LPD makes arrest in possible human trafficking sting

From the Livingston Police Department

The Livingston Police Department shut down a potential human-trafficking operation Monday afternoon.

Nelida Rojas Angulo, 24, of Houston was arrested at a residence located on the 1400 block of South Washington after LPD officers executed a search warrant. The officers were able to locate enough evidence to

establish probable cause for the search warrant after they were dispatched to the residence.

At approximately 12:50 p.m. Monday, LPD was dispatched to the residence after the department re-

ceived reports of subjects rushed into a residence. Once the search warrant was obtained, the search resulted in the discovery of 14 undocumented males inside a bedroom of the residence.

Upon further investigation, four of the 14 males were identified as juveniles between the ages of 13-16. During the search, Angulo also was obtained for further investigation. LPD then called on

Homeland Security to help with the investigation, to which the 14 individuals were released. It is believed that the residence was used to facilitate the transfer of undocumented individuals into the U.S.

County offering 3 types of Covid vaccines

Polk County citizens have options when it comes to the type of Covid-19 vaccines they receive.

Having offered the two-dose Moderna vaccine since the Covid vaccine distribution began, the county now offers the two-dose Pfizer vaccine and the one-dose Johnson & Johnson vaccine. Each distributor of the vaccine has certain ones that they offer, however.

"There are certain entities that will carry (Johnson

BLEEDING GREEN

Former Baylor player relishes alma mater's national title

It's safe to assume that Judson Pritchard bleeds green.

He graduated from Livingston High School, Lon Morris Junior College and Baylor University — whose primary school colors are green. Pritchard also coached at Arlington High School (primary color green) during his 38-year education career.

Lately, Pritchard has been on cloud nine. That's because his beloved alma mater, Baylor, won the NCAA men's basketball tournament Monday.

"The feeling Monday night was unbelievable," Pritchard said. "I'm so proud of the Baylor men's basketball team for what they did this season. Watching Baylor (against Gonzaga) you could see the speed. We're so proud of them for what they did. I talked to some former teammates, and we're just ecstatic about winning the national championship. Baylor was more physical and quicker, and they had the desire that they were going to win."

Pritchard is one of 13 members of his family who took classes at Baylor. His wife, Pat, attended Baylor as did the couple's two children, Jason and Allison. "Baylor is a family deal," Pritchard said. "It's a great university."

After graduating from Livingston High School in 1965, Pritchard attended Lon Morris for two years, where he played basketball. Following Lon Morris, he moved on to Baylor, where

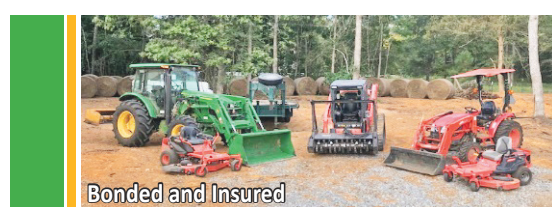
he played for the Bears in 1968 and 1969.

"Never made it to the NCAA tournament when I was at Baylor," Pritchard said. "Back then, we played in the Southwest Conference (SWC). We had great rivalries and knew a lot of the other players because we played against them in high school. It was tremendous and we hated to see the conference dissolve. We had some good teams up there."

After Baylor, Pritchard coached at Arlington High School and Denton High School for a total of 11 years. Then, he received an offer that he couldn't refuse.

"After college, I coached at Arlington and Denton then I got the call to come back to Livingston to be the high school principal," Pritchard said. "I came back to Livingston and put the rest of my career there. I was principal there for 11

