Deputy suspended after Taser incident

A Polk County Sheriff's Office deputy is suspended after his Taser deployed and struck a dispatcher.

According to the sheriff's office, the deputy unintentionally deployed his department-issued Taser on Feb. 10 and one of the Taser prongs struck a dispatcher in the upper leg. The dispatcher was taken to Urgent Care (per policy) and received medical treatment.

The deputy received suspension without pay for the policy and procedure violations due to the incident.

A second incident involving a Taser allegedly occurred Tuesday at the Polk County Jail. According to sources, the Texas Rangers are investigating this incident and an officer has been placed on administrative leave.

Big Sandy approves calendar, talks accelerated instruction

DALLARDSVILLE —Big Sandy ISD approved the calendar for the 2021-22 school year Monday during its monthly school board meeting.

The 2021-22 calendar is "very similar" to the calendar used for the current year, according to superintendent Eric Carpenter. Faculty and staff report back from summer break on Tuesday, July 27 and the first day of school is Wednesday, Aug. 4.

One difference between the current calendar and next year's is accelerated instruction days, which are on this year's calendar but not next year's. This week, the district will offer half-day instruction for students who need assistance in their school work or testing.

"We offer accelerated instruction and bring in students that qualify for academic need based on grades or testing," Carpenter said. "When you miss 26 percent of the school year, it impacts all of the kids, especially the struggling students. We built some time into our calendar to bring some of those kids in. We have some teachers and aides who stepped up and want to work with these students."

With spring break taking place March 8-12, Carpenter pointed out that some students and members of

the faculty will get an extra week of spring break this week. The district originally had an accelerated instruction week on the calendar Nov. 16-20, but had to make those days full instructional days after Hurricane Laura forced the district to close Aug. 26-28.

Two weeks ago, schools across the state closed because of Winter Storm Uri. Carpenter said that the district catchment area was unharmed for the most part.

"The roads were bad, but SHECO (Sam Houston Electric Co-Op) did

an amazing job keeping us up and running — our whole community," he said. "The whole water system out here went down at times though."

Carpenter's superintendent contract was approved for another three years as well. He also said the district has yet to shut down and go to remote learning because of a large number of Covid-19 cases.

"We wear our masks and have been very fortunate to not have to shut down," Carpenter said.

Big Sandy ISD will meet again at 6:30 p.m. Monday, March 22.

C-CISD meets, recognizes students

CORRIGAN — After rescheduling the Corrigan Camden ISD Board of Trustees' regular scheduled meeting due to inclement weather, Superintendent Richard Cooper presented a report pertaining to the schools' sanitation efforts.

Cooper said GermBlast Inc. assists the district with its sanitation efforts quarterly.

"Before they sanitize, they take samples of numerous surfaces around the district and determine the ATP levels," Cooper said. "All that is, they are counting live microorganisms on the surfaces — viruses, bacteria, etc. and we've been utilizing their

ONALASKA - Onalaska ISD board members met briefly to address the impacts of the coronavirus on academics and attendance.

Superintendent Anthony Roberts gave a brief report on the state of the district, noting that attendance, despite the pandemic and recent natural disasters, was close to past years. The district across all campuses currently enrolls 1,144 students, down eight from last year.

According to TEA's website, schools are no longer being held harmless as of the end of the second six

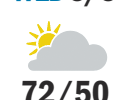

Feral cats a problem in your neighborhood?

From the Polk County SPCA

The SPCA of Polk County's Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) program called Fix-A-Feral is very busy and needs your assistance.

Through this tried-and-true program, cats are humanely trapped, spayed, or neutered, vaccinated, ear-tipped and returned to their outdoor home. Ear-tipping indicates that the cat has been neutered and vaccinated.

Studies show that TNR ends the cycle of breeding and shrinks the outdoor cat population. Cats no longer suffer the stresses of pregnancy and mating behaviors like spraying, yowling, and fighting.

Cats in TNR programs typically have low rates of disease and enjoy healthy life spans. TNR reduces shelter intake, the number of cats killed in shelters, and calls to animal control, which saves taxpayer dollars.

The Fix-A-Feral program started in June 2020 and to date has trapped and altered more than 100 community cats in Matthews Park and

This volunteer-led program needs help from the community to become a lifesaving success. Volunteers are needed to assist with the traps, transport to vet appointments and monitor the cats during post-op observation.

