Gene Hermes elected county sheriff

Faust, Hildebrand, Castaneda, Muzny win other contested local races in GOP Primary

Gene Hermes, chief deputy with the Burleson County Sheriff's Office, was elected sheriff in the Republican Primary on Tuesday, March 3, by a 2,147 to 1,320 margin over Jayson Lyday, a school resource officer with the Brazos County Sheriff's Office.

Hermes said after the election that he was honored to be chosen by the voters, and he appreciated their vote.

"That is our right as an American citizen. We can vote for who we want to vote for, and I appreciate the citizens who came out and voted for me," Hermes said.

Champion Forest breaks ground

With another subdivision breaking ground in Caldwell, the problem of having a lack of housing in Burleson County is about to be alleviated.

On Thursday, Feb. 27, residents in the City of Caldwell and Burleson County celebrated at the official ground-breaking ceremony of Champion Forest Subdivision which will be located at Fairview Drive in Caldwell.

Champion Forest is being developed by Terry Roberts and Steven Sodolak, owners of Chief Cornerstone

Construction.

The subdivision will house 73 new homes, See **FOREST**, page 4A

Gunshot wound a false claim

A woman who entered the CEFCO convenience store in Somerville on Sunday, March 1, and claimed to have suffered an accidental gunshot wound was turned over to U.S. Army officials from Fort Hood for mental health treatment.

The woman, a soldier stationed at Fort Hood, did not suffer a gunshot wound, and no one else was injured, said Somerville Police Officer Jim Loeblein.

Loeblein said no charges were filed against the

Home near Snook destroyed by fire

A fire severely damaged a doublewide home early Tuesday, March 3, on Private Road 4019 off F.M. 2155 near Snook, but family members got out safely.

The cause of the fire remains unknown, although no foul play is suspected, said Snook Volunteer Firefighter Beth Collins.

Collins said the fire was toned at 12:07 a.m. and Snook and

Somerville firefighters responded, with Snook arriving first within about 10 minutes.

The house is located about a mile and a half from Snook, she said.

Firefighters saw smoke coming from the roof and eaves around the roof, and the blaze spread and gutted the interior, Collins said.

Collins said firefighters are unsure at this

Snook approves revenue bonds for sewer plant

The Snook City Council has approved the sale of \$3.2 million in revenue bonds to finance a new wastewater treatment plant.

The council approved that and a water and sewer fee rate increase to cover that cost at its Monday, Feb. 24, meeting.

Snook Mayor John See said after the meeting that the city had hoped to issue certi-

icates of obligation for the project but learned, after consulting with the Texas Attorney General's Office, that revenue bonds would be required.

Revenue bonds require cities to repay the debt with a 25-year payout

using water and sewer revenue funds only, not using any general funds. See said Class B general law cities like Snook are required to use revenue bonds because their property tax rates are capped at 25 cents per \$100 valu-

ation. That limits their ability to repay the debt using tax revenue, See said.

Based on a rate study prepared by Strand Associates, the city's engineer, the city's base rate for water and sewer fees will increase from \$27

a month to \$37, said City Secretary Tammi Bryan.

For water service, rates will increase from \$29 to \$41.60 for zero to 4,000 gallons of use. For sewer service, the rates will increase from \$32

to \$39 for zero to 1,000 gallons, she said.
See said most customers will see about a \$23 increase in their bills. "No one on the council wanted to raise rates, but we are in a predicament with the plant being 40 years old," See

said after the meeting.
The city could not afford to let the plant fall into disrepair, he said. The new plant will include adequate upgrades and will allow for future growth for the next 30 years, he said.
Snook is planning a new concrete treatment plant with dual clarifiers. City officials say

the plant will have less maintenance issues, and the dual clarifiers will give the city a backup if one malfunctioned.
The city is more than doubling capacity from about 75,000 gallons a day to 175,000 gallons and providing at least 30 years of use.
The council in January had selected Caprock Construction of

Bryan as the contractor at a cost of \$2,865,500.
In other business at the Feb. 24 meeting, the council also approved a resolution allowing the city to reimburse itself for costs already incurred on the project -- including engineering and soil testing, Bryan said.
In other business at the Feb. 24 meeting, the council:
* Approved seeking bids for the concession stand and restroom facility at the Snook City Park softball field.

