Council okays technology hardware for HPD

The Hallettsville Police Department will get new technology hardware after the city council approved the purchase at its second meeting of the month Monday.

Peacemaker Technologies from New Braunfels was

awarded the quote of \$40,120 for the mobile data computers.

Peacemaker did not have the lowest quote but Police Chief Randy Schlauch told the council that the company offered antimicrobial tablets which the others do not have.

Included in the tablets is Bluetooth, Wi/Fi, front and

rear cameras, a docking keyboard and a no fault accidents warranty.

The lowest quote was \$28,312.80 from Cap Fleet Uptitters out of Belton.

The money will come from the CARES Act Coronavirus Relief Fund which the city is expected to receive 100%

(\$148,115).

The council voted to replace the screens and pump/motor on the Ridge St. Water Well No. 8.

Friedel Drilling from Hochheim will do the work at cost of \$65,541.56 which includes \$10,880 for a 10-inch rod base screen, \$24,000 for rig time

and \$5,100 for gravel packing.

"This is an emergency and it allows the city to bypass the bidding process," City Administrator Grace Ward said.

The council took no action on a request from Integrity Alliance LLC, an ambulance service out of East Bernard.

Lavaca Court holds special-called meeting Discusses proposed subdivisions

The Lavaca County Commissioners' Court held a special-called meeting, Friday morning, Nov. 13 to discuss issues regarding two subdivisions being proposed within the county.

The county is in the process of a developing a subdivision plan, and with concerns over what is considered a completed subdivision application, the court met with representatives from both parties.

The two subdivisions in question involve the Shiner Hillside subdivision that is planned for development on CR 352 near Shiner, and the Whispering Oaks subdivision to be located on CR 167, approximately four miles west of Hallettsville.

Matt Werner, owner/contractor for the Shiner Hillside subdivision and attorney Lee Koeling, who represented Randy Dornak for the Whispering Oaks subdivision, both presented their arguments to court with both feeling they fully completed their applications and submitted them for approval this past August.

However, according to County Judge Keith Mudd with the concerns of the county not having an approved subdivision plan, questions regarding roadways, drainage and septic tank approval have been a factor in the court balking at approving these two subdivisions.

"The main issue is all about liability for the county and its taxpayers," Mudd said. "We can't approve a project that could be liable to our taxpayers."

Mudd told the two parties that he hoped an agreement could be made to get these two plans approved.

Calling on county attorney Stuart Fryer, the court asked for his thoughts in the matter.

Fryer said he doesn't know the facts as to if the application is not complete, and felt if that is the case then the court should not act on it at this time.

"My position, from what I've heard, if this commissioners' court does not have a completed application, you cannot rule on it," Fryer said. "So I suggest, you (court) shut this down until you have a completed application."

In questioning whether the applications are completed Fryer added, "What we're hearing is a complete application for the plat that says the county will not be responsible for

maintenance of the roads for now and in the future, and if that's on there, you do have a completed application. But, from what I'm hearing you do not."

Fryer also said, "From a procedural standpoint, I urge, because we will have a new county judge, let that county judge weigh in. He will be one of five. He is not the CEO. He presides over commissioners' court and he's one vote of five. Let that vote come in."

Both subdivision representatives said they again felt they have completed all aspects of the application and meet the requirements, and not getting the court's approval is holding up owners, buyers and financier's interest in moving forward with their projects.

The HHS Brahmas ended the 1970 grid season with a thrilling victory over the Weimar Wildcats in Weimar Friday night. The score was 13-7.

In taking the victory, the Brahmas totaled 223 yards.

Thus, the Brahmas finished the season with six wins and four losses. In District 25-AA play, they were 4-2. This is not a bad season for Coach Keith Davis' Brahmas.

Terrell Johnson, fleet Brahma sophomore, scored the first TD for the Brahmas in the second period. The drive covered 64 yards in 13 plays with Johnson completing the drive with a 7-yard run. The extra point failed and the Brahmas led 6-0 at halftime.

Ronnie Holubec, Brahma full-back, went over left guard from 2 yards out for a third quarter touchdown. Gary Horstmann added the PAT. The drive again covered 64 yards, taking 9 plays.

A short punt in the fourth period gave Weimar possession on the Brahma 46-yard line to set up the lone Wildcat touchdown.

It was the Brahma defense that shined throughout the game. Weimar had a rugged offense and the Brahmas stopped a last ditch drive in the final minutes to preserve the win. Weimar fumbled after moving 77 yards into Hallettsville territory with the Brahmas recovering. Final score: Hallettsville 13, Weimar 7.