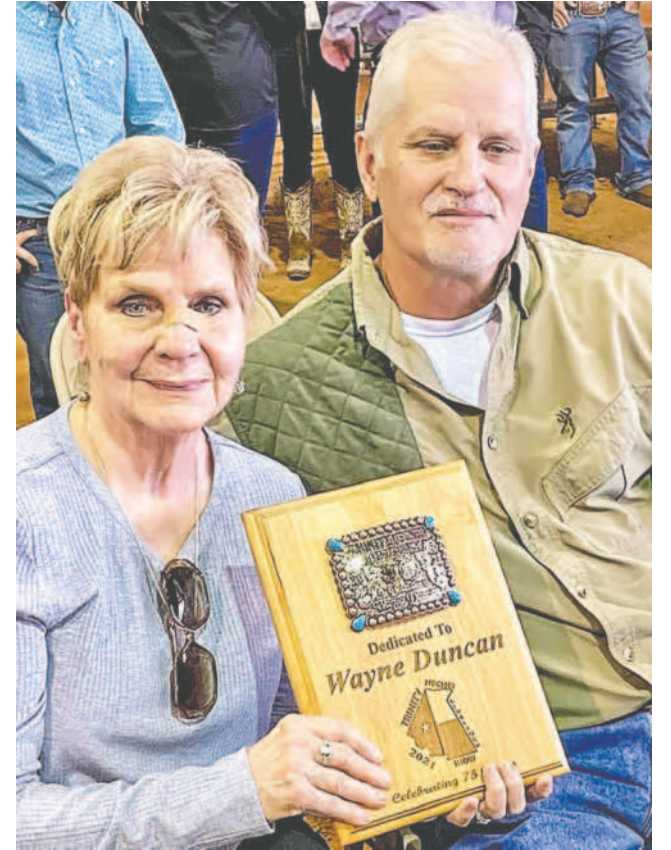

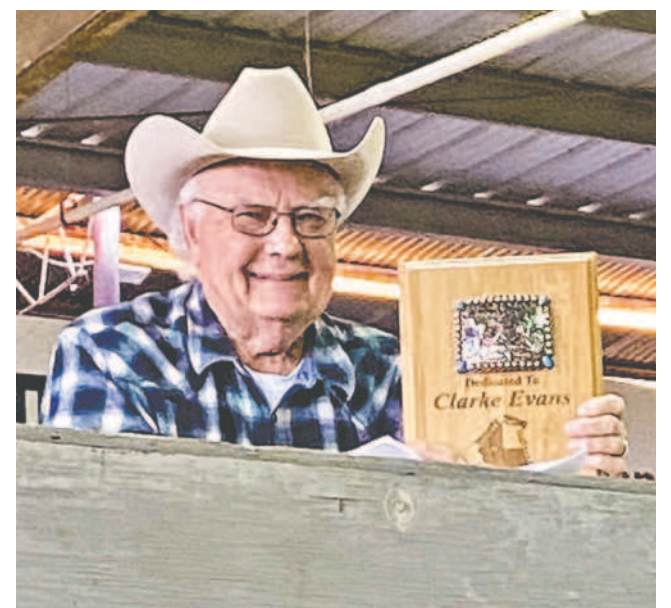

& Johnson) in the county," Polk County Emergency Management Coordinator Courtney Comstock said. "Johnson & Johnson is just one shot, Pfizer and Moderna are both two doses. The county has given Moderna most of the time, Pfizer requires more special care. It requires ultra-cold storage, and the one OEM gives is Moderna."

CHI St. Luke's Livingston Memorial Hospital, Livingston Pharmacy, Brookshire Brothers, West Park Primary Care and Health Center of Southeast Texas provide the Johnson & Johnson vaccine. CVS and Walgreens Pharmacies offer the Pfizer vaccine, and other entities offer Moderna.

"We have a list of the locations of places that are receiving allocations and the type of vaccine on the OEM website," Comstock said. "We encourage residents to check with these providers to see what they

have available. Moderna and Pfizer have higher coverage rates. A lot of people are seeking the Johnson & Johnson because it's just one shot so it's 'one-and-done.' We encourage people to get their vaccines."

Comstock also said that the volunteer clinics that the OEM has orchestrated at the Commerce Center in Livingston will be coming to a halt soon.

"Our last first-dose clinic will be Friday, and from this point forward, state hubs, pharmacies and medical providers will offer it," she said. "Some of the family medical clinics and pharmacies have more allocations, which makes it less sustainable for OEM to offer mass vaccination clinics. We'll finish out our second-dose clinics by May 18. We might do some sort of a special event with vaccines when those opportunities arise, but for the most part, we'll recommend people to the clinics and pharmacies. There has been a significant drop-off in participation in our mass vaccination clinics. Therefore, it is no

longer sustainable to utilize County and volunteer resources in order to keep mass vaccination clinics going. According to our health district, this trend spans beyond our county. Other counties have experienced significant drop-offs in mass vaccination clinic registrations as well."

Polk County Local Health Authority Dr. Raymond Luna also released a statement regarding the vaccines:

"The Covid-19 vaccine is safe. The biotech firms, Pfizer, Moderna and Johnson & Johnson have each developed COVID vaccines. These companies rigorously tested their vaccines for safety. Their safety data was reviewed by independent scientists with the Food and Drug Administration who then approved the vaccines for general use. Since then, more than 130 million doses of vaccine have been given in the United States and there is absolutely no evidence to suggest these vaccines are not safe. It's effective. All three of these vaccines are

good at preventing all Covid infections and they are extremely good at preventing the most serious cases that result in hospitalization or death. It's also available. Anyone 18 years of age and older qualifies for a vaccine.

years, then I moved to the central office as the personnel director and they added another title called the 'athletic director.' I had both titles at the time. I was with LISD for 27 and retired in 2007."