The council approved preliminary plans in January.
A Computer Aided Design (CAD) drawing from Rhodes Building Systems was provided for the concession and restrooms project, and it has been presented to the Snook School District.
The city is in talks with Snook School Superintendent Brenda Krchnak about the school contributing some of the funds for construction. Also contributing will be the city's 4B Development Corp., and Little League.
* Tabled action on the demolition of a sub-standard building on County Road 269 at the intersection of F.M. 2155, pending notification of the landowner and a hearing.
* Approved allowing electronic payments for customers paying utility bills using The Payment Group of Dallas.
A 3 percent charge will be assessed to the customer to cover the costs, and the city will incur no costs, Bryan said.

its anticipated budget revenue for the year to date for hospital services offered.
Patient days, outpatient procedures and emergency room visits are also exceeding budgeted revenue, Sunderman said.
Sunderman said they are also scheduling and looking for additional speaking engagement opportunities in Rockdale to ensure that residents are well versed about St. Joseph's services and to include health education to senior citizen groups.
* Were briefed by Billy Rice on Emergency Medical Services (EMS).
St. Joseph is working to ensure full, emergency ambulance coverage while non-emergency transports are occurring, Chapman said.
* Tabled action on making committee assignments. The board can consider those appointments at their March meeting, Chapman said.
* Discussed the need for drainage improvements at a water retention pond located in back of the Somerville clinic.
That problem is already being addressed, he said after the meeting.
* Discussed but took no action on some indigent jail bills received from the Brazos Valley Council of Governments (BVCOG).
BVCOG screens those eligible for the program and submits bills to the hospital district, Chapman said after the meeting.
Chapman said some bills from last June were received too late for the district to make a payment. The district's \$5,000 annual limit had already been exceeded, he said after the meeting.
The district will work with BVCOG to ensure that the bills are submitted in a more timely manner, he said.

Hospital board approves security, imaging upgrades

The Burleson County Hospital District's board of directors last week approved security and patient imaging upgrades for CHI St. Joseph Health Burleson Hospital in Caldwell.
Those upgrades were approved at the board's Monday, Feb. 24, meeting.
Board President Kirk Chapman said the board approved \$37,273 in upgrades for the hospital's security system and \$75,000 for new patient imaging (X-Ray) equipment.
Regarding security, one upgrade will allow employee access into the building using a name tag slid through an outside scanner, Chapman said.
That system is already used by employees in

many public and private buildings.
The multipurpose system also includes cameras and safety measures inside the hospital to ensure staff and patient safety, Chapman said.
Regarding the imaging upgrade, the new digital plate system will speed up the X-Ray imaging process for doctors, Chapman said.
In other business at the meeting, the board:
* Was briefed by Jessica Threadgill on the nursing home.
Currently, CHI St. Joseph Health Skilled Nursing and Rehab in Bryan is listed as a CMS Five-Star building, and the Caldwell nursing home is listed as a three-star building, Threadgill said.
The star ratings are defined by the Centers for Medicaid and Medicare who score facilities in quality, staffing and health inspections, she said after the meeting.
QIPP (Quality Incentive Payment Program) metrics have been set for the new year, and both facilities are doing well in all areas, Threadgill said. And both facilities have aggressive action plans to ensure continued compliance with those metrics, she said.
CHI St. Joseph Skilled Nursing and Rehab in Caldwell has hired a new activity director after the death of long-time employee Sherri Peters, she said. Georgette Maynard started in January and is making the transition into the role full time, she said.
Both facilities worked through an audit by a division of CHI national offices in December of 2019, and both were proud of the results, she said.
* Was briefed by CHI St. Joseph Health Burleson Hospital Administrator Kurt Sunderman.
Sunderman said financial data showed that the hospital is exceeding

many public and private buildings.

