Students from across the state competed in the Texas Cattle Feeders Association (TCFA) 2020 Junior Fed Beef Challenge held at West Texas A&M University in Canyon Friday, July 24 with Hallettsville FFA member Luke Bludau bringing home the top award as Senior Overall Champion.

This annual contest gives 3rd through 12th grade students the opportunity to gain industry knowledge and practical experience in commercial cattle feeding.

The challenge has students involved with feeding a pen of three steers as well as taking a written test and competing in oral presentations and interviews. In addition, cattle performance points are also figured into the scoring to determine the winners.

Students compete for a combined \$20,000 in college scholarships along with trophy buckles and plaques.

Tax assessor proposes tax rates

At Monday morning's Lavaca County Commissioners' Court meeting, County Tax Assessor-Collector Deborah Sevcik presented the certified values for 2020 and said the values have gone down from the previous year.

Following the court accepting the county and farm-to-market road certified values for 2020, Sevcik presented the calculated no-new-revenue tax rate and the voter-approval tax rate.

Sevcik said based on her calculations, including the general and Farm-to-Market Road (FMR) fund, the calculated no-new-revenue (NNR) tax rate for 2020 is 60.16 cents per \$100 valuation, which is calculated to be 47.32 cents for the general fund and 12.84 cents for the FMR fund. Before last year, the nonew-revenue tax rate was referred to as the effective tax rate.

Sevcik reported she calculated the voter-approval (VA)tax rate at 61.15 cents per \$100 valuation, which includes both the general fund (47.81 cents) and the FMR (13.34 cents). The voter-approval tax rate is the highest rate that can be adopted without holding an election. Before last year, the voter-approval tax rate was referred to as the rollback tax

Last year's 2019 adopted rate, including general fund and FMR, was 56.79 cents per \$100 valuation.

Following a vote to accept the Tax Assessor-Collector's presentation on the tax rate calculations. Commissioner Ronald Berckenhoff moved for proposing last year's tax rate of 56.79 cents per \$100 valuation, that included 44.68 cents on the general fund and 12.11 cents for FMR and is below this year's no-new-revenue

The court voted 4-1, with Commissioner Dennis W. Kocian opposing

Area Spared by Hurricane

Lavaca County was spared by Hurricane Celia late Monday.

The destructive storm continued to the northwest after hitting Aransas Pass and Corpus Christi.

So often after storms strike the Texas coast, they veer north and eastward in the past, but this one was just the opposite.

Lavaca County received only wind gusts up to 30 mph and rain averaged from a few tenth to one inch. There was plenty of lightning but no damage reported.

A large tornado funnel was spotted above ground at the Hwy. 111 intersection and highway 77 south, but evidently didn't dip down according the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The National Guard, with headquarters in Gonzales, was called to the disaster and left Gonzales at four a.m. Wednesday. They will be guarding against looting and helping clear the wreckage for three or four days. National Guardsmen from all over Texas are now in Corpus Christi and Aransas Pass. Manv Hallettsville National Guardsmen are members of the Gonzales Unit.

It's a new day in court

We've all seen it on TV.

A bailiff walks in front of normally bustling courtroom loudly calls out, "Would everyone please rise for honorable Judge So-and-so," as a robed figure makes his or her way to the bench to preside over the day's proceedings.

It's become almost standard fare for most any courtroom, anyplace in America.

anything but in this new postcoronavirus era, as the newspaper learned last week, when State District Judge Bill Old 25th court's latest in standard operating procedures.

It was pin drop quiet at the courthouse that day, not a soul to in a divorce case. be seen anywhere besides Judge Old, this reporter and a bailiff, to er," Judge Old said of the new start the day out.

Normally, the place would be bustling with attorneys and prosecutors, petitioners and complainants, law enforcement officers and defendants, court clerks and probation department personnel, all scrambling to get their jobs done as, one by one, they appeared before the judge to have their cases heard.

But no such bustle was to be found on Wednesday, July 29, nor has it been heard inside a courtroom since orders first went on in mid-March of this year, when COVID first began shutting down the case is heard. large swaths of America.