DETCOG accepting pre-applications for rental assistance waiting list lottery

LUFKIN — The Deep East Texas Regional Housing Authority (DETCOG) will open its waiting list lottery for the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program and begin accepting pre-applications on Monday, March 1, at 8 a.m. CT through Wednesday, March 31, at 11:59 p.m. CT. Pre-applications will be accepted online at <https://www.waitlistcheck.com/TX2875> and will not be accepted at the Housing Authority's office, nor by fax or mail.

The date and time the pre-application is submitted during the waiting list lottery opening period does not determine whether a pre-application will be selected for the waiting list. Pre-applications will be selected using a random lottery system.

DETCOG will accept 1,000 applications during the waiting list lottery opening period. Applicants will be placed on the waiting

list by random lottery and according to DETCOG preference(s). Applicants - will be notified of waiting list status by May 15, through their waitlistcheck.com login.

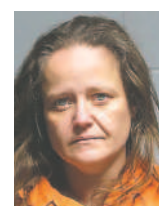
Deputies make trio of drug arrests

Angel Williams, 37, Christopher Bishop, 34, and Rebecca Messer, 38, were all arrested on possession charges in two separate incidents. Williams was arrested at her residence on Tuesday, while Bishop and Messer were detained during a stop.

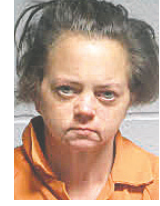
On Tuesday, the PCSO received a call reporting that Williams' home on Farm-to-Market Road 350 South was burglarized. Once deputies arrived on the scene, they investigated the burglary only to discover that there was no evidence that an actual burglary had taken place.

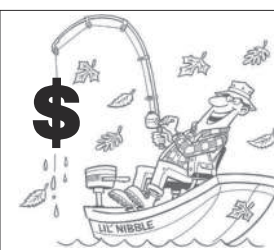

A search warrant was obtained and detectives from the narcotics division arrived to conduct the search. Williams was found to be in possession of methamphetamine and marijuana as well as items used to distribute and ingest the narcotics. She was charged with manufacturing and/or delivery of a controlled substance. On Wednesday, narcotics division detectives patrolled along FM 3126 when they observed a male and a female stuff a small bag into a cigarette pack. A stop was conducted near the Texas Landing subdivision and both subjects consented to a search.

When hard times strike, disaster soup saves the day

Over the past few weeks, many of us learned how precious basic utilities have become.

As I was hauling water to fill the toilet tank, I couldn't help but remember growing up on the dairy farm during times when weather would interrupt our daily routine. When the electric service was interrupted or as Dad would say "when the lights go out", our household had several pressing issues.

Because the well water we used was powered by an electric pump, we were in the dark and without water. With five kids in a single bathroom house, this was no small inconvenience.

To complicate matters, Dad had 60 plus cows who required milking twice a day. When the cows are not milked regularly not only are they uncomfortable and they let you know it but also their milk production will wane.

That milk was our sole source of income. Dad depended on electric milkers to manage a herd this size.

And of course, maintaining sanitation without water was difficult if not impractical. I don't remember any extended outages like we have experienced recently.

Usually, the milking was delayed only a matter of hours before power was restored. But I do remember Dad telling Mom and not in a patient, loving tone to call the power company and tell them we have cows to milk.

They have to get our power back on. This kind of interruption hap-

Disaster Soup

Serving Size: 1 cup
Makes ~ 13 Servings

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tablespoons oil, butter or margarine
- 1 large onion, diced
- 2 medium carrots, diced
- 2 stalks celery, diced
- 2 cloves garlic, minced or ½ teaspoon garlic powder
- 2 tablespoons oregano
- 1 tablespoon basil
- 2 teaspoons thyme
- 2 teaspoons salt to taste
- 1 teaspoon black pepper to taste
- ¼ teaspoon cayenne or red chili powder
- 2 teaspoons curry powder
- 3 tablespoons fresh parsley, chopped
- 2 15 oz cans diced tomatoes, no added - salt, undrained or what you have on hand
- 4 cups liquid, low sodium vegetable broth or water or salted broth diluted with water
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 4 cups frozen vegetables, yellow squash, green beans, corn, green peas or any frozen vegetables needing to be used)

DIRECTIONS

- Heat the olive oil in a large stock pot over medium-high heat. Add the onion, carrots, celery and garlic and sauté ~ 7 minutes. Stir in the spices, parsley, tomatoes and broth. Bring to a boil then reduce heat to medium, cover and cook until the vegetables are crisp tender, ~ 10 - 15 minutes. Add the frozen vegetables and cook 3-5 minutes until tender.

