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Hermes to begin duties on March 15

Burleson County Sheriff Dale Stroud will step down and allow newly elected Sheriff Gene Hermes to be sworn in on Sunday, March 15.

That announcement was made at the Monday, March 9, commissioners court meeting.

Stroud, who served previously for 12 years as county sheriff, came out of retirement to fill in as interim sheriff after the Oct. 10, 2019, resignation of Thomas Norsworthy.

The commissioners have set a 9:30 a.m. special meeting on Thursday, March 12, to accept Stroud's resignation and to appoint Hermes as the new sheriff and to approve his bond.

Hermes formal swearing in ceremony is set for 1 p.m. on Sunday, March 15, at the Burleson County Courtroom on the third floor of the county courthouse.

Hermes was elected in the Republican Primary on Tuesday, March 3, See HERMES, page 2A

Chilifest still planned despite COVID-19 issue

The latest canceled event due to COVID-19 was the St. Patrick's Day parade in Boston.

With events that draw large crowds canceling across the nation, such as the parade in Boston and SXSW in Austin amid the concerns over COVID-19 (or more commonly the coronavirus), the organizers of Chilifest have announced that the two-day music event in April is still planned.

The event typically draws more than 30,000

Burleson County got some moisture over the winter but certainly not to the levels of last year. In fact, some believe that the moisture profile could have been a bit better this year.

Schroeder eyes Coronavirus plan

With the Coronavirus gripping much of the country with concern and fear, local officials are trying to learn as much as they can and to have a plan.

Burleson County Judge Keith Schroeder told the county commissioners at their Monday, March 9, meeting that he has already met with officials from the Texas Department of Health and Human Services to get some input

and to begin preparing a plan if it is needed.

As county judge, Schroeder, with input from local doctors and state health officials, would make the call on whether specific quarantines are needed and how they would be organized, Schroeder said after the meeting.

Though no cases have been reported locally, Schroeder said he wants the county to be ready

Judge rules against throwing out lawsuit

A federal judge has dismissed motions by Burleson County and by Mike Sutherland and his business to throw out a lawsuit by a former clerk in the Burleson County Attorney's Office.

The woman alleges that Sutherland, a former Burleson County judge, sexually assaulted her at the courthouse

by a 2,147-1,320 margin over Jayson Lyday. No Democrat filed for the position, so Hermes would be unopposed in the November general election.
According to normal custom, the new sheriff would be sworn into office on Jan. 1, 2021, but Schroeder said on Monday, March 9, that Stroud had planned to step down after a new sheriff was elected, rather than serving through December.
And Stroud believes the department will be ready for the change. "The guys coming in will be fully briefed,"

Stroud told the commissioners at their Monday meeting, and they are working for "a smooth transition."
Stroud also stepped down in December of 2016 after Norsworthy's election, citing the desire for a smoother transition than the typical Dec. 31-Jan. 1 model.
"It is difficult for any county to go any length of time without a sheriff," Stroud said on Monday.
A new sheriff typically takes over on Jan. 1, but there is a void of a few hours until the sheriff is sworn in, he said.
And there is not necessarily a need to wait

until the end of the year to make the change.
Resigning early and transferring leadership can be more seamless.
"This will be a week of transition," Stroud said after the Monday commissioners' meeting.
"We have never had an opportunity to transition people like this," he said.
Stroud said he is meeting with Hermes and the staff to coordinate all the details and to ensure that all vital information is shared concerning ongoing cases and department management.
"This will be a time to go over issues and priorities, scheduling for events coming up,