As of last Wednesday, Judge and everyone pays heed as he Old said he worked 936 total cases via Zoom conference since all this coronavirus business began in March, working the caseload for the 25th State Judicial District, which encompasses Colorado, Gonzales, Guadalupe and Lavaca counties.

He had 12 cases on the docket that day-mostly divorces and But what was once typical is criminal plea agreements—and based on what we saw, he likely cleared all of them, in a remarkable time, to say the least.

He cleared a full half of those invited us out to come see the cases in just 37 minutes, with much of the time consumed by a rather detailed accounting of several specific property items

> "It actually moves a lot fast-Zoom conference medium. "If we were holding court as normal, we'd have most of these clients out in the hallway, and we'd wind up wasting quite a bit of time in between cases, gathering them up with their attorneys to take what ever actions were necessary for the case."

In fact, most of those court day proceedings—the plea deals, the sideline conferences those entail, as well as any last-minute dickering between divorce attorneys for their respective parties—is already done by the time

Judge Old may have been in rather lonely looking courtroom, he was joined by people from at least seven different towns in more than a dozen different places, be they client or attorney, court staffer or correctional officer.

Although Judge Old says he still prefers appearing in the actual courtrooms within his

district-which affords him the luxury of putting his hands on the actual paper files kept by the court rather than just viewing some image of a document on a computer screen—he has been able to hear the occasional case from his home office in Seguin, something he never could have done prior to the coronavirus.

Even before COVID, Judge Old says technology was providing the courts luxuries it never knew previously. Obtaining search warrants, for instance, often required late night meetings and signatures. He's done dozens of them now in fractions of the time, simply with a swipe of his phone.

Not that the new Zoom conferencing doesn't have its occasional drawbacks, the judge admits.

"Let's put out that cigarette Mr. So-and-so" is not a phrase a single judge anyplace has likely uttered in decades. Judge Old did so on Wednesday, however, instructing one of the defendants to extinguish his wares as he called roll for the day's docket.

Even among the attorneys apnew Zoom conference format, Judge Old says he has to extend the occasional reprimand to uphold formalities. Things like neckties and general neatness

still need to be attended. "It is still court, after all," he mind a Ps and Qs in court when



And, thanks to new streaming capabilities now available, which makes the day's proceedings available to spectators via the court's YouTube channel, there's also a full gamut of general spectators as well. They might be information seekers, like this reporter, or the just plain curious, folks who might have otherwise taken a seat in gallery during any normal day in court just to watch.

Judge Old says he has more than 100 subscribers to the court's YouTube Channel since earlier this summer.

That, too, can have its drawbacks.

The judge shared about how in one of recent cases, a divorce case between a military man and his spouse, how he'd made a comment about that wife might entitled to-namely, a portion of the man's military retirement benefits—since their union would now be absolved. Military wives, in particular, are often left at home, keeping things running while soldiers are off fighting wars, he said.

Almost instantly, Judge Old says a message appeared, praising the logic offered in the decision but at the same time questioning the ruling.

Of all people, it was from his mother.

"Makes you really want to

you know your Mom is watching," he says.

Drawbacks aside, Judge Old says he believes Zoom conferencing for things like plea deals and court hearings may well become the norm for courts all around the state, even long after the coronavirus is laid low.

He shared a recent experience from a hearing held in Gonzales County as a perfect example, back before the Zoom conference scheduling was as nearly as well known.

That hearing had one attorthey began offering that service ney driving in from Houston, which is at least a couple hours away, one way, on a good day. The other lawyer drove in from Dallas that day, a good 10-hour round trip most days, all for a hearing that didn't take more than 15 minutes in the courtroom, Judge Old recalls.

> "Think of all the road time that could have saved by them simply logging on to the conference instead," he says.

> Plus, thanks to benefits Zoom conferencing now affords, there's nearly 1,000 cases now that would otherwise still be idling on an already backlogged court docket.

