

LPD finds body in Long King Creek

The body of a Livingston man was found in Long King Creek on the west side of Livingston Thursday morning.

David Alexander Canon, 38, was found dead after Livingston Police Department officers were dispatched to Long King Creek near the 1800 block of US Highway 190 West. Officers were dispatched in reference to the body of a white male that had been found in the creek.

Once officers arrived at the creek, they discovered that the male was deceased. Once the subject was identified as Canon, the body was released to Cochran Funeral Home and sent to the Forensic Medical Management Services of Texas in Jefferson County for an autopsy.

At this time, the cause of Canon's death remains under investigation. If anyone has any information regarding the death of Canon please contact the Livingston Police Department at (936) 327-3117.

Woman killed in fire

Livingston firefighters extinguished a blaze that killed one person Thursday morning on Old Providence Road off of Highway 146.

Livingston Assistant Fire Chief John Haynes said his department received a phone call at 3:14 a.m. Thursday.

The first units on the scene reported the house to be fully involved in the fire. One engine and two tankers began dispensing water on the fire. The 15 firefighters at the location received word that somebody could still be inside. That proved to be correct, as a woman, who has been identified by sources as Angela Blum, was pronounced dead at the scene and transported to the medical examiner's office.

"We had three trucks and several men on the scene for a couple of hours," Haynes said. "There was quite a bit of material on fire — furniture, appliances and things of that nature. The house was a complete loss. One of the outbuildings was on fire and vehicles that were parked close that had fire damage to them. The roof collapsed by the time we got there. We had to pull some tin off to get to the rubble."

Firefighters left the scene at 5:49 a.m. The fire is currently under investigation by Polk County Fire Marshal Jacob Chapman.

Goodrich sup. receives his report card

Goodrich ISD called an election and graded its superintendent during the January regular meeting Thursday in the administration building.

Goodrich superintendent Dr. Bryan Taulton received a consensus of "exceeds expectations" on his annual evaluation, as well as from all board members. Taulton has been with Goodrich ISD for two years now after coming over from Hardin ISD.

In business items, the board members called a school board election for May 1 and appointed an election judge and early voting judge.

Since March of 2020, Goodrich ISD has had a total of three lab-confirmed positive COVID-19 cases. One occurred before the start of the 2020-2021 school year.

The most recent case occurred last week, when an elementary school student tested positive. As a result of this, all pre-K and kindergarten students and a total of six staff members have had to quarantine due to close contact and potential exposure. All students and staff will return from quarantine Monday.

For precaution, all GISD students — including grades pre-K through third grade — are now required to wear a face covering (mask and or shield). Prior to this, these students were not required to wear a face covering, in accordance with TEA.

Taulton said the district was able to respond and mitigate all occurrences to ensure that there was not an outbreak. Upon being notified of all lab-confirmed positive tests, leadership at the school district has maintained open contact with Angelina County and Cities Health District. They have also made sure that all faculty and staff members were informed, communicated information to parents and guardians via phone, district and campus letters and

Corrigan approves \$375,000 grant

CORRIGAN —During its regular scheduled meeting Tuesday, the Corrigan City Council approved beginning the procurement procedures to accept the Texas Department of Agriculture Community Development block grant for 2021-22.

City Manager Darrian Hudman said the \$375,000 grant, which is more than previous years, could be applied toward water and sewer projects. The council did not discuss what projects the grant would be applied to.

Mayor Johnna Lowe Gibson said the city is in talks with Corrigan OSB "to see if they can help" with some of the water or sewer projects.

The council also approved three appointments to a committee to seek who is most qualified to complete some of the jobs. Mayor Gibson described the committee as a "formality."

The council also approved a declaration toward "Entergy's backup generation product." Hudman said Entergy

intends to install a generator for the city to use during power outages. He said Entergy requested the council decline the initial submission so they could resubmit under a multi-city or municipality project.

The board also approved the general city election for May 1, 2021.

After a lengthy discussion, the council

tabled a motion to reduce the speed limit from 30 mph to 20 mph on Martin Luther King, Jr. Street until the council members have an opportunity to hear pros and cons from the citizens.

Chief Gerald Gibson requested the council take up the matter out of concern for children playing in the area.

"My only concern is the

children, that's all I care about," he said.

Chief Gibson said children walk along the street, play basketball in and near the street and play in the park, so he is concerned an accident is going to occur.

Hudman recommended the council consider

Leggett ISD issued favorable audit

LEGGETT — Leggett ISD received a favorable audit report for the 2019-20 school year during its monthly school board meeting last Tuesday.

The audit report was given by Darla Dear of Belt Harris Pechacek. LISD superintendent Jana Lowe was happy with the audit as well.

