Biden win confirmed after pro-Trump mob storms U.S. Capitol

WASHINGTON — Congress confirmed Democrat Joe Biden as the presidential election winner early Thursday after a violent mob loyal to President Donald Trump stormed the U.S. Capitol in a stunning attempt to overturn America's presidential election, undercut the nation's democracy and keep Trump in the White House. Lawmakers were resolved to complete the Electoral College tally in a display to the country, and the world, of the nation's enduring commitment to uphold the will of the voters and the peaceful transfer of power. Processing plants in Oklahoma are backlogged, with producers looking to

Vaccinations now available at county health department

Appointments can be made on state portal

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MIAMI — COVID-19 vaccinations are now available through the Ottawa County Health Department and North-east Tribal Health System, but those seeking the shots must make an appointment. The first wave of vaccinations has been for healthcare workers, first responders and persons 65 and older.

Appointments through the Ottawa County Health Department can be made through its website at <https://www.signupgenius.com/go/10c0d45abaa29aaf58-ottawa1>

Slots can also be booked by calling 918-542-5796. Ottawa County is one of nine regional PODS (Points of Dispensing Sites) that have been set up by the health department across the state that have been set up for vaccination distribution. The OSDH says there is no list for Oklahomans

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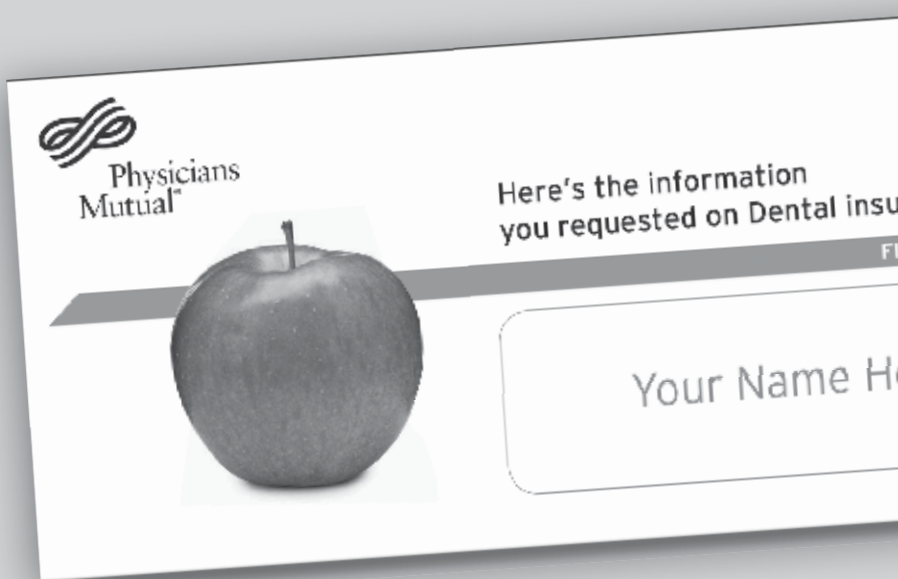

NEO, Northeast Tech lay groundwork for nursing partnership

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MIAMI — Northeastern Oklahoma A&M College in Miami and Northeast Tech's Kansas Campus recently signed a memorandum of understanding to develop the NEO Associate Degree Nursing Program Fast Track for licensed practical nurses and licensed paramedics on the Kansas campus.

Through the support of Northeast Tech, the NEO nursing program would deliver the classes and provide the student support services for the Nursing Fast Track on the Northeast Tech Kansas Campus.

This collaboration between Northeast Tech and NEO would create a path for graduates of the Northeast Tech practical nursing program to pursue the associate degree nursing program for registered nurses while living and working in the Kansas area.

"This is the first step in developing a program that will allow our institutions to collaborate and provide for one of the most high-demand careers in Oklahoma," said Dr. Kyle Stafford, NEO president. "We're able to use our individual areas of expertise to educate Oklahoma students and enhance our own institutions at the same time."

Contingent upon receiving the required approvals, Northeast Tech's support would create the capacity for NEO to admit 10 students annually.

The Fast Track program at the Kansas Campus would be supported with one new full-time nursing faculty and one new adjunct faculty position. These faculty would teach classes, supervise

clinicals, advise students, and coordinate program activities under the direction and supervision of the NEO Nursing program director.