> How the court deals with actual trials remains to be seen. Resumption of in-person hearings has been rescheduled multiple times since the pandemic began, and even in places that allow SEE COURT, PAGE 11





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

July 26th, 1845 -- United States flag raised on Texas island

On this day in 1845, the United States flag is said to have been raised on St. Joseph Island by United States troops. This was the first time the U.S. flag was flown in Texas. St. Joseph Island is a sand barrier island in Aransas County. The troops were part of a force under Gen. Zachary Taylor sent to protect Texas from Mexican interference after annexation. After the detachment landed on the island, the main force landed on August 1 and camped by a massive live oak tree at the site of present-day Rockport. The tree is now known as the Zachary Taylor Oak.



in-court appearances, there strict numbers guidelines that must be adhered.

Lavaca County's courtroom, for instance, can hold just 26 people currently. Most of the gallery seats in the place today are cordoned off, as per new COVID social distancing mandates. When you're dealing with a judge and other court personnel, clients and their attorneys, juries and witnesses, those 26 seats can fill in a hurry.

It will likely be early 2021 before the courts fully resume trials once again, Judge Old says. As soon they do, he says he's already got a capital murder case waiting to be heard, which would likely delay any other case trials by at least a month.

Plans are in the works to bring in visiting judges mostly retired district judges, of which Judge Old says there are a plethora—to help whittle down case backlogs that have accumulated as a result of the closures

But only time will tell how that pans out and, ultimately, when trials can once again resume.

"It's a new era for us, that's for certain," Judge Old says. "Unfortunately, much of it is still uncertain for us right now. But it's also showed us what can be done. I suspect many of the changes we've seen these last few weeks will be with us for years to come. It's simply the new way of doing business, something can benefit us all in the long run."

LETTERS to the EDITOR

This letter is a response and a reaction to the letter by Jerry Janak in the July 29 issue of the Tribune-Herald. I was very disappointed in the tone of the letter and the disrespectful name calling and accusations so prevalent in the letter.

We can certainly all agree that destruction of property and looting are not acceptable behavior and should be condemned. However, I believe we are all proud of the first amendment of our constitution which assures us of religious freedom and "the right of the people peacefully to assemble, and to petition the Government for redress of grievances."

Nothing was said in the letter about the grievance that brought on the marches and the demonstrations. We all viewed with horror and disgust the police officer kneeling on the neck of George Floyd for almost nine minutes while other police officers looked on. No mention was made of the shooting by police of Breona Taylor or the killing of unarmed Ahmaud Arberry by white men, never mind the killing of a number of other black individuals by white police officers in the past year or so.

Though unacceptable damage was done by some individuals and groups taking part in the marches and demonstrations, the majority of them were peaceful. I even saw a group of protestors rush to gather around a man with a base bat who was ready to break a store window. They told him that is not what we are here for! That will not help our cause!. And what are we to say about the policeman who on occasion knelt in unison with protestors? Are they to be lumped in with the "anarchist and marxists and mob of goon squads?" All these words were used in the letter!

Should we also include the bishop of the El Paso Catholic Diocese in such name calling and generalizations? He knelt in unison with some protestors, along with some of the priests of the diocese, as he held a sign that read "BLACK LIVES MATTER." We want to say "all lives matter" and that is certainly true. However, until black lives matter as much as white lives matter, we have not reached the ideal of being equal with liberty and justice for all.

You ended the letter with a comment about not being able to take freedom for granted. That is very true. I think that as we object to the damage done and the disrespect shown to some during the protests we need to also admire and praise all those, black and white, young and old, male and female, who took to the streets throughout our country to demand freedom for all, to demand respect for all, to demand equality for all.

This last week we celebrated the life of a civil rights and racial justice icon, John Lewis. Watching and listening to the final service in his honor on the day of his burial was a moving experience for me. Three former presidents spoke about him with high praise. John Lewis did not take liberty for granted! He had his skull fractured by the police as he and others marched across Freedom Bridge over fifty years ago. In spite of beatings and threats and numerous arrests he persisted in fighting non-violently for "liberty and justice" for all. He was proud of the Black Lives Matter movement. He with pride in the people of today expressed his faith that this generation of black and white people will continue the march toward liberty and justice for all.

May all of us individuals, as a community and as a nation take a critical look at name calling and generalized accusations and work a little harder at understanding and accepting and loving one another!
