Made in the USA? Proposed rule clarifies grocery meat labels

AP-Shoppers could soon find it easier to tell if those grocery store steaks or pork chops were really “Made in the USA.” Federal agriculture officials on Monday released new requirements that would allow labels on meat, poultry or eggs to use that phrase — or “Product of USA” — only if they come from animals “born, raised, slaughtered and processed in the United States.” That’s a sharp change from current policy, which allows voluntary use of such labels on products from animals that have been imported from a foreign country and slaughtered in the U.S., but also on meat that’s been imported and repackaged or further processed.

Imports of beef from countries including Australia, Canada and Brazil, for instance, account for about 12% of the total consumed in the U.S. Overall, imports of red meat and poultry account for less than 6%, while imports of eggs account for less than half of 1%.

U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack said the proposed rule would better align the labels with consumers’ views. A survey commissioned by the USDA found that nearly two-thirds of shoppers believed that a “Product of USA” label meant that most or all meat production steps occurred in the U.S.

“There’s obviously a disconnect between what the consumers’ understandings and expectations are and what the label currently is,” Vilsack said

in an interview.

About 12% of all meat, poultry and egg products sold in the country carry the U.S.-origin labels, USDA officials said.

The label change was first proposed by President Joe Biden in 2021 and was included last year in a series of steps to bolster the U.S. meat and poultry supply chain.

The USDA survey, conducted last summer, included a nationally representative sample of more than 4,800 American adults who do the grocery shopping for their families and who bought beef or pork in the previous six months. More than 40% of the shoppers said they look for the USA label when buying meat.

The rule was praised by consumer advocates and representatives for U.S. ranchers and farmers, including the U.S. Cattlemen’s Association, which petitioned the USDA for the label change in 2019.

“The proposed rule finally closes this loophole by accurately defining what these voluntary origin claims mean,” said Justin Tupper, the group’s president. “If it says ‘Made in the USA,’ then it should be from cattle that have only known USA soil. Consumers have the right to know where their food comes from, full stop.”

Thomas Gremillion, director of food policy for the Consumer Federation of America, said the change is a “small but important step” that should have been made long ago.

Under the current rule, Gremillion noted, a cow can be raised in Mexico under that country’s regulations for feed and medications, then shipped across the border and slaughtered that same day to make ground beef and steaks that qualify as “Product of USA.”

Carrie Balkcom, executive director of the trade group American Grassfed Association, said the existing rule also penalizes small domestic producers.

“It’s expensive to raise grass-raised animals from scratch,” Balkcom said. “And these large producers were importing these animals raised elsewhere and just repackaging them and then kind of coasting on the ‘Made in the USA’ label.”

An official with the North American Meat Institute, which represents large firms that process most of the meat and poultry products sold in the U.S., said she hadn’t seen details of the new rule. But Sarah Little added, the group “opposes overly prescriptive labeling requirements that will raise prices for consumers.”

Another industry group, the National Cattlemen’s Beef Association, has called for eliminating the voluntary USA labels entirely and allowing for strict labeling standards verified by the USDA.

The voluntary labeling rules are different from country-of-origin labels, known as COOL, which required companies to disclose where animals supplying beef and pork are born, raised and slaughtered.

