

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## Rangers aim to gain experience and set the tone for varsity return next season

The Park High football team is working to build off the progress it made last season.

After the first week of the last season, Park coaches and administrators made the decision to forfeit their varsity season in interest of player safety due to a low number of varsity-ready players. Instead, the Rangers only competed at the JV level.

As per Montana High School Association rules, the Rangers will compete in JV games again this season before they can jump back to varsity next year.

Head Coach Nick Coate said things have gone really well so far, as the Rangers already picked up their first win over Belgrade on Sept. 3, 39-24.

Coate said he was pleased with the performance and that the Rangers played a complete game on both the offensive and defensive sides of the ball.

Coate said the Rangers started slower than they would have liked, but they came on strong and built a big lead. The lead allowed the Rangers to give some of their younger players some valuable experience, something they will try to do whenever possible this year.

Without playoffs to shoot for, Coate said the team has a simple goal this season.

"We just need to focus on improving every week," he said.

Coate added that this season will help set the tone for next year.

The Rangers are led by a small group of seniors, but Coate said the strong core of junior players has the Rangers excited for things to come.

Junior Sebastian Perry takes over at quarterback this season. Last year, Perry saw time as the backup to Sage McMinn.

Sage's younger brother, Kaden McMinn, is also one of the Rangers core juniors that will play a leadership role on both sides of the ball.

Drew Rogge returns as a receiver and defensive back. Rogge started both ways for the Rangers last season.

Coate also mentioned the emergence of Zarren Roninger as another junior to watch this season.

Coate has also seen a huge improvement on the offensive

line, across the board.

It might be easy for some of the older Ranger players to get the itch to get back to playing at the varsity level, but Coate said that hasn't been an issue on this team.

"The guys that are there have really bought into the system," Coate said as the older players work to develop a "new culture" at Park.

In terms of team goals, Coate said he and the players are on the same page.

"I think our goal should be to win every game this year," Coate said, adding that he feels that goal is something that is definitely realistic for the crew he oversees.

#### Up next

The Rangers are scheduled to play again on Sept. 18 against East Helena.

## Speake takes the reins as Park High hopes for fresh season

The Park High volleyball team aims to reload this season with a new face at the helm.

Brenda Speake takes over as head coach after coaching the JV team last season and has high hopes for the Lady Rangers.

COVID-19 has already impacted much of their season, including some conference games against Billings Central and Hardin. But the pandemic has also forced the Lady Rangers to miss some of the early season tournaments that they usually participate in.

Speake said it's been challenging for the Lady Rangers because they haven't faced the amount of competition they normally do.

"The hardest part is giving varsity a challenge during practice," Speake said.

In order to accurately simulate another varsity opponent, the coaches have had to step in to give the Lady Rangers some action against stronger swings that they'll see during conference play.

Due to some of the cancellations, Park will only face some of their normal conference opponents once this season, meaning they will have less opportunity to game plan for the teams as the post-season approaches.

Park will rely on their three key seniors, according to Speake. Terran Speake, Coach Speake's daugh-

Skylar Higgs will be important on the offensive end as she comes back to play outside hitter for the Lady Rangers.

Raina Floyd's role will expand this year as she steps into a starting role as the right-side hitter for Park.

Coach Speake said she hopes the core

group of seniors can help lead the team through mistakes and lulls in momentum that are a natural part of volleyball.

"Volleyball is such a game of momentum and mistakes," Coach Speake said.

Speake believes in the group of players she has and said they are "super connected" and play well with each other as a team. She isn't putting a ceiling on what this team is able to accomplish this year

"This team has the potential to do great things," she said.

Park already got underway with a game against Butte Central. The Lady Rangers won the first two sets before they dropped the final three sets to fall in five.

Despite the loss, Speake said she's happy with the way her team played.

"We walked away from that game pretty happy because we played strong," she said.

## Rangers added depth brings new opportunities

The Park High School boys' soccer team added some much-needed depth this off-season and looks to improve this season with a fuller roster.

Last year, the Park boys had just 14 players on their roster. This year, the Rangers have upped that total to 24, according to head coach Jeff Dickerson.

Of those 24 players, 11 of them return with significant varsity experience.

The Rangers added seven freshman to help fill out their roster and added a few players that didn't turn out for soccer last season.

This year is also the first where the Park soccer program has done a co-op with Sweet Grass County High School, which has afforded them another extra player that makes the trip from Big Timber.