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5 hospital board members to be appointed in May

Since no one filed for the Burleson County Hospital District's five seats up for election on May 2, the five incumbents have agreed to be appointed in May.
Hospital Board Chairman Kirk Chapman said the five incumbents -- Pete Pederson, Barbara Drzac, Michael Bennett, Don Royder and himself -- had planned to file for re-election and would have run unopposed.
In that scenario, the election is typically canceled since there is no opposition, and the incumbents are automatically re-elected, he said.
However, due to a mis-

understanding among the board members, their re-election filing paperwork was not submitted in time for the deadline, Chapman said.
Chapman said the district, after checking with the Texas Secretary of State's Office, learned that all five could then be appointed to the positions after the election results are canvassed in the other May 2 city and school elections.
So the board members have agreed to do that, and they will ensure in the future that their filing paperwork is submitted on time.

Mayor Bradford speaks at historical society meeting

Somerville Mayor Michael Bradford addressed various city issues with the Somerville Historical Society at their Monday, Feb. 10, meeting at the museum.

Bradford, elected in 2019, said the main reason he ran was to work on the city infrastructure and to help make our town a, “little more exciting.”

He was hopeful when the city council voted to accept a plan of action recommendation for \$5 million to repair the streets and drainage.

That initiative was revoked by a petition signed by 5 percent of the voters, basically due to misinformation, he stated.

Bradford said he feels strongly about the community and is concerned that the community is losing its youth, and the senior citizens are dying.

Bradford also said he is concerned about apathy, especially demonstrated in the last election with only a minimal number of eli-

gible voters turning out to vote.

The choices citizens make do make a difference, he said.

In addition, the lack of volunteers available to help make the community better is bothersome, he said.

He also addressed the highspeed internet available to the city but which only the school takes advantage of.

Mayor Bradford also answered questions from the members.

Bradford said he has been married to his wife Theresa for 28 years. They have a daughter and three sons. The two younger sons attend Somerville High School.

Theresa was born and raised in Somerville and is the daughter of the late Matias and Bernice Arredondo.

The family lived in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, prior to moving to Somerville and have their own Real Estate business, The Bradford Team KW/Brazos Valley.

Bradford said he was born in Midland and

grew up with his grandparents.

His grandmother was a USO dietician with the U.S. Army.

It was because of their patriotism that he was inspired to join the Army, and he served for 10 years.

After his stint in the Army, Bradford finished school because “you finish what you start,” he said.

During the business meeting, discussion centered on the repairs made to the museum and other repairs needed, publicity to give visibility to the museum, new membership, establishing of a nominating committee for new officers and an update on Heritage Square.

There have been issues with the work to be done at Heritage Square, TxDOT official Stephen Copley said. It was supposed to have been a three month project but has now gone over a year, he said. At this writing, all work had stopped, Copley said.

State Sen. Lois Kolkhorst honored by Wildlife Society

State Sen. Lois W. Kolkhorst (R-Brenham) received the Distinguished Service Award from the Texas Chapter of The Wildlife Society on Friday, Feb. 14, at the society’s 56th annual meeting in Corpus Christi, Texas.

The award was presented to Sen. Kolkhorst by Dr. Don Steinbach, the chapter’s executive director, for her many years of distinguished service in the Texas Legislature advocating for wildlife.

That has included leading efforts to preserve private property rights, encouraging wildlife conservation and inspiring resource management.

“To be recognized by a such a renowned group of wildlife biologists is truly an honor,” Kolkhorst said. “Through the years, their input and testimony has been invaluable to lawmakers like me. As Texas continues to grow and different challenges are ever present, advocating for wildlife is extremely important, especially for those of us that grew

The Wildlife Society, founded in 1937, is an international, non-profit scientific and educational organization serving

and representing wildlife professionals. Their goal is to promote excellence in wildlife stewardship through science and education.

Hog hunt planned for this weekend in Burleson Co.

Wild hogs remain a pestilence in Burleson County -- tearing up pasture and crop land and causing frustration.

But local residents are not giving up.

This weekend, they will join the Hogs of Texas hog hunt starting Friday, March 6, and running through Sunday, March 8.

This will be a no-kill hunt with all hogs caught live, using dogs, said Brother Harvey Abke of the Burleson County Cowboy Church. Abke is one of the hunt organizers.

The hunt is sponsored by the Burleson County Chamber of Commerce and the Burleson County Cowboy Church.

Captured hogs will be taken to markets and sold for eventual human and dog food consumption, Abke said.