Although Pritchard and his wife are both Baylor graduates, they did not meet at Baylor. They actually met while living in Arlington.

"We went to a Baylor function, we started dating and the rest is history," Pritchard said.

Jason Pritchard followed in Judson's footsteps and played basketball at Baylor. The younger Pritchard attended Baylor for four years — three as a basketball player, one as a baseball player.

"Jason played from

2000-02 and he enjoyed it," Pritchard said. "He had offers from several other schools, but decided to go to Baylor. His senior year, he decided to try baseball. He tried out for the baseball team and he ended up getting drafted by the Phillies in the 35th round. After hurting his arm, he went back to Baylor to get his master's degree in sports management."

Pritchard's daughter also went to Baylor, albeit she didn't marry a Baylor graduate. Her better half graduated from Texas A&M.

"Allison married an Aggie," Pritchard said. "When I was in school A&M was all-male and they had to come to Baylor to date the Baylor girls."

Pritchard was quick to point out that when he played basketball, there was no 3-pointer. He believes the game has changed since the advent of the 3-point shot in the 1980s.

"Basketball was a two-point game when I played," Pritchard said. "The three-point play only happened if you made the basket and got fouled. Nowadays, they call it 'the old-fashioned three-point play.' It was something to get a three-point play. I think the 3-pointer added more scoring to the game. It also helped the guards become more of a factor. When I played, the big men dominated the game. It was put the ball inside to the big man. When they put in the 3-pointer, it opened things

up a little bit. I think it's great. The game has shifted into more of a little guy's game, and the speed is unbelievable. I was a forward. I'm 6-foot-4 and I was small. We had some good teams there. We played more of a set-offense, half-court style. We'd get the rebound, walk the ball up the court, run the offense and hustle back to play defense."

It's been a year since Pritchard attended a Baylor basketball game. The last one he attended was one for the ages, however, as No. 2 Kansas outlasted No. 1 Baylor, 64-61.

"It was No. 1 vs. No. 2 — we were No. 1, they were No. 2," Pritchard said. "They came to the Ferrell Center and it was a heck of a game. ESPN College GameDay was there, too. Kansas won by three points."

Pritchard had his take on this year's Baylor team as well. To say he's proud of the Bears would be an understatement.

"The difference between this Baylor team and previous ones was they had a lot more talent and experience," Pritchard said. "The portal transfers changed the game. We got three transfers who redshirted last year and were able to play this year. The experience paid off tremendously. Baylor played tremendous defense the other night. The 3-pointer made basketball a guard-oriented game. Once Baylor opened it up along the perimeter and drew those Gonzaga guys

away from the basket, we were shooting layups. We did that against Houston, too. We're so much quicker. They were in Waco every weekend. Last year, they could've won, but Covid-19 ended the tournament. They were No. 1 for a long time, too. They didn't get to finish and play last year."

The celebration continued into last week for Pritchard. It also involved a reunion of sorts.

"My favorite thing about playing basketball at Baylor was the camaraderie with my teammates," Pritchard said. "We're still friends. After the game Monday night, we called and texted each other. In fact, 4-5 of us met in Huntsville Tuesday and we reminisced about how great the Baylor team was. We're still friends and we go back to football and basketball games."

Pritchard also is proud of the three-time national champion Baylor Lady Bears. He also happens to be proud of the students he worked with in Livingston ISD.

"My highlight as an administrator in LISD was the students," Pritchard said. "Livingston has a lot of really good students. I enjoyed my time being principal at the high school and seeing the kids mature and grow, then go off to college, the service or work. They became outstanding citizens."

Peterson loses bid for congressional seat to Babin

If the third time wasn't the charm, odds are the fourth time might not be either. Donna Peterson had tried three times prior to April 1996 to gain a seat representing Polk and 18 other counties in the U.S. Congress. Each time, she made it to the general election but failed to unseat longtime District 2 Congressman Charles Wilson.

In April 1996, Wilson had retired and, with his Congressional seat wide open, the election had drawn a large number of candidates from both parties. So many, in fact, that there was no clear winner in the March Republican primary election.

A runoff between the top two finishers, Peterson and Brian Babin, was held on

April 9, 1996. And, although Peterson won in Polk County, Babin carried 16 of the 19 counties in the district and ended up winning handily, garnering a total 7,160 votes to Peterson's 3,628.

As the clear winner, Babin would go on to face Democrat Jim Turner, who had defeated two primary challengers to secure his party's nomination without a runoff, in the November 1996 general election.