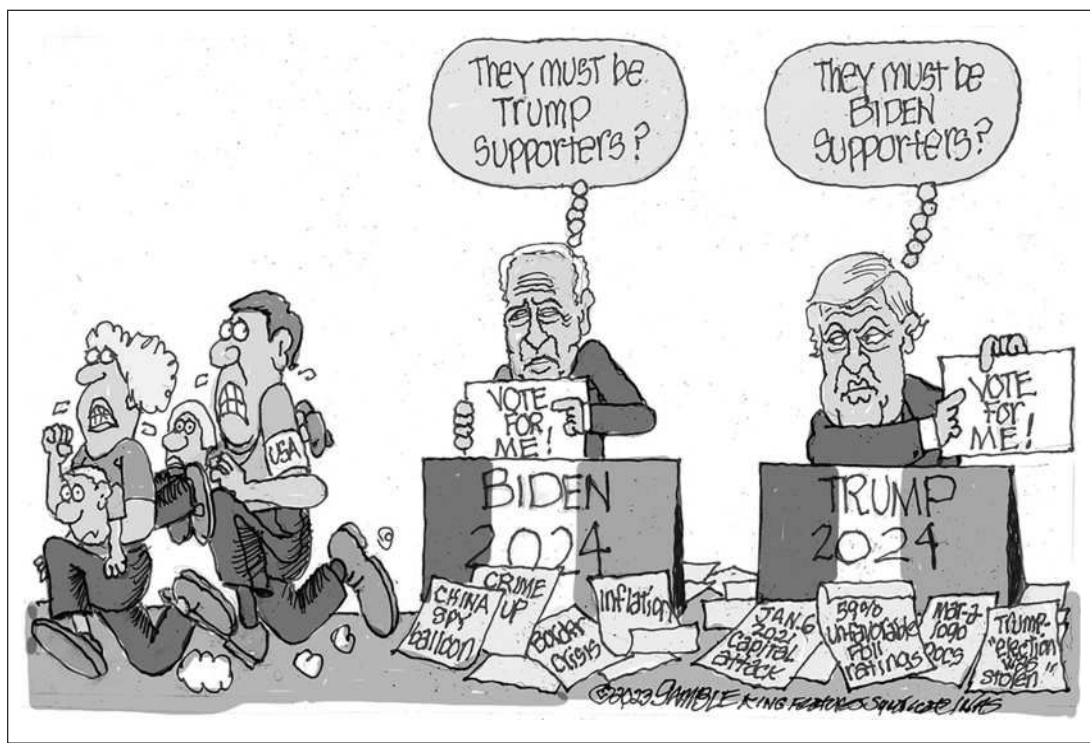

The Greatest Cover-up in Human History

First, it was supposedly a conspiracy theory. Then, it was banned. Finally, it was true. The so-called "lab leak" theory of the origins of COVID-19 -- the theory that COVID-19 originated in at the Wuhan Institute of Virology and then was unintentionally loosed -- was always the most probable explanation for the outbreak of the deadly virus. After all, as Jon Stewart correctly joked in 2021, "Oh, my God, there's a novel respiratory coronavirus overtaking Wuhan, China. What do we do?" 'Oh, you know who we could ask? The Wuhan novel respiratory coronavirus lab.' The disease is the same name as the lab. That's just a little too weird, don't you think?" But for well over a year, it was considered verboten to mention the lab leak theory. When Senator Tom Cotton, R-Ark., posited the possibility of a lab leak in February 2020, he was roundly mocked by the media. The New York Times headlined, "Senator Tom Cotton Repeats Fringe Theory of Coronavirus Origins." Scientific American headlined -- in March 2022! -- "The Lab-Leak Hypothesis Made It Harder for Scientists to Seek the Truth." Facebook actively quashed attempts to disseminate the theory; Dr. Anthony Fauci went on national televi-

sion and downplayed the theory. Why? Two reasons are obvious. The first: powerful institutions had a stake in downplaying the Chinese origins of the virus in order to shift blame to the rest of the world. Certainly, that was China's game: In all likelihood, COVID-19 was spreading in China as early as October 2019, and the government covered it up for months. But that was also the game of the World Health Organization. Members of the American government like Fauci also had a stake in smothering questions about American funding for gain-of-function research in Wuhan. Then there's the second reason: all the wrong people were repeating the lab leak theory. As one of MSNBC's resident hacks, Mehdi Hasan, admitted on Twitter, "The simple reason why so many people weren't keen to discuss the 'lab leak' theory is because it was originally conflated by the right with 'Chinese bio weapon' conspiracies and continues to be conflated by the right with anti-Fauci conspiracies. Blame the conspiracy theorists." As Nate Silver correctly noted, "The Bad People thought the lab leak might be true, therefore as journalists we couldn't be expected to actually evaluate the evidence for it."