“This helps farmers

and ranchers get rid of these feral hogs that tear up their stuff,” Abke said. “It puts a dent in the problem anyway.”

Hunters may start checking in at 9 a.m. on Sunday, and they must be in line for the weigh-in by noon on Sunday, March 8, at the Burleson County Fairgrounds in Caldwell.

The hunt is open to Burleson County and surrounding county residents, and hogs must be caught in the state of Texas, he said.

Entry forms are available at Homeyer Feed Store on State Highway 36 in Caldwell, at

the Burleson County Chamber of Commerce office on Main Street in Caldwell and on the Cowboy Church web site at www.burleson-countycowboychurch.com.

Hunters may sign up all the way to 5 p.m. on Friday, March 6, he said. Someone will be at the fairgrounds from 3-5 p.m. for anyone signing up, he said.

Buckles will be awarded as prizes for the high-point winners for the top five hogs, and side pots will be available for the longest string, heaviest boar and heaviest sow, Abke said.

with Phase 1 starting in this spring, consisting of 27 new builds.

Each home is estimated to be around 1,900 square feet, sitting on around a half-acre lot, with the cost starting in the low \$250,000 range.

In a written statement released before the groundbreaking, Roberts said, "Burleson County is home, and we wanted to develop housing to keep this area moving forward."

"With the expansion of RELLIS and the growth of College Station, we felt like this was a dynamic location that families would be proud to call home," Roberts said in the statement.

Kimberlin Moore, Director of Marketing for Armstrong Properties, was the master of ceremonies at Thursday's event and welcomed those who attended.

Armstrong Properties will be the exclusive listing and marketing company for the subdivision.

Moore said that when everyone sat down to discuss the reason why Roberts and Sodolak wanted to build the subdivision, she said the reason began with "something we all have in common in our homes: a table."

"A table is where a group of people gather together. A table can host your most important memories in life. And, with Champion Forest, we hope to create a neighborhood where family and friends will gather in and around their own tables for years to come," she said.

"Because, after all, a community is like a family, and when we come together, we are all champions," Moore said.

Moore then recognized

the developers and their wives (Sonia Roberts and Debbie Sodolak), city and county officials and Burleson County Chamber of Commerce Director Susan Mott and chamber members.

Jessica Armstrong of Armstrong Properties then welcomed the crowd and recognized her staff.

Armstrong said, "We hope that the community is as excited as we are about this development."

Roberts then addressed the audience and expressed his appreciation to those in attendance and to the City of Caldwell "for allowing us to be a part of the Caldwell family."

"We're excited and we are looking forward to working with the whole City of Caldwell," Roberts said.

Caldwell mayor Norris McManus then said, "I love Caldwell, and this is awesome."

"Most all of you know Caldwell is growing at this present time. Looking at these homes, I'm so proud to be a part of it," he said.

McManus said that the entire city council is behind the project and said, "We're just tickled to death to know that good things are going to happen."

He then said that the city will need to "do a little infrastructure work" but "things are looking great."

McManus said, "We don't have much housing here, as you all know, as this is going to be a wonderful thing to happen here."

Finally, Mott spoke because Champion Forest joined the chamber at the groundbreaking ceremony.

She said that she had a "connection" with both developers. She and Sodolak both went to

school together in Somerville, and she has known Roberts for several years.

After the ceremony, there was a reception held at The Old Post Office and the chamber also held a "Business After Hours" event in conjunction with the groundbreaking.

RRC issues nine new oil, gas permits

The Texas Railroad Commission (RRC) recently issued nine new oil well drilling permits in Burleson County in January.

The RRC report is for newly approved permits in the county, not for drill sites which were previously permitted.

The January permits were for:

- * Bell B 1H, located 3.2 miles north of Lyons in the J. W. Bell survey and in a Giddings (Eagleford) field, operated by Chesapeake Operating, L.L.C.

The RRC issued a total of 1,133 original drilling permits in January, compared to 1,199 in January 2019.

The Texas rig count as of Feb. 21 was 397, according to Baker Hughes Incorporated.

Texas preliminary November crude oil production averaged 3,352,056 barrels daily, compared to the 3,066,399 barrels daily average of November 2018.