"We had a good audit. We added to the fund balance, which is always what you want to do — add money to your fund balance," Lowe said. "We're happy with that. We have good audits. We work really hard to keep our little school solvent and in the 'black' so to speak. Some years are tougher than others and we've had some challenging years. We worked up to a good fund balance. Some years back, we had some tax appraisals from the county and it changed things. We had some oil rigs at one time, but when the oil rigs left, it changed the value. Right







Appraisal district reminds businesses to render taxable property by April 15

If you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income, you must file a rendition with Polk Central Appraisal District by April 15.

A rendition is a report that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on Jan. 1 of this year. Property includes inventory and equipment used by a business. Owners do not have to render exempt property, such as church property or an agriculture produc-

er's equipment used for farming.

"The appraisal district may use the information submitted in the rendition to set property values," said Chad Hill.

You can also file a report of decreased value to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of your property. "For example, if your property was damaged by a storm, flood or fire last year, you should file a report of decreased value. The appraisal

district will look at your property before assigning a value," said Hill.

For most property types, renditions must be filed after Jan. 1 and no later than April 15. Different deadlines apply in certain appraisal districts. A property owner may apply, in writing, for a mandatory extension to May 15.

Different deadlines apply for regulated properties.

A 10 percent penalty may be

imposed if a rendition is filed late, incomplete or not at all. Property owners who need more time to file their renditions may file a written request with the chief appraiser on or before the rendition deadline to receive an automatic extension.

The chief appraiser may extend the deadline another 15 days for good cause shown in writing by the property owner for each type of property.

now, we're stable and I'd rather see a stable tax base."

Following the audit, the school board voted unanimously to stick with Belt Harris Pechacek for next year's audit. The firm has family ties to Livingston and Woodville, and its main office is in Houston.

"They're about service," Lowe said. "We've had good experiences with them. They're originally from

Livingston and Woodville. Although they're out of Houston now, they are people that we've known and trusted, and they've done a great job for us. They're easy to contact. Now that we've gone into Covid, you really need someone you can contact anytime. The more we can use our local connections, the better."

Lowe said one thing that helped her district was being proactive in applying for grants. This came in handy when Covid-19 hit.

"Financially we were able

to look into grants that would offset our spending, and there were quite a few out there that we worked real hard to apply for those early so we could get that money to offset any problems that we might have," Lowe said.

The school board also approved a measure that would allow for an extension of leave in the event that an employee contracts or is exposed to someone who has Covid. While some employees have already contracted the virus, it will come in handy for those who haven't.

"Some people have already used the extension of leave because they were already out with Covid or with an exposure," Lowe said. "You can imagine how this would hurt someone who works hourly to lose a week and a half of work. We wanted to give them the opportunity to do that and I knew our board would be generous with that. I had an idea that they were going to approve. They're a generous board and they support their employees. That's why we keep them for a while."

Lowe also received a two-year extension on her contract, which means she will be the superintendent for the next two years. She's been with LISD for 15 years — seven as a teacher, three as a principal, four as a principal/superintendent and this year as a superintendent. LISD meets again at 7 p.m. Monday, Feb. 15.

social media, and actively monitored employee and student illnesses via contact tracing.

Additional medical grade, handheld electrostatic disinfectant mist sprayers have been ordered and received. These items were purchased with (CARES ACT) ES-SER grant funds.

The 150 Lenovo laptops and 75 hotspots ordered through Region 4 ESC have been received. TEA will disperse the remaining funds to GISD soon. Goodrich receives the bulk order (\$46,425.00 total saved) free of charge. The Polk County Coronavirus Relief Funds have allocated \$18,508 to Goodrich ISD. A total of \$11,606 of that amount will go toward the bulk purchase order. The remaining balance of \$6,901.75 has been requested from Polk County

and should be received soon.

The new GISD website is still set to launch May 1. New access points have been installed across the district in every classroom to strengthen the district's Wi-Fi infrastructure, needed with the additional technology now on campus.

The U.S. Department of Education Secretary has confirmed that state assessments will be administered during the 2020-2021 school year to gauge student progress. Scores will be used only as a diagnostic tool to gauge student progress.

After a few incidents of vehicles backing into the elementary awning, minor repairs are still needed and will be completed by the maintenance department. A new chain to deter these occurrences has been successful so far.

GISD continues to seek quotes for necessary window repairs on the upper elementary and middle

He patiently taught them tennis, skiing, fishing, and the value of a strong work ethic. Throughout their lives, he was always there for them at their games and special events.

Mark contributed to the raising and development of Helen’s five children, six grandchildren, four nieces/nephews, and three grand-nieces/nephews. He called them “My Kids,” and loved them all immeasurably.

