CSE gives update on class learning, music

Third grade

In ELA, we are currently reading "Because of Winn Dixie." For social studies, we are finishing up our unit on Early Inhabitants of Louisiana and will be learning about Early Explorers in Louisiana next.

In math, we just started our new unit on Multiplication and Division with Units of 0, 1, 6-9, and Multiples of 10. We are in the middle of our science unit on Survival and by the end of our unit we will have learned that organisms have characteristics that help them survive over time in changing environments.

Fourth grade

For math we are working on division and multi-digit multiplication. Students learned two strategies called the box method for division and area model for multiplication. The students are thriving with these two methods and think it is the best thing they have learned all year long.

In science, students are learning about energy and doing different experiments to increase their knowledge. In social studies and ELA, we are learning about the American Revolution through looking at sources and reading books about the topic.

Fifth grade

The fifth-grade halls at Cypress Springs Elementary are filled with laughter, learning, and holiday cheer! In ELA, students are immersing themselves in the magical and wondrous literary world of "The Lion, The Witch, and The Wardrobe."

While in social studies, scholars continue to analyze the reasons and motivations behind European explorations as well as describe the interactions between Europeans and Indigenous peoples. Math is finishing the year off strong by wrapping up Module 3: adding and subtracting fractions with unlike denominators.

And lastly, in science, students are completing Module 2: The Mangrove Tree Ecosystem and how all the organisms get what they require and still maintain balanced ecosystems. Lots of learning and merriment are taking place here at Cypress Springs, and there is no other way we would like it.

Music

Things have been busy this month in the Music Room! Our third graders have been working hard on learning rhythms and melodies for their Christmas songs that they will perform for the school while our fourth graders have been learning traditional Christmas songs on Boomwhackers! Boomwhackers are hollow plastic tubes that are tuned with various lengths. The students can hit them on the palm of their hands and produce a musical note - thus the "whack" part of boomwhackers! They are really fun to play and have helped us learn about notes on the staff and what they sound like on instruments!

Our fifth graders have been working hard at creating rhythms using cups. For their Christmas performance, they will be performing "The 12 Cups of Christmas" using the traditional song The 12 Days of Christmas and using plastic cups to create the rhythms! This song was quite the challenge and they have been working hard to create and learn their parts! I am so proud of all of our music students and the hard work and determination they have demonstrated.