The preliminary Texas total natural gas production figure for November averaged 23,288,161 Mcf per day, compared to the 21,150,604 Mcf daily average reported during November 2018.

Texas production in November came from 173,528 oil wells and 88,349 gas wells.

Loeblein said evidence from the scene, and from examining her leg, did not support that story. In addition, after removing a bandage that the EMS crew had placed on her leg, he learned that there was no gunshot wound, he said.

However, there were some cutting wounds, indicating that she may have cut herself, he said.

Loeblein said her commanding officer at Fort Hood was contacted, and the officer said she had been experiencing mental health issues.

Army officials arrived to transport her, and the woman's mother, who had planned to meet her in Chappell Hill, arrived to take the baby.

Loeblein said police could have charged her with deadly conduct, making a firearm available to a child or unlawful carrying but opted not so, due to her mental condition.

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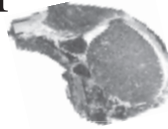

*David never sought revenge
despite Saul trying to kill him*

David, the shepherd boy who slew the giant Goliath and was anointed by King Saul many years before he actually ascended to the throne himself, certainly had a right to want revenge. He was anointed of the Lord and faithfully served Saul, who should have been eternally grateful to him for defeating Goliath and saving Israel from the Philistines. But for some reason --

maybe it was jealousy -- Saul turned against David and even wanted to kill him. Yet David refused to let Saul's wrath and his actions turn his heart and make him revengeful. This is a good lesson for all of us to learn. No matter what someone does with our mercy, we must not let it change our heart before God. We should treat a friend or an enemy with the same grace that the Lord has extended to us. This is just one of the many things we can learn by reading 1 and 2 Samuel as we go through the lives of both Saul and David. David first left his life at the palace under Saul to go back to the silence of the hillsides as a shepherd. But then he also went to live with the Philistines (1 Samuel 27:1-4). Some scholars interpret this action as wholly dishonoring to God, but some also believe the Lord used it to protect Israel's anointed king, sparing David from the battle in which King Saul was killed.

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David's time in Gath began when he "said in his heart . . ." If we are wise, we will listen to the voice of His Spirit, rather than to the fearful or negative whispers of our own heart, realizing that God is able to deliver His servants from any situation. In 1 Samuel 26:21, we read the summary of King Saul's life:

"I have sinned . . . indeed I have played the fool." The entire chapter summarized how foolish Saul acted in the latter years of his reign as king. He lived a life of waste and despair, eventually leading to disaster. During his early years as king, Saul was an entirely different per-

son. He loved God and extended that love to his people. He showed great leadership. But as the years went by, Saul began moving away from the closeness he once had with the Eternal God. Eventually the Lord was no longer in his life. This same thing can occur in the life of

this goodness to Your servant. Now therefore, let it please You to bless the house of Your servant, that it may continue before You forever; for You, O Lord God, have spoken it and with Your blessing let the house of Your servant be blessed forever" (2 Sam. 7:28-29).

Williams comes to Caldwell with a background in municipal planning and a passion for rural communities looking to enhance their community engagement and development.

Unlike previous Main Street Director Michelle Mahfouz, Williams will wear three hats -- overseeing the Main Street Program and the civic center and library.

White said he decided to create that new position to give the city a more comprehensive, community development approach.

And he is glad to have Williams on board.

“Forrest has a passion for small town community engagement. His education and experience are an excellent fit for the position,” White said. “Forrest will be able to help us put together a comprehensive plan for the Main Street area as well as the rest of the city. He will be very valuable in a number of other tasks with the city.”

Williams earned a Bachelor’s Degree in University Studies from Texas A&M University in 2016 and added a Master’s Degree in Urban Planning in 2019. He also holds a certificate in Sustainable Urbanism from Texas A&M, which emphasizes how to make communities more sustainable and resilient.

Prior to his appointment in Caldwell, Williams worked as a long-range planner for Flower Mound, a town of about 80,000 population near Dallas.

Though Flower Mound had experience in long-range planning, Williams’ position was helpful to them.

“It was good to prepare the community for growth,” Williams said.

Flower Mound already had a Smart GROWTH Program and a comprehensive master plan, and he relished the chance to help them increase transparency and communication in their planning efforts.