Livingston High School and Livingston Junior High English students attended writing camp sessions to learn skills to improve their writing. Seventh-grade students were tasked with writing an expository essay, an essay intended to explain or describe something. The two-hour camp was led by a presenter from The Writing Academy and assisted by the LJH English teachers, Jennifer Hughes, Barbara Butler, and Tracy Perry. Students analyzed the topic and developed the charge, which is the way they respond to the prompt. Livingston ISD Curriculum Coordinator Dr. Lisa Polk shares, “Practicing the analysis during The Writing Academy gave students the tools to examine the prompt and respond successfully by learning key words and tools. Acronyms were used to help students remember the strategies to apply when developing the whole essay.”

LJH 7th grade lead writing teacher, Jennifer Hughes shared, “I feel that the students were able to connect the benefits of brainstorming with the creation of strong topic sentences. The instructor was able to show them exactly how the example student pulled the resulting ideas into her main body paragraphs. Students often bypass brainstorming, or they don’t narrow it down correctly, leaving their paper more unfocused than it could be. I’m hoping they remember the strategies they learned at the clinic the next time they pre-write their essays.”

Livingston High School English I and English II students were led during their camp sessions using visuals and hands-on scaffolded practice opportunities. Students were then able to use these tools to analyze an exemplar essay, an essay that receives the highest score during an assessment.

A writing prompt analysis enables students to develop a thesis or position statement. At the high school level, the persuasive, argumentative essay includes a position statement. Students developed these strategies within the activities of the student camp. Writers strengthened their tools and techniques in essay writing, including gaining awareness of reason and purpose, knowing their audience, generating ideas, and selecting the most effective ones to use. They learned to include credible supportive facts in their writing while also learning strategies to develop effective conclusions.

LHS English Department Head Sarah Ege shared, “English I and II students attended an exciting workshop given by the Writing Academy. They learned different tips and tricks that will benefit them when writing their essays for their EOC test. This was further reinforcement of what is being taught in English classes.”

When life gets in the way grab a Crock Pot

Everyone loves a good home-cooked meal and in a perfect world we'd only pre-

pare healthy, nutritious home-cooked meals for our families. But alas, it's not a perfect world. It's messy and things come up and plans change. Basically, life gets in the way.

When this happens and your responsibility list grows and you find yourself being pulled in a dozen different directions, it's good to have some quick, easy meal plans in your back pocket to pull out. If you don't already know it, a slow cooker, or Crock Pot as we've always called it, can be your best friend.

With just the tiniest bit of planning you can put a bunch of stuff in your slow cooker in the morning, place it on low and when you return home after work dinner is ready. Or, if you go home for lunch, you can put it all in there then, place it on high and it's ready after work.

I'm not too proud to use the occasional shortcut or hack and several years ago I found a graphic on social media that showed how with some basic common ingredients that most of us already have in our pantries or freezers, we can use our slow cookers and come up with a variety of different dishes. Pair it with a salad or maybe some roasted vegetables and, voila, dinner is ready.

And then there are those videos that are always showing up in our social media feeds. You know the ones. Someone's making a dish that looks quick and easy. I find myself fascinated by these. The video is always sped up so I have to watch it several times to make sure I have it down. I saw one recently that looked good so I decided to try my hand at it. It's called Slow Cooker Olive Garden Chicken Pasta. I've included the recipe below.





Slow Cooker Olive Garden Chicken Pasta


INGREDIENTS

- 2 boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- 1 16-oz. bottle Olive Garden Italian dressing (available at most grocery stores)
- ½ cup grated parmesan cheese, divided
- 8-oz. block cream cheese
- 1 lb. penne pasta
- Ground black pepper

DIRECTIONS

- Place chicken breasts in slow cooker. Pour entire bottle of Olive Garden Italian dressing over chicken. Sprinkle ¾ cup of parmesan cheese over that. Sprinkle with ground black pepper to taste. Place block of cream cheese on top. Place lid on slow cooker and cook on high for two hours, then cook an additional two hours on low.
- In the meantime boil penne pasta per directions on package, drain and set aside.
- When the four hours is up, remove lid from slow cooker and with two forks, manually shred the two chicken breasts and stir the mixture.
- Add drained pasta and stir again. Top with remaining ¼ cup of parmesan cheese and serve hot.

There is nothing that you or I face that God can't see us through. Storm clouds seem dark but they always pass. Trust in Jesus and He will give you peace even in the midst of the storm that is this life and He will see you through to the other side.

May God fill your life with blessings! May He make His face shine upon you and give you peace in this life and joy evermore as you trust in the name of the Only begotten of the Father.