The newfound depth gives the Rangers a chance to field a JV roster to develop some of the younger players.

Additionally, the Rangers will be able to have a deeper bench on varsity, with more experience than previous

"I think it's going to give us a bench of about four to give highly skilled players," Dickerson said.

The bigger roster will also allow the Rangers to do more

scrimmages during practice, which will increase the team's intensity along with their experience, Dickerson added.

The Rangers senior experience will help guide the team this year. Tristan Stenseth was one of the leading goal-scorers in all of Class A last season. He returns alongside Nathan Brown, who led Class A in assists. The senior duo will look to build on their impressive junior campaigns this season.

Last year, the Rangers fell just shy of the playoffs as they lost in a shootout in the play-in game last season. Dickerson said he believes the team can improve on that finish and make a run toward a top finish in state.

"We have the hopes that this team will go much deeper into the playoffs," he said.

After facing cancellations due to COVID-19, the Rangers had to wait longer than usual before their first matchup of the season. That first match came on Sept. 12 against Lone Peak.

Although Lone Peak is a new addition to their conference this season, the game did not count toward their conference record.

The Rangers played Lone Peak to a 1-1 draw in the opener. Dickerson said the team got off to a slower start than they were hoping for and "couldn't quite get everything put together."

He said that a slower start is

normal, especially after waiting so long to see game action. Due to scheduled water breaks in the game, Dickerson said it played like a game with four quarters as opposed to two halves. He was happy to see that his team got better with each passing quarter.

The Rangers will face Lone Peak again in their first official conference game on Sept. 17.

Looking forward, with only five seniors, the added depth this season means nearly 20 Rangers will return next year. Dickerson said that the returning experience will help the Rangers strengthen their program for years to come by building depth, experience and player quality.

On the boys' side, three runners are leading the pack for the Rangers. Andrew Durgan, McCrae Wester and Charlie Serafin have placed top three, in order, in two of their three meets this season. They have finished in that order every time so far this year.

The only time they didn't take the top three spots, Durgan finished third and McCrae and Serafin fin-

ished seventh and eighth, respective-

COVID-19 has forced the Rangers to take things one week at a time and remain flexible, but Lentz said he

expects big things from the team over the remainder of the season.

"This is a small group, smaller than we'd like to see, but they're a great group," Lentz said.

Pierson said the shifting schedule has also made it hard for the team to set goals for the season.


"It's hard to set goals when you don't know when you're going to be playing," he said.

For the girls, Elsa Cajune shot a 97, which put her third, while Ashlan Mortensen tied for sixth with a 102. Jessica Gubler also cracked the top 10 as she finished eighth with a 105.

"My boys are really solid and my girls are really consistent," Cahoon said of her team.

The Rangers also hosted a dual with Dillon, which saw both the boys and girls take home a win.

Cahoon said the season has been interesting with all of the changes due to the pandemic, but she aims to keep her team sharp for the postseason.

"I've just been trying to keep them out and playing golf," she said.

## Rebels seek to build off 2019 success

The Shields Valley High School football team has wasted no time building off of its unprecedented run to the Class C 6-man quarterfinals last season.

The Rebels aim to do even bigger and better things this year and are already off to an undefeated, 3-0

"We've started the season exactly how we wanted," Head Coach Mitch Ward said.

The Rebels have 11 players out for football this season, up from 10 last year.

The Rebels had to replace significant production from Emmett Gilbert, who graduated after leading the Rebels in rushing last season

with over 1,000 yards.

To help bridge the gap left by Gilbert, Aidan Jenkins returns for his senior season after a dynamic junior campaign that saw him lead the Rebels in receiving and provide a change of pace from Gilbert in the run game.

Across the first two games this season, Jenkins has already filled in as Shields Valley's leading rush-

Jenkins toted the ball 36 times in the first two games, amassed 349 yards and scored three touchdowns. He also caught eight passes for another 121 yards and two more touchdowns.

After splitting time last season as a freshman, Kaden Acosta takes over at quarterback full time for the Rebels this season.

"He grew a little, got a little bit stronger and settled into his role," Ward said.

Acosta has already shown efficiency under center, completing 18 of 23 passes for 316 yards and seven touchdowns to just one interception across the Rebels first two wins.

Dylan Flatt, who split time with Acosta at QB last season and led the Rebels in passing, has shifted over to tight end and already leads Shields Valley in receiving with 199 yards on 11 catches with four touchdowns.