Herein lies a lesson: A huge number of people have decided that there are a cadre of people who are so vile that any opinion they touch is immediately toxified beyond investigation. Claims are not to be evaluated on their own merits; instead, we can simply determine whether a claim ought to be supported based on those who posit it. This helps to explain why political crossover has become nearly impossible: We're not judging the claims of our opponents; we're judging (SET ITAL) each (END ITAL) other. And this means that we can discard any argument simply by dint of the fact that we don't like the person offering it. Among members of the general population, this is a problem, but not a fundamental one. But among those who pose as "experts" -- the people who are supposed to serve as guides for people who outsource their political information, from media to scientific institutions -- it's a fatal error. After all, experts are supposed to be impartial adjudicators of the evidence. That's their entire job. We can evaluate on our own who we don't like -- but we often need help to determine whether an argument has merit or not. When experts become "just like us," they undermine their raison d'être. And that's precisely what happened with COVID-19.

Full Transparency or the Fox in the Hen House?

For over a hundred years, the citizens of Seminole County could rely on their government fulfilling its requirement to give notice of any meeting or action by placing a legal ad or announcement in the local paper. This method of informing the public of the doings of our elected representatives is now under siege.

In the guise of "saving the taxpayer money" the trend is to try to get around the newspaper by posting the notices online. Our elected officials discuss weighing the cost of publication in the newspaper versus the public's right to know. That is specious. The cost of newspaper ads are not out of line with other prices in the economy.

Our Tax Collector, Mr Kroll, is on record indicating he would favor not having to advertise the delinquent tax ads in the newspaper! From all indications, some of our County Commissioners also lean in that direction. They and Kroll want all notices and legal ads placed on the County's website!

Think about that. The Fox is guarding the Hen House!

"We are the government and we are here to help you." Help you right out of your home and hearth, that's what putting everything on the County's website will do.

Example:

Mr. Kroll, our Tax Collector, supposedly a protector of your home and

hearth, doesn't advertise the delinquent tax ads in the paper but just on the County website. The average citizen is not going to see them. Thus there is little chance he sees he is delinquent or his neighbor or a friend sees it and tells him. Instead of being able to flip through the pages of the paper, he has to have computer expertise and the right computer to find out what his tax situation is. \$1000+ for a computer vs seventy-five cents for a newspaper.

Next, the tax certificate is sold to a bidder who can make up to 12 per cent a year on his investment. (If no one bids on a particular parcel's delinquent tax bill, guess what happens? The County becomes the owner at 12 per cent!)

Remember, trust us, we are the government and we are here to help you.

By law, the County, if it gets ownership of the delinquent tax certificate, has to force the sale of the property for the delinquent taxes after two years. Is that sale going to be advertised on the County website where the general public will be unlikely to see it? What incentive is there for the County and the Tax Collector to look out for the little guy? You know, the guy that put them in office in the first place. Going to a County website for legal advertising is a clear conflict of interest.

Notice is what keeps government honest. It is much easier to pass a newspaper around for others to read than it is to pass around a computer.

Is advocating restricting the public's right to know, a good strategy, when running for re-election? Let's hope not.

Whether it was ignoring the actual evidence regarding masks and mask mandates, the evidence regarding post-vaccination transmissibility or the evidence regarding the lab leak theory, experts decided that the wrong people had to be ignored. But they were wrong. And now they have

no credibility left.

DAR, Lakeview Cemetery Dedication

The Major Francis L. Dade Chapter of the Florida Society U.S. Daughters of 1812 held a dedication and grave marking ceremony at the historic Sanford Lakeview Cemetery on Saturday, February 25, 2023. The chapter raised funds to have created a historical marker honoring all veterans buried in the cemetery. The marker gives special recognition to two War of 1812 veterans, Elias Woodruff who served in the New Jersey Militia, and John Hughey who served in the Georgia Militia, interred at Lakeview Cemetery. The beautiful blue marker is placed at the entrance of the cemetery. Not only are the veterans honored by the marker but so is the ever faithful "Old Bob", the horse that pulled the hearse for the T.J. Miller Funeral Home for 28 years. Old Bob's grave stone can be viewed at the opposite corner of the historical marker.