- Any meat that needs to be used can enhance this soup. First sauté the meat in the oil with a little salt and pepper just until lightly browned but not cooked

through and then proceed with the recipe as written.

- This soup is delicious. You might not want to wait until the next disaster to prepare it and the flavor improves the longer it sits.

we had propane to cook with but no water or electricity.

Sandwiches, one course meals, and soups are practical choices. Grilling meats and fish outside taking care for fire and carbon monoxide hazards is a good way to use these expensive foods.

This month's recipe focuses on the use of soups to finish cleaning out the freezer. You can use canned vegetables.

Just remember to use up freezer foods first. When preparing a soup of fresh and frozen vegetables, sauté the fresh vegetables before adding the liquid and then add the frozen vegetables.

The frozen require less cooking time. If using canned vegetables, add them last and just bring them to serving temperature.

While fresh potatoes work very well in this soup, they will hold in the pantry for a later meal while you use up refrigerated and frozen foods. Any meat that needs to be used can enhance this soup.

First sauté the meat in the oil with a little salt and pepper just until lightly browned but not

cooked through and then proceed with the recipe as written. The spices in this recipe work in any vegetable soup.

Use what you have on hand and remember that your goal is to balance flavors. Saltines or any crackers go well or bread grilled in a hot skillet with a little oil is very tasty.

This soup is delicious. You might not want to wait until the next disaster to prepare it.

And it is much less stressful when we have use of all our utilities. Happy cooking.

pened fairly frequently in those days and the power company came to be on a first name basis with my mother.

Fortunately, Mom had excellent people skills which served her well during these times and all of her life. Fast forward some 50 years and our main concern during a power outage becomes salvaging food from the fridge and freezer.

Fortunately, my training in food service and disaster planning has

prepared me well for such emergencies. Most people know to use up perishable foods first such as milk and meat and to systematically work freezer foods into the following day's menus.

Foods like cheese and yogurt are semi preserved and will last longer. Simplifying the menu is a must.

Now is not the time to experiment on that new quiche recipe. The degree of loss of utilities will drive menu choices. In our case,

Adjusting to life after mom

Is life a series of checking things off?

- High school — check.
- College — check.
- Get a job — check.
- Start a family — check.
- Raise a family — check.
- Retire and love life — check.

Does it really happen like that? What if life intervenes and the checks do not come as we expect?

In November, we buried our beloved mother, Georgia Bailey. She was a tireless worker, even into her 80's, for her family, church, and this paper, the *Polk County Enterprise*.

Mom was an open book — no secrets; she was not sentimental, her mantra was "just serve those around you." Yet, as part of the checklist in a post-mom world ... funeral--check, death certificates-- check, and estate settling (working on a check), while going through her things, there was a surprise.

In a small envelope, almost missed, was a group of white slips. When I saw them, I thought "Oh, wow, Mom saved all my grades from Angelina College."

- English-A.
- History-A.
- Accounting-A.

I thought, "Wait, I never made an A in accounting from Angelina College." I took it twice; the first time I made a "C" and the second time I made a "B" (only because my mother took both classes with me to help me through). Debbie doesn't do math.

Something does not make sense — the dates are 1973 and 1974. I was a freshman at Livingston High School in 1973, and was not in college classes.

The grades are not mine; they are hers. Her grades, and every receipt from almost 50 years ago, are carefully preserved in this hidden envelope.

How did I not know how important Angelina College was in my mother's life? I work for Angelina College.

I knew she was proud of that, but she never mentioned the connection. I

knew she was very Smart — Dow Chemical hired her at 17-years-old, already out of high school, because she had learned Latin in high school and aced the Dow Chemical vocabulary exam.

I never doubted my mother was smart. Everyone who knew her knew that about her.

What I didn't know was that she dreamed of a college education. In 1973, five years after opening, Angelina College was her ticket.

There, among her most treasured items almost 50 years later, is a printed history of her life at Angelina College. Life intervened in her goals.

I wonder, had she not been a single mom struggling to makes ends meet would she have been an Angelina College success story with an Associate's Degree in business? What would have happened had she had the resources to complete

her journey?

In my 21 years at Angelina College, I have loved helping students, despite their adversities, reach their goals. How did I not see the struggles of my own mother in the faces of the students I want to help?

How did I not recognize that the college I love was such an important part of my mother's life? It would be so like mom not to let me in on the connection.