There were no local races on the ballot for the April 1996 runoff election, but voters did have to decide on

a Democratic candidate to challenge incumbent U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm. Victor Morales won that runoff, defeating John Bryant. Once again, Polk Countians went against the tide, favoring Bryant.

The remaining runoff races were for nominations to Places 1, 2 and 3 on the Texas Criminal Court of Appeals.

On the Republican ticket, Sue Holland handily defeated James "Daniel" Boone for the Place 1 nomination. Polk Countians agreed with that choice.

Also on the Republican side, Paul Womack defeated Pat Barber for the Place 2 nomination. Local voters went along with the statewide trend.

The Place 3 Republican nomination went to Tom Price, who defeated Cheryl Johnson. Polk Countians also agreed with that choice.

On the Democratic ticket, Charles Holcomb defeated Gary Taylor statewide to secure the nomination for Place 2 on the court, with local voters also narrowly favoring Holcomb.

As might be expected, there was generally low voter turnout for the April runoff election, but the congressional race between Babin and Peterson had stirred local interest. In Polk County, 769 Republicans cast ballots, compared to 758 Democrats.

Also in April 1996:

- With the runoff elections settled, it was time to

look ahead to the summer party conventions and the November general election. It was announced in April that local Democrats had elected its delegates to attend the party's June state convention in Dallas.

Local delegates, with Richard Gilbert serving as chair, were Claude Baldree, Elgin Davis, Thurman Hullett, Jean Kalina, Karen Lantron, Kay LaRue, Tammy Polk, Cannon Pritchard, Bobbie Shaffer, Bobby Smith, Ellery Speight, Perry Tanner, Dennis Teal, Sharon Teal, John West, Fred Wilson and Rosemary Wilson.

Local Republicans were apparently waiting until a little closer to the date of their convention to announce their picks.

OATES CEMETERY IN LEGGETT

INSCRIPTION ON MARKER:
Caraway Oats moved to Polk County from Alabama during the late 1850s with his wife, Catharine (Skinner) Oats, their seven grown children and their extended families. Oats purchased property at this site in 1857 from N.D. Labadie, who had received the land by patent from the republic of Texas in 1845. When Caraway Oats died in 1861, he was buried on his homestead, establishing Oates Cemetery. The second burial at the site was that of Caraway's son, Nathan Oates, who died in 1863 at the Battle of Chickamauga while serving in the Confederate Army. After the war, Nathan's mother had his body brought from Georgia to be interred in the family burial ground. Through the years, additional descendants, relatives



and neighbors were buried at the site, and the cemetery became a community one, serving the residents of Shady Grove, Jones Prairie and Leggett.

Burials at the site include veterans of military conflicts dating from the Civil War. Several men interred at the site served as Polk County officials. Henry Hutto served as county sheriff, county commissioner, and justice of the peace during the period 1861-1883. W.J. Gallo way served as sheriff in 1868

and 1876 and as tax assessor 1873-1877. John R. Oates served as a county commissioner from 1871 until 1875 and was elected as justice of the peace in 1888 and 1890. J.B. Taylor served as county commissioner 1889-1891 and as justice of the peace 1893-1903. W.A. Peebles served as deputy county clerk during the 1860s and county constable during the 1880s. J.M. Singletary was elected county commissioner in 1900 and W. J. Tullos served as county judge 1931-1939.

Caraway Oats was a prosperous farmer in Henry County, Alabama. News of fine farming land in this area attracted the attention of several Henry County residents. Caraway Oats made an exploratory trip

by horseback to check out the stories. According to family lore, he was so enthused about the rich soil, that before he returned home, he put a sample of the soil in his saddle bags to show his neighbors in Henry County. He moved his three sons and four daughters and their families in 1857 to Polk County after purchasing 4,511 acres from N. D. Labadie.

For some reason, the second generation of Oats changed the spelling of their last name to Oates.

Therefore, the cemetery is known as the Oates Cemetery and also the Oats Cemetery.

It is located in Leggett on Upper Leggett Road just off 942 East.

Remembering the good old days in Goodrich

I enjoyed a wonderful visit with Anita Sue Kinne Campbell this past weekend. Anita Sue was kind enough to share some of her written memories of growing up in our Goodrich community with me so I could share them with all of you.

This week I am going to share one that she titled The Good Old School Days...so in her own words:

The Good Old School Days by Anita Sue Campbell:

"April Fool's Day was a special event at my high school one year. We, (the entire high school which was probably about 40-50 students, except for two girls in my home room who were straight "A" students and had not missed a day) walked away from school up the powder dusty road to my house, hitched my dad's flat bed trailer to the back of Verlan's car and headed to the woods (with peanut butter and jelly sandwiches).