Williams said he was also involved in some code amendments, population projections and growth forecasting, all of which fascinated him.

When he heard about the Caldwell opening, Williams said he was intrigued.

“I have always been interested in small towns with passion and rich history,” Williams said.

As part of his Master’s program, he conducted an evaluation and appraisal of the downtown master plan for the City of Bryan.

Though not a Main Street city, Bryan has a master plan, and “that was what got me more interested in Main

Streets,” he said.

Also, as part of his Master’s program, he was a team leader for a comprehensive master plan for the City of Rockport, and the team’s efforts led to a Resiliency Award presented by the American Planning Association Texas Chapter (TXAPA), he said.

So Williams came to Caldwell with a background and an interest in Main Street programs as a downtown revitalization effort.

And that work fits into his overall mission as a community development director, he feels. Enhancing more activities for the civic center and the library are all part of that vision.

“Working with the library and civic center are all part of community development, and it makes sense to put that into one department,” Williams said.

For Main Street, Williams will begin work on evaluating the current conditions of Main Street with input from the Main Street Board.

And he looks forward to working with the board and getting their feedback.

“I think a lot can be done. We just need a plan to guide redevelopment and revitalization,” Williams said.

Williams said Caldwell’s Main Street program “has a lot of potential on the historical side of it and needs to be a community-wide effort.”

“There are a lot of buildings that look well kept on the outside,” he said.

He hopes to offer suggestions on how to make those buildings more sustainable and how to make them fit into a coordinated, downtown revitalization effort.

Williams said the downtown also needs to be “more walkable.”

More connectability to the highways is needed to draw more foot traffic into downtown, he said. Williams said something visual and eye-opening along the highway is needed to accomplish that. The mural and brick facade in front of the civic center is an excellent start.

“We can use that as a base point and work from there,” he said.

Williams said the Main Street area could also be expanded to the east and north to offer a better connection to other areas of the downtown.

“Way finding signs” are also helpful and should be utilized, he said.

Better use of in-fill lots and a downtown park would also add value, he said.

Williams was scheduled to meet with Lina Burns, Main Street’s chair, this week, and he is looking forward to his first formal meeting with the board at 5:30

p.m. on March 10 to hear all of their ideas.

Williams has also met with Debra Dresher, coordinator for the state Main Street program, and with Jan Harris, Main Street manager in Taylor, to get additional ideas.

Williams said he is looking forward to taking on this new opportunity, and citizens are welcome to contact him with their ideas.

who previously said he was dropping out of the race, received 37 votes. Faust's 63.43 percent of the vote meant there would be no runoff. For Precinct 3 commissioner, incumbent David

Hildebrand was re-elected to a fifth term with 781 votes, compared to 283 votes for challenger Curtis Barnett.

For tax assessor-collector Cheryl Story Castaneda, who was appointed in 2018, was elected to a full, four-year term by a 1,970 to 1,324 margin over Jessica Lucero, an employee in the county clerk's office and a former employee of the Brazos County Tax Assessor-Collector Office.

In the Precinct 1 constables race, incumbent Jason Muzny was re-elected to a second, four-year term by a 459 to 365 margin over Peter Glidewell, a Brazos County deputy constable. Muzny received 56 percent of the vote and there will be no runoff.

In the 335th District judge's race, Reva Tow-slee Corbett, seeking her fifth, four-year term, led by a 2,472 to 856 margin in Burleson County over challenger Charles Carver. Final, district-wide results were not available at press time.

No Democrats filed in the local races, so the Republican winners in these contested races will be unopposed in the November general election.

Burleson County Judge Keith Schroeder, a Republican appointed in 2019 and running unopposed for an unexpired, two-year term, received 3,009 votes.

Other unopposed Republican candidates seeking four-year terms included Burleson County Attorney Susan Deski, 2,827 votes, Precinct 2 Constable Dennis Gaas, 794 votes, Jay Boykin, running for Precinct 3 constable, 931 votes, and Paul Muzny, running for Precinct 4 constable, 604 votes.

Buddy Warren did not seek re-election for Precinct 3 constable, and Wayne Wilhelm did not seek re-election for Pre-

cinct 4 constable.