This institution I love and work for has so many connections in my life — from myself, to my family, to your family, to our community. This is just the start of relating those connections.

There are 50-plus years of connections of Angelina College to our community. I plan to showcase many of those connections in future articles to come.

Looking Back 25 Years ...

Dolores Benskin and her daughter shared the same birthday. Dolores turned 12 and her daughter Rebecca celebrated her seventh birthday on the day a story about their special family was published in the *Polk County Enterprise* on a February Thursday in 1996.

Dolores and her husband Ralph had been married eight years, but on that day they were celebrating their second wedding anniversary.

Confused? You may have already guessed that 1996 was a leap year; the story was published on Feb. 29, 1996.

Dolores and Rebecca were born on leap day, 20 years and 14 minutes apart. Dolores and Ralph delayed their wedding so they could be married on leap day in 1988.

When Rebecca was born, news of the mother-daughter birthdays made news throughout the United States. They were among only 1,461 people with birthdays on Feb. 29, a day that comes once every four years because of leap year.

At the time, Dr. Brian Coomes, a mathematician at the University of Miami, said that a mother and daughter born on Feb. 29, 20 years apart, was extraordinary. He put the odds at one in 2,134,521.

“I feel very special. I’ve always been lucky and I think it has to do with being born on Feb. 29,” Dolores told the *Enterprise* 25 years ago.



“I never have to lie about my age. And the best thing is when I’m 100, I’ll really be 25!”

Dolores, who then teaching sixth grade in Livingston, said her students got a kick out telling her they were older than she was. She took the opportunity to teach the students about leap day and leap year.

Leap year has 366 days; the extra day was added to make the calendar year nearly the same as Earth’s orbital period of 365.2422 days.

It is probably one of the least memorable things about last year to most of us, but the previous leap year was in 2020.

Also in February of 1996:

• **Strength and** determination paid off for six Polk County youngsters who successfully maneuvered

calves into the winner’s circle during various performances at the 1996 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. The show began on Feb. 16 and wrapped up on March 3, 1996. March 1 was Polk County Night, with Reba McEntire as the featured performer.

Local students who won calf certificates in the scramble, which meant they would spend the next year raising a calf to show in the next year’s show, were: Derral Whisenhunt, Jared Wiggins, Mathew Tomlinson, Bobby Armentrout and Trace Ulrich, all Livingston 4-H members; and Elissa Lawless, Big Sandy FFA.

• **In one** of the lesser-known events of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, nine local youngsters competed in the SCLA Championship Youth Show on Feb. 16-18, 1996, showing llamas owned by Joann and Allan

Students also wrote letters to state officials and made a field trip to the Trinity River Authority, where they learned about how to get drinking water from polluted water, water permits and where the water they drink comes from.

The pollution study extended beyond science classes into math and language skills classes.

I’m not sure how much headway toward saving the earth has been made in the past 25 years, even allowing for a few leap years during the past quarter century.

services for almost two years now. It showed a downward

trend. It showed that our facilities are very sanitary.”

Cooper attributed the sanitary facilities to not only the sanitization products used, but to the teachers and

staff, as well.

“Between the products that they use and the efforts of our custodians and our teachers in our cleaning and in all our sanitization efforts

we do daily, we are keeping very sanitary, clean and healthy buildings,” Cooper said.

He said that prior to the recent freezing weather, four employees and one student tested positive for COVID-19.

“But, then the ‘snow-pocalypse’ happened and we all went home, anyway,” Cooper said. “We were all quarantined.”

Cooper also praised the district employee’s efforts in keeping a clean, sanitary school.

“The only reason we are able to continue to stay open is because of the hard work of our custodians, teachers and our aids,” Cooper said. “Our custodians are doing a great job cleaning. We use electrostatic spray machines to apply sanitizing fluids every day. Our teachers, between classes, disinfect and wipe surfaces. That’s how we

are able to have the safest buildings in the county.

“School districts are the safest places to be because we are constantly cleaning and sanitizing because our people care about our kids.”

The board also approved acceptance of an application for a Chapter 313 of the Texas Property Tax Code from Corrigan OSB LLC for value limitation. The board’s approval comes as Corrigan OSB is proposing building a second facility in the area.

Following an executive session, the board accepted the retirement of licensed counselor Kelly Rice after four years of service to the district and approved hiring Lucia Ascensio as an assistant speech therapist.