We played in the gullies washed out by a creek that had dried up a few years before, throwing dirt clods at each other, choosing up

sides and playing until all of one side had been hit by a clod. We chased an armadillo to its hole and tried to catch it by pulling on its tail to keep it from going into its hole until the scale slipped off its tail into Peter's hand and it was gone.

As it grew late we built a bonfire and just as we were settling down to enjoy it, the Ag teacher (and bus driver) found us and informed us the bus had left with the grammar school children and he was there to take the Swab City students home in his car. Nothing was said or done regarding our exit from school that day. It was certainly one of the highlights of my youth.

Another time I remember my dad loved to work on cars in his spare time and he and I traveled to the Valley with my Aunt and Uncle and drove a Model T back

to Goodrich. We had to stop along the way and fill a jug with water from the road ditches and pour it into the radiator to make it home.

He then took parts from another Model T and made one good car and painted the motor what he called sky-blue-pink, and we kids had a special little car to drive around Livingston on Saturday nights. Everybody had to have a turn driving it.

It had the spark on the steering column and made the nicest put-put sound as we idled around town waiting for the midnight show to start. One sunny afternoon my cousin and a classmate that lived up the road from us and I drove away from the school in this Model T up the road to the creek that runs along the farm-to-market road to our houses. We parked and waded into the creek.

The water was so cold and the sandy bottom so soft. We sat down in the water as it tugged at our dresses and played with the tadpoles swimming around and around in a little cove. We chased butterflies

In my column about these two gentlemen I noted that hopefully we could get together again and I could record more of their memories of a Polk County that most of us never lived thru. I will always regret not making that visit happen but my accident last year and Covid happened but regardless of the excuses I will still always regret not making that visit happen.

So learn from this... make time to visit with the elders that you know, write their memories down...I promise one day you or your children will be glad you did.

Conquering My Culinary Bucket List One Dish at a Time

WHAT IS VANILLA BEAN PASTE?

Vanilla bean paste is made by blending concentrated vanilla extract and vanilla bean powder, creating a paste with a maple syrup-like consistency that contains flecks from the pod and has a more intense flavor than extract.

Evidently you can buy it already made, but I couldn't find it locally and didn't have time to order it online so I decided to look for ways to make it.

I found a recipe online for Homemade Vanilla Bean Paste at dessertswithbenefits.com but it made two cups and required 30 vanilla beans. Well I knew I didn't need two cups and I also knew that I couldn't afford 30 vanilla beans. Have you priced vanilla beans lately? Jeez! I only bought two and I don't want Hubby knowing what I paid for them.

Anyway, the recipe called for vanilla beans, vanilla extract and agave nectar. So I just used some good old-fashioned fifth grade long division of the listed ingredient amounts to determine the amount I needed. If you have any left over, store the vanilla bean paste in the fridge.

I handled the vanilla beans just like I've seen before on TV. With a sharp knife blade, make a long cut, lengthwise, down the bean. Using your thumbs, gently pull the pod open and then hold open with the thumb and index finger of one hand while your other hand uses the blade of the knife to gently scrape the beans lengthwise, down and away from the inside of the pod.

I'll be honest with you. It was considerably more difficult than they make it look on TV and it makes a bit of a mess. However, once you combine it with the vanilla extract and the agave nectar and make your vanilla bean paste, it tastes so excellent that it's worth every bit of the hassle. I promise.

Agave nectar can be found in a plastic, squeeze bottle on the same aisle as the sugar.

As a child, I think I could have eaten my weight in French toast. I remember many a Saturday morning when me, my little brother and our baby sister were splayed out on pallets on the living room floor watching cartoons while our sweet mother made slice after slice of French toast just to our individual liking, much like a short-order cook. My brother preferred his with butter and syrup. Finding the syrup cloyingly sweet for my taste, I preferred mine with butter and powdered sugar, and the more powdered

sugar, the better. I loved the distinct taste made by the combination of the warm, salty, melted butter and the powdered sugar.

I honestly couldn't tell you the last time I ate French toast. As an adult, my tastes veer in the savory direction, such as bacon and eggs with salt and lots of pepper.

However, when I recently saw Jeff Mauro, one of the hosts of "The Kitchen," one of my favorite shows on the Food Network, make something called Lemon Blueberry French Toast Bake, I found myself intrigued.

Lemon and blueberry are two items that pair perfectly. When you eat them together they each seem to elevate the

flavor of the other. Kind of like when you combine tomatoes, garlic and basil. Certain ingredient combinations are just so perfect together that, if you're like me, you get to the point where you just can't imagine one without the other.