21st District Judge Carson Campbell also ran unopposed and received 2,875 votes in Burleson County. District-wide results were not available at press time.

For U.S Representative District 17, county voters chose Renee Swann with 1, 164 votes, compared to Pete Sessions, 637, George W. Hindman, 589, Elianor Vessali, 382, Trent Sutton, 183, Todd Kent, 175, Jeff Oppenheim, 56, Kristen Alamo Rowin, 48, Scott Bland, 41, David Sauce-do, 29, Laurie Godfrey McReynolds, 28, and Ahmad Adnan, 9.

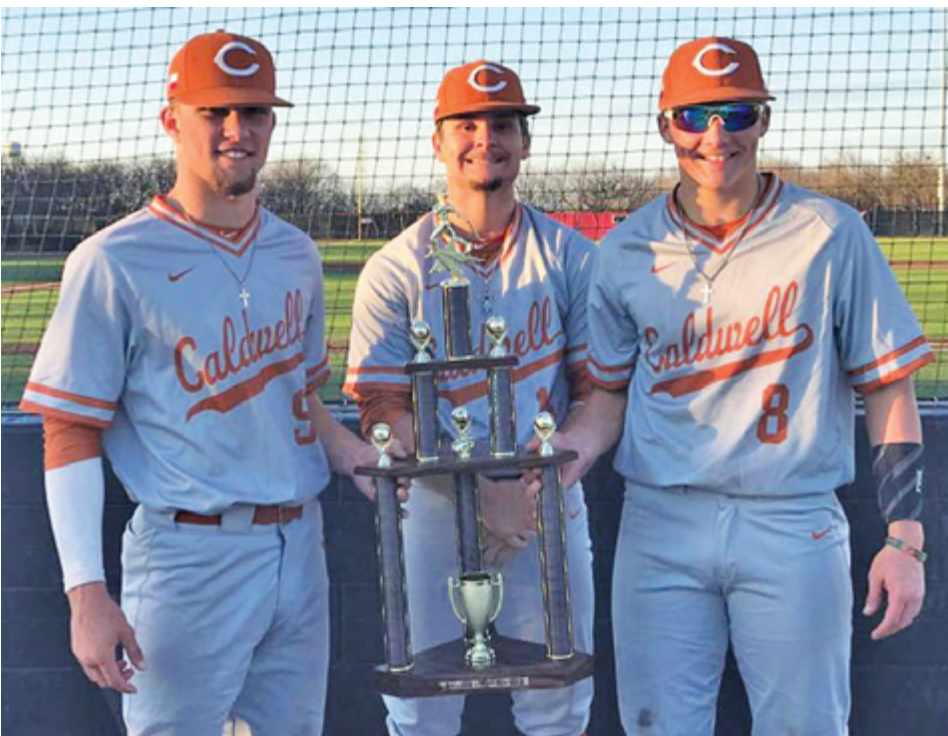
113, and James Coston, 117.

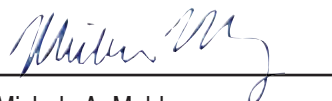

Entergy Texas, Inc. hereby publishes NOTICE that, pursuant to Section 36.203 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act (codified in TEX. UTIL. CODE) and 16 Tex. Admin. Code § 25.235(b), it filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (the “Commission”) on February 20, 2020, a tariff to implement a revised fixed fuel factor. All of Entergy Texas’ retail customers whose fuel charges are calculated under the Texas fixed fuel factor tariff – including but not limited to Residential, Small General Service, Large General Service, Large Industrial Power Service, and Street and Outdoor Lighting Service – will be affected by the Commission’s approval of the revised fixed fuel factor. The revised fixed fuel factor, if approved, will affect only the fuel portion of the rates charged by Entergy Texas and will have no effect on non-fuel base rates.

Entergy Texas seeks Commission approval to revise the fixed fuel factor effective with the first billing cycle of the March 2020 billing month. Entergy Texas proposed that the fixed fuel factor be changed pursuant to a semi-annual filing to be made each February and August, with revised fuel factors to be effective with the first billing cycle of the March and September billing months, pursuant to a methodology that changes the fuel factor based upon changes in the published price of natural gas. This methodology was authorized for use in Docket No. 32915.

