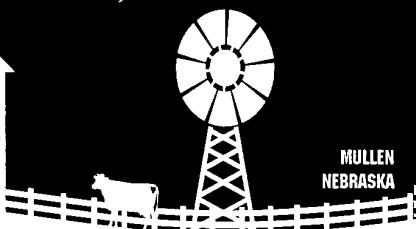

6th grader Riley Hegland will tie-dye anything cotton

Totes, t-shirts, towels and masks – just a sampling of what Riley Hegland can tie-dye.

It started as a 4-H project for the Hooker County Fair three years ago. Riley Hegland's grandma wanted to try tie-dye. So together they made some shirts and Riley entered one of them in the fair.

Fast forward to the spring of 2020 with everyone stuck at home thanks to COVID-19. Riley's dad, Kyle, who is the Golf Course Superintendent at Sand Hills Golf Club, was annoyed that his white golf towel kept getting stains on it, so he had the idea of having Riley tie-dye it.

Riley's mom, Ashley, who initially wanted nothing to do with the mess of tie-dyeing, said they did it outside so it wasn't too big of a mess - and then they started tie-dyeing everything!

People kept asking Kyle where he got his tie-dyed golf towel. And the last week of Sand Hills' season, Cameron Werner, the Director of Golf at Sand Hills, asked Riley to

tie-dye four towels to sell in the Pro Shop. They were gone within 24 hours.

Riley, who is 12 and a Mullen sixth grader, now has a public Facebook group called Ri-Dye (through her mom's account since she isn't on Facebook) where they post her latest creations.

She's done just about everything that is made of cotton - socks, shorts, blankets, towels of all sizes, handkerchiefs, reusable grocery bags and more.

Her most popular items are currently masks and t-shirts.

The items she dyes need to have at least some cotton in them - the higher percentage of cotton, the brighter the colors will be. And while the items don't have to necessarily be white, once again, the colors are brighter on white fabric.

The items don't have to be plain - for example, she can dye t-shirts that have graphics/logos on them.

One person got a stain on

their favorite shirt, so they had Riley tie-dye it!

Ashley is now fully on board with the tie-dyeing... even if it is still a mess that has now been moved inside.

"It's something fun that we both like to do together," Ashley said.

In the world of tie-dye, there are some basic designs like the swirl, bullseye, triangle, half and half and stripes. But the options for creativity of other designs are endless, just like the color options!

Riley will tie-dye items that are given to her, or they will also purchase items that people would like to have done.

The prices range from \$5 for masks to around \$20 for sweatshirts. The bigger the item, the more expensive it will be.

Thanksgiving food do's and don'ts

Food safety starts at the grocery store.

DO clean your grocery cart. Use those sanitary wipes next to the cart corral.

DO start with the room-temperature foods. Pick up cold and frozen foods at the end of the trip working to keep those foods out of the temperature danger zone - 41°F to 135°F - where bacteria likes to grow.

DO organize your cart - keep raw protein separate from fresh produce. Keep juices from raw protein from dripping on other foods helps avoid the spread of foodborne germs.

DO check out and wrap or bag your raw protein wrapped separately.

Turkey shopping:

Buying fresh? Make your purchase only one to two days out. This length of time a fresh, whole turkey can be safely kept in the fridge before cooking.

Buying frozen? Make your purchase ahead of time, knowing that thawing in the fridge may take a few days. For a 5-12 pound turkey, it will take

1-3 days. For a 12-16 pound turkey, it will take 3-4 days. For a 16-20 pound turkey, it will take 4-5 days.

DO thaw your turkey and cook it to an internal temperature of 165°F.

DO use a calibrated food thermometer to check three spots to ensure this temperature is reached throughout: the thickest part of the breast, the innermost part of the thigh and the innermost part of the wing.

DON'T leave your prepared dish out at room temperature. Cold and hot dishes left in the temperature danger zone for 2 or more hours should be thrown out, not eaten or saved for later.

DON'T allow friends and family to refill their plates using personal utensils. This is a surefire way of spreading foodborne germs. Instead, provide separate serving utensils for each dish.

Finally, discard or freeze Thanksgiving leftovers after three to four days in the fridge.

Local COVID-19 update

As of press time on Tuesday, Nov. 24, two new cases of COVID-19 had been reported for Hooker County in the last week with test dates of November 17th and 19th.