The Saturday event also included the marking of three daughters of John Hughey; Mary Hughey Martin, Georgia Hughey and Margarita Hughey. Mary Hughey Martin,

married to Alexander Calvin Martin, was born in 1845 and died in 1905. Margarita Hughey, born in 1855 and Georgia Hughey born in 1859, died in a tragic accident in 1878 when many of the Hughey family members were returning from a camp meeting near Mellonville. The wagon carrying the party overturned on a flooded road. Margarita and Georgia along with two of Mary's children were drowned. Another daughter of John Hughey, Virginia Hughey Evans, grave site was marked by the society in 2020.

This project was made possible by the members of the Major Francis L. Dade Chapter, Florida Society U.S. Daughters of 1812 and the Central Florida Cemetery Project who did all the restoration work on the twin stone for Margarita and Georgia Hughey. Their expertise and valuable work by their team of volunteers in the tedious cleaning and restoration for not only these stones and others in the cemetery is greatly appreciated.

Dietitian - Cold & Flu Season Remedies



Dear Readers,

The common cold is responsible for 150 million missed workdays annually in the United States. Many of us will head to the nutrition supplement aisle to ward off these nasty viruses, but do these supplements really work? We investigated four of them, and this is what we found:

1. Elderberry- In a study of 312 air travelers, those using elderberry had an average of a 2-day shorter duration of the cold and experienced fewer symptoms (1). More extensive studies are needed to confirm these results. Remember, several studies are needed before scientific value can be determined.

2. Vitamin C- In a meta-analysis involving more than 11,000 participants, 200 mg of vitamin C daily did not reduce the risk of getting a cold for the general population. However, the same dosage reduced the illness's length by about one day (2). The supplement must be taken daily to obtain this benefit, not only when you realize you are getting a cold.

3. Zinc- In a review on zinc and the common cold, researchers found that when taken within 24 hours of symptom onset, zinc reduced a cold by about one day, and the severity of symptoms was also reduced (3). It is important to note that excessive amounts of zinc can cause copper deficiency, anemia, and damage to the nervous system. Furthermore, in 2014 the FDA warned against using zinc nasal sprays due to permanent loss of smell in more than one hundred people. The tolerable upper limit of zinc is 40 mg daily for adults, less for those under the age of eighteen.

4. Echinacea- While echinacea has been shown to stimulate immune cell production, studies are mixed when it comes to preventing the common cold and the severity of its symptoms. Overall, echinacea may shorten the life of a cold by half a day and may slightly reduce its severity (4).

Given the modest effect of dietary supplements on preventing the common cold, the best defense may be good old-fashioned self-care: Eat right; get plenty of sleep; exercise regularly, and wash your hands frequently.

of Clark Street and on the west side of Aulin Avenue. This new subdivision will encompass roughly 7.22 acres of land and is zoned as a medium density residential district, meaning only single-family and two-family homes can be built. This specific proposal

features single-family attached townhomes with two-car garages and two parking areas in each driveway. The development will also feature roughly 20,000 square-feet of the property set aside for two internal mini-parks that will be accessible by the public. Architecture designs for the subdivision are currently not ready for public viewing and will be submitted for approval by the city at a later date. The developers will also be donating \$25,000 to the City of Oviedo's Public Art Fund for a new sculpture in Solary Park.