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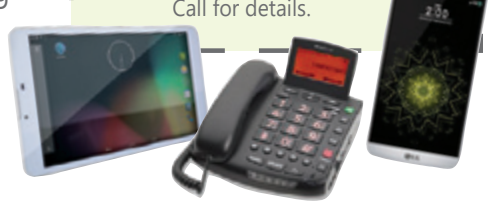
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problem areas and good areas," Stroud said.
Stroud said goodbye to the commissioners at their Monday meeting.
"I hope in some way I have filled in and improved things a little," Stroud said.
Schroeder said the "whole county appreciates everything that you have done."
Stroud responded that he has had "a lot of support and a lot of dear friends."
Hermes, a 22-year law enforcement veteran, has spent 20 years with the Burleson County Sheriff's Office, most recently serving as chief deputy.
He received Stroud's endorsement in the pri-

mary.
Hermes agreed to take over the duties early and is looking forward to the job.
"I am ready and excited to bring my ideas and plans," Hermes said. "I look forward to working with the employees and citizens of Burleson County. The door to the sheriff's office is always open for citizens if they have questions."
Hermes said he is keeping the existing staff, although he has added a new chief deputy John Pollock.
Pollock most recently worked as a patrol lieutenant with the Brazos County Sheriff's Office and was with them for

28 years.
Hermes said Pollock will bring excellent experience to the position.
"I am excited to get the level of experience that he brings to our agency, and he will be a great asset," Hermes said.
Hermes said he also appreciates Stroud for stepping in on an interim basis.
"I commend him for doing what he did and running this agency and letting me run for this office," Hermes said. "It has been an honor to work under him as chief deputy. You could not have asked for a better man to come in and be the interim sheriff."

Somerville Council eyes ordinances for bond election

The Somerville City Council was scheduled to meet on Tuesday, March 10, to approve ordinances related to the May 2 \$1.5 million bond election.
That included approval of the early voting schedule and the election day voting location at the Somerville ISD administration offices.
In addition, they were to consider a lease agreement for election equipment between the city of Somerville and Burleson County for both early voting and election day.
Another item was approval of a joint election agreement with the Somerville School District.
They were also to appoint the election judge and alternate election judge, establish the maximum number of election clerks, establish the maximum rate of compensation for election judges and clerks and appoint the early voting ballot board and the central counting station.
The city is calling a bond election for major street rehabilitation and improvements to the water distribution system and sanitary sewer system.
In other business at the meeting:

*Paul Messenheimer with Frontier Communications was to give a presentation on DSL expansion in the city of Somerville.
*Gary Metcalf with Cadence Sports was to give a presentation regarding the Texas MS 150 bike ride and its path through the city of Somerville.
*The council was set to discuss and take action on the authorization of City Administrator Danny Segundo to enter into an agreement with Mercer Construction to repair the city's storm sewer system on Rosa Lee Lane.

visitors annually, however, the event is more statewide and not known as an international event like SXSW.
KBTX-TV reported that Chilifest Chairman Cole Roberts said the concern about Austin's SXSW is because it brings in international artists and spectators.
Roberts told KBTX that Chilifest brings in mainly Texas residents, so Chilifest organizers are less concerned about the virus spreading. And, no musicians have backed out of performing at the event, KBTX reported.
Roberts said their main concern was being able to give back to the Brazos Valley and to ensure that everyone at the event remains safe, KBTX reported.
Burleson County Judge Keith Schroeder said he was already looking into a coronavirus plan for the county.
Schroeder said he has met with officials from the Texas Department of Health and Human Services to get some input and to begin preparing a plan if needed.
Though no cases have been reported locally, he and county officials are watching the situation closely, and Chil-

ifest will be an issue to consider.
Schroeder said circumstances could change in the next month if a worst-case scenario were to emerge.
The county judge would make the call, with input from local doctors and state health officials, on whether a local quarantine is needed and how it would be organized, he said.
"I don't expect that," Schroeder said on Monday.
And he agrees with Chilifest organizers that this event is different than SXSW in Austin.
"It (Chilifest) is not people from worldwide," Schroeder said.
Many of those attending are college students from Texas A&M University or other surrounding counties, he said.
But would bringing that number of people to Burleson County add to the risk locally?
Schroeder said county officials will be carefully monitoring the situation in Brazos County in the coming weeks.
If classes are still being held at Texas A&M, "I don't see any reason to do anything differently," Schroeder said.
"But there could be a point where we have to make a tough decision,"