"This partnership stems from a true desire to meet the needs of the district," said Northeast Tech Superintendent Roger Crutchfield. "What we do at Northeast Tech, is find a workforce need and figure out a way to meet it. We look forward to working with NEO to close the gap on that nurse shortage."

Northeast Tech Director of Nursing Janet Trimble notes that the new partnership would be yet another way that the two institutions have collaborated over the past several years.

"We have established a strong partnership with NEO's Department of Nursing over the years through serving on each other's advisory committees," she said. "Bringing the bridge program to our Kansas Campus would bring even more opportunity for the LPNs in our local communities to further their nursing education."

The Northeast Tech Practical Nursing program prepares students for a

career as a Licensed Practical Nurse through a variety of hands-on and in-class learning. As LPNs, graduates have opportunities in a variety of fields, including long-term care, hospital nursing, and home health, among others.

The NEO Fast Track program provides opportunities for LPN/Paramedics to receive advanced standing in the completion of an Associate in Applied Science in Nursing. NEO Nursing Program Director Debbie Morgan notes that the expansion of the Fast Track program would provide many benefits for both institutions.

"We are excited to expand the NEO A&M College Fast Track LPN/Paramedic-RN program to the Northeast Tech Kansas Campus," she said. "This partnership would not only benefit the students, but also the healthcare facilities in the region by preparing more registered nurses."

to be added in order to be included in the state's phased approach to vaccine distribution.

However, for up-to-date, detailed information about the vaccine distribution plan and the priority populations included in each phase, please visit oklahoma.gov/COVID19 or call 2-1-1.

A mobile phone application was rolled out Thursday that allows residents to schedule an appointment to receive their vaccine and track when they should receive a second dose.

Oklahomans can visit this portal at vaccinate.oklahoma.gov.

However, pre-registration is open for all Oklahomans to enter their personal information to determine their eligibility to receive the vaccine within Oklahoma's priority phase plan and receive notifications when the vaccine is available to them.

Hours of the vaccination clinic at the NTHS are from 8:30 to 11 a.m. and 1:30 to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

To make an appointment, call 918-332-4478.

The state has received nearly 175,000 doses and administered more than 50,000 first doses of the two-dose vaccine, deputy health commissioner Keith Reed said during a Zoom press conference Monday, Jan. 4, to announce the launch of Phase 2.

Phase 1a of the vaccinations included high-risk health care workers and first responders. Phase 1b added patients of all ages and those with underlying health issues.

Health Commissioner Dr. Lance Frye said Phase 2 includes first responders, an expanded group of health-care workers and, in some areas, those in the 65 plus population "depending on local vaccine availability."

Oklahoma expects to begin receiving between 30,000 and 40,000 additional doses every week.

"Our vaccine rollout can only go as quickly as we're getting supplies from the federal government," Frye said.

He said the state is notified on Tuesday how many vaccines are coming for the following week then scheduling information will be posted on Friday.

He said this past week,

the state allocation was about 32,550 doses for state system as well as partners around the state.

Frye said 13,650 doses would be diverted to pharmacy partners across the state.

"Once we get better information from Warp Speed at the federal level so we can better understand what we will have moving forward, we really have to do this one week at a time," Frye said.

Ottawa County has had its 29th death — a male in the 65 and older age group — according to the OSDH daily report on Tuesday, Jan. 5.

Health officials reported 2,699 new confirmed cases on Monday and 62 additional deaths, bringing the total number of confirmed infections in the state to 311,573 and the death toll to 2,633.

The seven-day rolling average for the new cases reported is 3,506.

It should be noted that the true number of infections in Oklahoma is likely higher because many haven't been tested, and studies suggest people can be infected and not feel sick.

Oklahoma currently ranks fourth in the U.S. in new cases per capita over the past 14 days, with 1,096.45 cases per 100,000 residents, according to data from Johns Hopkins University.

process their livestock having to wait months and sometimes even up to a year to reserve a spot at a plant.

The Miami Area Economic Development Services Inc. (MAEDS) assisted Cook's Processing of Miami in applying for and receiving the grant, about which owner Melvin Cook said, "This grant will allow us to double our expansion in half the time it usually takes in order for us to meet the needs of our customers.