church. I wanted to make sure that my grandma stayed with me forever," Adams said. Adams is following in her great grandmother's charitable footsteps, giving back to the community that gave her so much when she was growing up. Surround yourself with people who pour into you who make you feel good about yourself." Adams uses her "Girlfriends" merchandise to remind her followers that "people all look different and have different experiences and how we treat people based on beauty may not be right and we should change it." Her online web store sells journals featuring women of all shapes, sizes, ethnicities, and abilities centered on the front cover to show her audience that every woman can be a cover girl. "People who look like me, dark, fat, short, we're often times told that we can't be models or we're not

marketable and I've just been living my life and doing that as an influencer," Adams said. If you look closely at the animated women featured on the cover of the journal, you can spot one of them wearing a Bokey necklace, representing Adams' hometown. No matter how many glass ceilings she breaks, Adams stays true to herself and her Bokey roots. Adams is helping to put Sanford on the map by making sure that everyone she meets knows that she is a product of Sanford's uplifting and nurturing community. "I shine bright from a little small town like Sanford... People say, when you're from a small town no one can see you, but people see me, they see us, they see Sanford," Adams said. She has blazed her own trail all the way to being recognized as a Business Elite's Under 30 honoree in Las Vegas for her work as the founder of Amapoundcake. "I hope to empower and be a part of developing a world that creates more women and girls like me and give us a place to be free in our bodies no matter what it looks like... We have the right to dream and be no matter what we look like," Adams said. Follow Adams on Instagram @amapoundcake to keep up with her upcoming workshops and feel good content.

Voice – Girl's Summit. "We feel like we have girls in that room that could be great leaders and sometimes they just need a little bit of encouragement, a little bit of mentoring, a little bit of support, and a little bit of time to grow. Our goal here today is to start that process and be really proactive in helping them to be successful members of our community," Cummings said. The workshop was free to all participants and was created as a way to empower girls to be the change they want to see in their community. During the summit, participants had the opportunity to connect with their peers and counselors who they can rely on throughout their time in school. Considering the recent increase in violence involving young women on school campuses, Faison and Cummings decided to take a proactive approach to the problem, educating girls on crucial topics like conflict resolution before they head off to upper-level schools. Cummings said, workshops like these are extremely important for our future generations because "a lot of our young students need to learn how to solve conflicts and really learn how to handle situations. A lot of times as adults, we just assume they know that, but they don't always know that they can talk, and they don't always know who they can turn to." Faison and Cummings hope that Finding Your Voice will teach girls how to make decisions and see the difference between right and wrong. Teaching students these skills at a young age will provide them with more effective solutions to conflicts and give them the confidence to chase their goals.

"We're trying to go as young as possible and help really set that foundation and plant those seeds so that when they get older, we can see them grow and thrive as leaders as they go through the rest of middle and high school," Faison said. The effort to keep young women on the right track as they transition into middle school will not end at the summit. Faison and Cummings plan to follow the girls through graduation and act as an immediate support system for whenever they need someone to guide them along their path to greatness. Many of the fifth graders that Cummings met with are worried about transitioning into middle school. She wants Finding Your Voice to reassure them that they will have an advocate by their side throughout the entire process. Every girl who attended received gifts to remind them of what they learned at the summit. They were given bracelets engraved with the words "my voice" to remind them to stay true to themselves. At the summit, the girls also created their own teddy bear. Inside of the teddy bear, each girl placed a heart with their biggest goals and hopes for the future written on it. "That's something that they'll have forever, so that they know they have this team of women that will care for them, who want the best for them, and when they think they need some comfort or they need to be motivated, they have their bracelet and they have their teddy bear," Faison said. The assistant superintendents plan to make Finding Your Voice an annual event to continue helping girls grow into successful young women. "We want to create positive self esteem and positive self identity for the girls and really give them the opportunity to mingle with each other so they can work on a little conflict resolution and just remember to have a positive attitude everyday looking at themselves,"

Timing is a big factor in the outcome of a great number of deals. There are many hands where a declarer actually has all the tricks he needs to make the contract and yet goes down because the defenders score their own tricks first.

A competent declarer always looks for a way to turn the time factor to his own advantage. This deal provides a case in point.