Schroeder said.
Schroeder said he is also planning a meeting with Chilifest representatives in the near future. And he plans to meet with local school superintendents to discuss the overall issue of a coronavirus plan, he said.
Burleson County Emergency Management Coordinator Duane Strange said the county will maintain contact with state and federal officials for the latest information on the coronavirus.
"We want to make sure that we know what is going on, what the future might look like and keep our eyes and ears open," Strange said.
Though the risk is still generally low, Strange said everyone should follow basic precautions.
That includes washing your hands, not touching your face and sanitizing areas like door knobs and counter tops, he said.
And anyone sick with flu-like symptoms -- including fever, cough and breathing issues -- should call their health care provider before going in for an appointment. Get the doctor's advice on when to arrive and how to enter the building, he said.

primarily through a one-penny-per-pack tax on cigarettes. In 1993, the 73rd Legislature replaced the cigarette tax funding with a portion of revenues derived from the sales tax on sporting goods. The sporting goods sales tax was designed to create a steady stream of funding for state parks, but the amount of the tax has fluctuated over the years. Under Proposition 5, the entire amount of the already existing state sales tax on sporting goods will be permanently dedicated to state parks and historic sites.

The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department and the Texas Historical Commission are already beginning to alleviate an estimated \$800 million backlog of deferred maintenance and repairs across the state's parks and historic sites.

Some Trees And Signs Were Blown Down Over Town

SHARP LIGHTNING UNUSUAL THIS TIME OF YEAR COMES WITH BLOW Friday afternoon, Jan. 4, about four o'clock, a strong freakish south wind struck the city and continued in unusual proportions for approximately an hour or more, something very unusual at this season of the year. It was preceded by heavy rains and lightning. The wind wrought some minor damages. Some trees were blown down, some limbs were blown off, and one syndicate sign was demolished and a few other minor damages resulted.

The rains were rather intermittent throughout the afternoon and proved of great benefit to the soils. About one half inch fell.

Again Tuesday night the county was visited by further rains that proved to be of additional benefit to the soils. Approximately three-fourths of an inch of rain fell.

The Tuesday night rain was preceded two or three days and nights by a hard freeze and a heavy frost.

As a result of the rains and the freezes, the crop outlook for the year has been enhanced.

Man charged in meth possession

A Livingston man was arrested on Saturday, March 7, on a felony drug charge after a traffic stop by Caldwell Police Officer John Hammons on State Highway 21 West.

and at his business, the Funky Junky in Caldwell, in 2017.

U.S. District Judge Lee Yeakel dismissed their motions on Feb. 18 without prejudice. Without prejudice in legal terms means the county and Sutherland may refile their motions at a later time.

Sutherland's motion stated that he denied all of the allegations, and his attorney challenged some legal aspects of her filing. Sutherland is represented by attorney David Minton of Austin.

The county's claim stated that the county, specifically the county judge, had not been formally served with the lawsuit as required.

The county also argued in their motion that she worked for the county attorney's office at the time of the alleged offenses and was not an employee of the county judge. Therefore, her civil rights violation alleging sexual harassment would not apply to where she worked, the motion stated.

And she has not and cannot establish any facts showing that she was terminated due to alleged involvement with the county judge, the motion stated.

Burleson County was added as a defendant in the lawsuit in a supplemental filing on Jan. 2.

The case was originally filed in Caldwell listing Jane Doe as the plaintiff and moved at Sutherland's request to the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Texas in Austin.

The former employee's petition states that Burleson County is jointly and severally liable to her because Sutherland was the county judge and "acted under the color of law" when he sexually assaulted her in November and December of 2017 and January of 2018.

The lawsuit was originally filed on Nov. 27, 2019, in Burleson County, and she is seeking damages for mental anguish and pain. Her attorney, U.A. Lewis of Houston, said previously that she would seek at least \$1 million in damages.

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as a lowly shepherd, to his service in the king's palace, to the time he was crowned king of Israel. It was all part of God's plan, and David knew that in all his different circumstances that God was using him. David didn't always know his true destiny, but he never doubted that God was guiding and using him every day.