Additionally, the board approved retaining the law firm of Sara Leon & Associates and financial consultants Jigsaw School Finance

Solutions LLC to review and process the application for value limitation agreement from Corrigan OSB.

“We currently use both of those companies assisting us with the 313 we now have with Corrigan OSB,” Cooper said.

In other business, the board held a board training for board advocacy for Chapter 313 of the Texas Property Tax Code, and approved updates to several board policies from the Texas Association of School Boards and two local policies. Additionally, the board adopted the 2021-22 school calendar, which remains a four-day instructional week.

The board also recognized the C-CISD fall sports athletes who received All District and All State academic honors and cross country athletes who advanced to the region cross country meet.

week grading periods, meaning school funding is currently being tied to Average Daily Attendance (ADA), as it has in the past.

The board approved a new teaching position, which will open up for the upcoming school year. The position, titled Tier II Intervention Specialist, will have the task of assessing the impact that Covid has had on students and address how to help those who fell behind aca-

demically, focusing primarily on earlier grade levels. Roberts gave the following statement.

“For the 21-22 school year, Onalaska ISD will be hiring a Response to Intervention (RTI)/Tier II Teacher,” he said. “This position will focus on serving identified first and second grade students who need additional, targeted support in the area of early literacy. This focus is to ensure that all students going to third grade are equipped with the literacy skills needed to be a successful on-grade level

reader.”

The district calendar was also approved for the upcoming school year and will be available on the website before the end of the year.

will be made up June 1-3.

A district renovation plan was also approved, giving the district some flexibility on a start date. This year Goodrich begin classes on Aug. 19. In the 2021-22 year, classes will begin a day earlier.

There have been three positive Covid-19 cases since the beginning of the school year, with an employee and two student cases. The most recent case was Feb. 5, as an elementary school student tested positive. With the new district-wide (Pre-K-12) mask/face covering mandate, no

students or staff were required to quarantine, as they were not considered in close contact.

Since Jan. 19, all GISD students were required to wear a face covering. Before that date, only students in grades 4-12 were required to do so.

There were two water leaks connected to the recent freeze. A water main underneath the sidewalk at the bus ramp and a pipe in the fieldhouse. Insurance claims have been filed for each.

The U.S. Department of Education secretary stated that state assessments will be administered during the 2020-2021 school year to gauge student progress. Scores will be preliminary and used as a diagnostic tool to gauge student progress. Remote learners are not required to take the STAAR exam this year.

Painting is still needed on the elementary awning, with

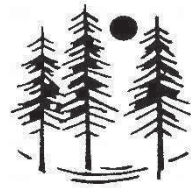
minor repairs now complete. The school district is still seeking quotes for necessary window repairs on the upper elementary and middle school campus. Repairs can be completed in two to four phases.

The ag. shop has electrical outlets that are scheduled to be installed and updated, making them compatible with the new welding machines. A new air compressor has been installed and there are ceiling tiles that need to be replaced.

Goodrich has a total enrollment of 243, with 125 in elementary, 54 middle school and 64 high school students.

The district is searching for an elementary primary teacher (first-fifth), a secondary secretary, bus driver and substitute teacher.

The date for the next board meeting has been changed to March 25, as the third Thursday of the month is during spring break.

Notice to City of Livingston Water Customers March 1, 2021

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) requires by law that all public water supply systems maintain a disinfectant residual in their drinking water to protect the public health. TCEQ recommends that, as part of a proactive maintenance program for water distribution systems, public water supplies that utilize chloramines for disinfection should switch to a free-chlorine disinfection process on a periodic basis. This change of disinfection, coupled with a rigorous flushing program, will maintain the ability of the system to deliver clean, safe water to its customers.

The Trinity River Authority (TRA), as the operator of the system that supplies and treats water for the City of Livingston, the TDCJ Polunsky Unit and IAH Detention Facility has notified City officials that beginning Monday, March 1st, through Friday, March 26th, a **temporary change** will be made in the disinfectant that is used in treating the City’s water supply. TRA will begin feeding free chlorine as the primary disinfectant instead of chloramines. In addition to the change in disinfection procedures, crews from the City of Livingston will be flushing the water distribution system by opening fire hydrants in various parts of the City during the early morning hours to minimize inconvenience to our customers.

As the temporary change in disinfectant and the flushing of the system occur, customers may experience some minor changes in the taste and odor of the water. This is normal and should only last for a short time.