West leads a diamond against four hearts, and East wins with the ace. East then shifts to the jack of

spades in the hope of developing a spade trick for the defense before dummy's clubs become established.

Declarer wins the spade with the king and plays the ten of clubs, ducked by East. South then leads a second club to East's ace, and East returns another spade, taken by dummy's ace.

If the defenders were on lead at this point, they could cash a spade trick and sink the contract. However, they are one tempo behind and are helpless. South has the situation under control and cannot be stopped from making his game.

When declarer next leads dummy's king of clubs, East can do no better than ruff with the six, which South overruffs. Declarer then trumps a diamond in dummy and leads the queen of clubs, leaving East without recourse whether he ruffs with the ace or not. Whatever East does, South discards a spade and finishes with 10 tricks.

Although it is perfectly normal for West to lead a diamond — the suit East opened the bidding with — it is interesting to note that the defense can win the race against time if West happens to lead a spade instead. In that case, the defenders would collect four tricks before declarer could score 10.

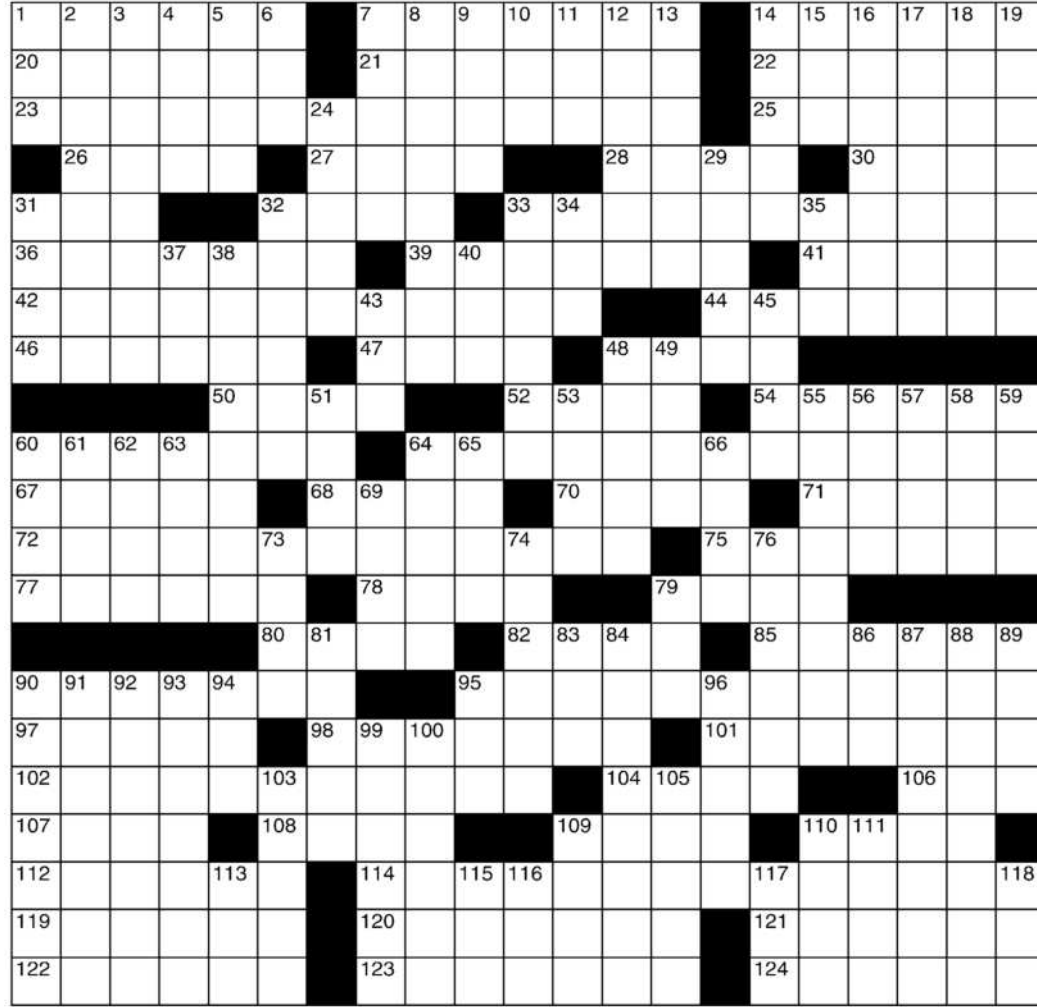

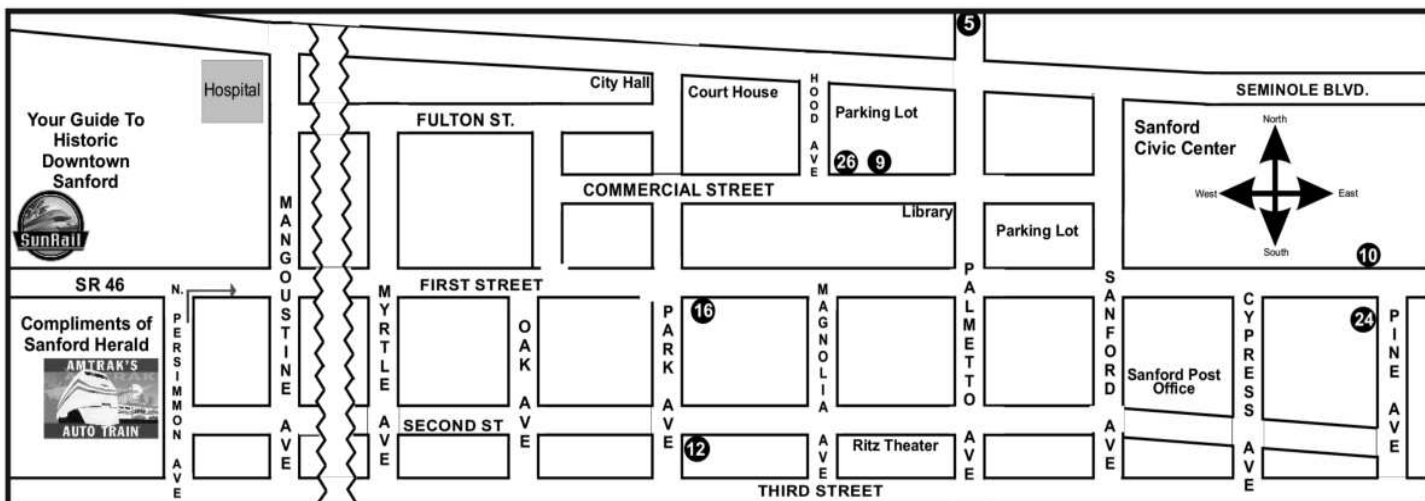

parking lot of Bel-Air Apartments, located at 900 E. Airport Blvd.

Responding officers located a female, later identified as Myeia Kudakwashe, 27, suffering from an apparent gunshot wound to her abdomen. She was transported to a local area hospital in serious condition. A short distance from the apartment complex, officers located a male, later identified as Steven Martin, 29, with multiple gunshot wounds to his chest. He was transported to a local area hospital where he died as a result of his injuries.

Based on the preliminary investigation, it appears that Kudakwashe was at the location earlier, which was the customary location for Kudakwashe to exchange custody of her children with their father, who lived in the complex. Based on witness statements, Kudakwashe appeared agitated when

arriving at the apartment complex, and she forced her way into the apartment before having to be forcefully removed. Witnesses stated she then brandished a firearm before leaving the complex.

When Kudakwashe and Martin returned, they were shot on the second floor exterior walkway near the apartment. The details of what occurred when they returned are still under investigation.

Based on the investigation, this appears to be an isolated incident that was domestic in nature. The case is still active and ongoing, and investigators will be working closely with the State Attorney's Office in reviewing the case.