2 Samuel records how Jerusalem first became the capital of Israel under David's reign. During the time of Abraham, it was a royal city (Genesis 14:18), but other than in brief battles, the Jebusites, a Canaanites tribe, controlled Jerusalem. It was Jerusalem that was one of the strongholds Joshua couldn't

conquer (Joshua 15:63; Chronicles 11:4-5). But Jerusalem was perfectly located for David, since it was on the border between Judah and the northern tribes. That made it possible for David to unify his kingdom. Since it was also located on a hill, it had natural defenses, and it was located near the spring of Gihon, so

there was a very good water supply. God worked through David to bring all this about for his chosen people. It was made possible because David was a man of God and let his life be guided by the Lord. But both 1 and 2 Samuel showed us how David's life was filled with ups and downs, good things and bad things -- not unlike

our own lives. What we admire in the life of David doesn't do away with the things we don't like about his life. This isn't a story of what God wants us to be, but rather a story of God working with the raw material of our lives -- just the way we are at certain times. In fact, David's story is told in so much de-

tail that we can see the good, bad and the ugly as it took place in his life. In the end, it shows how God is able to work in the life of any of us -- no matter how messed up it may be at times. As long as we continue to trust Him in any circumstance, He will make things work out for us, just as he did David. -- Buddy Preuss

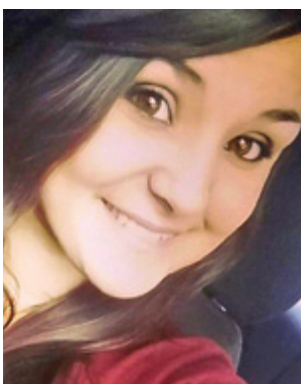

ing. In general, the subsoil moisture is adequate.

Planting got underway over the last week, with a few delays for some light showers, and it looks like this year's crop will be on schedule.

Burleson County Extension Agent John Grange said "our weather right now is pretty good."

"We are getting some sunshine and some warmer days," Grange said. "Hopefully, it will hold up, and we won't get that late freeze."

Grange said the county could have used some more moisture over the winter, improving the soil profile.

However, farmers have "had a couple of showers over the past couple of weeks which will always help, but it is right in the middle of planting."

Overall, farmers just need a drier trend in the short term until they finish planting.

"Planting is going. We just need some sunshine and clear days until we can get it in the ground," he said.

Longtime Caldwell area corn farmer John Malazzo said on Thursday, March 5, said he was about ready to start -- and hopeful with the improved conditions.

"I think right now is just about the right time to plant," Malazzo said. "Of course, you never know what the weather is going to do. I hope we don't have any more freezes. We will plant and see what Mother Nature deals us."

Malazzo said he is grateful that the fields are not too wet this time.

"Last winter, it just got too wet, and you couldn't get the land prepared," Malazzo said. "This year it is more dry, and we got the land worked up and broken up good and all the rows up."

And there was just enough rain without excessive conditions, he said.

Malazzo expects to plant about the usual acreage this year. If conditions remain right, he will not have to switch some corn acreage to cotton as he was forced to do last year.

In Snook, Edmund Sebesta said on March 5 that he had started on Friday, Feb. 28, and was done.

"Everything worked out good. It was a lot easier this year. It looks like we are way ahead of the ball game," Sebesta said.

Sebesta said he planted about 250 acres, roughly the same amount last year -- although late planting was required then.

Roughly half of the crop will be irrigated, and half will be dry land, as usual, he said.

And the soil profile for this spring was adequate.

"We didn't get a whole lot of rain, but there is good moisture in the ground," Sebesta said. "The last week or so, the weather has been good. There was a cold spell, and then it warmed up. It should be good for a week or so."

Sebesta said farmers "now just need some

warmer weather and sunshine to get it up and get it going."

Barney Homeyer, farming in the Caldwell area all his life, agrees that this year is so much better for planting.

And he is about on schedule.

"We are still going. There is still some (to plant) in the bottom and about two days more here (Caldwell area)," Homeyer said on Monday, March 9. "We are not far from being through. If we get about four more days, we will be through."

Burleson County is staying on schedule better than some other counties.

"In El Campo, they are just getting started today (March 9). We are not behind. If you can get it done in March, you are in good shape."

The weather had definitely been an advantage, he said.