Both the Trinity River Authority and the City of Livingston continually monitor the quality of the public water supply through regular, routine water sample analysis, in accordance with state requirements, to assure the continued safety and quality of our public drinking water. The water is and will continue to be safe to drink during this process. There are no associated health risks with this change in our treatment process. The Trinity River Authority has notified the TCEQ Regional Office in Beaumont and the main office in Austin of its intention to make the changes to the disinfection process.

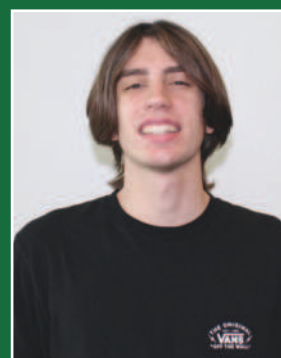

Birthday Celebration Splurge

Creamy Garlic Butter Tuscan Salmon with healthy side dishes

My mother recently celebrated a birthday and knowing that salmon is one of her very favorite entrees, I decided to

prepare a salmon dish for our family to enjoy for her birthday dinner. In addition to Mother being a fan, Hubby, Daughter and I all love salmon as well. I've oodles of salmon recipes but wanted to try something different.

There's a salmon recipe I've had my eye on for some time but had been hesitant to prepare because of the rich, creamy sauce that accompanies it. It just seemed a little counterproductive, with all of us trying to eat healthier. Of course, what better time to splurge on calories than someone's birthday? And besides, I reasoned, if I made enough healthy stuff to go with it, it would offset the sauce, right? So that's what I did.

I made Creamy Garlic Butter Tuscan Salmon that I served over a bed of brown rice. On the side, I served roasted zucchini and yellow squash. Midway through I remembered that Daughter isn't especially fond of zucchini and squash so I roasted some broccoli too. Surely three different veggies and brown rice would offset that heavy cream.

SALMON

Creamy Garlic Butter Tuscan Salmon

From cafedelites.com

- 4 salmon filets
- Salt and pepper
- 2 teaspoons olive oil
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 6 cloves garlic, finely minced
- 1 small yellow onion, diced
- ½ cup dry white wine
- 5 oz. jar sun-dried tomatoes in oil, drained and chopped
- 1 ¾ cup heavy cream
- 3 cups baby spinach leaves, roughly chopped
- ½ cup fresh grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 tablespoon fresh parsley, chopped, for garnish

• Heat the oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Season the salmon filets on both sides with salt and pepper, and sear in the hot pan, flesh-side down first, for 5 minutes on each side, or until cooked to your liking. Once cooked, remove from the pan and set aside.

• Melt the butter in the remaining juices left over in the pan. Add the onion to the butter and cook until translucent. Add the garlic and cook until fragrant, about one minute. Pour in the white wine and allow to reduce down slightly. Add the sun-dried tomatoes and cook for 1-2 minutes to release their flavors.

• Reduce heat to low heat, add the heavy

cream and bring to a gentle simmer, while stirring occasionally. Season with salt and pepper to your taste. Add in the spinach and allow to wilt in the sauce and add in the parmesan cheese. Allow sauce to simmer for an additional minute until cheese melts through the sauce.

• Add the salmon back into the pan, sprinkle with the parsley and spoon the sauce over each filet. Serve over pasta, rice or steamed vegetables.

My notes:

— You may use salmon filets with the skin on or off. The skin is edible. However, if you choose to remove the skin, use the sharpest knife you own.

— Remove the salmon from the refrigerator about 15 minutes prior to cooking bring them close to room temperature. Pat them dry with a paper towel to prevent sticking, allowing the outsides to crisp evenly while cooking.

— Season just before cooking to prevent drawing out moisture and drying out your fish.

— Heat oil in a large skillet before adding your filets and make sure your pan is nice and hot. Sear your filets flesh-side down first (skin-side up) for 4-5 minutes each side, depending on thickness.