"We are building a big, new addition that will include adding a new freezer, a smoked meat cooler, a fresh meat cooler, and a prep room for sticks and jerky. Then we will turn our old smoke room into another production line for beef, so we will be like three plants in one and are going to try to get up to around 200 head a month," Cook said of plans for the grant money.

MAEDS CEO/President Charlotte Howe said, "Cook's Processing has been in the Miami region for over 30 years and has been a major contributor to our economic success. We are excited to have been able to assist them."

Governor Kevin Stitt appropriated \$10 million in federal funds from the CARES Act to the Oklahoma Dept. of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry with the goal of addressing supply chain disruptions across the state as a result of the pandemic.

Through this grant money, processing plants will become larger and more efficient, which in turn will benefit local producers and consumers – not only with more options for producers to process their animals, but also by adding a hefty local economic impact, more meat options to local grocery shelves, and more jobs for the local

community. "Cook's Processing will utilize these funds to add jobs, equipment, and floor space to accommodate their growing customer base. It's great to see CARES funding being put to good use in Ottawa County," said State Representative Steve Bashore. Melvin Cook started his experience in the job market during his high school years at Cone's Meat Market on the south end of Miami, later working for Foodtown, which was also Farrier's and then Consumers, as a full time meat cutter. During his 30 years of employment he envisioned building a processing plant of his own and, in 1985, Cook's Processing was born. It is now the only processing plant in northeast Oklahoma that has successfully passed the USDA regulations regarding a HACCP Plan and a Sanitation Standard Operating Procedures Plan. By passing all the regulations required by the state, Cook's is legally able to sell meat to individuals, schools, grocery stores and restaurants. The company has added several additions to its plant over the years, bringing it to a total of 4,700 square feet that enables them to handle a higher volume and keep their prices the "lowest in the area."

Having a higher volume has also made it possible for them to process the Delaware and Nowata County Spring Livestock Shows at the same time. "This grant money will create a solid foundation for increasing capacity in our state and I am excited to see the impact Cook Processing will make. These grants are the gateway to mitigating risks of plant shutdowns and ensuring continued meat availability for consumers in our state," Oklahoma Department of Agriculture Secretary Blayne Arthur said in a press release.

Furnas and emergency management director Chad Holcomb reported that the numbers are not encouraging at all and the county is not free to start putting its guard down.

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Broken

We can be stronger once we mend. A bone is after new bone forms around the fracture so as to protect it, a graft onto a fruit tree, even a broken heart can make one stronger.

Cat Stevens' song came to me with the words, "Morning has broken" and so did it seem for awhile that our democracy would be broken.

I could not sit and watch, but I could not stay away. It was as if the country we had grown up with, flawed and historically cruel to non-whites was not on fire, but fracturing with people moved by the righteousness for power denied by the results of our last election denied by the most powerful person in the world.

Results had not been conveyed in believable ways. The concepts I had grown up with have gone away, like: "Don't be a sore loser." "Winner takes all." "We take turns." "Win some, lose some." For the most part we didn't "burn down the house if we lost."

Elections. Even before I could legally vote, I chose losers and have voted for many losers. But I never had a fit. I didn't even get a Pussy Hat last time around. I have participated in peaceful protests in my life, but never to overthrow an election, but to stop pipelines we knew would leak, because all pipelines leak, or to stop unnecessary wars. I have never participated in a coup, or an insurrection, or a radical takeover of an occupied government building filled with elected officials at work on the people's business. But I did get to witness such an action. And it was frightening to watch just exactly how fragile democracy might be.

But as the day turned to night, our people went back to work for us. They climbed out of the closets and got off the floors, unlocked doors down long lonely halls and stood back up and came back to finish the task of the day, for us, the American people, to value the votes we had cast, because that is how we determine who our winners and naturally who our losers are.

According to John Haltiwanger Wednesday Jan. 6 was the first time the US Capitol was breached by a large, violent group since the War of 1812 and Senator Cory Booker went on to express his description of both events being inspired by cults of personalities, one a foreign adversary and the other our sitting president.