Weimar finished its season 5-4-1 season record and the Wildcats were 2-3-1 in district.

After all discussions were completed, the court voted unanimously to contact attorney Robert Bass to examine the two proposed subdivisions to work out the details to get them into approval form that could be approved independently.

Mudd asked both parties permission to forward the information of the applications for their plats to Bass.

Mudd said he would ask Bass if something rea-

sonable can be done with just language in the plats that would allow the ap-

plications to be addressed at the next court meeting on Nov. 23.

THE LIVING TESTIMONY OF REV. EARLINE BAINES WILLIAMS

ISAIAH 6:1-10 — ST. MATTHEW 28 18-20

Rev. Earline Baines Williams celebrated forty years (40 years) of preaching on Oct. 25, 2020. She was called by God to preach the Gospel in 1980, and was ordained Itinerant Elder in 1987. She is the first black woman to be ordained from Sublime, and called to preach.

There was one woman preacher from Hallettsville to preach in Sublime many years ago.

A local Elder Rev. Williams came from a line of preachers in her family. Her parents were the late Rev. A.T. and Batteasy Baines. Rev. A.T. Baines served sixty years as a preacher. Mrs. Batteasy was a great missionary and Gospel singer from the Orange Grove Baptist Church in Sublime. The legend goes on.

A.T.'s late brother, Hiawatha Baines, was a great preacher man.

Rev. Earline B. Williams was reared in Sublime, attended school in Hallettsville and served in the local church in Sublime. She attended Texas Southern University in Houston and also Prairie View A&M College in Prairie View.

She was married to the late Rev. James Williams, an Itinerant Elder from the African Methodist Episcopal Church in San Antonio in 1968. She moved to San Antonio and was ordained an Elder in the African Methodist Episcopal Church. She began preaching at the Missionary Field as an ARBA Charmany for eight years in the Southwest Texas District Conference of the Tenth Episcopal District AME Church.

One of the first women to be ordained Itinerant Elder



in the West San Antonio District.

Rev. Earline B. Williams has pastored three churches, the last one at Wesley Chapel AME Church in Sublime.

She began Children of Street Ministry Evangelical Outreach founded and organized June 4, 1994 and also Church Without Walls in San Antonio.

These ministries are also established in Sublime where Earline B. Williams resides. She has written a book "There's a Child Standing at My Gate."

She has been a mentor to many young preachers.

Her second book is being published of her life story "One Woman's Faith Journey."

Rev. Earline B. Williams thanks God for His Faithfulness for all these years: LAM. 3:21-23.

Many thanks to all the people who helped me on this journey.

Turkey and Meal Prep Tips for a Happy Thanksgiving

There are milestones that when reached provide both a sense of accomplishment and a realization that one has moved on to the next stage in life. Graduations and weddings come quickly to mind. The first time to be responsible for the Thanksgiving turkey can be just as monumental of an occasion for some. Turkey is not just a tradition; it is an expectation that comes with a side of cornbread dressing and a slice of pumpkin pie. I am certain those who have long past their first time to prepare the "Turkey Day" meal will agree that there is a simple key to success—and that is planning!

My preparation this year began by cleaning out my freezer to make room for the turkey. I am not a fan of crowded grocery stores so many of the important components – green beans, shoestring onions, and cream of mushroom soup for the green bean casserole; the turkey; and vanilla pudding for the pie are all safely stored and ready for the big day. Of course, I could not shop until I had a good idea of the number of guests that we will be feeding. So how do you decide on the size of the turkey? A good rule of thumb is one and half to two pounds of turkey per adult guest. Remember when shopping to keep your fresh fruits and vegetables separate from raw meat and poultry and put your perishable items into the refrigerator within 30 minutes of shopping. Keep your hot foods hot and your cold foods cold, as bacteria grows best between 40 and 140 degrees Fahrenheit.

According to the AgriLife Food Safety unit there are three acceptable methods to thaw a turkey: refrigerator, cold water, or microwave. Of these, thawing in the refrigerator is the recommended method. Allow one day for each four to five pounds of weight, so if thawing a large turkey, the cold-water method may be necessary as it takes less time. It does require more attention. When thawing in cold water, replace the water every 30 minutes. For turkeys under twelve pounds, allow up to six hours of thawing time. A 22-pound turkey may take up to twelve hours to thaw by this method. When thawing by the cold-water method, the turkey must be cooked immediately upon thawing. If using a microwave to thaw, be aware that the turkey may not thaw evenly making it more susceptible to bacteria growth. Most importantly, never just thaw the turkey on the counter as the outside of the turkey will reach unsafe food temperatures long before the inside has thawed. If you do not have the refrigerator space to allow the turkey to thaw you can safely cook a frozen turkey, but you need to allow 50% more time in the oven.