This dish is a multi-step process. You'll need to assemble it the night before you plan on serving it, as it needs to be refrigerated for at least eight hours before baking. I promise you though, it will be well worth your efforts. I enjoyed a bowl of it with a fresh hot cup of coffee and found it so delightful that I immediately scooped up a second bowl of it to deliver to one of my friends at her office. It's that good!

LEMON BLUEBERRY FRENCH TOAST BAKE

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup (2 sticks) unsalted butter, at room temperature, plus more for greasing
- ¾ cup maple syrup, plus more for serving
- 2 teaspoons vanilla bean paste, divided (See note above)
- One 12-ounce package Hawaiian slider rolls
- 1 tablespoon lemon zest
- 1 pint fresh blueberries
- ¾ cup whole milk
- ½ cup heavy cream
- ½ cup sugar
- 3 large eggs
- Kosher salt
- 4 pieces cooked bacon, finely chopped, for garnish


DIRECTIONS

- Grease an 8-inch square baking dish with butter.
- Add the butter to the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with a whisk attachment and whip on medium speed for 1 minute. With the mixer running, slowly pour in the maple syrup and 1 teaspoon of the vanilla bean paste and whip until completely combined. Transfer to a serving bowl and reserve.
- Keep the rolls intact and slice across the equator to create 1 large top and 1 large bottom roll. Place the bottom roll in the baking dish, then spread with 2 tablespoons of the maple butter. Sprinkle with the lemon zest and half of the blueberries and top with the top roll.
- In a medium bowl, whisk together the milk, cream, sugar, eggs, remaining 1 teaspoon vanilla bean paste and a pinch of salt. Pour the mixture over the rolls. Cover and refrigerate at least 8 hours.

- Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F.
- Cover the baking dish with foil and bake for 40 to 45 minutes. Remove the foil, then continue to bake until golden brown, about 10 more minutes.
- Arrange scoops of the maple butter on top and sprinkle with the bacon and remaining blueberries. Serve with additional maple syrup if desired.

MY NOTES

- Place your square Pyrex dish on a foil-lined sheet pan to collect any leakage. I didn't do this and I regretted it. Some of the sweet juices overflowed and made a mess of the bottom of my stove. Ugh.



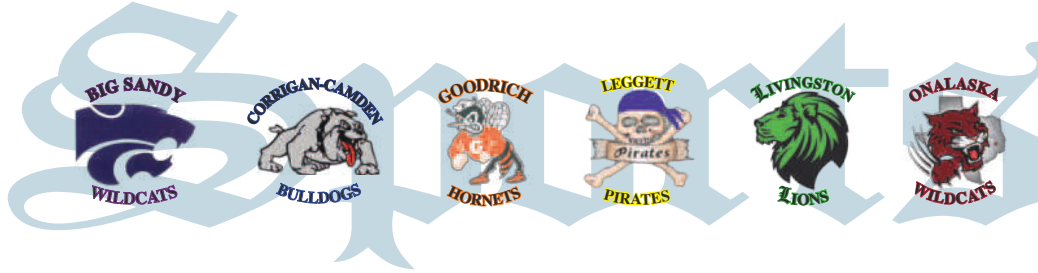

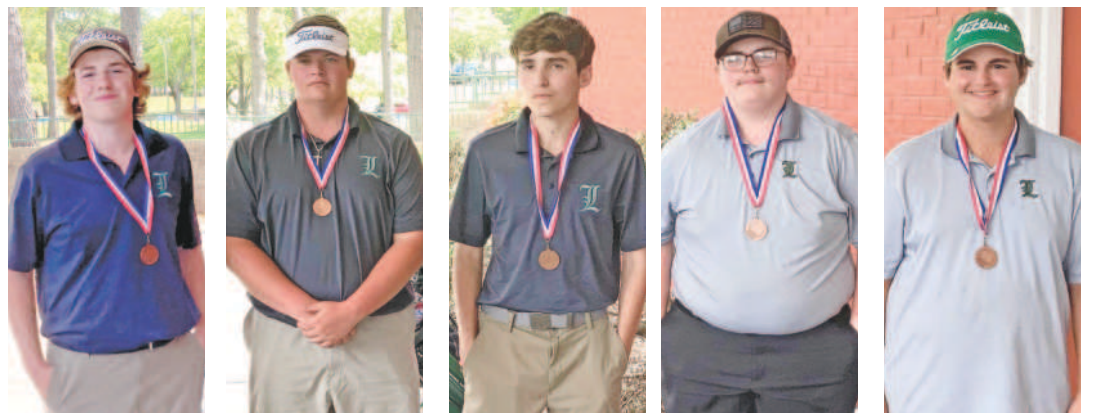

Catfish are good on cut and prepped bait, moving further north in the lake.

