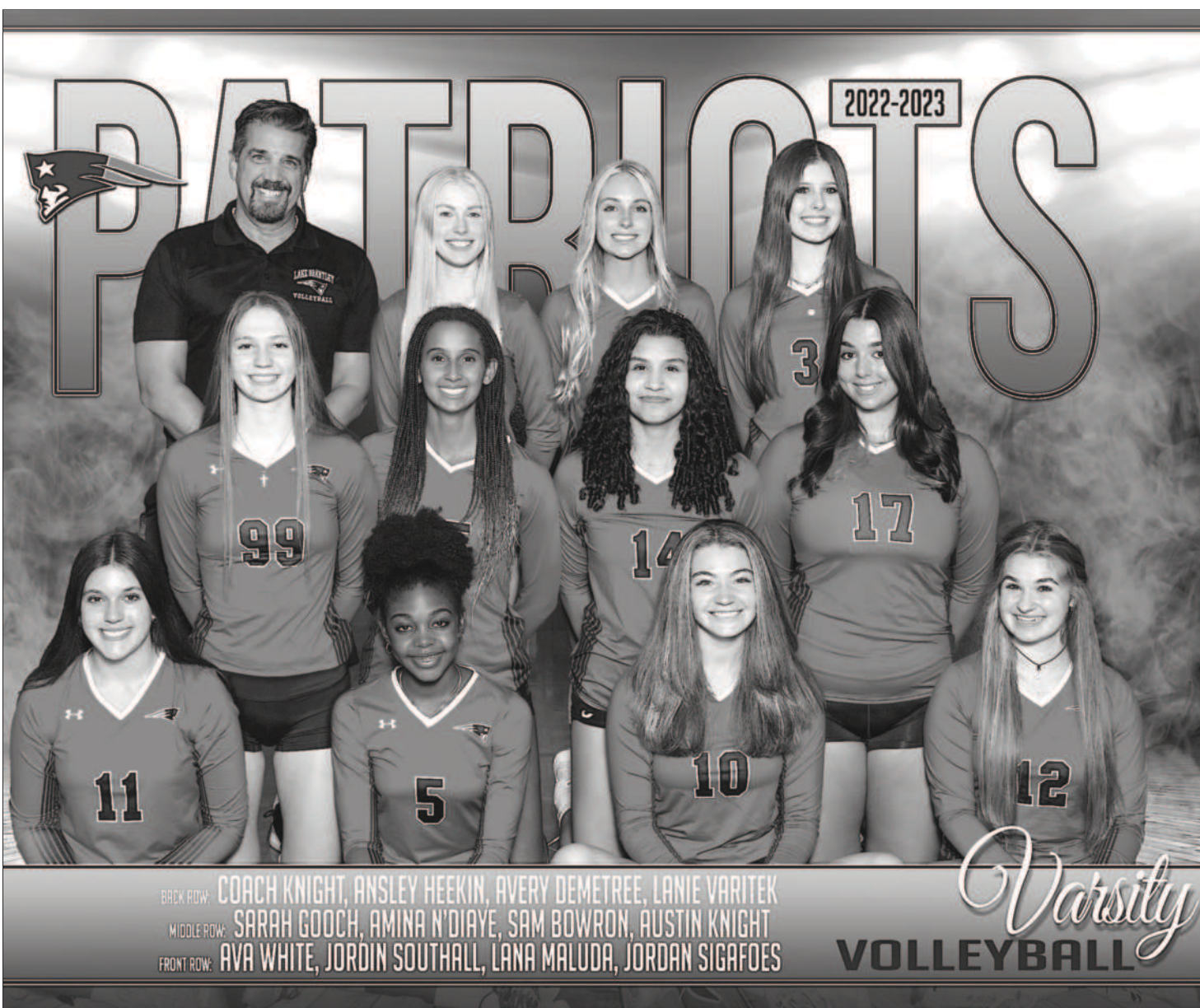

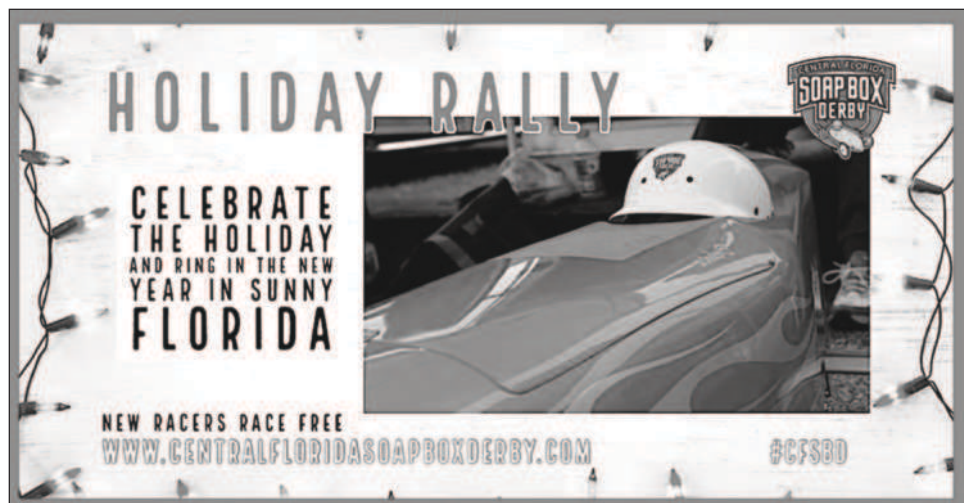

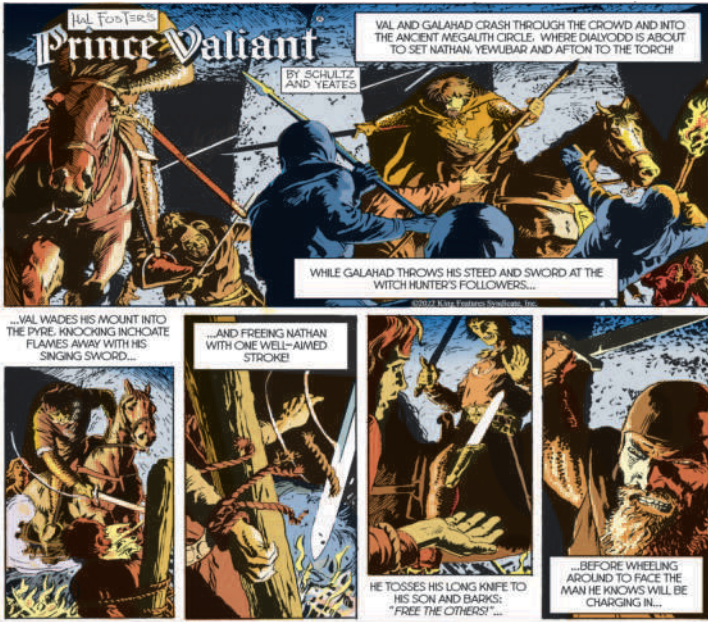