"We have had a lot of little rains. There was good moisture," Homeyer said.

But farmers can always use more rain later, and that certainly remains true for corn. In addition, stock tanks are getting low, so more rain will be needed there, Homeyer said.

And Homeyer said he remains hopeful that he can avoid hog troubles, always a pestilence for local farmers right after planting.

Like his neighbors, Homeyer is just grateful that the fields are accessible.

"Last year it was so muddy that we couldn't plant until mid-April," he said. "There is always something to be thankful for."

Jungman to shoot for Team USA in 2020 Tokyo Summer Olympic Games

Caldwell native qualifies to compete in 2020 Olympics in Men's Skeet Shooting

On Sunday, Caldwell native, U.S. Army Spc. Phillip Jungman was named to Team U.S.A.'s Men's Skeet Olympic Team and will compete this summer at the 2020 Summer Olympics in Tokyo, Japan.

Jungman punched his ticket to the Games of the XXXII Olympiad by scoring 537 points to finish second during the two-stage trials at the 2020 U.S. Olympic Team Trials for Shotgun in Tucson, Ariz., this past weekend.

Vincent Hancock of Eatonton, Ga., qualified for a fourth consecutive Olympic Games, winning the Men's Skeet Shotgun 2020 U.S. Olympic Team Trials with a total of 547.

Two-time Olympian Frank Thompson of Alliance, Neb., who earned Team USA one of its two Olympic quo-

tas in the event, finished fifth, while Christian Elliott of Greenwood, Ind., the 2019 Pan American Games champion (where Jungman finished fourth) and a 2019 world cup silver medalist, was 10th.

Jungman has been shooting since being a member in the 4-H rifle club at 8-years-old, and has dreamed of being an Olympian since his first match at age 11.

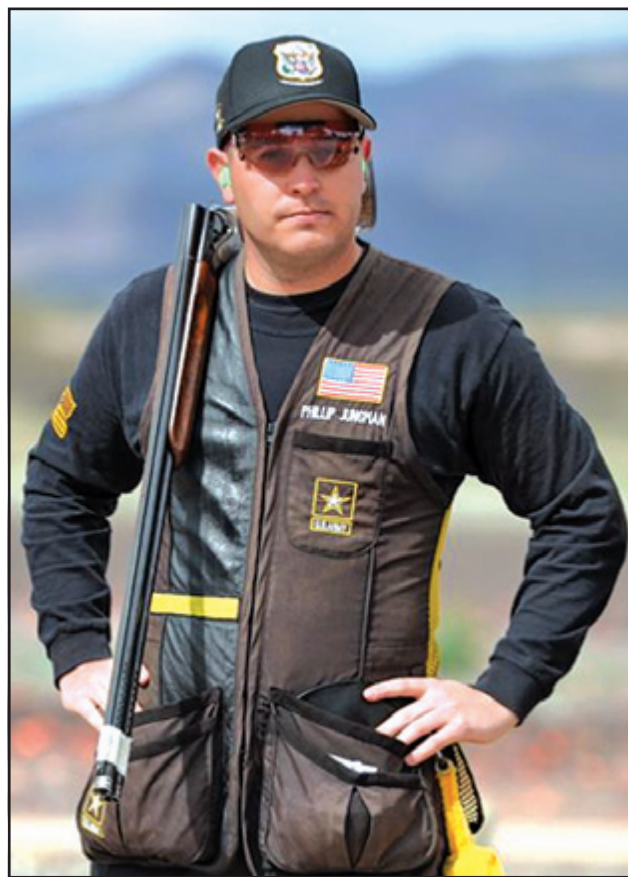
When asked how he first felt when he knew he was being named to Team USA, he said, "I cried, right off the bat."

And, the story of Jungman's Olympic dream began thousands of miles from Tokyo, host city of this summer's Olympics, at his home in Caldwell.

He said that his family has been a major part of his success by

supporting him financially and giving of their time.

Jungman said, "If you hit a baseball, you can go out in the field and pick it up and put it in a bucket to use again. In shooting, you pull the trigger, and the round goes off. But, you can't pick up the BBs or the bullets and reuse them."