GOOD. Water clear; 60 degrees; 0.08 high. Black bass are good on top waters, finesse jigs, chatter baits, frogs, and skirted jigs in 2-8" near shorelines, brush, and in the creeks. Crappie are good on minnows and chartreuse jigs in brush piles and near creeks. Catfish are good on cut bait and punch bait in 8-15 near

baited holes.
Caddo
GOOD. Water clear; 61 degrees; 1.40 high. Largemouth bass are good working bladed spinners, square billed crankbaits, skirted jigs, and drop shots near coves and creek mouths. Crappie are good on minnows and jigs near brush piles and creeks. White bass are good on slabs in the creeks and shallow channels. Chain pickerel are good with spoons and small jigs. Catfish are fair on punch bait, chicken liver, and cut bait fishing baited holes near channels and timber edges.

Conroe
GREAT. Water stained; 64 degrees; 0.21' low. Largemouth bass are great on worms, and crankbait. If you don't get a bite in the structure within 6-10 casts,

keep moving. Crappie are good on live bait wanting structure in coves and creeks. Hybrid striped bass are good following baitfish on rattletails. Catfish are good on stinkbait and cut bait. Sunfish are good with live worms or crickets in shallow water.

Fork
FAIR. Water lightly stained; 59-62 degrees; 0.35 low. Largemouth bass are fair on bladed spinners, crankbaits, jerk baits, curly-tailed worms and skirted jigs in 2-8". White and yellow bass are fair with spoons and swimbaits in the creeks and feeder arms. Crappie are good on minnows and jigs near docks and creeks. Catfish are slow on punch bait and cut bait in 8-20'.

Houston County
GOOD. Water stained;

65 degrees; 0.06' high. Black bass are good moving just out from standing vegetation on Carolina rigs, and jigs letting your bait sink deeper than last week. Crappie are fair working timber, and back around the pier on jigs. Catfish are fair using live and cut shad, as well as boiled deer corn.

Lake O' the Pines
GOOD. Water lightly stained; 59 degrees; 0.70 high. Largemouth bass are good on crankbaits, jigs, topwater and jerk baits in shallow water. Crappie are good on minnows in the brush piles and creeks. Catfish are fair with cut bait, chicken liver, or punch bait in baited areas.

Livingston
FAIR. Water lightly stained; 66 degrees; 0.12' high. Largemouth bass are

good on Carolina rigged worms, spinners, and jigs searching around points still working around 10 feet and less. Striped bass are slow with less activity. Crappie are fair on minnows and jigs settling under structures and very vegetative spots. White bass remain excellent moving between points and drops on small spinners and live bait. Catfish are fair on live baits throughout and excel at night.

Martin Creek
FAIR. Water lightly stained; 64 degrees; 0.04 low. Largemouth bass are fair on jigs, tubes, crankbaits, and swimbaits. Crappie are fair on minnows and jigs in 9-18" in timber and brush piles. Catfish are fair on punch bait and live bait.

Nacogdoches
GOOD. Water lightly

stained; 64-67 degrees; Largemouth bass are good as spawn comes to an end. Fish 7 feet and less of structures using Carolina rigged skinny long plastic worms, spinners, and smaller quick running crankbait. Crappie are fair with jigs using lighter colors over shallow brush and under man-made structures. Sunfish are fair on jigs, and crickets. Catfish are good on dough balls, cut, and live bait.

Raven
FAIR. Water stained; 66 degrees; Largemouth bass are good staying within 30 yards of banks and structures with worms and spinners in a depth of around 8 feet. Sunfish are fair on cutworms striking quick and hard from undercover and better at night.

Advances in DNA technology aids crime investigators

One of the most prolific ways to catch criminals these days is through the use of DNA. I am sure most of the readers are familiar with the term DNA, as most crime shows on television elicit its use to tell stories and identify potential suspect(s) present at the scene of the crime.

DNA stands for deoxyribonucleic acid, which is a molecule composed of two polynucleotide chains that coil around each other to form a double helix. They carry genetic instructions for the development, functioning, growth and reproduction of all known organisms and many viruses.

The scientific definition sounds cool, but in basic terms it is the fundamental building block for an individual's entire genetic makeup. DNA is a component

of virtually every cell in the human body, furthermore, a person's DNA is the same in every cell. For example, the DNA in a person's blood is the same as the DNA in their semen, skin cells, tissue, organs, muscle, brain cells, bone, teeth, hair, saliva, mucus, perspiration, fingernails, urine, feces, vomitus etc. (also known as biological evidence).