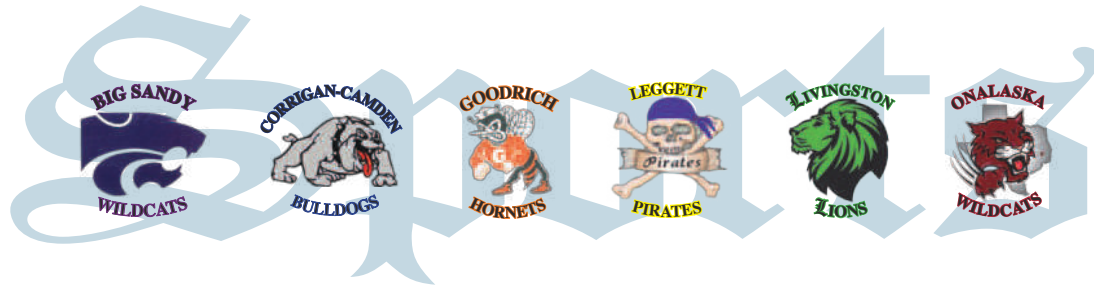

Leggett tackles state-ranked Kennard, falls in area round

As time ran out Thursday night, Leggett boys basketball coach Sean Edwards took time to reflect on his team following its season-ending 75-67 Class A area round loss to Trinidad.

“We were senior-heavy this year,” Edwards said. “These seniors were here every day. Came in at 5 a.m. to practice every day.”

The Pirates finished their second season under Edwards with an 11-9 record. He believes his team overcame a lot of off-the-court obstacles as well.

“It was a battle this whole season with Covid-19,” Edwards said. “We had to play and make adjustments.”

There were plenty of adjustments that Leggett had to make on the court Thursday night against a Trinidad team that won its 12th consecutive contest after losing its first four games of the season. The Pirates were saddled with foul trouble from the get-go, which included nine team fouls in the first quarter alone.

“I always that no matter what the officials call we have to adjust,” Edwards said. “We adjusted well to what they were calling.”

With the exception of taking an early 5-2 lead, Leggett trailed throughout the contest. The key thorns in the Pirates’ side was the Trojans’ set of twin towers – 6-foot-7 Demajeigh Hampton and 6-5 Julius Stevenson – who combined for 59 of their team’s 75 points.

Trinidad led by as much as 12 in the first half, but Leggett was able to trim its halftime deficit to a single point, 35-34. Junior guard Jacoby Sells hit a 3-pointer at the second-quarter buzzer and was fouled on the shot, which gave him a free-throw attempt that he sank to complete the 4-point play.

But the third quarter belonged to the Trojans,

who outscored the Pirates, 25-7, in the frame to build a seemingly out-of-reach 60-41 lead heading into the final quarter.

“We got it cut down to one at half, but in the third quarter, we kind of let it get away a little bit,” Edwards said.

Trinidad hit a free throw early in the fourth to increase its lead to 61-41 before Leggett went on a last-ditch comeback attempt. Chase Parrish scored 13 points during a 24-6 run that pulled the Pirates within two, 67-65, with less than two minutes left in the contest.

“The kids fought hard and I told them all year that we’re a team and they fought back,” Edwards said. “We got into a press that we run all the time when we’re behind, and it worked. We got a couple of steals and baskets in transition, but we also picked up some cheap fouls.”

In the end, those “cheap fouls” cost the Pirates. Sells and Varian Flournoy each fouled out midway through the fourth quarter, and Trinidad was able to hit free throws down the stretch to close out the game on an 8-2 run.

Sells led Leggett with 22 points, while Parrish and Garrett Francois had 17 and 11, respectively. Thursday night’s contest was the final high school basketball game for Flournoy, Francois, Parrish, Abraham Diosdado and Melvin Nesmith.

LEGGETT 39 KENNARD 36

The bi-district round of the playoffs was not easy, but the Leggett Pirates outlasted state-ranked Kennard 39-36 in Huntington Tuesday.

Down 30-26 in the fourth, Kennard received contributions from five different players and outscored Leggett 10-9.

However, a heave from behind the arc in the final

second did not fall and allowed the Pirates and their fans to celebrate. Edwards felt that Tuesday’s performance over the No. 17 team in Class A was the most complete of the year.

“I told the kids that you have to think about 10 years down the road — any regrets or what you should’ve, could’ve, would’ve (done),” he said. “It is just representing your school, your family and everybody that was at Leggett before you. It is starting to jell and they know it is playoff time.

I see serious on their face.” The game was the first competition in over a week for Kennard.

“We were very rusty,” Tiger coach Cory Carden said. “We came off of almost a week and a half of no basketball. It really kind of put a dent in what we’re doing. They got to play on Saturday and we could say excuses for all of that, but it came down to who wanted it more. I think they got more loose balls and they were scrapping too. They came out and won the first couple of minutes and I think that’s kind of what kept their momentum the rest of the game.”

Leggett established an early lead, but the Tigers would quickly recover. Hitting a 3-pointer to close the first quarter, Kennard held an 8-7 advantage.