Your turkey will not be safe to eat until it has reached an internal temperature of 165°F. When checking the temperature with a meat thermometer check the thickest part of the breast, the innermost wing and the innermost thigh. Be sure to store away leftovers promptly. All perishable foods including the turkey should be refrigerated within two hours of serving. Store in airtight containers. Use leftovers placed in the fridge within three days. Leftovers placed in the freezer may be kept for two to six months. Upon thawing and cooking leftovers, make sure that the turkey reaches 165° again.

While planning how to thaw and cook the turkey, take time to determine which other dishes will need to be prepared and the temperatures and times with each recipe you plan to make so that your favorite side dish is not sitting at unsafe food temperatures while waiting on the turkey to finish roasting. Turkeys can be safely prepared in an electric roasting pan to free up oven space for other dishes.

The Friench Simpson Memorial Library had a circulation of 1,314 in October. There were 596 library visitors and 473 eBooks and audios checked out.

The library submitted a grant to the Dickson Allen Foundation and was not among the libraries chosen to receive the Texas CARES grant through the Texas State Library.

In other business, the council approved bills totaling \$371,693.72, Lavaca County Elections Administrator Gwen Holt canvassed the results of the Nov. 3 election and changed the normal first meeting of the month to Dec. 14.

Mayor pro tem Cindy Renken presided over the meeting.

11/14/1954: Cuero paper uncovers land fraud

On this day in 1954, the Cuero Record published an article by its managing editor, Roland Kenneth Towery, revealing violations of the intent and purpose of the Veterans' Land Program through fraud and bribery. Towery's story, and those which followed, won a Pulitzer Prize in 1955 for distinguished reporting of local affairs. They also set off intensive statewide media reporting and accelerated an investigation begun in October by the office of the attorney general under John Ben Shepperd (who was a member of the Veterans' Land Board at the time of the investigation), the Texas Department of Public Safety under Homer Garrison, the state auditor's office, and the Senate General Investigating Committee. Governor Allan Shivers, as a member of the Veterans' Land Board, was also actively involved in the investigation. Once investigations were begun, numerous charges were filed against various people accused of taking part in the improper use of state monies and violating veterans' personal rights. Twenty people were indicted in nine counties, and Bascom Giles, commissioner of the General Land Office and chairman of the board of the Veterans' Land Board, became the first elected state official to enter prison for a crime committed while in office.

County's active COVID cases increase

The number of COVID-19 active cases for Lavaca County continued to rise over the past week increasing from 62 to 86 as reported by the Department of State Health Service Region 8 on Friday, Nov. 13.

According to Lavaca County Emergency Management coordinator Egon Barthel's since the counting of cases within the county started in March there have been 1,315 total cases of which 1,216 have recovered. Thirteen have passed away due to the virus.

Breaking down cases based on zip codes in the county, as of Nov. 13, Hallettsville has 35 active cases with 451 having recovered and nine who

have passed away.

The Moulton zip code shows four active cases with 108 recovered and no deaths.

Shiner's zip code has 22 active cases with 202 recoveries, and no deaths.

The Yoakum zip code reports 23 active cases with 437 recovered and there have been four who have passed away.

Schulenburg zip code involving residents living in Lavaca County has two active cases and six recoveries.

The Sweet Home zip code shows zero active cases with nine recoveries.

Barthel's said due to executive order GA-29, at this time Lavaca County does not meet the requirements to be exempt from the face covering

requirement. He said Lavaca County must have 30 or fewer new COVID-19 cases over the previous 14-day period.

According to executive order GA-29, if a county exceeds 30 new COVID-19 cases during a 14-day period, the county judge will be notified via email by the Texas Department of Emergency Management (TDEM).

After a 14day waiting period, if the county has fewer than 30 new active cases during the previous 14-day period, the county judge will be eligible to reapply for exemption.

According to a report from DSHS, on Sunday, Nov. 1, the total number of active cases for Lavaca County stood at 65. With the increase to 86 on Nov. 13, there have been 21 new cases reported for the county.

ADMINISTRATIVE/ FINANCIAL REPORT

Lavaca Medical Center administrator Steve Bowen presented his administrative report for the month of October.

Bowen reported that LMC has added three pharmacies to its 340-B program including Quality Pharmacy of Shiner, City Drug in Yoakum and Brookshire Brothers in Hallettsville.