This peaceful transfer of power is unique and a thing we have taken for granted. And may not take for granted anymore. We will have to be vigilant and remember how nearly broken we were. We will be stronger, but we have to reach back to another time in our nation's history, and reach deep

into how divided we can be as a people. Think back to the Civil War and the deep hatred ginned up in the nation and when Lincoln was re-elected, the words that stood out from his inaugural address:

With malice toward none; with charity for all; ... to bind up the nation's wounds; to care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his widow, and his orphan—to do all which may achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace among ourselves, and with all nations.

As he spoke he wore a jacket and inside the lining these words were embroidered: One Country — One Destiny.

There is an image from the takeover of our nation's Capitol that connects those times to now. The Confederate flag originated during the Civil War as a battle flag for the pro-slavery Confederacy and throughout the entire Civil War the flag never entered the Capitol, but photographer Saul Loeb captured it being carried through the rotunda in 2021, remarkably shown between the portraits of Charles Sumner, an abolitionist and John C. Calhoun, a defender of slavery.

There were many such flags and many carrying the name of our current president who eventually asked the rioters to go on home, but not before he expressed his love for them.

As we go forward, with a new president who will take his office with "malice toward none... he will have to bind up the nation's wounds from the hatred and divisiveness, the divisions we have had even over the deadliest contagious disease our nation has ever faced and find a way to bring us back to the hope we all have of One Country — One Destiny. We have a common destiny.

Morning has broken like the first morning Blackbird has spoken like the first bird Praise for the singing, praise for the morning Praise for them springing fresh from the world

I have had many friends contact me and nudge me to get the vaccine to be protected from COVID-19, and am glad to report my brother got his first shot today and I will have my first in two days. Speaking of praise for the morning!

I am believing our common destiny must help our broken feelings heal and attempt to bind up our nation's grief.

We're leaning with desperate anticipation toward normalcy, but who can say what that now looks like and if we'll know when we see it?

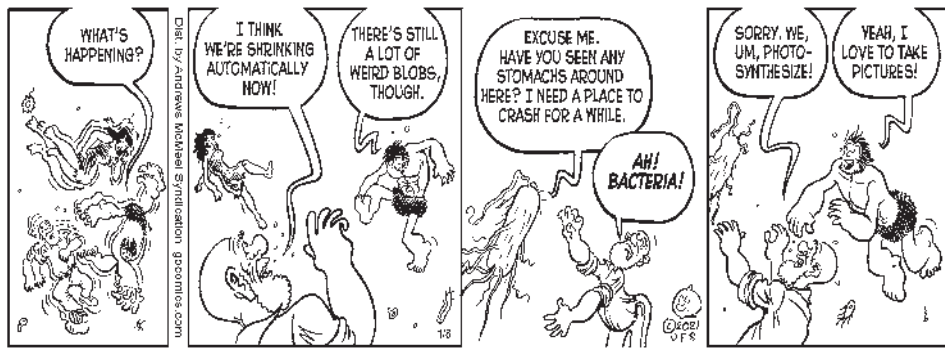
In ways that have yet to manifest, 2020 will be the year that makes or breaks us.

Raising children

Nothing is as challenging as being a parent. Children have no on-off button. They cannot be put in the closet like clothes, turned off and parked like cars or placed in a kennel for the night like pets. They are on a constant quest: poking, prodding, pushing, pulling and climbing.

When our children were little, we weren't allowed to strap them down in the back seat. (It was a long time ago). As soon as they got in the car, they looked for buttons to push and knobs to twist. When I turned on the key the blinkers blinked, windshield wipers wiped and the radio blared, vibrating the windows. The same was true for our bedroom and kitchen.

They grew up to be responsible adults. But the path wasn't easy. Every passage brought new challenges: the first day of school, a move from

familiar neighborhoods to a new city, puberty, a driver's license, dating, computer games, technology. Parenting requires a constant learning curve that never stops, even after children are grown and on their own. Relationships constantly change.

I found, across the years, that there is no "fix it" book for parenting, no "cure-all," "read this" or "do this" simple solution. Every child is different, and every parenting situation has its unique challenges. But there are some essential tools that make the difference: patience, consistency, authenticity, trust, love, faith and a listening ear. Most of us don't come naturally equipped with these essential tools. Most of us have to learn them and acquire them while we are on the job. And all of us have room for improvement.