Down 20-15 at the half, the Pirates went to work in the third. They began a 15-3 run to go up 12 until a Tiger 3-pointer from Dylan Cole ended the period.

“We got in foul trouble and we had to slow it down and play a half-court game,” Edwards said. (Our plan) was to press and run them. They broke it and they were banging us inside and they were physical at first. We had to change some stuff up in the second half and come with it.”

Edwards agreed that the offense was able to relax a bit after ditching the full-court press.

“We play different types and different styles. We can play slow or fast, but we have to go with what gets us

the win that night.”

Leggett’s Sells finished with 18 points, tops on the night. Teammate Parrish added eight and Francois hit an important bucket and free throws in the final quarter. Kennard’s Cole led the Tigers with eight points, while Jacob Catoe and Okoye Smotherman each had seven.

The Tigers finish the 2020-21 season with a district championship and plenty of individual accolades.

“We had a great year and I hate that it went down this way,” Carden said. “We’ve

played a lot better than this. We came out tonight, I think a little overconfident and rusty, but we had a great season. We topped at 17th in the state and I’m going to have an all-district MVP and I’m going to have first team all-district players. We had a great year, it is just that tonight was not our night. Games like this when it is playoff time, that one night is going to cost you. The playoffs are not forgiving at all.”



The best success has come below 10 feet in structures on spinners, crankbaits, and Carolina rigged worms. Crappie are fair on jigs moving in structures around creeks, timber, and cover. Catfish are good on cut and prepped bait.

FAIR. Water lightly stained; 47 degrees; 0.56 high. Black bass are fair on A-rigs and skirted jigs in 18-30' near creek bends, timber, rocky shorelines, and drop-offs. Crappie are

slow on minnows and jigs in brush piles and near open water bait schools. Catfish are fair on cut bait and punch bait in 12-25 near baited holes.

Caddo

SLOW. Water lightly stained; 46 degrees; 0.22 low. Largemouth bass are slow working brush hogs, crankbaits, and swimbaits near channel edges, boat docks, and creek mouths. Crappie are slow on minnows and jigs near brush piles and timber near a drop-off or creek channel in 14-24'. White bass are slow on slabs in the main lake. Chain Pickerel are slow with spoons and small jigs. Catfish are fair on punch bait fishing baited holes near channels and timber edges.

are good with live worms or crickets in shallow water.

Fork

SLOW. Water lightly stained; 47 degrees; 0.79 low. Largemouth bass are slow on spinners, spoons, crankbaits, and jigs near deep points, roadbeds, brush piles, timber, and rocky shorelines. White and yellow bass are slow in deeper water with slabs and

jigging spoons. Crappie are slow on minnows and jigs in 28-45' near bait schools in the main lake. Catfish are slow on punch bait and cut bait in 12-30'.

Houston County

FAIR. Water stained; 58 degrees; 0.21' high. Black bass are fair, with the spawn starting strong and fast, staying north and in vegetative cover, and shallow. Crappie are fair looking towards the eastern portions of the lake. Catfish are fair using live and cut shad, as well as boiled deer corn.

Lake O' the Pines

FAIR. Water clear; 48 degrees; 0.82 high. Largemouth bass are slow on plastic worms, bladed spinners, skirted jigs, and diving

crankbaits. Crappie are fair on minnows in the standing timber areas along the deep creek channels, brush piles, and open water bait schools near the dam. Catfish are fair with cut bait or punch bait in baited areas.

Livingston

FAIR. Water lightly stained; 58 degrees; 0.20' high. Largemouth bass are fair as we recover from cold conditions on Carolina rigged worms, spinners, and jigs. Striped bass are fair on spoons and live shad moving back to deeper shelves. Crappie are fair on minnows and jigs still in creeks. White bass are good on spoons in about 15 feet of water out from creeks. Catfish are fair on live baits.

2 Samuel 11:13 And when David had called him, he did eat and drink before him; and he made him drunk: and

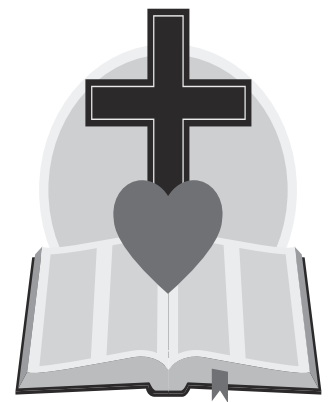