Bowen said they've recruited a doctor (Parks) out of DeTar of Victoria in Pain Management. Dr. Parks will begin seeing patients in the specialty clinic in December.

Bowen reported LMC received a \$65,000 grant from the Johnson Foundation that will be used for purchasing beds and examining tables.

Bowen said LMC reached an agreement with Baylor College of Medicine to rotate fourth-year nursing students to the facility.

Bowen reported the surgery area in LMC is fully operational with Dr. Gonzalez doing a fantastic job.

"He (Gonzalez) is totally booked and sees patients on Thursdays and Fridays," Bowen said. "He has asked to see about a permanent contract and we are working on it."

Bowen said they have raised the Medicaid rates, which were \$153 to the new rate of \$220.

Due to the COVID program's HEROS fund, Bowen said all LMC employees, with the exception of him, will receive a bonus, including part-time employees.

Reporting on the financial report, Bowen said clinic is still running behind in clinic visits.

"When COVID hit, we were seeing about 1,600 to 1,700 visits per month," Bowen said. "That dropped to 700 visits per month. Although the number continues to grow, we are still down about 200 visits."

Bowen said from September to October the clinic had around 1,350 visits.

Bowen reported clinic providers and the doctors in the specialty clinic are getting back to where it needs to be in gross patient revenue.

Bowen said year-to-date the gross patient revenue is down 10 percent, but was up seven percent from September to October.

Bowen reported the net profit was very good during the past month.


December Meeting

The board voted to dispense from holding a December meeting.

Board president James Fenner presided over the meeting with John Allen, Carl Hobbs, Rosanne Gallia, Gene Schott, Kyle Denney, and Forrest T. Kroschel present for the meeting.

BASTROP – The Hallettsville Brahmas took no prisoners in a 61-26 Class 3A bi-district playoff game at Memorial Stadium Saturday afternoon.

To say Jonathon Brooks' had an outstanding day would be a gross understatement. The senior halfback scored seven touchdowns – one on a punt return and another on a pass from quarterback Trace Patek – and finished the game with 442 all-purpose yards.

Brooks scored on runs 16, 13, 4, 58 and 34 yards, caught a 63-yard scoring pass from Patek besides returning a punt 78 yards for a touchdown. He

finished with 241 yards rushing on 19 carries and passed the 2,000-yard mark.

On its fourth possession, the Brahmas drove 77 yards in 7 plays capped by Brooks' 13-yard run. A 15-yard pass to Bludau was the big gainer.

The Brahmas got the ball in plus territory and capitalized with a 40-yard, 8-play drive which ended with a 4-yard run by Brooks.

Following a three-and-out, the Brahmas got the ball at midfield and after a penalty, Patek, under heavy pressure, dumped the ball off to Brooks who

Senior citizens program still accepting donations

Thanksgiving has long history

Thanksgiving celebrations began years before it became a national holiday and can be seen in ancient harvest celebrations.

The American concept of Thanksgiving developed in the colonies of New England roots, but the roots can be traced back to the other side of the Atlantic Ocean. As an annual celebration of harvest and its bounty, Thanksgiving falls under a category of festivals that spans cultures, continents and millennia.

In ancient times, the Egyptians, Greeks and Romans feasted and paid tribute to their gods after the fall harvest. Thanksgiving also bears resemblance to the ancient Jewish harvest festival of Sukkot. Historians have noted that Native Americans had a rich tradition of commemorating the fall harvest with feasting and merrymaking long before Europeans set foot on their shores.

In 1620, the Mayflower left Plymouth, England, carrying 102 passengers. The crossing lasted 66 days, dropping anchor near the tip of present-day Cape Cod, Mass. Only half of those colonists lived to see March 1621 because of the brutal winters. That March, the remaining settlers moved from the ship to the shore where they received a visit from an Abenaki Native American who greeted them in English.

Several days later, the Native American brought Squanto to the Pilgrims. Squanto was a member of the Pawtuxet tribe who had been kidnapped by an English sea captain, was sold into slavery, escaped to London and returned to his homeland on an exploratory expedition.

Squanto taught the Pilgrims how to cultivate corn, extract sap from

maple trees, catch fish in the rivers and avoid poisonous plants. He also helped the settlers forge an alliance with the Wampanoag tribe which endured for 50 years and remains as one of the sole examples of harmony between European colonists and Native Americans.

The following November, after the first corn harvest proved successful, Gov. William Bradford organized a celebratory feast and invited a group of their Native American allies, including Wampanoag chief Masassoit. This celebration lasted three days and is known as the "first Thanksgiving".