"In shooting, it costs money every time you practice," he said.

He said that his family's time was also sacrificed for shooting events.

"My parents had three kids, yet they always made time to take me to any competition that I wanted to go to," he said.

And, to express his gratitude to his family for all their sacrifice, he invited his parents, grandparents, in-laws,

aunts... -- the whole family -- to be there with him at the Olympic trials.

He said, "It was kind of exciting to live through the experience together."

"And, my making it to the Olympics was just as valuable to them as it was to me," Jungman said.

Jungman first came onto the national scene in 2014 when he earned the title of 2014 Men's Junior National Champion and placed third overall in the 2014 Men's National Championship. Also, in 2014, he was the National Junior Olympic Shooting Men's Skeet Champion.

Since 2014, Jungman also made a name for himself on the international junior circuit, placing third at the 2014 ISSF Junior World Championships.

He then placed second at both the 2015 International Shooting Sport Federation (ISSF) Junior World Cup Final and the 2015 ISSF Junior World Championships.

In 2016, Jungman was close to fulfilling his Olympic dream, being named as Team USA's alternate to compete on the Men's Skeet Team in the 2016 Summer Olympic Games in Rio after finishing third in the final U.S. Olympic Team Trials.

However, upon Jungman's final shot at Sunday's Olympic Team Trials, Hancock told Jungman, "You're an Olympian forever."

And, Jungman could not say enough good things about Hancock after the competition.

He said of the three-time Olympian, "I couldn't have made it

with a better person."

"His mechanics are Number 1 in the world. He's untouchable. He's like the Michael Phelps of shooting."

"Whenever you shoot behind him in order, you get to see his form and see how to do it correctly," he said, "which helped me at this year's trials."

"He told me after a bad round this week, 'Keep your head up, you worked hard.' He said, 'You've looked so much better than you have in the past.' I attribute a lot of this to him as well, because everybody can tell you 'Good job,' but it means a lot when it comes from a two-time Olympic gold medalist," Jungman said.

"I'm excited to be able to work with him and exchange ideas."

Jungman described the trials process as being “miserable,” thanks to the stress.

He said, “Lots of hours waking up and then you can’t go to sleep because it’s on your mind. You’re getting four hours of sleep a night, you know you have to compete the next day, your stomach drops about every five minutes. It doesn’t go away, but you have to push through it.”

“I’ve been in this scenario many times, but now I finally learned how to deal with it -- how to deal with the noise from everybody around, and deal with the nerves, and how to focus whenever you go out there,” he said.

Jungman said that in the past three years he’s also learned the importance of coaching himself.

“I’ve learned that when you get to the end that there is no one to be your next coach.

You start with your parents, then there’s high school, collegiate coaches and athletes -- maybe a pro can teach you something in college -- but in the end, there’s no one left to be your coach,” he said.

“You can ask others that have been there and done that for advice, but there’s no step further because you’ve now gone just as far as those people.”

To coach himself, Jungman said, “You need to admit to yourself your faults and then pick one to work on. After you’ve worked on it, switch to another fault. After a year, you’re going to be better than when you started.”

Though Tokyo 2020 is the fulfillment of Jungman’s childhood dream, he will never forget his life in Burleson County and the people who have touched him in some way.

Jungman said, “Former employers, baseball coaches, football coaches, people who donated to the shooting

range in Tunis, people who bought my rabbits at the Burleson County Fair -- you have all made me who I am today.”

“A lot of people don’t realize the impact that they have made in my life.”

“You made me the shooter I am today,” Jungman said.

Jungman, a 2013 Caldwell High School graduate, is the son of Chris and Cindy Jungman of Caldwell. He has two brothers, Kyle and Ty, and is married to Rebecca Lewis.

Jungman also is an active duty specialist in the U.S. Army and currently shoots as a member of the U.S. Army Marksmanship Unit.

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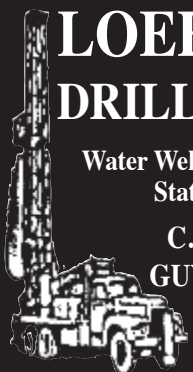