Years ago, I visited the home of a young mother

who was caring for several preschool children. I was amazed at her patience and attention with the children and complimented her on it. She responded by telling me that this had not always been the case. Before she trusted Christ, she said, she had no patience with children, but after she gave her heart to Jesus, He gave her a gift of patience, not only for her own children, but for others.

The Bible says that John the Baptist introduced Jesus to the world by turning the hearts of the fathers to their children and the disobedient to righteousness (Luke 1:16-17). Every generation must struggle against the natural desires of the flesh: envy, jealousy, resentment, anger and self-indulgence. These attitudes destroy the family.

When we put our trust and faith in Jesus Christ, He gives us a new heart. He produces in us the fruits of

the Spirit that equip us to be parents: "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, faithfulness and self-control." All of these, the Bible says, are the fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23).

When our hearts are right with God so that we are producing these fruits, we will be good parents. Then we will be able to fulfill the Scripture's instruction, "Do not exasperate your children, instead, bring them up in the teaching and instruction of the Lord" (Ephesians 6:4).

Flooding brings new woes to NYC church hard-hit by COVID-19

NEW YORK — A Lutheran church in New York City already reeling from the COVID-19 deaths of more than 60 members of the congregation has suffered a new trauma: Severe flood damage from the rupture of a major municipal water main.

The flooding caused significant damage Monday to the sanctuary and to basement-level rooms, including a theater, said Jared Stahler, senior pastor at Saint Peter's Church.

The Midtown Manhattan parish is known for its Jazz Vespers program, and Stahler said the badly damaged items included treasured musical instruments and the archives

of jazz greats such as John Coltrane and Billy Strayhorn. Specialists were being called in to work on minimizing the damage, Stahler said.

A chapel on the upper level that was created by the late artist Louise Nevelson was not affected.

Saint Peter's, a parish of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, describes itself as a "welcoming and progressive church." The building was designated as a city landmark in 2017.

The church's leadership says at least 62 members of the congregation, which numbered about 800 before the pandemic, have died of COVID-19, almost all of them part of the community of some 400 who attend services in Spanish.

pushed through the night with tensions high and the nation's capital on alert.

Before dawn Thursday, lawmakers finished their work, confirming Biden won the election.

Vice President Mike Pence, presiding over the joint session, announced the tally, 306-232.

Trump, who had repeatedly refused to concede the election, said in a statement immediately after the vote that there will be a smooth transition of power on Inauguration Day.

"Even though I totally disagree with the outcome of the election, and the facts bear me out, nevertheless there will be an orderly transition on January 20th," Trump said in a statement posted to Twitter by an aide.

The Capitol was under siege Wednesday, as the nation's elected representatives scrambled to crouch under desks and don gas masks while police futilely tried to barricade the building, one of the most jarring scenes ever to unfold in a seat of American political power. A woman was shot

and killed inside the Capitol, and Washington's mayor instituted an evening curfew in an attempt to contain the violence.

The rioters were egged on by Trump, who has spent weeks falsely attacking the integrity of the election and had urged his supporters to descend on Washington to protest Congress' formal approval of Biden's victory. Some Republican lawmakers were in the midst of raising objections to the results on his behalf when the proceedings were abruptly halted by the mob.

Together, the protests and the GOP election objections amounted to an almost unthinkable challenge to American democracy and exposed the depths of the divisions that have coursed through the country during Trump's four years in office. Though the efforts to block Biden from being sworn in on Jan. 20 were sure to fail, the support Trump has received for his efforts to overturn the election results have badly strained the nation's democratic guardrails.

Congress reconvened in the evening, with lawmakers decrying the protests that defaced the Capitol and

vowing to finish confirming the Electoral College vote for Biden's election, even if it took all night.

Pence reopened the Senate and directly addressed the demonstrators: "You did not win."

Republican Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell said the "failed insurrection" underscored lawmakers' duty to finish the count. Democratic House Speaker Nancy Pelosi said Congress would show the world "what America is made of" with the outcome.

The president gave his supporters a boost into action Wednesday morning at a rally outside the White House, where he urged them to march to the Capitol. He spent much of the afternoon in his private dining room off the Oval Office watching scenes of the violence on television. At the urging of his staff, he reluctantly issued a pair of tweets and a taped video telling his supporters it was time to "go home in peace" — yet he still said he backed their cause.