The revised fixed fuel factor, differentiated by voltage level, is as follows:

The revised fuel factor would result in a decrease in Entergy Texas’ annual Texas retail fuel and purchased power revenues by approximately \$6.5 million, or 1.3% on an annual basis. Compared to the fixed fuel factor approved by the Commission effective September 2019, a residential customer using 1000 kilowatt-hours (kWh) of electricity per month would see an approximate decrease of .3% annually, or \$.34 on average per month, on his/her electric bill. The fixed fuel factor rate is designed to pass through to customers the actual fuel costs incurred by Entergy Texas to serve customers. Entergy Texas is not allowed to make a profit on fuel costs. Amounts collected from affected customers pursuant to the revised fixed fuel factor will be subject to final review by the Commission in Entergy Texas’ next applicable fuel reconciliation proceeding before the Commission. Entergy Texas expects the revised fixed fuel factor to be in effect for the billing period of March 2020 through September 2020.

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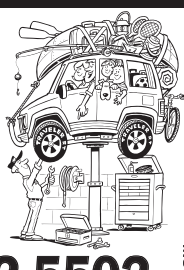
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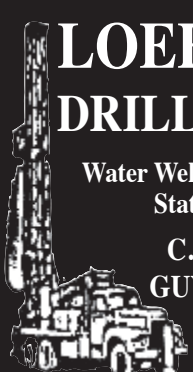
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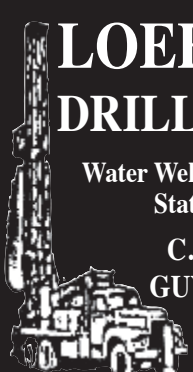

C3 Farms and Poultry, LLC, Recognized for Environmental Excellence by USPOULTRY

C3 Farms and Poultry, LLC of Caldwell, Texas, was one of six farms across the United States to receive U.S. Poultry & Egg Association’s Family Farm Environmental Excellence Award during the 2020 International Production & Processing Expo in Atlanta. U.S. Poultry & Egg Association (USPOULTRY) sponsors the annual award in recognition of exemplary environmental stewardship by family farmers engaged in poultry and egg production.

Applicants were rated in several categories, including manure management, nutrient management planning, community involvement, wildlife enhancement techniques, innovative nutrient management techniques, and participation in education and outreach programs. Applications were reviewed and farm visits conducted by a team of environmental professionals from universities, regulatory agencies and state poultry associations.

C3 Farms raises broilers for Sanderson Farms. The farm started in 1999 as Chmelar Poultry, which has since expanded its operation to include the Chmelar’s children and grandchildren. This inspired the new name “C3,” which represents the three generations of Chmelars who lived and worked on the farm. Over the years, their operation has gone from four broiler houses to eight, all of which are run with the same systems and equipment to ensure consistency across the board. These broiler houses are maintained with a careful litter management system, windrowing and reusing clean litter and transporting composted litter for use on the fields of both the Chmelars and their neighbors.

As their operation has grown, the Chmelars have kept their broiler houses up to date, installing LED lights and solid sidewalls to create an environment for their birds that is both calming and energy efficient. They continue to further their education, attending multiple seminars regarding rules, regulations and best practices for Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations. They are meticulous about biosecurity on the farm, carefully monitoring who enters the farm and offering disinfectant for shoes and tires at the farm entrance.

The Chmelar family is highly involved in their community, serving on the board for both the annual county fair and their local Farm Bureau agency. They actively participate in their local church. In the aftermath of Hurricane Harvey, the Chmelars were instrumental in sending trailers full of water, food and other needed supplies to hurricane victims.

C3 Farms loves the land that their family has lived and worked on for three generations, viewing it as their personal responsibility to build a sustainable operation to hand off to their children. Managing their resources and their environment is a way to create a more sustainable industry and home for their children to inherit and to provide for the land as it has provided for their family.

Mike Levengood, vice president, Chief Animal Care Officer and Farmer Relationship Advocate for Perdue Foods and vice chairman of the US-POULTRY board of directors, presented the award to Jamie and Sherri Chmelar.



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