With advances in DNA technology over the past

40 years, the use of DNA as a tool/evidence has been greatly elevated and become the standard in identifying and placing individuals at crime scenes. Fingerprint identification still remains the bread and butter for criminal identifications in law enforcement investigations, but DNA has opened a whole new world of ways to identify criminals and to strengthen the evidence trinity.

Just as fingerprints developed at a crime scene can be scanned into AFIS (Automated Fingerprint Identification System) in search of a suspect or link and individual to a crime scene, DNA profiles from a crime scene can be uploaded into the CODIS database (Combined DNA Index System), providing law enforcement the greater ability to identify

possible suspects when no prior suspect existed.

DNA evidence is used to solve crimes in two ways: If a suspect is known, a sample of that person's DNA can be compared to biological evidence found at a crime scene. The results of this comparison may then help establish whether the suspect was at the crime scene or whether he or she committed the crime.

Secondly, if a suspect is not known, biological evidence from the crime scene can be analyzed and compared to offender profiles in existing DNA databases to assist in identifying a suspect. Through the use of DNA databases, biological evidence found at one crime scene can also be connected to other crime scenes, linking them to the same perpetrator or perpetrators.

DNA databases have also evolved to include the use of GEDmatch, Family Tree DNA and genetic genealogy that law enforcement can utilize to solve crimes. Using these databases is far more challenging, but they have provided familial DNA that has helped solve many cold cases to include Joseph James DeAngelo Jr. -- the Golden State Killer out of California.

DNA profiling can be used in a variety of manners when involving law enforcement. It is used in broad range of crimes, body identification and in some cases, paternity testing.

With all good things there are drawbacks and DNA is no exception to this. Misconceptions may be drawn about what DNA match really means. Matching DNA from a crime scene to DNA

taken from a suspect is not an absolute guarantee of the suspect's guilt. Instead, forensic experts prefer to talk about probability. Another misconception is how DNA analysis is portrayed in movies and television which contribute to the "CSI effect."

The "CSI effect" manifests itself when jurors demand DNA tests in cases where they are unnecessary or rely too heavily on DNA evidence. Other drawbacks may include DNA fraud where criminals plant fake DNA samples at a crime scene. Identical twins also pose a problem whereas both their DNAs are an exact match. This is where the use of fingerprint identification comes back into play.

I worked a case where

DNA was key in identifying the mastermind of a group of individuals that had pulled off some daring casino robberies at the MGM Grand, Mandalay Bay, Bellagio and Desert Inn, as well as killed two armored truck guards at a local strip mall. The group of individuals were led by Jose Vigoa, a Cuban refugee with former training as a special forces soldier with the Cuban Army.

I was dispatched to the Bellagio Hotel on the busiest part of the Las Vegas tourist corridor called The Strip. A well-disguised Jose Vigoa in conjunction with his brother-in-law,

Luis Suarez, made a daring daytime robbery of the main casino cage. Vigoa robbed the cage of approximately \$200,000 dollars at gunpoint with many unsuspecting tourists gambling just feet from him. While engaging the cashiers at gunpoint, he leaned his left forearm on top of the marble counter for support and that was his downfall.

Up to this point we were not successful with obtaining any fingerprints or DNA that could identify our suspects, but a mistake was finally made. All Las Vegas casino activities are heavily monitored via hundreds of surveillance cameras, making this such a brazen and daring robbery. The surveillance video

captured Vigoa's mistake of placing his left forearm on the counter surface. The big break we received was news that the counter had been cleaned just prior to the robbery, making the counter an ideal surface for the recovery of a sample of what turned out to be Vigoa's DNA.

Because the suspects were always disguised this helped break the case wide open when we were able to attach a name to the DNA sample after comparison.

The discovery of Vigoa's DNA allowed all the pieces of the puzzle to be linked. Vigoa received four non-parole life sentences, plus an additional 306 to 760 years in prison for his role in the robberies and homicides.

Two additional suspects who were both brothers-in-

law of Vigoa, Luis Suarez and Pedro Duarte were also found guilty. Luis Suarez was sentenced to 15 years in prison for his role in the Bellagio robbery, while Pedro Duarte was sentenced to 16 to 70 years in prison for his role in the attempted robbery of the Desert Inn. The fourth suspect, Oscar Sanchez Cisneros, who implicated Vigoa and the others in the various crimes, committed suicide in jail while awaiting trial.

This was a very complicated case with many facets to include multiple crime scenes, car chases, an attempt escape from jail, a suicide and lots of corroborating evidence. All were triggered by a sample of DNA identifying the main suspect.