Hours later, Twitter for the first time time locked Trump's account, demanded that he remove tweets excusing violence

and threatened "permanent suspension."

A somber President-elect Biden, two weeks away from being inaugurated, said American democracy was "under unprecedented assault," a sentiment echoed by many in Congress, including some Republicans. Former President George W. Bush said he watched the events in "disbelief and dismay."

The domed Capitol building has for centuries been the scene of protests and occasional violence. But Wednesday's events were particularly astounding both because they unfolded at least initially with the implicit blessing of the president and because of the underlying goal of overturning the results of a free and fair presidential election.

Tensions were already running high when lawmakers gathered early Wednesday afternoon for the constitutionally mandated counting of the Electoral College results, in which Biden defeated Trump, 306-232. Despite pleas from McConnell, more than 150 GOP lawmakers planned to support objections to some of the results, though lacking evidence of fraud or wrongdoing in the election.

Trump spent the lead-up to the proceedings publicly hectoring Pence, who had a largely ceremonial role, to aid the effort to throw out the results. He tweeted, "Do

it Mike, this is a time for extreme courage!"

But Pence, in a statement shortly before presiding, defied Trump, saying he could not claim "unilateral authority" to reject the electoral votes that make Biden president.

In the aftermath of the siege, several Republicans announced they would drop their objections to the election, including Sen. Kelly Loeffler, R-Ga., who lost her bid for reelection Tuesday.

Earlier, protesters had fought past police and breached the building, shouting and waving Trump and American flags as they marched through the halls, many without masks during the COVID-19 crisis. Lawmakers were told to duck under their seats for cover and put on gas masks after tear gas was used in the Capitol Rotunda. Some House lawmakers tweeted they were sheltering in place in their offices.

Rep. Scott Peters, D-Calif., told reporters he was in the House chamber when rioters began storming it. Security officers "made us all get down, you could see that they were fending off some sort of assault."

He said they had a piece of furniture up against the door. "And they had guns pulled," Peters said. Glass panes to a House door were shattered.

The woman who was killed was part of a crowd that was breaking down the

doors to a barricaded room where armed officers stood on the other side, police said. She was shot in the chest by Capitol Police and taken to a hospital where she was pronounced dead. City police said three other people died from medical emergencies during the long protest on and around the Capitol grounds.

Staff members grabbed boxes of Electoral College votes as the evacuation took place. Otherwise, said Sen. Jeff Merkley, D-Ore., the ballots likely would have been destroyed by the protesters.

The mob's storming of Congress prompted outrage, mostly from Democrats but from Republicans as well, as lawmakers accused Trump of fomenting the violence with his relentless falsehoods about election fraud.

"Count me out," said Trump ally Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C. "Enough is enough."

Several suggested that Trump be prosecuted for a crime or even removed under the Constitution's 25th Amendment, which seemed unlikely two weeks from when his term expires.

"I think Donald Trump probably should be brought up on treason for something like this," Rep. Jimmy Gomez, D-Calif., told reporters. "This is how a coup is started. And this is how democracy dies."

Sen. Ben Sasse, R-Neb., who has at times clashed with Trump, issued a statement saying: "Lies have consequences. This violence was the inevitable and ugly outcome of the President's addiction to constantly stoking division."

Cold-shooting Wardogs stumble against Sequoyah

MIAMI — Playing just their second game of the season, Miami's boys shot only 28% from the field and dropped a 37-20 decision to Claremore Sequoyah here Tuesday, Jan. 5.

After playing just twice since Dec. 1 because of a COVID outbreak, the Wardogs will see plenty of action the next nine games.

"It certainly felt like the first game of the year," MHS coach Rusty Mercer said. "It had been over 30-something days since we had played a game (Dec. 1 at Verdigris was

their last only action)."

They wound up missing games at Oologah, the Seneca Tournament and Jay before heading into the holiday break.

"I told them that teams night in and night out that are able to handle the distractions will probably have the most success," Mercer said. The 20 points were the fewest in a game since a 74-20 loss to Verdigris on Jan. 31, 2020.