The second documented harvest celebration was held in 1623 to mark the end of a long drought that threatened the year's harvest and prompted Gov. Bradford to call for a religious fast.

During the American Revolution, the Continental Congress designated one or more days of Thanksgiving a year. In 1789, George Washington issued the first Thanksgiving proclamation by the national government of the United States. He called upon Americans to express their gratitude for the happy conclusion to the country's war of independence and the successful ratification of the U.S. Constitution. John Adams and James Madison also designated days of thanks during their presidencies.

In 1817, New York became the first of several states to officially adopt an annual Thanksgiving holiday. Each state celebrated it on a different day and the American South remained largely unfamiliar with the tradition.

Sarah Josepha Hale, author of "Mary Had a Little Lamb," launched a campaign to establish Thanksgiving as a national holiday in 1827.

For over 35 years, Hale published numerous editorials and sent letters to politicians, earning her the nickname of "Mother of Thanksgiving."

In 1836, Abraham Lincoln heeded her request, at the height of the Civil War, in a proclamation entreating all Americans to ask God to "commend to his tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife" and to "heal the wounds of the nation."

This proclamation ultimately scheduled

Thanksgiving for the final Thursday in November and was celebrated that day every year until 1939.

In 1939, President Franklin D. Roosevelt moved the holiday up a week in order to spur retail sales during the Great Depression. Roosevelt's plan, known derisively as "Franksgiving," was met with passionate opposition. Two years later, FDR reluctantly signed a bill making Thanksgiving the fourth Thursday in November, which is how it has remained since.

PUBLIC NOTICE OF HEARING REGARDING INTENTION OF LAVACA COUNTY TO CONSIDER ADOPTION OF PROPOSED REGULATION OF SUBDIVISIONS, INCLUDING MANUFACTURED HOME RENTAL COMMUNITIES

Pursuant to § 232 of the Texas Local Government Code, and §2007 of the Texas Government Code, notice is hereby given regarding the intention of Lavaca County, Texas, acting by and through its Commissioners Court to conduct a public hearing on December 28, 2020, at 10:00 AM in the Commissioners' Courtroom located at the Lavaca County Courthouse, Hallettsville, Texas. The purpose of the hearing is to consider the proposed actions of the Lavaca County Commissioners Court concerning the adoption of subdivision regulations, including provisions regarding the licensing and regulation of Manufactured Home Rental Communities (MHRC) in unincorporated areas in Lavaca County, Texas, and to receive public comment on said proposed actions.

The proposed actions will include new regulations concerning the following general areas:

- Requirement for surveys and development of plans and specifications for any Subdivision of Land, as defined by Chapter 232 of the Local Government Code, including MHRC.
- Requirement for minimal standards for the provision of water, wastewater and drainage of such subdivisions of land, including MHRC.
- Requirement for minimal access roads, streets, and infrastructure for emergency vehicles to such subdivisions, including MHRC.

As required by Section 2007.043 of the Texas Government Code, a Takings Impact Assessment of the proposed regulations was completed. The Assessment, using the analysis outlined by the Texas Attorney General, has determined that the adoption of these regulations does not constitute an unconstitutional taking of real property, as defined by Section 2007.002 of the Texas Government Code. The proposed actions were determined to be exempted from the Texas Private Real Property Rights Preservation Act ("Act"), in accordance with TGC §2007.003(b)(13) due to the County's intent to protect public health and safety by establishing minimum requirements for the subdivision of land, including regulation of Manufactured Home Rental Communities. Further, the proposed actions pose a minimal burden on real property owners and present a substantial benefit to society. The County is permitted to adopt regulations that address the public health, welfare and safety of its citizenry. Lawfully subdividing land, or operating a Manufactured Home Rental Communities that may be affected by the regulations may be permitted to continue operations in their current locations so long as such locations are not enlarged or expanded. The adoption of the proposed actions does not result in the physical taking of private real property. The adoption of the proposed actions does not deprive the owner of all economically viable uses of the property, have a significant impact on the property owner's economic interest, or deny a fundamental attribute of ownership.

Copies of the proposed regulations and the Takings Impact Assessment will be available for inspection in the office County Judge Mike Myers, Lavaca County Courthouse, Hallettsville, Texas during normal business hours December 1, 2020. Copies of the proposed regulations may be obtained, at a cost of \$1.00 per page. Copies of the Taking Impact Assessment may be obtained, at a cost of \$1.00 per page.

Any persons interested in expressing their views on the takings impact assessment are encouraged to attend the public hearing. COVID 19 Rules will be applicable.