According to the West Central District Health Department Dashboard, Hooker County has 21 active cases dated October 25th (3), 28th, 30th, November 1st, 2nd (2), 4th, 6th, 8th, 9th (4), 10th (2), 11th (2), 17th and 19th.

That puts us at six cases in the last two weeks. However, the Dashboard had not been updated since Friday, Nov. 20. Watch the Hooker County Tribune's Facebook page for any additional cases.

There was a regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Mullen, Mullen, Nebraska, Nov. 5, 2020, in the Municipal Meeting Room.

Present: Chairman Wade Marsh, Trustees Josh Barnes, Willard Boyer and Bill Sonnenfelt. Absent: Trustee Chad Myers. Also present: Tyler Cash, Wynn Wiens, Doug Stack, Devan Polt, Tony Corbin, Terry Pearman, Gary Steele, Deb Daly and Jessie Cash.

Notice of the meeting was given in advance by publication in the Hooker County Tribune as shown by the affidavit attached to these minutes; notice of the meeting was simultaneously given to the Chairman and all members of the Board of Trustees and a copy of the agenda is attached to the minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in the advance notice and in the separate notice to the Chairman and Board of Trustees of the meeting; all proceedings hereinafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to attendance by the public.

Chairman Marsh called the

meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Chairman Marsh pointed out the open meetings law poster is posted in the meeting room.

It was moved and seconded to approve the regular meeting minutes of Oct. 1, 2020, as presented. Motion carried with a roll call vote of four votes aye.

Moved and seconded to approve the Oct. 31, 2020, treasurer's report as presented. Motion carried with a roll call vote of four votes aye.

Under correspondence, Utility Superintendent Tony Corbin said the power, sewer and water are in at the new Kwik Stop.

It was moved to pay the bills from their respective funds with a second. Motion carried with a roll call vote three votes aye, with Trustee Barnes abstaining due to conflict of interest.

There is one delinquent bill on the list; bill still unpaid at 501 N Veteran Ave.

There were no requests to address the Board.

Utility Superintendent Tony Corbin had nothing to report.

Attorney Doug Stack had nothing to report.

Under safety report; Utility Superintendent Tony Corbin said Tim Macke and himself have been training Scott Gray in the bucket truck.

Motion and second to

approve Resolution 2020-10 Year End Certification of City Street Superintendent. Motion carried with a roll call vote of four votes aye.

Fire Chief Tyler Cash was present to discuss the fire department's need for new pagers and radios. The Rural Fire Board will pay half for the pagers if the Village would be willing to pay the other half. Tony Corbin said the Village had four radios the fire department could have. Motioned with a second to pay \$2,300.00 for the pagers and give the fire department the radios the Village has. Motion carried with a roll call vote of three votes aye, with Trustee Barnes abstaining due to a conflict of interest.

Utility Superintendent Tony Corbin discussed with the Board on replacing the 2000 Ford pickup. The Board suggested to look into options.

The Board discussed part time employees getting paid time off and holiday pay. This would be 4/5 of normal leave for the Deputy Clerk and 3/5 of normal leave for the drop off site operator. Attorney Doug Stack will prepare a resolution for the December meeting.

Motioned with a second to approve Site Land and Use Permit #253 for Wes Skillings to build an addition to his existing garage as recommended by the Planning Commission. Motion carried with a roll call

vote of four votes aye.

Chairman Marsh announced the public hearing for the 1 & 6 Year Street Improvement Program was open. Gary Steele from Miller and Associates discussed street repairs for the 1 & 6 Year Street Plan. It was decided to add Cleveland Ave from NW 1st street to NW 2nd Street as well as NW 2nd Street from Blaine Ave past the intersection at Washington Ave. Motioned to close public hearing with a second. Motion carried with a roll call vote of four votes aye. Motioned with a second, to pass Resolution 2020-11 with additions to the 1 & 6 Year Street Plan. 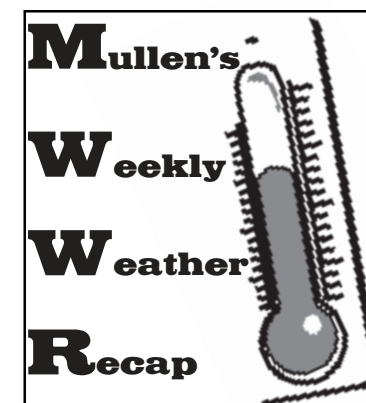