All told, the Rebels saw four players score two or more touchdowns in the first two games.

On defense, Flatt lead the Rebels with 33 tackles and has had a nose for the football as he's intercepted three passes.

Hazen Marshall amassed 30 tackles and also picked two passes for the Rebels early on.

The community rallied behind the Rebels on their run last season, and Ward said that has continued so far this year.

"It's been so great to see how the community has been supporting our guys," he said.

The COVID-19 restrictions threw a wrench into the way the Rebels practiced early, but Ward said it's become second nature to the team and something they are used to dealing with.

Pandemic distractions aside, Ward said the Rebels have their eyes set on repeating as conference champions and making another deep run in the playoffs.

Collins has been the assist leader for the Rebels from the setter position so far this season.


Now that the Lady Rebels have wins under their belt, Jenkins said their goal is to be consistent and continue to apply the skills they learn in practice to the games.

"I think the future looks pretty bright right now," Harbach said.


The Lady Bruins already have a few games under their belt. They started the season 2-1 after beating Shields Valley and splitting matches with Townsend.

The Gardiner football team is facing an uphill battle this season, with low numbers and a lot of lost production.

Not only do the Bruins have to replace Elijah Byrd, who accounted for nearly 75 percent of the team's total offense and led the team in tackles, but they have to do so with just six players.

Every player has played every snap for the Bruins this year. In total, they have just one senior, four sophomores and a freshman.

Mike Baer takes over the program again after coaching the team years ago. Baer said this season is mainly about learning for the Bruins.

"They're just learning and playing against juniors and seniors that are bigger, faster and stronger than them," Baer said. The lack of experience and low numbers have made the first two games challenging for the Bruins, who lost by a large margin to both Noxon and Hot Springs, without marking the scoreboard in either game.

The Bruins were scheduled to play on Sept. 19 against White Sulphur Springs, but will have to forfeit because one of their six players has to sit out with a concussion.

Baer said he's aiming to build unity and consistency. To do that, he is also coaching the middle school teams to keep things consistent throughout the program.

The Bruins are scheduled to play Valley Christian on Sept. 26.

Baer commended the Bruins lone senior, Tyler Koel, as someone who has remained committed to the program and been a leader despite the struggles.

The Sweet Grass County football team is searching for positives in a season that sees a lot of new faces taking the field.

The Herders kicked off practice on Aug. 14, but they had to close up practice for a few days while a player was awaiting results from a COVID-19 test.

"We had a player tested for COVID, but it came back negative so that actually shut down for three practices so we're kind of feeling like we're behind," Head Coach J.V. Moody said.

The Herders are young, but Moody hopes his five seniors help the younger players get acquainted with the system.

"Hopefully those guys will step up and get these younger kids to realize what it's all about," Moody said.

Senior Payson Morgan has been one of the senior leaders for the Herders. He said he realizes how fortunate the Herders are to be playing this year and he's not taking it for granted.

"Just being out here right now, we don't really know what the future will hold as far as shut downs and everything," he said. "We're just going week-by-week and we're grateful to have every practice and every game that we do get to have."

Moody said there are a lot of new faces on the roster this season, which means he has to look at each player to see how they fit into the scheme.

"We're young," Moody said.
"Trying to figure everything out again. The make up of our team is way different than it has been in the past. We're trying to figure

out a spot for everybody. We've got to figure out where to plug them in."

The Herders will have a new face under center as junior Connor Giesecke steps in to play quarterback. Moody said he's comfortable handing the reins to someone with varsity experience.

"Quarterback situation is good," Moody said. "Connor Giesecke, he's probably one of our most athletic kids. He's got some game experience, not a lot at quarterback, but I think he started every game last year on the defensive side of the ball."

The Herders have been in action for three weeks now, but they've only played two games after their week two matchup with Colstrip was canceled due to poor air quality.

The Herders' two games against Red Lodge and Townsend

showed just how young the team is as they lost in convincing fashion in both games and managed just one touchdown in each game.

The Herders have improved, but they still make drive-killing mistakes that keep them out of the scoring column.

Giesecke looked more comfortable under center in game two against Townsend and was able to lead the Herders downfield and put them in scoring position multiple times, but some ill-timed penalties halted drives and stunted any momentum the Herders managed to get.

Defensively, the Herders have gotten off to slow starts in both games, but they've tightened up as the games progressed.

The Herders will look to piece things together as they hit the road and take on Jefferson on Sept. 18.
